

GENERAL RULES

1. In no event shall the Neosho County Fair Association or its officers, directors or members be held responsible for any loss or damage to the property or person or exhibitor or other persons while on the fairgrounds whether said loss or damages shall arise from an accident or any other cause.
2. All entries must be entered in superintendent's entry books to be eligible to compete for cash prizes. All exhibits must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor.
3. Age for exhibitor – as of January 1st of the current year for the 14 & under age and over 65 categories. Persons 14 and under must specify their age when entering, the same class numbers will be used and the letter "A" will be added to each entry and they will be judged separately.
4. Entries and all exhibits must be in place by 10 a.m. Thursday. Exhibitors are not to remove their exhibits before 7:30 p.m. Monday evening. All entries must be checked out on Monday at 7:30 p.m. In the miscellaneous class, if three or more persons enter the same item, a new class may be named.
5. The Neosho County Fair Association is the legally organized County Fair of Neosho County under the General Statutes of Kansas, General Statute Supplement, 1947, Laws of 1949, Chap. 1 and 201.
6. Open class premiums may not be picked up before 7:30 p.m. Monday, in the Fair office. If a premium is not picked up at the close of the fair or at the Extension office by September 1st, it will be returned to the Fair Board treasury. Premiums for all open class will be paid in cash this year. No premium will be mailed after the fair. No premium will be paid unless the class is listed in the premium list, but such exhibits may be placed on display at the discretion of the superintendent. Ribbons, no cash premiums, will be given for third place. The Neosho County Fair Association reserves the right to pro-rate all premiums. No more will be paid in premiums and awarded than is appropriated by Neosho County for these purposes. The amount listed below is the premium money paid out in the open class section, for the ribbon placing, not an entry fee.

OPEN CLASS INDOOR EXHIBITS

- There will be no pre-entry. Also, no entry table the day of the entry at the fair.
- Upon arrival at the fairgrounds, open class home economics entries will be taken directly to each department where the superintendent will enter the name and mailing address in the appropriate division. The exhibitor will be asked to fill out an ID card to be placed on the exhibit. Persons entering many exhibits may pick up entry cards in advance at the Extension office in Erie.
- Entries close and all exhibits must be in place by 10:00 a.m. Thursday.
- In classes with only one exhibitor, the judge reserves the right to place the exhibit as they see fit in regard to place.
- In the miscellaneous class, if three or more persons enter the same item, a new class may be named.
- **Please note:** For all Home Economic departments, Persons 14 and under must specify their age when entering. The same class numbers will be used and the letter "A" will be added to each entry and they will be judged separately.
- **Please note:** Open Class Judge is not required to give a Grand and Reserve in each category. It will depend on the quality of the product.

OPEN CLASS LIVESTOCK

- Livestock must be pre-entered, by July 1st to allow for stall space.
- Entry fee \$5 for large animals (beef, sheep, swine, and goats)
- Livestock exhibitors not sending in advance entries will be allotted the remaining stalls and will not be guaranteed space.
- Both registered and commercial animals may show in open class. Livestock previously shown in the 4-H/FFA show may not be shown in open class. Limit two head per species per exhibitor.
- At least three (3) animals must compete before a champion will be named in any livestock class. In classes with only one exhibitor, the judge reserves the right to place the animals as they see fit in regard to placing.
- Livestock classes will be shown in alphabetical order by breed with light classes before heavy, when not stated otherwise.
- Open class poultry exhibitors will be charged a head fee of .25 cents per animal.
- Open class rabbit exhibitors – no fee charged.
- All livestock and poultry exhibitors will send their entry fee at the time they send in their pre-entries. Head fee must be paid to the Fair office before livestock is unloaded. Neosho County 4-H/FFA members are exempt from this head fee.
- 4-H members exhibiting in open class will be required to keep their stall clean during and after the fair. Failure to do so will be cause for forfeiture of premium.
- Once an animal leaves the fairgrounds it cannot be re-admitted.
- Neosho county fair board reserves the right to dismiss from a class any exhibitor treating their animal in a cruel or inhumane manner.

ANTIQUES

See General Rules

- Give age of item entered. Item must be 50 years or more.
- At least 2 years elapse between the showing of the same antique.
- Indicate the name of the article when entering in a miscellaneous class. If three or more entries in the miscellaneous class with the same item, a new class may be added. No more than (2) entries may be made in a miscellaneous class. Entries in miscellaneous are only for items not having a class listed.
- An entry consists of one (1) item or one (1) set.
- In the Quilt class, give approximate age, name of the person that pieced and quilted the quilt, name of the quilt pattern and a story about the quilt.

