Dear Members and Friends,



I wrote in this space **thirteen** years ago: "February also marks some important birthdays! On our kitchen calendar, February 12 is marked <u>Lincoln's Hannah's</u> Birthday; the only native-born Rhode Islander in the Clark household celebrates six years of life on that date. And February 22 is marked <u>Washington's Lydia's</u> Birthday; her eleventh. (Stephen's April 13 birthday, his ninth, happens to coincide with the birthday of a third Rushmore depiction, Thomas Jefferson!)"

And I wrote in this space **seventeen** (!) years ago: "As we once again anticipate the loving celebration of Valentines' Day February 14, I'm reminded that February brings three additional loving celebrations to our household: The ninth anniversary of our marriage (Feb. 24), the seventh birthday of our eldest (Feb. 22), and the second birthday of our youngest (Feb 12)." Not included in these long-ago excerpts is another notable February celebration for the Clark family over the years ... my father's birthday, February 4. Born in 1933, this year would have been his 83rd birthday.

I want to thank everyone for the many (and thoughtful!) cards, notes and emails of condolences, the fruit basket and beautiful plant I found on my front doorstep, the prayers, the offers of help, and especially those who made the long journey to Pennsylvania to attend the funeral service. For those who didn't know, my Dad passed very unexpectedly and suddenly January 2, 2016; there was no warning, no hint that anything like this was imminent. I'm so very grateful I was able to visit with my parents the previous Sunday while my son so adequately filled the pulpit here; as I sat with my father in worship that Sunday in the Methodist church of my childhood (my parents are charter members), I had no way of knowing I was sitting with him in what would be his last service of worship while Mom sang in the choir (as she had done just about every Sunday since 1965!). Dad touched many lives, as several of you saw in his obituary ... I'm told the line for the calling hours preceding the service stretched far out into the parking lot and around the building at least twice; we had to delay the start of the funeral by nearly two hours. The service was a fitting tribute to a full life very well lived, and a glorious sendoff to the life to come. I ask your indulgence as I exercise a little pastoral/editorial prerogative on page 2 ... I've copied an article from the April '98 Fishermen's News by my late wife inspired by a birthday card she bought for Dad's 65th birthday, and included a clip from my hometown newspaper that ran last October; in honor of his birthday, I had planned to include it in this issue 'way back when I first got this copy from the Daily Local.

I write four days before our **72**nd **Annual Meeting**, grateful for another year of ministering to, and being ministered to by, such a caring, comforting, compassionate congregation as you. -- **Stephen L. Clark, Pastor**



FROM HEARTH AND HEART

...a note from the pastor's home



"Not every successful man is a good father, but every good father is a successful man." R. Duvall



Several weeks ago, in the midst of my radiation treatments, Steve came home from the church one afternoon to care for our three children while I went to the doctor. When he came in the door, Lydia, Stevie and I had been playing pretend with a box full of hats. The two kids saw an opportunity to perform before an audience, so Steve and I dutifully sat on the couch and laughed in all the right spots while Lydia and Stevie took turns acting various parts. They were so intoxicated by the spotlight that they could not bear to stop their theatrics. Finally, the demands of our schedule began to gnaw quietly at me; I wanted to be sure Steve had a chance at a quick lunch before I had to leave. "Okay, you two, one more turn, and that's the end. It's time to get on with real life."

Steve turned to look at me. "This," he admonished me gently, "is real life." I stood corrected.

Steve is an active, loving and wise father. But if he takes any satisfaction in his fathering abilities, he is quick to give the credit to his own dad, who serves as his role model. That's why my heart was moved by the above, italicized quote when I was hunting for a birthday card for Steve's father not long ago. The card seemed particularly appropriate for Steve's dad because he had recently received one of the great honors of his life: he was chosen by the Chamber of Commerce as the Outstanding Citizen of the Year for West Chester, Pennsylvania. In January, a sold-out banquet was held in his honor, with family and friends in attendance, along with a host of guest speakers who feted Alan F. Clark accordingly. Area newspapers covered the event and listed his successes and accomplishments. The list of organizations he serves as a tireless volunteer could virtually fill a page in the phone book: the Salvation Army, Chester County Hospital, the Lions Club, and the Area Senior Center, to name a few. "I'm never bored," he told one reporter. "When I hear people say they're bored today, I find it hard to comprehend. There's so much to do." He is a charter member and lay leader of the Willistown United Methodist Church, and every year he and several other members pack their bags for Puerto Rico -- not for a vacation, but for a short-term mission project helping residents rebuild after a devastating hurricane.

