After he had said this, he went on ahead, going up to Jerusalem. When he had come near Bethphage and Bethany, at the place called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of the disciples, saying, "Go into the village ahead of you, and as you enter it you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden. TODAY IN WORSHIP

Welcome to worship! On this Palm Sunday, our guest preacher, the Rev. Shannan R. Vance-Ocampo, will be reflecting on two texts, Isaiah 50: 4-9a and Luke 19: 28-40, and two very different processions, the triumphal entry of Jesus to adoring crowds, and the *via dolorosa* with Jesus carrying his cross to *Golgotha* through jeering hoards. How will we move through the ambiguities and perplexities of this Holy Week?

Welcome Shannan R. Vance-Ocampo our Guest Preacher today! The Rev. Shannan Vance-Ocampo serves as the General Presbyter for the Presbytery of Southern New England. Prior to this call she was the Transitional Executive Presbyter for Albany Presbytery, served two pastorates in New Jersey, and did clinical and pastoral field work in Chicago, IL. In addition to her work with our Presbytery she serves at the national church level as the Chair-Elect of the board of the Presbyterian Mission Agency and is a member of the Committee on the Office of the General Assembly. She is working on her Doctor of Ministry at Memphis Theological Seminary in Land, Food and Faith Formation. Her husband, Juan Gabriel Ocampo Valle, is a native of Bogotá, Colombia, where they also maintain a home and they have one daughter. She is an avid gardener and added a few chickens to her garden during the pandemic.



All children are welcome to stay in worship throughout the service, but especially through the procession of the palms until Scott offers a message for young disciples at the end of the welcome and announcements. Childcare is also provided in the nursery by Louna Esperance and Saturnina Greeves-Cooper from 8:45-11:45am every Sunday. There are also curriculum bags for kids and a craft corner in the rear of the sanctuary if anyone gets restless. Church wide events hosted by the YLC are inclusive of all ages and next Sunday the youth are hosting an Easter Egg Hunt for the children and a Bake Sale for the adults! After Easter, please watch the event schedule and sign up to explore faith and share in fellowship with our wonderful inter-generational church family.

FPCNC is staying steady with "mask optional" policy in worship, at church gatherings, and on church grounds. Fully vaccinated individuals are no longer required to wear masks, although those who prefer to may continue to do so. The in-person Sunday service will continue to be simultaneously streamed online via *LocalLive* at 10:00 am.

ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

Nicolas Jaques Lemmens was born and died in Belgium. He took lessons from François-Joseph Fétis, who wanted to make him into a musician capable of renewing the organ-player's art in Belgium. Fétis sent him to Adolf Friedrich Hesse in Germany to learn Johann Sebastian Bach's tradition. In March 1849 he was appointed organ teacher at the Royal Brussels Conservatoire, aged only 26; and he trained numerous young musicians, including two eminent Frenchmen, Alexandre Guilmant and Charles-Marie Widor. During 1852 he gave organ recitals in Paris, where he stunned audiences with his technique, particularly, his brilliant pedal-playing, which he owed to his studies of Bach's music (at the time Bach's organ works were not at all well known in France).

William Mathias (1934-1992) began to compose at an early age, studying first at the University College of Wales, Aberystwyth, taking his BMus with first-class honours, and subsequently on an Open Scholarship in composition at the Royal Academy of Music. He was elected a Fellow of the Royal Academy of Music in 1965 and gained the DMus of the University of Wales in 1966. From 1970-1988 he was Professor and Head of the Music Department at

the University College of North Wales, Bangor. He was known as a conductor and pianist and gave or directed many premières of his own works. A house composer with Oxford University Press since 1961, his compositions cover an extraordinarily wide range. He has made a highly significant contribution to twentieth-century organ music, and his church music and carols are still regularly performed worldwide.

Michael Bedford (b.1949) served as Organist/Choirmaster and Composer-in-Residence at St. John's Episcopal Church, Tulsa, Oklahoma for 25 years before retiring in 2015. A native of Sherman, Texas, he has published choral music for children, youth, and adults, as well as organ collections, handbell music, and two extended works for choir, soloists, and chamber orchestra. He has served as a workshop leader and clinician for children's and youth choir festivals, hymn festivals, directors' workshops, and music reading sessions throughout the United States.

THIS WEEK AT FPCNC

Maundy Thursday Service, April 14 at 7pm During the service of Tenebrae, meaning shadows or darkness, the lights are gradually dimmed to darkness as we read the story of the passion of Jesus. We remember the cataclysmic nature of his sacrifice as we hear the overwhelming sound of the "strepitus." Worshipers leave in silence to ponder the impact of Christ's death and await the celebration of his coming Resurrection.

Good Friday Service, April 15 at 12pm What's "Good" about "Good Friday?" It's a day full of ambiguities and perplexities. It's a day of violence and unspeakable cruelty on the one hand, and peaceful non-retaliation and unimaginable forgiveness and love on the other. The only way to fully appreciate and comprehend what the Christian celebration of Easter is all about is to first attempt to appreciate the proclamation of the cross. Paul writes, "we proclaim Christ crucified, ... Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength." Come join us for worship on Good Friday.

Come join us on Sunday, May 1st from 11:30 to 1pm for the first in a series of conversations, inspired by the mission statement of the First Presbyterian Church of New Canaan. As the pandemic recovery continues, the goal of this series is to help participants renew, explore, deepen, and strengthen their spiritual practices. The mission of First Presbyterian Church of New Canaan (We strive to: live spiritually, love inclusively, learn continuously, and leave a legacy), while pursued in the context of the Christian faith at our church, also reflects universal aspirations of those

seeking to live meaningful lives, so these conversations will be open to all, and participants are encouraged to invite friends and/or neighbors to participate as well. Questions that may be part of our first conversation include:

- What does it really mean to live spiritually?
- What are some of the obstacles to improving spiritual practices, and how might they be overcome?

Chris has served churches in Greenwich, Wilton, and New Canaan, CT and served for almost a decade on the Board of Pacific House, Inc. a housing and human services agency focusing on people who are homeless, and based in Stamford, CT.






As the violence in Ukraine continues, the number of people being displaced internally and fleeing to neighboring countries increases by the day. And in the midst of the chaos, there are sibling churches and ecumenical partners who are already providing assistance with basic items for survival. Our first priority is to provide funding to these partners on the ground. While the scale of this crisis is new, receiving refugees from Ukraine and other countries in Central and Eastern Europe is not, which means we have trusted, established partners with the knowledge and expertise to carry out this important work. Our response will include both financial and technical assistance as the network of faith communities providing humanitarian assistance grows in the months ahead.
