A Difference that Matters

Every time that we baptize a child in this church, one of the elders always asks the congregation to make a vow along with the other vows of the parents. Together, right in front of God and everybody, we all make a solemn promise. "Do you the members of the Church of Jesus Christ, promise to guide and nurture this child, by word and deed, to love and pray for, encouraging this child to know and follow Christ and to be a faithful member of his Church?" "We do!"

So how are we doing at faithfully fulfilling this very important oath? As parents, grandparents and as a church, how are we helping educate and nurture faith in the children whom God has entrusted to us? What are we doing to teach and demonstrate to them that they are loved and uniquely blessed by God? Are they experiencing God's mercy and grace as a part of their lives and spiritual development? What have our children learned about prayer and worship? Have they known and felt the hope and abiding presence of God for themselves? Which of the great Bible stories or parables of Jesus do they know and love best?

Our children are often beginning to learn their ABC's by age two. Many can count to one hundred by the time they are four, and they can probably outscore us by millions of points on their favorite video game. However, what do they know of Abraham, Moses, Solomon, Peter, Andrew, John Calvin or Martin Luther? Do they know about Joseph and Mary? Do they understand why there are no elves in the Nativity set? What do our children believe and understand about the difference between Santa Claus and Jesus Christ?

Let me suggest, and I challenge you to ask your child or grandchild to retell the Christmas story in as much detail as they can remember --- and be warned. What you hear may come as a shock. The story that you hear may well involve the Grinch, maybe a snowman, or elves and reindeer. However, how could our children learn what Christmas is really about if they are primarily influenced by our culture and Christmas specials on TV?

From Thanksgiving on, the airwaves and TV stations are filled with Holiday Music, very little of which includes church music. Instead of Christmas Programs at school, we have Winter Concerts. Many of our children and youth do not know enough of the Christmas hymns to go caroling without song sheets. If we are not deliberate in teaching our faith through Christmas carols and hymns, how will we pass on that great heritage to the next generation? If we do not specifically teach our children and raise their awareness, how will we counteract the selfishness and greed promoted by the materialism and consumerism involved in the marketing of Christmas to children?

We first acquire our knowledge of God from the environment in which we are raised. We receive our religious inheritance from both home and church, against the deceptions lived and taught within and by our culture. Our principal religious tutor is a loving and faithful family, and our church has vowed to support them as the extended family of God. Our challenge and primary task is the spiritual formation of those whom God has entrusted to this congregation. The Advent/Christmas season is an ideal opportunity for meaningful Christian education.

The first and most important thing we can do to prepare our children for Advent is to prepare ourselves first. After all, if we are impatient and crabby - pressured by all the busyness of this season - we will not be very good at teaching our children anything about quiet, expectant waiting. If they do not hear us talk about our faith, our hope and our walk with the Lord, then how will they learn? In addition, if they only hear "the coming of Jesus" talked about at church, but never hear us talk about the meaning of the coming of Jesus for us, what is the message we are giving them?

There are many opportunities for us to teach and foster faith in our children during Advent and Christmas. When Christmas cards arrive, talk to your children about the difference between a secular perspective and those, which reflect the true meaning of Christmas, the coming of Christ. When you hear Christmas music, have a conversation about those with biblical themes and those, which do not. When you watch TV, help your children by discussing examples of how the world misunderstands what Christmas is truly intended to celebrate. We can look for opportunities to talk about what Christmas and our traditions mean to us and to our family. We can look for new and meaningful ways to focus on the true meaning of Christmas -- the reason for the celebration -- His birth. Sometime during Advent we can set aside some time for reading together as a family the true and real Christmas story from Matthew 1:18-2:23 and Luke 1:5-2:52. A Christmas of Santa Claus or Jesus Christ, it is a difference that truly matters. May our children be nurtured within a godly environment and one that reflects God's own steadfast loving kindness and gracious purpose.


Iglesia del Pueblo's First Baptism

RICARDO AND REYNA GREEN

We are often surprised at the people whom God chooses to do His work. That is certainly the case with Ricardo Green, who, along with his wife Reyna, are our Missionaries of the Month. We have been helping to support Ricardo and Reyna since 1999. The Greens recently ended their ten year mission to Brazil and are now living temporarily in Decatur, Georgia.

