

- May provide a source of revenue for FoMD to fund socially accountable programs or to even sustain existing programs in the face of budget cuts




What direction does FoMD want to pursue?

Human Rights Violations, 2014



Human rights violations measured on a scoring system from 0 to 10 (where 10 is worst). This is an aggregated metric on that basis of multiple variables, including: press freedom, civil liberties, political freedoms, human trafficking, political prisoners, incarceration, religious persecution, torture and executions.




An isolationist approach would mean not dealing with governments from almost every developing country and some developed countries.

Human Rights Scores, 1946 to 2017



These Human Rights Scores indicate the degree to which governments protect and respect human rights. The values range from around -3.8 to around 5.4 (the higher the better).



Wenzhou Medical University





Wenzhou Medical University

17,100 students

- 3288 are master and doctoral students
- 884 are international students

More than 10,000 faculty members in the school, 1,479 full-time

The first provincial-owned university designed for international collaborations

The pass rate of clinical medicine graduates among the top 10% in the country

Background Alberta Institute - Collaboration with Wenzhou Medical University

- 2017 Leadership Development for mentoring Physician Leaders (ongoing)
- 2018 Visiting Summer Student Program for medical students from WMU
 - WMU Faculty participated in FoMD Faculty Development Program
- 2019 UAlberta Board of Governors signed Articles of Association for Alberta Institute WMU
 - Joint Symposia on Medical Education in Wenzhou
- 2020 Alberta Institute WMU delivers the first cooperatively-run medical school in China
 - Inaugural class of 57 students enter first year of the 5 year Alberta Institute program



Proposal - new Bachelor of Biomedicine degree

- International dual degrees are collaboratively delivered by UAlberta and a partner University to provide enhanced education experiences for students and deepen UAlberta's international presence and connections.
- Students registered in the Alberta Institute at Wenzhou Medical University (AIWMU) complete a five year course of study collaboratively created and delivered by both partner universities.
- The first two years of the program are predominately based on the curriculum of WMU, the curriculum of the third and fourth years is predominantly based on the Preclerkship curriculum of the FoMD MD Program. The fifth year is a clinical clerkship year based on the curriculum of WMU.
- We propose a new Bachelor of Biomedicine degree, students in the AIWMU program would be eligible for this degree after successful completion of the first four years of study in this program.



New Degree Proposal - Bachelor of Biomedicine

Standard UAlberta 2+2 degree program design

2 years/ ★60 credits at another institution

2 years/ ★60 credits at UAlberta

Similar to the existing FoMD degree of Bachelor of Medical Science

The degree of Bachelor of Medical Science may be awarded to students in the DDS or MD program at the end of the second year of that program who have fulfilled the following requirements at this or another university:

- 1. Two or more years of social sciences, general sciences, physical sciences or engineering, with successful completion of undergraduate course work totaling no less than ± 60 with one academic year of ± 30 .
- 2. Successful completion of Year 1 and 2 of the DDS or MD program.

Faculty Council supports the creation of a new Bachelor of Biomedicine degree program for students registered in the Alberta Institute at Wenzhou Medical University

Principles to consider for International Engagement

International engagement must not negatively affect FoMD internal programs.

The FoMD must check that each international Faculty/Department engagement is not likely to: directly or indirectly cause, contribute to, or benefit from human rights violations or abuses.

Commit to "do no harm/do good" as FoMD overarching international human rights goal. Therefore each International engagement initiative should be considered prospectively on the probability of doing good vs harm. and rejected if the probability of harm can't be mitigated.

Establish processes for gathering relevant statistics and information to determine retrospectively whether the initiative has done good or harm and whether the engagement improved, worsened or had no effect on human rights.

Principles to consider for International Engagement

A portion of net proceeds from International engagement initiatives would go to the unit(s) implementing the initiatives.

Use a portion of net proceeds for FoMD social accountability initiatives or programs.

Where possible Include some participants from under resourced countries to take International income generating programs for free.

Transparency: regular reporting, to the FoMD community and the wider public on outcomes of international engagements and benefits to FoMD.

Next steps

- Bring revised principles to Faculty council for approval
- Establish a faculty-led International Engagement Advisory Committee
 to review new or renewal proposals for compatibility with FoMD
 academic mission and engagement principles, as well as
 participation by the UAI to assess alignment with institutional
 policies and goals





Data Collection Instrument (DCI)

- 12 Standards, 96 Elements, 446 questions
 - About half the questions are answered so far
- Data from across the FoMD & MD Program



Independent Student Analysis (ISA)

- Survey closed at the end of August
- Student Task Force has been convened, led by Marissa Ledger (C2022) and Jillian Meyer (C2024)
- Raw data from the ISA will be incorporated into the DCI later this month
- Final report from the students, including survey data and recommendations will be submitted to the Steering Committee & MD Program in early November



Medical School Self-Study (MSS)

- Steering Committee & 6 Sub-Committees have been set up
- Meetings every month to review data, make CQI recommendations
- More than 80 people, representing faculty, staff, students, and other stakeholders, are involved in the accreditation process

Spotlight on Social Accountability

Focus on social accountability in the accreditation process:

Element 1.1.1 – requires each medical school's social accountability to be articulated in its mission statement, evidenced by specific outcome measures, and fulfilled in its educational program through admissions, curricular content, and types and locations of educational experiences

Element 6.4.1 — ensures exposure and experience in generalist care and requires clinical learning in a range of environments from small rural or underserved communities to tertiary care centres

Element 7.10 -- requires educational activities to develop a student's professionalism and leadership skills;

Element 7.6 -- requires consideration of the Indigenous peoples of Canada as medical schools prepare students to learn, recognize and address unique needs of people of diverse cultures.

MD Program Faculty
Appointments Policy
(reviewed & re-approved by MDCPC
August 26, 2021)

Policy: All physicians who have direct supervision of medical students in required clinical learning experiences must have a faculty appointment (clinical or academic) in the FoMD. This does not apply to residents who supervise, teach and assess medical students as part of their position
