Most departments offer concentrations, and the ones offered by the English department come in three varieties: creative writing, literary studies, and professional writing.

To complete a concentration in English, you must complete four of six possible course modules.

A single course cannot count toward two modules. Unless you are taking a class to replace a grade, only courses with “R” may be repeated (i.e., ENG 370R, 350R, etc).

As a general rule, take 200-level courses early, and reserve 300- and 400-level courses for your junior and senior years. Capstone courses should be taken your final semester.