Ricardo was born and raised in Honduras, one of the poorest countries in the western hemisphere. When he was 18 and just out of high school, he sneaked across the Rio Grande with several of his friends in July 1979 and ended up in Los Angeles. That's right -- Ricardo was an illegal. In his own words, he did it simply out of curiosity. He wanted to see what it was like on this side of the border. And of the 22 Hondurans who attempted the crossing with Ricardo, only eight made it safely.

Ricardo got a job in a tortilla factory in Los Angeles -- certainly an inauspicious start for a missionary. But about ten months later, his boss introduced Ricardo to the Bible and started telling him about Jesus Christ. Ricardo was eventually born again. He resumed his education, eventually earning a B.A.in philosophy and religion at the University of La Verne in California and two Masters degrees from Princeton Theological Seminary. In 1986, he married Reyna, who was also from Ricardo's village in Honduras. Prior to immigrating to California, Reyna had earned a degree in teaching and had taught for a while in Tegucigalpa, the capital city of Honduras. The Greens now have two daughters, Kerry and Ashley, and a son, Richard.

After graduating from Princeton and being ordained as a Presbyterian minister, Ricardo was a pastor at three new Hispanic churches in New Jersey and one in Fort Lauderdale, Florida. In 1999, he received a call from the Independent Presbyterian Church of Brazil to become a teacher at the Presbyterian Theological Seminary in Fortaleza, Brazil. Fortaleza is in the heart of the Brazilian northeast -- the most poverty-stricken area of the country. The entire northeast is often plagued by drought, and there is little employment. Consequently, most northeasterners leave the region if they can. This was a major problem which Ricardo and the seminary in Fortaleza faced even with the seminary graduates -- after graduating, few wanted to remain in the area, despite the dire spiritual needs of the people there.

Ricardo accepted the call, which required both him and Reyna to learn Portuguese. In addition to his teaching duties at the seminary, Ricardo also preached at different churches in Fortaleza on Sundays, helped a number of Brazilian Presbyterians to establish and strengthen new churches in outlying areas and worked with young narcotics addicts in rehab. By 2004, Ricardo had become a member of the ministry committee of the Presbytery of Ceara. In addition, he and Reyna both led various Bible study groups at different times during their stay in Brazil.

In August 2007, Ricardo wrote to us that he and Reyna had terminated their missionary service in Brazil, effective June 30. The Greens have returned to the U.S. and are now living temporarily in Decatur, Georgia. Ricardo is seeking a position as a pastor in the U.S., possibly to a Spanish- or Portuguese-speaking congregation. In his letter, Ricardo warmly thanked First Presbyterian Church for our support of his ministry in Brazil. The Greens would welcome correspondence, so if you wish to contact them, you may write to them at Mission Haven, 167 Inman Drive, Decatur, GA 30030, or send them an e-mail at bgreenrich2@aol.com . He also asked for our prayers as he and his family face the difficult challenges of changing careers and readjusting to life in the U.S. after being away for ten years.

Presbyterian Women Local Mission For December

Cristo Rey Outreach, Inc. is a Presbyterian Church-sponsored community development organization. It is located in Sunland Park, New Mexico, a border community with poverty levels more than triple the national average.

Cristo Rey Outreach, Inc. operates a community center known as La Casita in the neighborhood of Anapra. Since 1999 the center has provided a safe place for children in this community to develop their full academic and leadership potential. Through the hard work and dedication of local volunteers, La Casita has grown to embrace a variety of activities. Some of them are:

- "After School Tutoring" provides a nutritious snack, help with homework, safe recreational activities, for school age children.
- "Planting Project" teaches about nature through gardening. Children take part in growing plants to be sold at the local farmers' market.
- "Clean-Up Project" Neighborhood kids want Anapra to become one of the cleanest places in the whole world. In yards and on the streets, they are sweeping up debris and garbage to create a sense of neighborhood pride.
- "Summer Lunch" provides a hot lunch to kids while they are out of school, a vital nutritional supplement for local children. As well, the program provides wholesome activities in a safe place.