But if you asked Alan Clark what gives him the greatest satisfaction in life, he would not point to any of the recognition he has received or charitable service he has performed. Nor would his first pride be in his immensely successful 38 years as a life insurance agent, during which he regularly received national awards as one of Prudential's top agents. He would look instead to his 48-year marriage to his beautiful wife, Ann, and to their six children and 20 grandchildren. His greatest joy seems to come when as many of them as possible gather at the gracious Clark home for family events. (It's possible that his second-greatest joy sinks in with the inevitable solitude when they all depart...) He is a loving and much-loved father. Steve has often said that, growing up, he was always confident of his parents' love for him.

Since Alan Clark often worked evenings, he tried to be home in the afternoons when he could. That example has left its mark on Steve. That is why, when Steve has an evening meeting at the church, you might spot him that afternoon at the grocery store with our kids in tow, or crawling around in the play maze at Chuck E. Cheese's.

One of the major purposes of the Family Life Parenting Conference, scheduled for May 1 and 2 at Greenwood Church, is to equip those of us who have children to be better parents. Steve and I are looking forward to being there. While we have not yet seen the curriculum, we suspect that some of the things that Alan and Ann Clark did (and continue to do) so well will be on the agenda: being good role models; loving one's spouse; spending quality AND quantity time with one's children; being faithful to the church.

Steve has also said, on more than one occasion, that one of the reasons he is in ministry is his dad: "It's pretty easy to talk about a loving heavenly Father when you've had such a loving earthly father." That is a great legacy -- and a tribute to a successful man.

MEMBER CARE COMMITTEE

As we begin the New Year, many of us have formally or informally made resolutions to strive to do a better job in some aspect of our lives. Perhaps this is also a good time to remind ourselves of what it means to be a church member and to seek to carry out our ministry to the best of our ability. In the latest edition of the **Book of Order,** Part II of the Constitution of the Presbyterian Church (USA), section *G-1.0304 "The Ministry of Members"* describes the meaning of membership as follows:

Membership in the Church of Jesus Christ is a joy and a privilege. It is also a commitment to participate in Christ's mission. A faithful member bears witness to God's love and grace and promises to be involved responsibly in the ministry of Christ's Church. Such involvement includes:

Proclaiming the good news in word and deed,

Taking part in the common life and worship of a congregation,

Lifting one another up in prayer, mutual concern, and active support,

Studying Scripture and the issues of Christian faith and life,

Supporting the ministry of the church through the giving of money, time, and talents,

Demonstrating a new quality of life within and through the church,

Responding to God's activity in the world through service to others,

Living responsibly in the personal, family, vocational, political, cultural, and social relationships of life,

Working in the world for peace, justice, freedom, and human fulfillment,

Participating in the governing responsibilities of the church, and

Reviewing and evaluating regularly the integrity of one's membership, and considering ways in which one's participation in the worship and service of the church may be increased and made more meaningful.

We are very fortunate at Greenwood Church that so many of our members fulfill these commitments as they participate in the worship and programs of the church and bear witness to their faith in their families, workplace, and communities. But like everything else in life, there is always room for improvement. As we begin 2016, perhaps we can each review this list and consider "ways in which our own participation in the worship and service of the church may be increased and made more meaningful."



SAVE THE DATE! Sunday, February 14: Since the earliest days of the church, the sharing of food at a common meal has been a celebration of the love Christians shared in Christ. Such "Agape Feasts" (ah-GAH-pay) are specifically mentioned at least twice in the New Testament and are also mentioned frequently in historical records. We are planning our own "Agape Feast" on Valentine's Day and invite any who care to do so to bring a "love" dish to the buffet table which reminds you of someone you have loved, or a recipe which may spark a loving memory, and we also encourage you to bring a brief

note explaining the history/significance of your food contribution! By the way, as with every potluck meal of the church, bringing a dish is NOT required; all are invited, welcome and encouraged to come!

STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE



As most of you know, every year all members of the Presbyterian Church (USA) are asked to voluntarily contribute toward the administrative expenses of the governing bodies of our denomination via the "per capita apportionment." For the past fifteen or so years, a special envelope marked for this purpose has been included in the box of offering envelopes provided for all members of our church. The following excerpt/explanation comes from the minutes of the 1995 General Assembly:

"Per capita is an opportunity for all communicant members of the Presbyterian church through the governing bodies to participate equally, responsibly, and interdependently by sharing the cost of coordination and evaluation of mission; and of performing ecclesiastical, legislative, and judicial functions that identify a Reformed Church, while at the same time strengthening the sense of community among all Presbyterians (GA *Minutes*, Part I, 1995)."

Each year the Stewardship Committee has asked you to consider using this special envelope to specially designate a gift based on the number of church members in your households to help fund these administrative/ecclesiastical expenses of the Presbytery of Southern New England, the Synod of the Northeast and the PC(USA) General Assembly. In 2012, the Session resolved:

"We will continue to ask and strongly encourage each member of our congregation to voluntarily contribute the total individual per capita annually defined by the Presbytery of Southern New England and will distribute the funds received on a monthly basis."

As a result of this 2012 decision, per capita is no longer funded from the general treasury of Greenwood Community Church, Presbyterian; what is received from members of the congregation for this Special Offering is what is disbursed to the appropriate bodies, just as with other Special Offerings. The Stewardship Committee continues to ask all church members to consider covering their individual per capita apportionment. In the Presbytery of Southern New England, the recommended **2016 Per Capita** donation is **\$41.63** per individual member, of which **\$7.02** is designated for the General Assembly of the PC(USA), **\$4.00** for the Synod of the Northeast, and the remaining **\$30.61** for the Presbytery of Southern New England.



MISSION COMMITTEE

ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING: Since 1949 Presbyterians have joined with millions of other Christians to share God's love with our neighbors in need around the world through the special mission offering of the One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS). This offering, traditionally collected during Lent, began in 1949 in response to the devastation of World War II, when, during a Saturday evening nationwide radio broadcast, Americans were asked to "give generously" to the offering the next morning in their churches. A remarkable variety of national leaders and celebrities gave their efforts to the broadcast, and more than 75,000 churches responded. This nationwide united effort by America's Christians had an importance far beyond the practical goal of fundraising; this joint program strengthened the vitally important relief and rehabilitation work of the churches overseas, and proved to all the world the great power generated when Christians unite in a common cause.



The Presbyterian Church (USA) uses funds received through OGHS to support disaster relief, refugee/immigration and development ministries throughout the world through the Presbyterian Hunger program, Presbyterian Disaster Assistance program and the Self Development of People program. Contributions to One Great Hour of Sharing make a huge impact on people's lives. Whether gifts take the form of immediate relief to people experiencing crisis or partnerships with communities focused on long-term solutions to chronic problems, contributions are a powerful, tangible witness to Christ's healing love.

Portions of our offering to the One Great Hour of Sharing Program are also donated to other agencies we support who provide relief and assistance to those in need. Please use the One Great Hour of Sharing Envelope provided in your box of offering envelopes, or the special One Great Hour of Sharing pew envelopes for your contributions.

NEW MISSION OUTREACH FOR 2016: This year we will begin supporting a new mission agency, **Mercy Ships**. Mercy Ships is an international charity that was founded in 1978 by Don and Deyon Stephens. Their Mission statement is "To provide free healthcare and improve healthcare delivery systems in the poorest nations". Mercy Ships currently operates the largest non-governmental hospital ship in the world, providing free health care,

community development projects, community health education, mental health programs, agriculture projects,

and palliative care (a multidisciplinary approach to specialized medical care) for terminally ill patients. Mercy Ships has operated in more than 57 developing nations and eighteen developed nations around the world, with a current focus on the countries of Africa. This agency brings hope and healing to the forgotten poor, mobilizing people and resources worldwide. The organization treats all patients without cost, and without regard to their religion, race or gender.
