

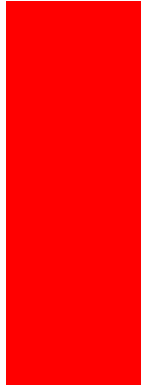

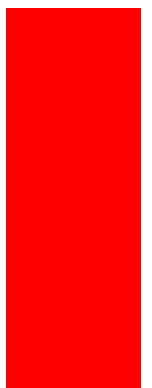

# Frisco Chamber of Commerce

Organization stands for local businesses

For more than 45 years, the Frisco Chamber of Commerce has been an entity that supports business. The vision of the chamber, however, has evolved over time.

The Frisco Chamber of Commerce was established in 1970. It was a volunteer-run organization with a part-time executive for about the first 25 years of its existence, chamber President Tony Felker said.

The first full-time president and CEO of the chamber came on board in the mid-1990s, said Felker, who became the chamber president in 2009.

Before the Frisco Economic Development Corp. was created in 1991, the business landscape in Frisco was

much smaller than what it is today, Felker said.

The focus of the chamber before 1991 was also similar to what the FEDC does now, including economic development, business attraction and business retention and expansion, he said.

"Business back then was very, very different," he said. "It was a bunch of folks that got together and wanting to be helping and developing the business community."

Now that the chamber has the FEDC to partner with, the chamber can focus more on being an advocate for businesses, Felker said.

This year, the chamber tweaked its mission statement to say that the chamber protects and promotes

commerce through advocacy, resources and connections. The updated mission statement is a part of the chamber's 2016-20 strategic plan.

Felker said the chamber is moving past being an entity for ribbon cuttings and networking events. The major focus of the chamber's role is to be a problem solver for businesses, he said.

"While the [FEDC] is mainly concentrated on attracting companies, it's really [the chamber's] role to make certain that once these companies are here—small, large, in between—that

they have what they need," he said. "If there's anything keeping them up at night, we're here to help try to take care of that."

Felker said the chamber will address both seemingly small issues—such as calling the city to fix a standing water problem—and bigger issues for businesses.

Some of the bigger issues the chamber has gotten involved in recently include joining a lawsuit against the U.S. Department of Labor's new overtime rule and becoming a party in a case against overhead power lines in West Frisco.

Taking a stance on governmental issues is a relatively new effort from

the chamber's board of directors, Felker said.

"Six years ago, people saw the chamber of commerce as a thermometer," he said. "...A thermometer tells you what the temperature is; it doesn't do anything about raising the temperature or cooling the temperature. Rather than a thermometer, I want to be the thermostat that actually turns the heat up or lowers

things down and makes things happen."

One of the key values of the chamber under the new strategic plan is continuous improvement so the chamber can be the best it can

for the business community, Felker said.

He said this means the chamber has to be at the top of its game and not be soft when it comes to advocating for businesses.

"[The chamber has] no ability to regulate, tax, anything like that. So the saying is we are the most powerful powerless organization," he said. "We have no power to do anything. But if we can take the resources that we have, the connections that we have, the leverage that we have throughout the community and if we can channel that in the right direction ... it's amazing what we can and have done over the years."

# ADVOCACY — A Shift in Focus

No other organization in Frisco is better poised than the Frisco Chamber of Commerce to be the “Voice of Business.” In early 2016, the Chamber tweaked its mission statement to read “to protect and promote commerce through advocacy, resources, and connections.” The Governmental Affairs Committee of the Frisco Chamber is at the forefront of issues not only involving Frisco, but the entire North Texas region.



## Frisco Chamber joins lawsuit against Department of Labor's overtime ruling

**FRISCO** The Frisco Chamber of Commerce joined more than 50 Texas business organizations in filing a lawsuit against a new Department of Labor overtime rule, which goes into effect Dec. 1.

The Texas and national business organizations, led by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, National Association of Manufacturers and the Texas Association of Business, filed a lawsuit that alleges a new overtime rule exceeds the Department of Labor's statutory authority under the Fair Labor Standards Act.

The overtime pay rule changes the salary threshold for those who are

exempt from receiving mandatory overtime pay. Currently, full-time, salaried workers making \$23,660 or more per year do not qualify for overtime pay. Under the rule, that salary level changes to \$47,476 or more per year in 2016.

The DOL said about 4.6 million employees who are currently exempt from overtime pay would receive overtime protection under the rule, which the department argues would help those workers receive fair compensation for their work.

The lawsuit was filed in the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Texas.

## Water development act passes U.S. House

**AUSTIN** A resolution to help the North Texas Municipal Water District get its largest project to date online sooner rather than later was passed by the U.S. House of Representatives on Sept. 28.

