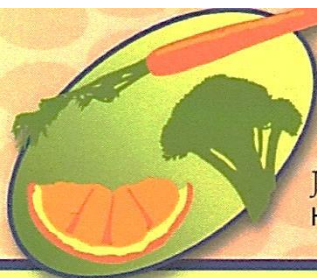

Florida's environmental disaster hits the beaches

Early on a beautiful Saturday morning, 59 people hit the beach at Ocean Inlet Park in Ocean Ridge; but this event, sponsored by the Sea Angels, was all business and not at all pleasurable.

With buckets and hand-held grabbers, they picked up debris. The vast majority, it turned out, was plastic.

After 2½ hours, they had collected a mound of plastic fishing line, nets, lures and bobbers. They'd filled a five-gallon container with plastic bottle caps, a bucket with Mylar balloons and another five-gallon jug with plastic straws.

Yet another five-gallon container overflowed with cigarette butts, made of a plastic called cellulose acetate.

The trash also included 12- and 20-gauge shotgun shells, plastic containers from the Bahamas and, on prior cleanups, a complete IV kit with syringe, that was traced back to New Jersey, and plastic medical waste from Haiti.

It was the tip of the iceberg of the ocean's plastic garbage, and it washes onto South Florida beaches with every wave.

The plastic debris is more than unsightly. It is killing birds, turtles, marine mammals and coral reefs.

In only 60 years since plastic has been mass produced, it has caused incalculable damage:

- A state study, done 10-20 miles off the Palm Beach County shore, collected post-hatchling turtles and found 80 percent had plastic in their stomachs, said Kirt Rusenko, marine conservationist at Gumbo Limbo Nature Center in Boca Raton.

- Whales consume plastic, lose weight and die. The world's oceans are polluted with an estimated six pounds of plastic for every pound of plankton, Rusenko said.

- In the Pacific, 50 percent of boobies and other seabirds die from plastic ingestion, scientists estimate. "The parents collect plastic in the ocean and bring it back and feed it to the chicks," Rusenko said. "Probably the same thing is happening with seabirds here."

Administration. Experts speculate the majority of plastics made in the last 60 years still exist.

Craft Categories

3. Polymer Clay - Any project sculpted or covered with 85% or more polymer clay.

5. Stained Glass – Actual stained glass.
6. Jewelry – Including jewelry made with beads.
7. Beadwork – Other than jewelry.
8. Painting – Wood, clay, glass, metal, etc. (See Category #81 for China Painting)
9. Decoupage/Dimensional Collage – Decoupage objects or 3-dimensional collages. (See Category #75 for FLAT collaged & framed pictures.)
10. Miniatures – Anything on a small scale, except paintings. (See Category #80 for Miniature Paintings)
11. Paper crafts – Card Making, stamping.
12. Paper crafts-Quilling, Paper Mache, 3/D, paper sculptures, etc.
13. Scrapbooking/Memory Books – Handmade.
14. Scrapbooking/Memory Books – Digital.
15. Baskets – Hand-woven.
16. Natural Material – 85% Natural from shells, sand, pine cones, gem stones, leaves, palms, etc.
17. Recycle Materials – Bottles, cans, boxes, bags, etc.
18. Floral/No live materials – Silk, etc.
19. Floral/No live materials – Dried/Pressed flowers, leaves, etc.
20. Wreaths - All occasions.
21. Decorated Ornaments – All occasions
22. Doll Making – China or cloth.
23. Doll Clothes – May be displayed on a doll.
24. Knitting – Clothing, all ages.
25. Knitting – Afghans and etc.

26. Crochet – Clothing, all ages.
27. Crochet – Afghans and etc.
28. Hand Embroidery – Threaded needle, crewel, ribbon, etc. – no machine embroidery.
29. Machine Embroidery – All embroidery 100% machine done.
30. Needlepoint & Petit Point – Needlework done on canvas so as to resemble tapestry.
31. Cross Stitch – Counted
32. Cross Stitch – Stamped
33. Fabric Craft – Painted, felted, stuffed (other than dolls), applique' & quilted (other than bed size. i.e.: Pot holders, placemats, wall hangings, etc.)
34. Hand Quilting – 100% hand-pieced and quilted, bed size. (crib up thru king)
35. Machine Quilting – 100% machine pieced and quilted bed size. (crib up thru king)
36. Hand and Machine Quilting Combination – Bed size. (crib up thru king)
37. Family Sewing – All ages.
38. Special Event Sewing – All ages (wedding, christening dress, etc., including costumes)
39. Heirloom Sewing - Tatting, cutwork, pulled-thread hand work, pin-tucks, lace-making/shaping, smocking, etc.
40. Group Entries – Any craft done by 3 or more club members.
41. Combination – Blending of any 2 or more crafts. (A 3 x 5 card listing the categories used MUST be attached)
42. Open Category – Item does not qualify for any other category. (A 3 x 5 card describing the craft MUST be attached)
43. Forgotten Crafts – Candle wicking, weaving, macramé, wood-carving, hardanger, etc.

ART CATEGORIES

All entries should have the following information:

- a. Member's name, name of club, district number, division and category name. (i.e.: Jane Doe, Florida Woman's Club, District 100, Painting, 70 - Oil)
- b. Brief caption or description of item or subject.
- c. Entries must have an arrow on back to indicate top of item.

Each person entering this exhibit must have already signed a Release Form as to originality and absolution of claim for loss or damage.

Painting 70 - Oil
 71 - Acrylic
 72 - Pastel
 73 - Watercolor

Drawing

74 - Drawing – Charcoal, Colored Pencil, Black & White, etc.

Mixed Media/Collage

75 - Mixed Media/Collage - A combination of any two or more of the first four divisions, and/or FLAT materials to form a framed picture.

Size requirements for the above categories: Maximum 33" and minimum 12" either length or width, including frame. All works must be framed and wired for hanging.

Miniatures

80 - Any medium of the first four categories in miniature.

Size requirements for miniatures: Not larger than 4" x 6". May or may not be framed. You may bring a small easel, making certain to mark with your name, club name and district number.

China Painting

81 - Painting on fine china

China painters may bring a small easel, making certain to mark both the china entry and the easel with your name, club name and district number.

PHOTOGRAPHY CATEGORIES

All entries should have the following information:

- a. Member's name, name of club, district number, division and category name. (i.e.: Jane Doe, Florida Woman's Club, District 100, 90 – Portrait)
- b. Brief caption or description of item or subject.
- c. Entries must have an arrow on back to indicate the top of item.

Each person entering this exhibit must have already signed a Release Form as to **originality** and absolution of claim for loss or damage.

Size Requirements: All photos must be an 8"x10" original print and matted. Matting must be at least 10" x 12" but no larger than 14" x 16", with no frames or glass. Matting may be in any color the photographer believes will best highlight their photo.

Photography

- 90 - Portrait – A head or head & shoulders photo of a person.
- 91 - Natural History – Plants, flowers, trees, animals, insects, birds
- 92 - Scenic - Vistas, landscapes, seascapes, snow scenes, bridges, parks, mountains, farmland, etc.
- 93 - Feature - Depicting a person or persons in an interactive, emotional or unusual situation.

The photos in the above 4 categories (90, 91, 92, 93) must not be enhanced in any way (except for red eye correction and the size being cropped).

Enhanced Photography

- 94 - Enhanced Photo – Portrait – A 4 x 6 copy of the original photo that was enhanced MUST be attached.
