

Recording Secretary's Report

Compact Day Luncheon October 30, 2016 Bellevue Red Lion Inn, Bellevue, Washington

Our Compact Day Luncheon began at 11:45 am with a social hour. Members were invited to peruse the sales table for sales books and Mayflower items, view displays about the 2017 GSMD Historic Sites Tour and a list of members who belong to other heritage societies.

Governor Guy Moellendorf called the meeting to order at 12:20 pm.

Elder Mavis Ratcliff led the Invocation, and Captain Nick Parrott led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Governor Moellendorf introduced former Governors, Steve Arnold, Catherine Roberti, Margaret Spangler, and Don Wingerson, current Board Officers, and the Board of Assistants.

Governor Moellendorf gave a brief summary of the Mayflower Compact and its signers (men). He then did the Ancestor Roll Call, noting that in 2007 the list of ancestors was expanded to include all ancestors arriving on the Mayflower, including women and children. There were 58 members, two junior members, and 22 guests present. James Chilton had the most descendants present (7), and John Alden was second with 6 descendants.

Since our speaker's topic for today was witches, Governor Moellendorf asked members with ancestors who were witches, judges, accusers, or others involved in witch trials to stand. More members stood than didn't, demonstrating how profoundly the

"witchcraft" hysteria affected our ancestors in New England.

Historian Jerri McCoy and Corresponding Secretary Genie Parrott recognized our new member in attendance. Katherine Doughty (James Chilton), and presented her with her membership certificate. Lynn Pittier, in Pilgrim attire, introduced our Junior Members in attendance, Calvin Paulson and Dinah Reed, presenting them

with certificates of attendance.

Catherine Roberti was presented with the Past Governor's Award and Badge. Catherine also has 17 supplemental ancestors!

Lunch was served at 12:45 pm. Tables were decorated in a fall theme, with gold tablecloths and napkins. Round mirrors were covered with fall leaves and miniature flags. Food selections included burgundy beef tips, parmesan crusted chicken, pesto chicken penne, and ratatouille, with chocolate cake or cheesecake for dessert.

Following lunch, Deputy Governor Jocelyn Paulson welcomed our guest speaker, Deborah McNally, PhD, Lecturer at the University of Washington on Early American History. Dr.

McNally's presentation was "The Salem Witchcraft Crisis of 1692: Why Salem? Why 1692?"

Some points Dr. McNally made were:

This was different than previous New England witch hysteria cases.

1600 were named, 162 were arrested, and 144-156 were said to be "in the snare of the devil."

- Conflict with the Native Americans made this an intensely fearful time.

Many families had ties to the isolated frontier in Maine, which was experiencing severe Indian troubles.

- Colonists who experienced or feared Indian attacks had severe anxiety and showed signs of Post Traumatic Stress Disorder, PTSD.
- Lyme disease and ergot-affected grain poisoning could cause symptoms similar to those attributed to demonic possession.
- Family conflicts, disputes with neighbors, misogyny, and religious disagreements could be to blame. These people were under a high degree of stress.
- Afflicted and accusers were powerless young women. Being in the spotlight gave them attention and control which they did not have otherwise.
- Almost everyone believed that witches (and devils and demons, etc.) were real. It was just part of their religious belief system.

The reigning English king at that time, James II, became a Catholic when he married his second wife. He advocated religious tolerance to stop the persecution of Catholics (and others). He merged the New England colonies, creating the *Dominion of New England*. This replaced the religious governments of the Puritans and Separatists, and advocated religious tolerance of Catholics, Quakers, and Baptists. They certainly did not want to tolerate these groups, and did not want to give up their original charters and freedoms. In 1688, James II was overthrown by his Protestant daughter, Mary, and her Dutch Protestant husband, William of Orange (William and Mary). This inspired Massachusetts colonists to rebel against the Dominion and its officials, including ousting Dominion Governor Andros. However, the overthrow of the Dominion officials in the Massachusetts Bay Colony didn't work out as the colonists had hoped. William and Mary refused to reissue the colony's original charter and instead issued a new charter in 1691 that merely continued the policies of the *Dominion* of New England, including restricting religious Puritan-based laws. Needless to say, this created intense strife for the Puritans of Massachusetts. Governor Winthrop's "City on a Hill" was

coming to an end. More stress!

This was a very litigious society, using courts to resolve disputes. There were disputes over property lines, grazing rights, and church privileges to name a few. (Salem Village residents were considered quarrelsome.) When the Colony Charter was suspended, the courts were also suspended, leaving many issues unresolved.

In October of 1692, as more prominent people were being accused, prominent ministers began speaking out. They believed confessions were being coerced, and spectral evidence was called into question.

Governor Moellendorf thanked Dr. McNally for her enjoyable and thought-provoking program and presented her with a certificate of appreciation.

Bylaws Committee Chair, Margaret Spangler, introduced the Bylaws Committee and explained the proposed revisions to the Bylaws, Article III. Members were given ballots upon arrival. It was moved by Margaret and seconded by Nick Parrott that we put the revisions to a vote. There were five separate items to approve on the ballot by a yes or no vote: Section 5 – Transfers and Dual Memberships; Section 2.c. – Membership Classes; Section 3.b. – Junior Member; Section 3.c. – Life Member; Section 6.b. – Reinstatements.

