

Silent Key: Frank Clement, W6KPC (SK)

HF antenna pioneer A. J. F. (Frank) Clement, W6KPC, of Bakersfield, California, died September 23 as a result of a highway accident. He was 93 and an ARRL Life Member. A former owner of Tri-Ex Tower, Clement designed and built a number of high performance HF arrays over the course of several decades. The June 1980 issue of *QST* featured his article describing the Collinear Yagi Sextet. As he described it, "[t]he antenna systems at W6KPC and OH8OS are computer controlled. The computer is programmed to search through the eight modes to see which receives the incoming signal best." His other state-of-theart antenna projects appeared in the September 1951, May 1958 and November 1978 issues. Read more here.


Frank Clement's Collinear Yagi Sextet antenna as it appeared on the cover of the June 1980 issue of *QST*. Click here for a larger image.



Amateur of the Month BENNY WILLIAMS KW6N, by Joe Capel W0PJD

If your are listening some evening on VHF, UHF or even daytime 20 meters side band and hear a local ham say, "stand by for a minute", then hear a big BNSF train roar by with a loud whistle, you can be sure it is Benny Williams, KW6N on the air.

Benny was raised in Chowchilla and after high school joined the US Marine Corps as a heavy equipment mechanic serving four and a half years in Okinawa and Camp Pendleton.

After discharge he settled in Fresno and has been here ever since. He worked for several commercial trucking and auto dealership service departments, but eventually found his nitch at the City of Fresno in the mechanics shop til about 1978 when a work injury ended his career in that field and began soon began his interest in amateur radio.

He and his friend Johnny Peters, now N6ETM went to the San Francisco and the Long Beach offices of the FCC in a friendly competition to get their ham licenses. Benny's first call was N6GJI.

He has made as a central aspect of his hobby, building, trading, buying and tweaking antennas to serve his main interest of DXing. Since he liked those exclusive segments of the HF bands he became an Extra Class licensee in 200 and got his present call in 2002. He has been a member of the FARC since 1985 and a member of the Quarter Century Wireless Association starting in 2006.

You can find him on CW, SSB and FM on all bands from his antenna farm in Fresno and for the California QSO Party on mobile traveling to rare locations helping country hunters out.

Since his wife of many years passed on, he has lived with his daughter and grandson who he is grooming to become a ham also.

He is extremely generous with giving advice about, swapping or helping hams put up new antennas at their locations or trading DX secrets and stories with his friends.

If you think you missed the ARES 75th Birthday party, my mistake, it is October 30! The last of all the happenings this month. The ARRL SET is on the 2nd and 3rd, a Bicycle Race on the 9th, the "Great Shake Out" on 21st



and the "After Shock" on the 23rd. All this while we are implementing enhanced structure for ARES/RACES. SATERN not to be out done begins a new era 1 October with a new Communications leader.

Happy Birthday ARES! 75 and still going! A Party on Saturday 30 October will put ham radio and EmComm on public display but more for the hams and served agencies. Lew KI6YWX (you will be seeing his name quite often in the future) has been instrumental in organizing this gala event along with Joe WA6FFJ and Carole W6TTF. There will be short presentations from clubs and groups as they show off their specialties. It runs from 9 AM to 1 PM at the Salvation Army Citadel, door prizes and refreshments!

October 2[:] The ARRL Simulated Emergency Test (SET) will test a planned response and we will open the SATERN EOC to attempt some digital traffic handling. That is the plan. Next month I'll report on how successful we were. It is a simple response but the most ambitious plan ARES has attempted for the SET, to date.

October 9: The hills will be rampant with bicycles! A new entity "Off the Front" will commence their inaugural Century Bike Race around Bass Lake to Clovis. They will not be alone. The Fresno Cycle Club is doing a longer one on the same day and course! The Mountain Club and ARACC have provided communications for them for years and Don W6WWT has provided his portable repeater for the event. ARES/RACES and SATERN will support the Clovis Pioneers in providing Communica-

tions for "Off the Front". Jim WA7HRG, the Tulare Co. ARES EC will also participate with 6-8 volunteers. I think it is notable that ARES/RACES and SATERN are working together spanning 3 ECs, 7 Clubs and operating in 2 Counties. Lessons learned here will be invaluable.

21 October, 10:21 AM is the "Great Shake-Out" earthquake disaster simulation. Over 10 million participated last year and their goal is to educate everyone how to prepare for an earthquake and what to do during one. "Drop, Cover and hold on!". What does that mean to us? Our responsibilities include getting to, setting up and providing auxiliary communications in a disaster. We even had a 2.? Earthquake in Clovis this year! What would you do, and where will you be when a big one hits! Our scenario addresses this. I had the privilege of attending the Salvation Army Disaster Training Level II that describes the Salvation Army compliance and organization along the ICS and NIMS structures. The Class was taught buy the Territorial and Division Disaster Coordinators and were pleased to announce to us SATERN folk, that a new era was beginning on 1 October for SATERN in the West. Put in stuffing made with:


- whole wheat bread
