Can you imagine the stressfilled interactions among the Jewish people in Palestine and throughout the Roman Empire at the proclamation of the disciples? "Where is your messiah, then?", and "Why does Rome still occupy Judah?" others may have

challenged the first disciples. For those who did confess Jesus as messiah, their acceptance caused others to

look down upon them or persecute them. Under such pressure, it becomes tempting to withdraw from fellowship with other disciples of Christ. Our summer shorship services are themed by the letter to the Hebrews which encouraged early believers to stand firm in their faith.

In many ways our 21st century western culture is similar to the first century Greco-Roman world. The uniformity of Christian faith and values of the twentieth century here in the U.S. is gone and believers in Jesus find themselves being marginalized or

worse. The apostle Paul encourages we disciples that faith trusts God and patiently serves as God leads us. This was true in the first century and today. We need to hear and see this encouragement as we gather week by week!

We are not a culture that looks to history for guidance. We tend to consider the past as less informed. Yet the Lord is good to

have given us the Scriptures that tell of others that have walked by faith. Not only are we blessed because of

their actions, we are blessed if we follow in their demonstrated hope and trust in God. Each generation of disciples has their challenges as they are led by Christ to invite others into his salvation. We know all too well our challenges. So let us be thankful for one another and the encouragement we can give each other to walk by faith and fulfill the good work the Lord has given us in these days!

## **Christians Celebrate Independence**

What does the Fourth of July -Independence Day - mean to Christians? On June 7, 1776, the **American Continental Congress** made its first formal proposal for independence from their British oppressors. A committee of five men were selected to draft a declaration of independence, but due to his eloquent writing style, Thomas Jefferson became the primary author of the document. His rough draft was complete on June 28, 1776 and with a fleet of British war ships assembling off the coast of New York, even those congressmen who were

reluctant to move for separation realized that the time was upon them and there was no turning back. There had been violence between the patriots and British soldiers going back to April of 1775 and reinforcements in the king's army were arriving now in huge numbers. War was eminent, but the founders felt that they needed to announce to the world the reasons they desired

freedom from British rule. So on July 2nd, 1776 the Declaration of Independence was adopted and it was formally announced two days

later on July 4th.

If you haven't read the declaration recently, it's not a bad idea to take another look and see what it says. The declaration reads like one of the longest complaint letters ever written. But there are a few features of the document I would like to highlight. First, it begins with a paragraph that explains why and to whom it was written. The founders wanted to "...assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them." So here, in the opening paragraph, they announce to the world that God has entitled them

to freedom. This will not be the only reference to God in the Declaration.

In the next paragraph Jefferson writes: "We hold these truths to be self evident, that all men are created equal, and they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights..." Yes, there is quite a bit of debate among be ratified by all thirteen colonies historians about the degree to which our founders were actually practicing believers. However, the first official document issued by their fledgling nation makes two references to a Creator God right



in the beginning stanzas of the text. Nearly 1,000 words later, after a list of more than twentyfive serious accusations against the British government, the document ends with an assertion that with a reliance on "Divine Providence" they pledge their lives and honor in support of the document.

Of course the British refused to willingly allow the colonies to separate, so the American Revolutionary war raged on until 1783 when the last of the British troops sailed out of New York. Now, with their new found freedom, it was the responsibility of the founders to establish some sort of government. Over the next few years there was debate, argument, and a great deal of compromise. There was also the

failed attempt to form a confederation of states rather than a strong centralized constitutional government. In the end - I believe with more of that "Divine Providence" - they agreed to a United States and set about the task of writing a constitution.

The constitution needed to and was only finally agreed upon after the inclusion of a Bill of Rights. Here, I believe as Christians, was the most important act of this embryonic government. The First Amendment to the

> Constitution includes some of our most important rights. It is in this amendment that they included two clauses about religion; often referred to as the establishment clause and the free exercise clause. It is these two clauses that guarantees that we will not have a government that establishes for us a religion and dictates to us, by law, how to practice that faith.

And of course the free exercise clause allows us to worship our God without interference from the government.

In recent years it has become in vogue to ridicule the founders calling them racists, sexists, and elitists. While on some levels those assertions may be true, at this time of year I generally choose to look beyond that and be thankful to a kind and loving God who I believe was with those men 243 years ago making certain that "...our fathers, brought forth on this continent a new nation, conceived in liberty, dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal". And that those forefathers were guided by God to include religious liberty as one of the founding principles of that nation.

## Going on around Northkirk . . .





# Summer Gardening





How do I make a composting container or pile?

There are many ways to recycle waste from plants, whether it started out as food, old plant parts (chopped up), or clippings. Just make sure what you put in your compost material is not diseased or insect infested. The best thing about composting is, it is free, easy, and fun. Composting can provide a balanced amendment to add back into the soil, fertilize your crops, and help to protect your plants against drought, pests, and disease. I will provide a few recipes for the formulas for balanced composting and present a couple methods that we have at the church and in my backyard at home.

