The NE lowa Food & Fitness Initiative (FFI) believes that NE lowa is a unique place where all residents and guests should have access to locally grown, healthy food and opportunities for physical activity every day. The NE lowa Food & Fitness Initiative Early Childhood believes all children and their families should actively

thrive in healthy communities for a lifetime. Our Early Childhood FoodCorps Pilot is in it's second year.

PROJECT UPDATES:

Garden Club—During the beginning of November, Central's Garden Committee put together a Fall Garden Clean-up Day! We planned for the day and made a great big to-do list, which mostly included pulling out 1,000 square-feet worth of weeds and dead plant matter.

They pulled out kid-sized kale plants and other dead plants from their school garden. They also planted garlic, covered it with straw, and planted a rye cover crop. They thought it was really fun and were so surprised that we were planting things in our garden when snow was about to come!



PROJECT UPDATES: Launched a new Staff Wellness program. we now have a small sub-committee from the

Wellness Committee that plans our staff wellness every month. There is specific time set aside once a month during professional development on Friday's designated for Staff Wellness activities. This is the first program of its kind in the area.

November focus was on physical activity. December's theme was healthy eating . January's focus will be on the emotional, social, and spiritual dimensions of wellness. We plan to do a large group session on mindfulness, guided relaxation, and a values workshop. After the winter months, we will pick back up with the financial dimension of wellness.

I'm will to go into the classrooms and talk about planning for planting our school garden this Spring. It will be a fun learning experience and competition for them. A high school class will vote for a winner when the kids are finished designing their garden plans. The high school students will judge plans based on creativity, use of space, and will be looking at the general layout to make sure each plant has good garden companions to thrive throughout the growing season. They will compare layouts to what was planted in the garden last year, so that things aren't planted in the same location.

Hopefully, in the end it will allow for more ownership from the kids for their school garden.

We will be receiving seed donations from two local partners The Pepperfield Project and Turkey River Farms!

January we enjoyed **Martin Luther King Jr. Celebrations** related to Dr. King's favorite Southern Foods and his influence in American History.

The 2nd-3rd graders learned about Dr. King, Southern Foods and tasted mini cornbread muffins with local honey.

Central's Cooking Club made sweet potato fries and read about Dr. King and what he did to contribute to our country's equality.

We are trying something a little different at Central this year—White Milk Wednesdays. I am encouraging the children to take white milk instead of flavored milk and talking about why it is better for you on a daily bases.



FOODCORPS







PICK A BETTER SNACK:

Kara taught Pick a Better Snack lessons in December, focusing on kiwi. Each class had the chance to practice cutting skills, working as a group to halve, then quarter their kiwi. In January, the featured snack was garbanzo beans. Kara made hummus in each class, which was well-received by the kids. Several school staff members later mentioned that their kids were asking for hummus at home!



COOKING LESSONS:







The Southwest Iowa Food and Farm Initiative is a network for food producers and consumers working to develop a healthy local food system. SWIFFI works to build a sustainable regional food system that links production, processing, distribution, and consumption; for better health, food security, stronger communities and economic development. SWIFFI is a multi-county coalition of individuals and organizations working together with Golden Hills Resource Conservation and Development. SWIFFI works in Harrison, Shelby, Pottawattamie, Cass, Mills, Montgomery, Fremont, and Page counties.



PROJECT UPDATES:

SWIFFI toured the new Kitchen Council shared-use kitchen in Council Bluffs, which is opening soon.

We are collaborating with the Council Bluffs Public School District dietitian with the Pick a Better Snack Program to provide education about healthy eating. This program includes teaching students about MyPlate, healthy eating choices, tasting food samples, and cafeteria coaching.

We are coordinating seven ag arts camps in four Southwest Iowa counties. This project involves reaching out to farmers and artists, meeting to develop curriculum, and finding sponsors to support each camp.

ISU Extension and Outreach in Wapello County strives to develop the local food system in Southeast Iowa, working in Wapello, Davis, Monroe, Mahaska, Keokuk, and Jefferson Counties, through a local food box delivery program called Produce with a Purpose.



PROJECT UPDATES:

Produce with a Purpose is planning to deliver food boxes for 10 weeks during the 2018 growing season. Our goal is to deliver 75 shares with each delivery, which happens every other week. We will work with at least 4 worksites in Wapello County, delivering fresh produce directly to where customers work.



PARTNERSHIPS:

We are looking to partner with new producers who wish to sell produce to our local food box program. We are targeting producers in Wapello, Mahaska, Keokuk, Jefferson, Davis, and Monroe counties, though we are open to working with other producers in southeast lowa. Our program season runs from the end of May through October.

The Wapello County Extension Office is developing a producer education schedule for 2018-2019. Most classes will take place during the winter, when producers are more able to attend workshops. We are looking for people who are interested in teaching educational programs related to any aspect of production, marketing, pricing, and sales.

Our office is hiring a Food Box Coordinator, who will provide leadership with the Produce with a Purpose local food program. The position is from mid-March through the end of October, for about 35 hours per week. We are seeking a candidate who is organized, has excellent communication skills, and is passionate about strengthening the local food network in and around Wapello County.
