**Europe's Original Football City - People Make Glasgow**

From the game's humble beginnings in the early 1800s, the City of Glasgow has become synonymous with the sporting and cultural growth of football under the other European metropolises.

In 1874, Glasgow's early passion for the game saw the city house the world's three largest purpose built football stadia: Celtic Park, Hampden Park and Ibrox Park, housing in excess of 50,000 spectators, and structure the United Kingdom's leading stadium architect and designer - Archibald Leitch.

During the 1920s, the city achieved a remarkable feat in its ability to host Glasgow's footballing public, with its six senior clubs shared ground capacities able to host half of the city's population at that time.

Recognised as a city of significant architectural importance through its regeneration in the 1980s, Glasgow's renaissance was endorsed by the award of European City of Culture in 1990, while Recognition for Great and Chicago has Home United World, Glasgow has the Art Nouveau inspired Charles Rennie Mackintosh which was selected in the award brand design for the 2007 UEFA Cup Final.

In 2014, the world will focus its attention on Glasgow with the staging of the 2014 Glasgow Commonwealth Games and the fifth Europe Music Awards, providing an unprecedented opportunity to continue to tell the city's story to the world.

The world's leading publications and travel guides have consistently named Glasgow as a top city to visit in recent years - mentioning the city's position as football's spiritual, cultural and sporting capital.



As one of Europe's most vibrant, welcoming and dynamic cities, Glasgow is renowned for its friendliness, warmth and abundance of its people whose love of life lies at the heart of the city's sporting success.

Glasgow welcomes more than two million tourists each year and has built a solid international reputation as a successful host of many prestigious sporting and cultural events.

Scotland's largest city is home to more than 20 world class museums and galleries. The internationally renowned Kelvingrove Art Gallery & Museum remains one of the most popular visitor attractions in the UK, while the 20th-century designed National Museum was voted 2013 European Museum of the Year.

Glasgow also enjoys an enviable reputation as a centre of design excellence, described by iconic trade journal 'Planet' as 'the best and most exciting design city in Europe', with a concentration of top talent for this and a vibrant engineering and design scene that comes alive at night.

Above all, Glasgow is a city proud to be about sport. The city is inspired and motivated by its strong belief in the ability of people working together to succeed and enhance the development and promotion of sport.



**Hampden Park - A European Love Affair**

There can be few tracks in Europe more immediately synonymous with the history of elite European football than Hampden Park in Glasgow.

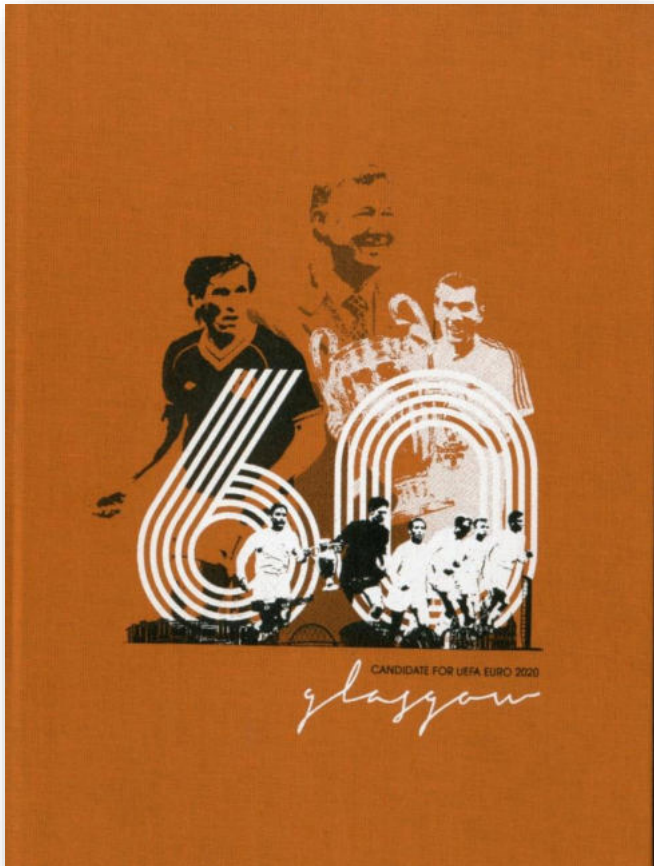
Home of the ultimate European Champion Clubs Cup Final in 1960 between Real Madrid and Liverpool Football Club, Hampden has hosted proud host to seven UEFA Cup Competition Finals between 1969 and 2002. The stadium maintains an enviable list of European attendance records.

