# Chaplain's Column A Celebration Of Light And Hope

Dear Brother Knights,

The days are getting shorter and shorter during the month of December until the 21<sup>st</sup> of the month when we mark the shortest day of sunlight for the year here in the northern hemisphere. Just a few days after this event, on December 25<sup>th</sup> Christians throughout the world celebrate the Birth of the Saviour. For many, during the weeks of preparation for this celebration more and more artificial lights are appearing inside and outside our homes and places of employment. It is almost as if we want to eliminate the darkness and recapture the light. The darkness is a difficult place to be because it can be frightening and unfamiliar. Just as the darkness in our environment can paralyze us, so too can the darkness in our world do the same.

There is so much darkness in our world: poverty, homelessness, addictions, despair, unemployment, broken relationships. There is also the possibility that some of these seemingly hopeless experiences can be changed into opportunities of hope and light. Even today, in the darkness and uncertainly of our world, we should see in Jesus a ray of hope that can heal the brokenness of our earth. From the earliest days of his earthly journey, Jesus offered a plan of life that would bring healing and reconciliation to the hearts of all if we would willingly embrace a plan for life that would recognize the sanctity of all life from the moment of conception to the moment we are called home to the house of the Father. #### Unto Us A Child Is Born.

This year, the winter solstice arrives at 6:09 a.m. on December 22<sup>nd</sup>, and with it comes that old curmudgeon, Old Man Winter, barging in for his annual unwelcome stay.

December brings with it the anticipation and celebration of Christmas. The Church has set aside several weeks of preparation for this great feast – Advent. The word derives from the Latin ad-venire - to come to - the coming of our Saviour among us.

For ages, it has been the custom of people in countries around the Mediterranean to convert caves into livestock pens. These caves sometimes even served as shelters for people. It was in such a cave converted into a stable that the King of Kings, Jesus, was born to the Blessed Virgin. The Creator of all things could have cho-



sen to be born anywhere, in a fancy marble palace, had He wanted to. Yet, He chose a humble stable as a lesson to all of us. He could have had His birth heralded around the power centres of the world. Instead, He sent His angels to announce His birth to simple shepherds who were watching their herds at night. It makes one wonder why the Lord of Lords chose to be born in such obscurity. Is it perhaps to impress upon us that He came to serve, not to be served? It is proper for us to celebrate this great event marking the start of the fulfilment of God's promise of our redemption, even if we often do so boisterously and extravagantly.

The Church chose December 8th to mark the feast of the Immaculate Conception. As Catholics, we believe that God chose the Virgin Mary to be born free of the burden bequeathed to us by Adam and Eve – the stain of original sin – so that she would be a fitting, pure, and worthy temple for the unborn Jesus.



On the day after Christmas, the Church celebrates the feast of St. Stephen. He was one of seven deacons appointed by the Apostles to minister to widows, orphans, and the poor. Stephen was the first martyr of our faith. It is interesting that a young fanatic Pharisee by the name of Saul held the garments of the men who stoned Stephen to death. He was later to become the great Apostle of the Gentiles – St. Paul.

The feast of the Holy Family, which came into being when Jesus was born, falls on the first Sunday after Christmas; this year December 30th.

Born to Mary Salome and Zebedee of Bethsaida in Galilee, John and James later joined their father in the fishing business. They followed Jesus when He called them to become His disciples. John, the beloved disciple, was the only one of the twelve who stood by Jesus at His crucifixion, and Jesus entrusted His mother Mary into his care. After Pentecost, John preached in Palestine, then in Asia Minor



where he founded many Christian communities. John remained unharmed when the Emperor Domitian had him put into a cauldron of boiling oil, and he then exiled John to the island of Pathmos. We know that John is the author of one of the Gospels, as well as three epistles. He is also believed to be the author of the Book of Revelation. John outlived his fellow Apostles and died in Ephesus in 100 AD at the age of 94. The Church commemorates St. John on December 27th.

Dear Brother Knights,

My sister-in-law in Malta sent me the following story by e-mail. I believe that it is worth reading.

It was a busy morning, about 8:30 a.m., when an elderly gentleman in his 80's, arrived to have stitches removed from his thumb. He said he was in a hurry as he had an appointment at 9:00 am. I took his vital signs and had him take a seat, knowing it would be over an hour before someone would to able to see him. I saw him looking at his watch and decided that, since I was not busy with another patient, I would evaluate his wound. On exam, the wound looked well healed, so I talked to one of the doctors, got the needed supplies to remove his sutures and redressed his wound. While taking care of his wound, I asked him if he had another doctor's appointment this morning, because he seemed to be in such a hurry. The gentleman told me no, that he needed to go to the nursing home to eat breakfast with his wife. I inquired about her health. He told me that she had been there for a while and that she was a victim of Alzheimer's disease. As we talked, I asked if she would be upset if he were a bit late. He replied that she no longer knew who he was, that she had not recognized him in five years now. I was surprised, and asked him, "And you still go every morning, even though she doesn't know whom you are?" He smiled as he patted my hand and said, "She doesn't know me, but I still know who she is." I had to hold back my tears as he left, I had goose bumps on my arm, and thought, "That is the kind of love I want in my life." True love is neither physical, nor romantic. True love is an acceptance of all that is, has been, will be, and will not be.

With all the jokes and fun that are in e-mails, sometimes an e-mail comes along carrying an important message. I had to share this with you all. Oh, by the way, peace is seeing a sunset and knowing whom to thank. The happiest people do not necessarily have the best of everything; they just make the best of everything they have. Amen to that!

