

PURSUIT DRIVING COURSE

PURSUIT DRIVING COURSE

Final approval has been given for construction of the Pursuit Driving Course with funds provided jointly by L.E.A.A. and the Highway Safety Act.

This Driving Course will consist of 1.9 miles of paved roadway, in somewhat of an oval, and will include a 300' x 300' skidpan area. It will be located on top of Table Mountain, directly north of the Colorado Law Enforcement Training Academy.

Immediately upon completion of the track, training of State Patrolmen, city police officers and deputy sheriffs will be implemented in the following scopes of driver training:

1. Steering, cornering, use of brakes, throttle control, and skills in the prevention of skids and the ability to recover if a skid occurs - all necessary for effective and skillful pursuit driving. The apprehension of almost every traffic violator involves speeds over posted safe limits.
2. Stopping the violator safely, protecting all concerned in the process.
3. Accident investigation, with the use of mock accidents where skidmarks can be produced and city streets and highways duplicated. Included in this instruction is speed determination from skidmarks.

The new facility will make it possible to provide training under safe, realistic conditions for hundreds of Colorado Law Enforcement Officers in the future.

In response to your request for comments to "help us evaluate the Academy and its effectiveness," dated August 3, 1971, and as in previous such communications to you, I again make the following comments and requests:

1. That the Academy comply with the suggestions in the Task Force Report: The Police, President's Commission on Law Enforcement and Administration of Justice, Municipal Police Administration, National Institute of Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice and other related documents regarding course content, course length, course instructors and Academy Rationale for the training of Police Officers.

2. That the Academy staff and Members of the Board become familiar with the contents of the aforementioned documents, as they relate to Police Recruit training.

3. That trainees of non-recruit status, attending non-recruit courses, be permitted the dignity of wearing appropriate civilian attire of their choice.


4. That all trainees be afforded the dignity of adult Police Officers by terminating such practices as "lights out" and mandatory isolation to the Academy grounds.

5. That qualified instructors, from within and without law enforcement, be provided for trainees.

6. That the Academy not force the hiring procedures of Departments by providing basic training only during certain months of the year. Such procedures require a Department such as ours to restrict hiring six new personnel at one time; i.e., four to attend during July and two to attend during September. Our Budget called for six new officers on July 1, 1971, and not the hiring of four in July and two in September, as has been forced upon us by the Academy. The hiring of the additional two Officers in July is a waste of taxpayer money until September when they can be trained.

This Department is required to send its Officers to C.L.E.T.A., as it is the only academy available. However, unless the Academy improves along the lines specified by the consultants and experts referred to in Sub-Paragraph 1 above, alternative methods will be employed in the future to improve the training of our Officers--even if it requires sending them out of state.