- UEFA International Championship match - all time European attendance record and European record for an international match - 148,433 - Real Madrid v Liverpool, 1960
- Scottish Cup Final - record attendance for a club match in Europe and record attendance for an international cup final in Europe - 147,368 - Celtic v Aberdeen, 1957
- European Champion Clubs Cup Final - record attendance for a UEFA Cup Competition Final - 127,651 - Real Madrid v Liverpool, 1960
- European Championship Qualifier - record attendance for a UEFA International Competition final - 120,711 - Scotland v England, 1968
- European Champion Clubs Cup Semi-Final - record attendance for a UEFA Cup Competition final - 126,808 - Celtic v Leeds, 1966



The list of games that have graced the Hampden has seen more trophies and spectators an unprecedented insight into the development of modern European football.

Standing in its third incarnation as a five star stadium in 2012, capacity stands, reputation and size in 20 years make the ground much more than a stage and history in itself. UEFA membership and the opportunity to provide to these clubs in the story of European football to genuine pride of the modern game.

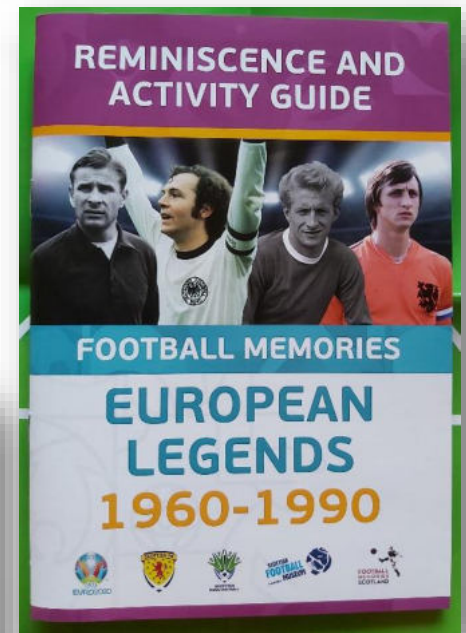

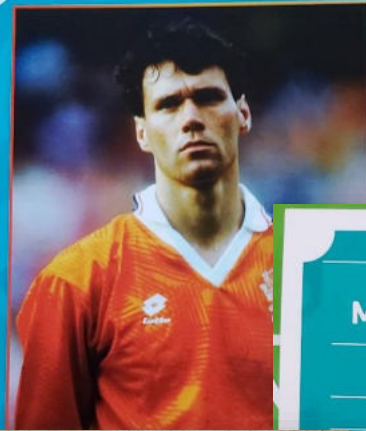

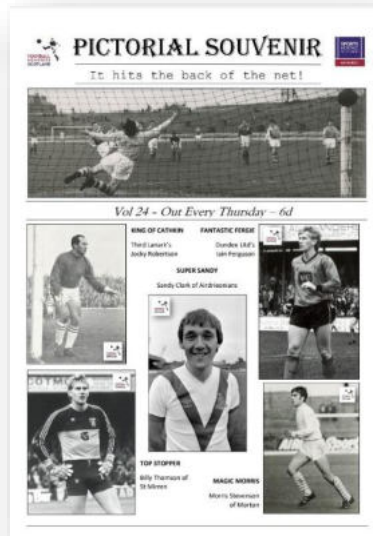

### SPOTLIGHT ON...

#### Stevie Chalmers

A Lichen Link, Stevie Chalmers will best be remembered in Scottish football history for scoring Celtic's winning goal in the European Cup final of 1967. He signed from Aberdeen in 1959, making his first team debut soon afterwards away to Aberdeen in a League match. A fast and powerful centre forward, Stevie could also score goals and netted 238 times in 485 games. He enjoyed a long association with Celtic, lasting 12 years and making the club's fourth highest all-time goal scorer. Four League Champions trophies, a total of 10 in the 1960 League Cup Final against St Johnstone he would also win four Scottish Cup titles, four League Cups, three Scottish Cups and the European Cup with Celtic. On leaving Celtic in 1971 Stevie would go on to play for Morton and Partick Thistle, an international level he scored three goals in five games for Scotland, one of the goals coming in a 1-1 draw against Brazil, who were the then reigning world champions and included Pele.



### 1961

#### Scotland 3 Czechoslovakia 2 It's Denis at the Double!

Two goals from forward Denis Lam, including what proved to be the winner just seven minutes from time, brought Scotland back on equal terms with the Czechs in their World Cup qualification group. Both teams will now have to meet at a neutral venue in a play-off to decide which nation will head to the World Cup in Chile next year.

The Scots had to sink the hard way, coming from behind twice to earn the vital points. A 25-yard rocket from Sportsman's Andy Kinnear after six minutes got this game off to the warmest possible start for Scotland but he hit St John's header from a John White cross equalised minutes with 20 minutes on the clock. The game remained all square until the 53rd minute when Geoff Shewee, who plays for the Red Star club of Bratislava, drew home from 20 yards. Scotland recovered and Denis Law got the first of his goals in the 82nd minute, late taking the ball into the net. The winner, which came after 83 minutes, was a brilliant solo effort, Law taking pace for four opponents to score. While this result made a fantastic comeback for the Scots, a 0-0 draw play-off is to be expected as the Czechs were convincingly in charge back in May.