Steve Arnold challenged the ballot vote, which required five separate tallies, and suggested we vote only once with a show of hands. We could vote yes if we approved all five revisions or no if we did not. This was done, and there were two no's. Everyone else voted to approve all five revisions. Motion Passed to Amend Bylaws, Article III. For the adopted wording, see page 10, Fall

Skipper of ship Lady Washington to Speak at April Luncheon

Kenneth Lazarus is one of the active Skippers of the *Lady Washington* tall ship. He will speak about life aboard a historical wooden sailing ship. He will have a PowerPoint with about 20 slides to share with us.

The current *Lady Washington* tall ship is a replica of the original *Lady Washington* that was launched in 1780. The current *Lady Washington* was launched in 1989.

Ken works for the Grays Harbor Historical Seaport which is home port for the *Lady Washington*. Mr. Lazarus said that he may appear in his historical merchant marine Skipper's uniform (non-military) for the speech.

The Skipper of a historical sailing ship is a great catch for our speaker! What could be more relevant to descendants of those who sailed on the *Mayflower*?

Skipper Lazarus' Life Experience

Ken grew up on the Niagara River driving small fishing boats from the age of 10. In 1990, he moved to Southern California and spent 14 years teaching scuba diving. This led to St Thomas, US Virgin Islands to run Underwater Safaris Dive Operations for two years.

Now living in the Pacific Northwest, he is skippering charter boats such as the 65ft schooner, *Mallory Todd*, the Sea Scouts Ship *Charles N. Curtis*, *SSS Odyssey* and our state ship, The *Lady Washington*. Since moving to Tacoma in 2010, Ken has focused on maritime activities by volunteering at Tacoma Sea Scouts and is the new Marine Operations Manager at Grays Harbor Historical Seaport.



Watch the Mayflower II being Restored

A \$7.5 million, multi-year restoration is being undertaken of the nearly 60-year-old replica of the Mayflower that normally is found in the waters off Plymouth, MA. This is in advance of the 400th anniversary of the Pilgrims' arrival in Plymouth in 1620. The restoration honors the ship's original construction and uses traditional methods. The goal is to restore the Mayflower II to her original state when she first arrived in Plymouth in 1957.

The public can watch the restoration online via a live cam at plimoth.org/mayflowerlive Towed to Mystic CT, before Thanksgiving, the Mayflower II is being attended to by Mystic Seaport shipwrights and Plimoth Plantation maritime artisans. Workers are replacing the halfdeck area, as well as working on the tween deck and topmast rigging.

Inspections in 2013 revealed the Mayflower II, owned by Plimoth Plantation, was in need of a major refit, which was not considered unusual for a nearly 60-year-old wooden ship. Donations toward the restoration are accepted at plimoth.org/sos

Bylaw changes Approved At November 30, 2016, Luncheon.

Below is the resulting wording for each affected section.

ARTICLE II, Section 2 c. Life Member: A Regular Member who has paid the Life Member Fee listed in the Standing Rules or who has attained 40 consecutive years in good standing with the Washington State *Society*.

ARTICLE III, Section 3 b. Junior Member: Upon attaining 18 years of age, a Junior member may become a Regular member by complying with the requirements of Article III Section 3a.

ARTICLE III, Section 3 c. Life Member: Life Membership in the *Society* may be obtained by a Regular member over 35 years of age who has paid annual dues for at least one year and has paid the Life Member Fee specified in the Standing Rules, or by continuous membership in good standing for 40 years. To remain a Life Member the *Society* must be informed annually of the member's current contact information.

ARTICLE III, Section 5. Transfers & Dual Memberships:

Transfer members who have paid annual dues to the state from which they have transferred shall pay dues to the *Society* for the year in which the transfer was made.

ARTICLE III Section 6. b. Resignations & Reinstatements:

Delinquent members who were dropped for non-payment of dues may be reinstated with payment of the current and previous year's dues.

Life Members who become dormant by not notifying the *Society* annually of current contact information may be reinstated when the Society receives a letter stating current contact information, General Society number and Washington State Society number. []

The Mayflower Pilgrims

In 1620, a brave group of 102 men, women, and children sailed across the Atlantic on the *Mayflower*, searching for a life of religious and civil freedom.

These Pilgrims landed in Plymouth harbor, establishing the first permanent European settlement in New England. Only half survived that first difficult winter. Hundreds of years later, from those few survivors there are now millions of Pilgrim descendants.



In addition to bringing their values and spirit of adventure with them to the New World, the Pilgrims created a heritage of liberty and law by drawing up a document of self-government, the *Mayflower* Compact, which they signed onboard the *Mayflower* at Provincetown. The *Mayflower* Compact is considered a forerunner to the Constitution.

The General Society of Mayflower Descendants

To honor Pilgrim ancestors and to keep their story alive, the General Society of Mayflower Descendants was created in 1897.

Getting Started

Proof of lineage from the original Pilgrims, through at least five generations, can be found in our *Mayflower Families* silver books.

Your state society Historian can guide you regarding best practices in researching your family lineage and filling out your membership application form.
