Fun with Figurative Language

This pack includes 32 Figurative Language matching cards, and 8 Heading Cards.

Independent: Students have to match each figurative language card to the correct heading card.

With a partner: Students lay the heading cards out on their desk. The figurative language cards are split evenly between both players. Each player takes a turn matching one of their cards to the correct heading card. If they match the cards correctly, they get a point. If the other person spots their mistake, they can steal the point. The person with the most points, wins!

Whole Class: Give each student in the class a card. When you say "Go", have the class separate themselves into groups based on the type of figurative language card they have. It is up to them to figure out which type of figurative language they have, and which students have the same as them. Once all students feel they are in the correct group, have each student share their card, and see if the class agrees they are in the correct group.