#### A Message From The Supreme Director

Since 1997, the Knights of Columbus have been gathering information about Father Michael J. McGivney for the purpose of having him raised to the dignity of the Altar. It has been a long, slow process; and well that it should be. For our founder to be canonized, it is not only important to show that he has led an exemplary life and was a holy person, but it must also be clearly shown that a miracle can be attributed to him. Years of research and investigation must take place even before the cause is presented to Rome.

At the 125th Supreme Convention in Nashville, we had the privilege of hosting as our guest Cardinal Tarcisio Bertone, Vatican Secretary of State. Cardinal Bertone noted that Fr. McGivney's cause for canonization is currently being investigated by the Congregation for the Cause of Saints. He told us that they are studying Father McGivney "as a model Christian, worthy of imitation". A miracle attributed to Father McGivney has also been reported to Rome. The Cardinal continued to say; "Everyone who had the privilege of knowing Father McGivney was impressed by the dynamism of his personality and pastoral zeal. The founding of the Knights of Columbus was a "noble goal' and the key to Father McGivney's "apostolic vision" of helping others to recognize the call that Christ addresses to them. The Knights of Columbus he said "has provided the opportunities for countless lay Catholics to play their part in building up the Kingdom of God". It looks very promising that we may soon hear some good news. However, we must continue to pray for Fr. McGivney's cause for sainthood. One way in which we can show our support is to join the Father McGivney Guild. Your support will go a long way to show our love for our Order's founder.

#### **Our Council In Action**

#### Church Heating/Cooling/Ventilation System - Support for the Church



Did you feel it; that updraft of warm air in the church? No that was not an untimely hot flash you were feeling. That was the warm air coming from heating/cooling/ventilation systems that were recently installed in our church. Just in time too; the weather has been getting chillier every day.

The project is now complete. Under the general direction of Bro. Walter Friedl, the careful technical direction of Bro. Dan Dumouchelle who monitored the progress even when he was ill, and the constant oversight of Bro. Mike MacLellan, the project came in on time and under budget at \$148,900 (original estimate - \$180,000). Dan was particularly busy negotiating a loan from the Diocese to finance the project. Lately, he has been trying to convince the Diocese to allow our parish to use any funds left over for the renovation project in the rectory - more about this later

The contractor installed five units in total - a small unit to supply the church vestibule, two large units to supply the church sanctuary itself, one unit to supply St. Francis Hall, and another unit to supply the area formerly occupied by the parish offices. The project began with

one unit to supply St. Francis Hall, and another unit to supply the area form the removal of the old units from the mechanical room in the church building. It was then time to provide support for the roof with four I-beams to take the weight of the four units that were to be installed on the roof. The contractor's crew then cut holes in the roof and prepared the bases on which the units rest. The big day for hoisting the four units, two of which are of massive proportions, came on October 23rd. At about 1:00 p.m. a crane arrived in the church parking lot, and at about the same time, a large flatbed truck delivered the units. In just about an hour, the four units were hoisted on top of the roof, ready for the next stage of the project – attaching the gas lines and electrical wiring necessary for their operation, followed by the installation of the ductwork. The new units are all high efficiency units that we expect will help to reduce the energy costs of our parish. We thank Brothers Dan Dumouchelle, Walter Friedl, and Mike MacLellan for their unwavering efforts in successfully shepherding this project from start to finish.



#### **Rectory Renovations - Support for the Church**



Our church building and rectory were erected in 1978 – 1979 – they are almost thirty years old. Over time, things wear out and need to be replaced. In past years, our Council has provided funds and volunteer work to replace the church windows, carpeting, and roof, and the heating/cooling system and all the windows in the rectory. We now need to make renovations to other interior parts of the rectory – the bath-

rooms, carpeting and tile on the floor, draperies, and so on. In October, our Council approved the sum of \$2,500 to begin the renovations on Fr. Mike's bathroom. It has been very difficult for Fr. Mike, who walks with the aid of a walker, to take a shower in the bathroom because it required stepping up into the tub enclosure. A number of our Brother Knights – Bob Adam, Basilio Crestan, Walter Friedl, Helmut Hofgärtner, GK Greg Mac-

Donald, Mike MacLellan, and George Pickering, assisted by parish members Leo Benedet, Carlton Ngui, and Ed O'Donnell did the work. After the necessary demolition work was completed, Basilio, Walter, George, and Carlton built a walk-in shower stall in place of the tub enclosure. Bob Adam did the plumbing work, and GK Greg installed a pocket door to provide easier access to the bathroom for Fr. Mike. Basilio did all the tile work on the walls and floor and replaced the vanity top, and Helmut put the finishing touches with wallpaper and paint. As can be seen from the Charity Report for November, our Council approved another \$6,500 to continue with the project of making more renovations in the rectory – Fr. Bob's living area is next in line. Stay tuned.

and Rita, Fr. Mike Graham, and Bros. Mike MacLellan and his son Mike Blaise, made a special trip in two vehicles to Frankenmuth on November 15<sup>th</sup> to

acquire the figures. On the morning of November 26th, GK Greg MacDonald, DGK Mike Agius, and Bro. Mike MacLellan visited a local building supply store to buy the necessary materials. After they returned with the materials, Bro. Walter Friedl joined them as the work of building the Nativity Scene began in earnest in the rectory garage. The photos show them hard at work in the early construction stages. The dimensions are approximately 8 feet wide, 4 feet deep, and 5 feet high. The front and sides will consist mostly of plexiglass to provide maximum visibility from three sides.