### TEAM OF THE WEEK DUNFERMLINE ATHLETIC

Memorable Cup final winners and big European nights under Knudsen at East End Park is what the fans of Dunfermline Athletic experienced over the course of the 1960s. Under manager Bob Spink, the Pars won their first major trophy in 1961, defeating Celtic 2-0 in the Scottish Cup Final. European competition brought opponents from Yugoslavia, Hungary and Spain. One of the biggest marks came in the beer-Coca Cola Fairs Cup in 1962 when the Pars defeated an Everton side which was on its way to winning the English League. The 2-1 aggregate win brought Pars to heart matches with Valencia, with the Pars only going out narrowly after a play-off match. Under George Farnie the team continued. Dunfermline defeated Hearts 3-1 to win the Scottish Cup in 1968 and the club embarked on another incredible European journey, reaching the semi-finals of the European Cup Winners' Cup, where Dunfermline lost narrowly on aggregate to Slavia Bratislava.

### THE JUNIORS

#### 1965 SCOTTISH JUNIOR CUP

##### Linlithgow Rose & Balleston 1

##### The Cup heads to West Lothian

What a memorable day for everyone associated with Linlithgow Rose. It was the first time the club had reached the final round of the Scottish Junior Cup and a huge support for the Rose was present at the Heriot's ground at 35,000. Linlithgow got off to the perfect start when, after just three minutes, Malcolm Ophant rounded a defender to hit an unstoppable strike.

As the net, Balleston should have equalised after 14 minutes, when heading wide with the goal of his career. A fantastic save from Cameron McQueen in Linlithgow's goal from Black after 30 minutes was a decisive moment in the game. Heading into the second half, Linlithgow got the all-important second goal after 58 minutes, Colin Grant scoring to off the right hand post after being put through by Venck. A third goal quickly followed when Lindsay in the Balleston goal could only rush to a cross against the bar and Andy Cowie followed up to score from the rebound. With Linlithgow captain Benton struggling out on the right wing with an ankle injury, Balleston finally found some spine to cut through the Rose defence and when Black's shot could only be parried by McQueen, Traquair was on hand to find the net for a late consolation. The on-field celebrations by the Linlithgow Rose players on the sound of the final whistle will long be remembered by those present.

### SPOT THE BALL!

Kilbirnie Ladeide v Leamshagow, Rugby Park, 1977



Today we are at Rugby Park in 1977, where Kilbirnie Ladeide (in stripes) are playing Leamshagow at the semi-final stage of the Scottish Junior Cup.

**Facts:** In this picture Ronnie Harvey of Kilbirnie is attempting to get in a header under pressure from the Leamshagow defence. Kilbirnie's nickname is the 'Brawnie' after a Robert Burns poem in which the poet refers to buying a "brawnie'd red-wad Kilbirnie Brawnie" (a local hero). In this semi-final tie, Kilbirnie were losing to 'The Slow' and heading out of the competition until Bobby Davidson scored a late equaliser. The side from North Ayrshire edged out Leamshagow by a goal to nil in the replay and would go on to win the final, defeating Kilmarnock 3-1 at Hampden Park.

- A strike partner with Fergie at Falkirk, his other clubs include Queen's Park, East Stirlingshire, Partick Thistle & Dykebar.



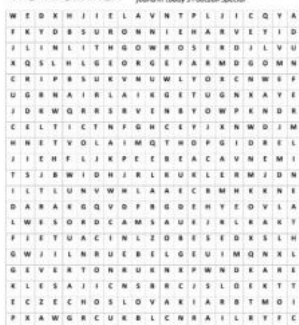

**SPOTLIGHT ON...**

**Dave Mackay**



Hailing from Edinburgh, Dave was signed by Hearts in 1952 after Hibernian manager Hugh Shaw offered him a trial at Easter Road. An exceptional player, aggressive, determined and blessed with skill, MacKay quickly established himself as a star player at Tynecastle. He led Hearts to glory, winning the Scottish Cup in 1956, the Scottish League in 1958, and the Scottish League Cup in 1954 and 1958. MacKay's performances brought interest from Tottenham Hotspur and Bill Nicholson secured his services in 1959. Dave was a key player in Tottenham's double winning year and he also enjoyed success in Europe, winning the European Cup Winners' Cup in 1963. With 'Spurs' MacKay won the League in 1961 and the FA Cup in 1961, 1962 and 1967. Dave was voted Scottish Player of the Year in 1958 and joint Football Writers Player of the Year in 1969. He won 22 Scotland caps and would have won more had injury not interfered with his career. His determination is best summed up by the fact that he twice recovered from a broken leg. MacKay moved to Derby County, where he won the Second Division title in 1969 and the First Division title, as manager, in 1975.
