Gangs: Extended Family

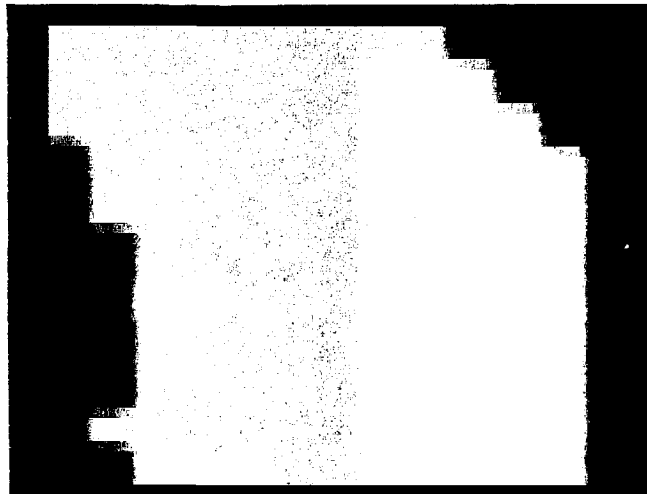
- Often bonded by commonality (ethnic background, social, economical status)
