### CONFESSION AND FORGIVENESS

We begin our worship by freeing ourselves from the baggage we have carried around this week.

# **WORD** God speaks to us in scripture readings, preaching, and song

### FIRST READING

### Isaiah 6:1-8

Through a vision in the temple, the eighthcentury prophet Isaiah is called by God to announce judgment against Israel. Aware of his sinfulness and shortcomings, Isaiah is initially hesitant. But when God calls, Isaiah responds, "Here am I; send me!" In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lofty; and the hem of The Lord's robe filled the temple. Seraphs were in attendance above the Lord; each had six wings: with two they covered their faces, and with two they covered their feet, and with two they flew. And one called to another and said: "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts; the whole earth is full of the glory of the Lord."

The pivots on the thresholds shook at the voices of those who called, and the house filled with smoke. And I said: "Woe is me! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips; yet my eyes have seen the Sovereign, the Lord of hosts!"

Then one of the seraphs flew to me, holding a live coal that had been taken from the altar with a pair of tongs. The seraph touched my mouth with it and said: "Now that this has touched your lips, your guilt has departed and your sin is blotted out." Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" And I said, "Here am I; send me!"

The word of the Lord. **Thanks be to God.** 




### PSALM

### Psalm 138

The psalms were the original prayer book of God's people and capture the full gamut of human emotion.

The choir sing the refrain, which is repeated by the assembly. The choir sings the verses.



- 1. I thank you, Lord, with all my heart; you have heard the words of my mouth. In the presence of the angels I praise you. I bow down toward your holy temple.
- 2. I give thanks to your name for your merciful love and your faithfulness. You have exalted your name over all. On the day I called, you answered me; you increased the strength of my soul.
- 3. All earth's kings shall thank you, O Lord, when they hear the words of your mouth. They shall sing of the ways of the Lord, "How great is the glory of the Lord!"
- 4. With your right hand you save me; the Lord will accomplish this for me. O Lord, your merciful love is eternal; discard not the work of your hands.

### SECOND READING

### 1 Corinthians 13:1-13

Christians in Corinth prided themselves on their spiritual gifts. Paul reminds them that God gives us many gifts through the Holy Spirit, but the purpose behind all of them is love, the kind of love that God showed us in Jesus Christ.

### GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

**We stand** to welcome Christ, the living word of God, in the gospel reading. Now I would remind you, brothers and sisters, of the good news that I proclaimed to you, which you in turn received, in which also you stand, through which also you are being saved, if you hold firmly to the message that I proclaimed to you—unless you have come to believe in vain.

For I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me. For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me has not been in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them—though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. Whether then it was I or they, so we proclaim and so you have come to believe.

The word of the Lord. **Thanks be to God.**

Luke 4:14-21

Near the beginning of Jesus' public ministry, he visits his hometown of Nazareth. In the words of Isaiah, he states and claims his identity, purpose, and mission.



## The Holy Gospel according to Luke. Glory to you, O Lord.

Once while Jesus was standing beside the lake of Gennesaret, and the crowd was pressing in on him to hear the word of God, he saw two boats there at the shore of the lake; the fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. He got into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon, and asked him to put out a little way from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat. When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into the deep water and let down your nets for a catch." Simon answered, "Master, we have worked all night long but have caught nothing. Yet if you say so, I will let down the nets."

When they had done this, they caught so many fish that their nets were beginning to break. So they signaled their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both boats, so that they began to sink. But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, "Go away from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man!" For he and all who were with him were amazed at the catch of fish that they had taken; and so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. Then Jesus said to Simon, "Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching people." When they had brought their boats to shore, they left everything and followed him.




### For those worshipping from home:

Just as the risen Christ knows no bounds, you are included in this celebration, and are one with the whole body of Christ across all time and space. You are invited to pray the following prayer:



### LAMB OF GOD

To call Jesus the "lamb of God" is to identify him with the Passover lamb in the lewish scriptures. In ancient temple worship, the lamb symbolically bore the sins of the people in sacrifice, and was then shared as a sign of God's forgiveness. In Holy Communion, we feast on the presence of Christ. who has freed us from sin and death.

### **MUSIC NOTES**

The prelude for today was written by Piet Post, a 20<sup>th</sup> century Dutch organist and composer is based on the melody of the gathering hymn, *Holy, Holy, Holy, Holy*. This hymn tune, which was written by John B. Dykes specifically to accompany this hymn text, is named after the Council of Nicaea (A.D. 325) at which the early church leaders affirmed and outlined the doctrine of the Trinity. The Postlude was written by John Stanley (1712 – 1786), an English organist and composer and is taken from his collection of 30 organ *voluntaries,* a generic term for an organ composition of moderate length. Though rendered nearly blind by a childhood accident, Stanley was extremely talented and studied "with great diligence" under Maurice Greene, the organist at St. Paul's Cathedral in London. He was first appointed as the organist of All Hallows Bread Street (in London) when he was only 11 years of age, and, when he was 17, became the youngest person ever to obtain his Bachelor of Music degree from Oxford University.
