

Three heads, six faces, one body or not so much...

Ceramic on metal and wood bases

These were inspired both by my own dreams and ancient Celtic mythology. In Ireland and the Orkney islands, fisherfolk told stories of seals that would sometimes turn into women and live, at least for a time, on land and in domestic relationships. This notwithstanding, only by destroying their seal skins could these selkies be induced to stay in human form. Conversely, some said that only by keeping their ocean dreams and mystery stories inviolate, could selkies in human form thrive for any time when earth-bound. And now what are we, one body with these dreams and seas and each other, or disembodied altogether?

Two figures: transformations of need and greed...

If the beauty of classic European Renaissance figures reflect their creators' newfound confidence in a more human centered world of personal accomplishment, what might the figures of a society fed on consumerism look like, the psychic forms of need relentlessly capitalized and extended?

I am an award-winning Theatre Artist and a Relly Award Nominee. I created the role of Molina in the North American premiere of The Kiss of the Spider Woman and developed works through The Hispanic Theatre Project which I founded in 1985 at the Mark Taper Forum.

I performed, produced, or directed over 250 productions in all areas of the entertainment world and have been directed by John Cassavettes, Mako, Michael Lehman, Cheech Marin, Jack Bender, Jose Quintero, Peter Brosius,

Sally Gordon and the recent Academy Award nominee, George C. Wolfe, twice.

In 2013, while performing in a major musical I suffered a Traumatic Brain Injury followed by a Stoke. It would take me seven and a half years to remember the name of the song I had sung in the show, before I was hit in the left temple. Not the words, just the title. Forgetting how to Breath, Sing, Dance, Spell and even Speak was a nightmare. Driving Terrifying.

The work I am sharing today came from isolation and the need to Heal even if there were no words to properly express myself. As a life-long activist and community worker, I dedicate this first exhibit to the great healer, Margaret Sedenquist and to Survivors everywhere.

To GOD goes the Thanks and the Glory for my continuing recovery and the Healing I have experienced through All Saints Church.

Due to limited control of my arms and hands, I use charcoal as my medium of choice because I can smudge and blend the work as needed.

My art style of still life and snap-sketch is what brings me great joy and inspiration, as I am able to capture the essence of a particular moment through the beauty of the environment around me.

In addition to being the soprano soloist/section leader in Canterbury Choir at All Saints, I am also a lifelong member of the church and have participated in the choir programs since I was a child. I have served on several church committees, including the Children, Youth and Families Committee, the Racial Justice Committee (formerly COLORS), and the Interim and Permanent Music Director Search Committees. I am currently a member of the Telling the Whole Story (Our Stained Glass Windows) Committee.

My interest in birding (and subsequently bird photography) began when my daughter was about seven years old. We had a Los Angeles

Zoo membership, and one of the activities available was an after-hours "Bird and Bat Walk" to see the resident bat colony and also any wildlife that appeared at dusk. The main docent leading the tour was really impressive in her ability to identify a bird by sound or by sight in a split second. I love learning things so I decided in that moment to start challenging myself to pay attention to birds in my yard and neighborhood. I discovered a lot of great things about birding: it helps me reduce stress, I am fascinated by the diversity and behaviors of birds, I get to find new places to enjoy the outdoors, and I can also appreciate birds just by looking out my window. My bird photography evolved because I wanted to preserve the amazing images I encountered in nature and to share them with others as environmental advocacy. Included in that advocacy is equal and safe access to nature and the outdoors for people of all ethnicities, ages, identities, and physical challenges. As a woman of color I am aware of how important it is to be visible as a birder, as that activity has only recently become more common among people of color.

Many, if not most, birders/birdwatchers have a favorite bird species or type of bird that they feel particularly excited to see. Some people love raptors (like hawks and falcons), some love hummingbirds, others love warblers, etc. I don't have a favorite species of bird, but I prefer birds that live in or near water (like the Black-crowned Night Heron, the Great Blue Heron, and the Osprey). I think the calming effect of water in combination with the patience of observing birds particularly appeals to me. When choosing places to go birding, I focus on locations that have lakes, wetlands, streams, are near the ocean, and also have trees, and other vegetation, so in addition to seeing my favorites I will also get to see other bird species.

I retired a few years ago and continue to study the new digital technologies and WebDesign.

I had the opportunity to work and study Television and Cinema production in Argentina, Ireland, Belgium, Panama, and USA. I have been nominated for an Emmy thanks to the production of a television program about several Latin Americans in the US who have stood out in the artistic life of our country.

At the beginning of my studies in the "Universidad del Salvador" in Argentina, I had the opportunity to have exceptionally good teachers in Art and Language of the Image who made us discover the beauty, the

forms, the use of light in everything that surrounds us and give meaning to the smallest detail.