There are three components necessary for composting: air, water and organic matter. The amounts of each are almost as important. Too much of any one part will cut down on the effectiveness of the finished amendment. Your regional climate can have an effect on it, as well.

Here's a list of some of the labels given to composting:

- Dry-weather
- Wet-weather
- Straw-bale
- Basic backyard (pile on the ground)
- Halloween leaf
- Air pile and turn\*
- Chicken and chips
- Rabbit-powered pile
- Recycled barrel
- Indoor worm
- Compost in a drum\*\*

Things to keep out of your compost material:

- Cat or dog droppings
- Coal or charcoal ashes
- Fish, meat, or cheese scraps
- Grease or oil
- Weed seeds, roots or rhizomes
- Diseased plants
- Chemicals

Organic matter should always be shredded and layered in your pile. Water needs to be added to your pile so that it makes the material moist, but not saturated (it must drain out, but stay damp). Water is added as necessary to keep the pile damp, during the agitation times.

After a week or two, air needs to be added by moving the pile from one full side to the other empty side. Each time you move the pile, you will notice the pile beginning to break down. \*

The tumbler uses the same process as the pile and turns, except that you are turning the drum\*\* at least five revolutions every day, adding water as necessary. In either case, when your pile or the tumblers capacity has been reached, stop adding new matter to the mix. The time necessary for a good composting amendment to be made will depend on the damp organic material (shredded), the temperature of the pile (120 degrees or more), and the duration the pile has been turned (2-4 weeks).

Knowing the right ratio of Nitrogen to Carbon in your pile is important for it to break down properly, (that's if you want it calculated scientifically). That ratio is about 30 parts Carbon to 1-part Nitrogen.

#### To calculate:

- 1. Multiply the percentage of Carbon of each ingredient by the number of parts (by weight) and then add all of them up.
- 2. Do the same for the Nitrogen.
- 3. Divide the Carbon value by the Nitrogen value to get the ratio. If it's not between 25:1 and 35:1, adjust the portions, so it brings them into the proper range. This ratio will create the best composting (plus air, water, heat, and time).

#### What do I do if my dishwasher isn't draining?

If the water in your dishwasher is not draining, it's time to clean the airgap and filters. The airgap is located near your sink faucet. Open the airgap by unscrewing the cover. Inside are plastic parts that trap the grease and soap and can become moldy. Use an old toothbrush to get the crud out and gave the parts a good cleaning. Next, run the dishwasher, and on the second wash cycle, pour two cups of

white vinegar in the bottom, close the door and let the dishwasher continue running. The solution will remove the grease trapped on the filters and leave your dishwasher fresh and clean.

The net operating deficit is subsidized by investment funds. The session has budgeted \$122,284.15 to be withdrawn from our investments this year. So far, we have withdrawn \$32,300 which is 26% of the budgeted amount which is 7% under budget. Our investments have recovered some of the funds lost in April. We are hoping they will continue to climb.

We are in the process of renewing a CD through the Presbyterian Investment Loan Program (PILP). We will invest our money with a 60 month note at 2.67%. This is investment money which supports our mortgage which is also with PILP.

Please note that we have a budgeted income of \$16,499.35 in May. This includes pledges, non-pledges, donations, and interest. The amount we have received is \$11,418.02 which is 83% of the expected revenue. It really helps our church to keep your pledges and offerings up to date especially now with summer vacations coming. Please think about our church as our expenses do not go on vacation.

It's time for all church members to support our shared Presbyterian resources by our per capita offering! This year our capita is \$36.00/member. For 92 members, totaling \$3312. Approximately 59% of our members have paid their per capita to date. Please help by contributing as soon as possible

#### **Northkirk Now Accepts Electronic Transfers**

The electronic age has changed the way people make payments and many people no long carry checkbooks or cash. Zelle, Venmo, PayPal and Apple Pay are just some of the electronic transfer networks often used.

Northkirk has decided to move into the 21st Century by creating Zelle and Venmo accounts. Zelle is used by the major banks to transfer funds to a cell phone number or an email address. The money is transferred within seconds, and there are no fees. Venmo is a subsidiary of Paypal and works similar to Zelle.

- "loveoffering" would be used for church hosted groups such as the I Am Family Choir, jazz vespers, etc.

The donor will need to set up our e-mail address(es) as their recipient. Once the setup is accomplished, the donor can then go to transfer funds, select one of our e-mail addresses, enter an amount to transfer, enter a description of what the funds are for and hit send. Our financial secretary will get a notification of the transfer and will apply the donations to the giving statements. The church can also pay money out to individuals that are on the Zelle network or directly to an individual's bank account. The money will be paid out from the church's Bank of America checking account.