2. No more than **two** articles may be entered in any classification by one person and no exhibit may be entered in two classes.
3. Every article will be under the control of the superintendent and every possible care will be taken to prevent damage, but in no event will the fair management be responsible for injury or loss should any occur.
4. Articles having received the first premium before may be exhibited but not for premiums.
5. Article must be clean and in order for exhibiting.
6. Please indicate name of article when entering in a miscellaneous class. If three or more persons enter in the Miscellaneous Class with the same item, a new class may be added. No more than two (2) entries may be made in a miscellaneous class. Entries in miscellaneous class will be for only those items not having a class listed.
7. **Please note:** Unfinished tops will be judged and placed within the class, however, since they are not a finished product, they will not be judged for overall champion or reserve quilt. The complete and finished product may be entered in the next fair.
8. **Please note:** Persons 14 and under must specify their age when entering. The same class numbers will be used and the letter "A" will be added to each entry and they will be judged separately.
9. A special prize will be given to Grand Champion overall Quilt & Reserve Champion overall Quilt, donated by Garold and Mary Jane Burghart.

At check-in, quilters must identify if they are a professional (those who make a living by selling their work or made by one who teaches or sells), amateur (those who create art as a hobby/occasional sales does not disqualify), senior citizen (quilter is over 65), or first-time (never quilted before).

Quilts/Quilters will be judged on the following criteria:

The Quilt Back

- Sides and/or ends even
- Corners: preferably mitered
- Backing: choice of fabric
- Binding: neatly attached
- Clean and washed

The Quilt Top

- Pattern and/or design
- Color: harmonious/correlation
- Piecing: secure and neat
- Applique: neat stitches
- Quilting: even stitches/balanced throughout

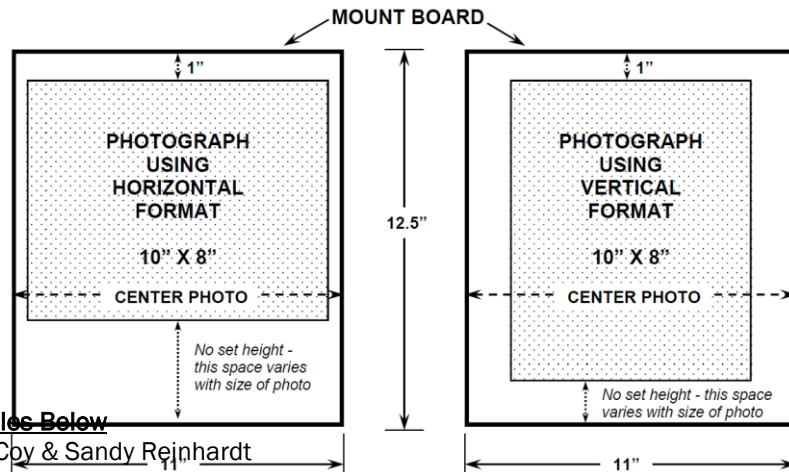

POULTRY

1. All birds must be mature enough to be full feathered with adult plumage.
2. The same birds cannot compete in both single and trio class.
3. An exhibitor is limited to not more than two entries in any breed and variety per class.
4. All eggs laid during the fair will be gathered by the superintendents in charge.
5. In any class where only one entry is made, awards will be made at the discretion of the judge, based on the quality of the exhibit.
6. Disqualification will bar competition from the class. Some of the more common disqualifications are listed in "4-H Guide in Selecting and Preparing Birds for the Show."
7. The comparison system of judging as outlined in the American Standard of Perfection will be used in placing the awards. Classes will be judged primarily on basis of exhibition qualities as described in "The American Standard of Perfection," American Bantam Poultry Association and "The Bantam Standard of Perfection," American Bantam Association.
8. Breeds should be stated at time of pre-entry.
9. Entries will not be accepted unless band numbers are listed in the entry book. All birds must be banded when placed in cages.
10. Birds are not to be removed from the exhibit building without permission from the superintendent in charge. A person violating any of the rules will forfeit any prize money that may have been awarded.
11. All entries must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor. Any exhibitor in violation of this rule will be subject to disqualification.