The Water Resources Development Act—now up for a vote in the Senate—requires the Environmental Protection Agency and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to issue a final permit for the construction of the Lower Bois d'Arc Creek Reservoir no later than Sept. 30, 2017.

The resolution was introduced in February by U.S. Rep. Sam Johnson, R-Plano, and was co-sponsored by U.S. Rep. Pete Sessions, R-Dallas,



U.S. Rep. John Ratcliffe, R-Heath, and U.S. Rep. Eddie Bernice Johnson, D-Waco.

Planning for the estimated \$1.2 billion reservoir in Fannin County has taken more than a decade to complete and more than \$122 million has been spent for its construction.

# ‘Dallas is our suburb’

relocation guide, advertising, and anything and everything else.

**What is topping your legislative agenda right now?** The key points are transportation, economic development. Local control is a big issue, as well as energy and education.

**What is your focus on local control?** We feel that government is best exercised at the local level. That should start with the local governing body being City Council as much as possible. I always find it funny that state elected officials say “Washington, stay out of our business,” but then they’re very quick to turn around and tell cities what they can or cannot do, or push unfunded mandates down.

**What do you see as the biggest threat to continuing the wave of growth, corporate relocations and expansions in Frisco and North Texas?** Water, which is a statewide issue. Workforce development is much more of a regional and local issue, as is transportation. Bringing people into the area is going to be a critical issue. We’re at 2.4 percent unemployment in this area now, and we’ve got more trained workers today and we need to make sure that we’ve got a highly qualified and trained workforce coming in tomorrow.

**Can you narrow it to one?** If I had to choose just one, I’d probably go with transportation. It is such a complicated issue. There are so many components with transportation.

**What differentiates the Frisco Chamber from others?** Too often, I think, chambers of commerce have defaulted to “we do networking, we do ribbon cuttings and we have chicken lunches.” We have made it a point that we’re not going to do that. There are certain things in town that we are best suited for – advocating on behalf of our businesses, being problem solvers, lobbying on behalf of the business community, legislation – those are things that impact every single member of ours, every single business.

**How did the deal with the Dallas Cowboys for The Star in Frisco come together?** That was a model where they took the deal that was in place for Toyota Stadium and said, hey, we’ve done this before. We’ve got the city that’s been involved, we’ve got the school district that’s been involved, we’ve got a private entity that’s been involved. We can tweak this. It took about 90 days to put that whole deal together because they basically took the agreement and substituted “Cowboys” in for “FC Dallas.”

**What’s your budget size and source?** We are currently at \$1.35 million. Dues make up about half of that, and the other half comes down to events,

With its \$5 Billion Mile under construction along the Dallas North Tollway and its record of nation-leading population growth, Frisco has been on a roll, with no signs of slowing down.

One of the entities helping the city grow is the Frisco Chamber of Commerce, led by Tony Felker, president and CEO.

Frisco grew a whopping 32 percent between 2010 and 2015, boosting its population to 154,407. The city posted an average annual population growth of 5.32 percent, ranking first in that category as well. The Frisco Chamber has 1,300 members, which ranks it No. 5 in North Texas, according to Dallas Business Journal research.

“One of the things we talk about all the time is we’re not your grandfather’s chamber,” Felker said. “We don’t want to be viewed the way chambers have historically been viewed... We’re going to shake it up. We’re going to do things differently.”

**What’s the latest on Frisco’s \$5 Billion Mile?** The last number that I saw, the figure was up to \$5.4 billion. That \$5.4 billion is if everything is built out the way everybody assumes it will be. We know some aspects won’t be built out to what’s planned, and others are probably going to be more than what’s expected. I think when the everyday person hears about the \$5 Billion Mile and everything that’s going to get built,

they think that by Christmas of 2017 everything is going to be built. It’s not like that. Some of these developments will be 15 or 20 years. I tend to think it will be sooner than that because most of the growth up here has had more rapid sellout and absorption than anywhere else.

**How does Frisco fit into the economic development scene in North Texas?** We refer to it as co-ompetition – a mix of cooperation and competition. It’s not a case of one city competing against another city and what do we get, what does Plano get and what is Rockwall getting? Texas is doing great within the whole country. The better that Frisco can do in terms of economic development, the better that Plano (and others) can do.

**Do you view Frisco as a suburb of Dallas or as its own city?** Jokingly, whenever I’m at a convention out of town or visiting folks in other states, I say “I’m from Frisco, Texas.” If I get that look, I say “If you don’t know where Frisco is, Dallas is our suburb 20 miles south.”
