Pre-K Program Essentials-Overview

- Georgia's Pre-K Program was established in 1993
- Funded by the Georgia Lottery for Education Act
- More than 860,000 Pre-K children served since 1993
- 2008-2009 School year: 79,000 Pre-K slots
- Comprehensive classroom standards
- On-site program monitoring/technical assistance
- Instructional and financial accountability
- Family Support Program through Resource Coordination Grant



Pre-K Program Essentials-Overview

- Voluntary Universal Program
 - Children must live in Georgia and be age eligible
 - No income requirement
 - 56% of Georgia's four year olds served
- Public/Private Partnership
 - Operates in both Public and Private sites
 - 59.26% Private
 - 39.34% LSS
 - 1.36% Other (Military, Charter, Technical Schools, Vocational Education, Refugee Centers, University Lab Schools)

Pre-K Program Essentials-Overview



- Full Year/Full Day Program
 - 180 days per year (36 weeks)
 - Five days per week
 - 6.5 hours per day
- Credentialed Teaching Staff
 - Lead Teachers credential requirements
 - Certified / Bachelor's degree in Elementary or Early Childhood (79.85%)
 - Associate's Degree in Early Childhood (20.34%)
 - Assistant Teachers must meet minimum credential requirement
 - Child Development Associate (CDA) or equivalent