This is an opportunity for us to help by supplying some materials needed for their summer program.

- Nonperishable snacks
- Multipurpose paper for indoor activities, etc.
- \$20 will buy nutritious snacks for 20 children on a daily basis
- \$35 will give a needy child one backpack full of school supplies

PAPER BAG LUMINARIAS


Lead your family and friends to your house this holiday with luminarias celebrating Jesus' birth.

WHAT YOU NEED:

- Pencil
- Brown paper lunch bags
- Hole punch, tack or pushpin
- Sand
- · Votive candles or tea lights

WHAT YOU DO:

- Draw a simple picture, word or symbol of Jesus' birth on the bag; for example, a star, a manger, a heart, a lamb, a wise man or the word "JOY."
- 2 Using a hole punch or pushpin, punch holes along the drawing, leaving a little space between each hole. Punch all the way through both sides of the bag so you end up with the same design on both sides when the bag is opened. When using a pin, place a piece of cardboard under the bag or work on carpet so nothing gets damaged.
- 3 Open the bag and fill each luminaria with about two inches of sand. Then sink a votive candle or tea light in the center of the sand.
- 4 Place the luminarias along a walk, patio or porch. Have an adult light the candles.

Stewardship and Financial Situation

The year 2007 has been very eventful for First Presbyterian Church in many ways. You need to be aware of some of the financial aspects of those events and what we see for the near future. The paragraphs below will summarize the main points.

Our financial situation in late 2006 was rather bleak. Our Session worked hard to reduce expenses in 2007 and the congregation responded with increased pledges and total giving. As a result, the data at the end of October show that we have spent about 70 percent of our budget in 83 percent of the year. In addition, we have over \$62,000 in operating funds and over \$93,000 in operating reserve funds. Almost \$64,000 of the latter came from the sale of the Christian Day Nursery. The Session will be working on the proper use of those proceeds during the next year. The financial outlook for 2007 has been much more favorable, but it came as a result of sacrifices in employees' salary increases, mission giving, and other restrictions.

The recent stewardship campaign focused on what our church is doing with what you have given to God through our church. It is your giving of time, talent, and money that supports our outreach to our congregation and beyond. The pledging process helps us plan the budget for the following year. More than once in my personal involvement I have been asked, "How can you make a budget when you don't know how much money you will have?" While we rely heavily on faith in God to provide, we would not be doing our jobs if we did not also analyze the data from previous years. We can identify year-toyear trends in pledging, the significant amount of giving above what is pledged, and the increased costs of running the church. We begin in late summer with incomplete data and adjust as we work through the budget process. One of the important data points is the amount pledged for the following year. As of November 27, the amount pledged for 2008 is \$292,483. Again, this is incomplete data as more pledges will be submitted and there will be giving above the pledged amount. It is important for you to know that this amount is well below the amount pledged in 2006 for 2007 of about \$360,000. This will alert the session to review the budget for 2008 that is currently in draft form and reconsider what expansions can be left in the budget and what must be cut back. We have planned on expanding our programs in a slow but steady manner and this requires a steady increase in time, talent, and money to be effective.

If you have not pledged, please consider submitting a pledge card by filling one out and putting it in the offering plate or providing it to the church office. Blank cards are in some of the racks along the back of the pews. If you have difficulty finding one, just ask one of the ushers for assistance. Status of the Phase I Renovation Debt

Last August, the First Presbyterian Church received a very generous bequest from the estate of a church member, the late Don Rubart. The bequest allowed FPC to pay off the Phase I Renovation debt to the bank, with over \$21,000 remaining.

With the bank mortgage paid off, the funds formerly directed to paying the bank are being used to pay those members (sixteen family units) of the congregation who graciously lent the church money to reduce the interest burden of the debt. That amount reached \$160,000 at the time the bank debt was paid. It was down to \$151,000 at the end of October.

While we have made significant reductions in the original debt of \$800,000, the remaining debt and interest (although lower) are still a drain on our mission and ministry at First Presbyterian Church. We give thanks for your generosity and perseverance in retiring this debt and encourage you to continue giving to Phase I until we completely eliminate the balance of the debt owed to our members.
