Staff Survey Results

Every three years DRCC conducts a comprehensive survey of all its employees. A small employee work group reviews/revises the survey tool and then tallies and summarizes the results. This year 318 of DRCC's approximate 500 employees completed the survey.

The results are truly heartening. Virtually everyone who responded indicated that they enjoy their work with the individuals we serve and also believe that DRCC is a good organization to work for. This is a great formula for the provision of quality services. We have employees who are committed to the individuals we serve and who believe they are part of an organization with a strong mission that values their efforts.

In addition to the overall positive feedback, employees also provided a number of suggestions for making improvements. We will be working to incorporate these ideas into our organization.

Another Difficult Legislative Session

Doesn't this sound familiar? The primary focus of the last two legislative sessions was working to resolve the state's budget deficit. And now, it's back again - bigger than ever. Current projections estimate that the projected deficit for the state's next two-year budget will be roughly five to six billion dollars.

So, what might this mean for services for persons with disabilities? Unfortunately, because the projected deficit is so large, legislators will likely consider reducing virtually every aspect of services. This includes basic services such as dental and physical therapy, rate reductions for residential and in-home services, increased co-payments for individuals and their families, and restricting access to services. Everyone will be asked to make do with less.

It is going to be critical to pay attention and advocate throughout the legislative session. Legislative alerts will be available through the ARC and other advocacy organizations. Contact your local legislator to make them aware of how proposed legislative proposals will impact individuals close to you.
