

News and Events GSU Hosts Congressional Candidates in Packed CPA

Governors State University affirmed its position as an important public square at last Thursday's Second Congressional District Candidate Forum. Despite less-than-ideal weather conditions, the forum, in GSU's Center for Performing Arts, drew a large audience of area residents and GSU students and staff.

Twelve candidates for the vacant Second Congressional District seat – 10 Democrats and two Republican – attended the forum. Mike Flannery, political editor of WFLD Fox 32, did an exemplary job of asking questions, and making sure that every candidate had enough time to air their positions. A number of key issues were discussed, including the economy, health care, the environment, guns, immigration, ethics, the war in Afghanistan, spending cuts, and violence on our streets.

"The Candidates' Forum is a perfect example of GSU's commitment to civic engagement," said President Elaine P. Maimon. "Our students studied the issues, prepared questions for candidates, and showed up in record numbers. The GSU community joined the larger Congressional District 2 in an audience numbering close to 800. It was democracy in action fulfilling GSU's mission as a Public Square."

Democratic candidates participating in the forum were Anthony Beale, Debbie Halvorson, Gregory Haynes, Toi Hutchinson, Victor Jonathan, Robin Kelly, Fatimah Muhammad, Larry Pickens, Charles Rayburn, and Anthony Williams. Republican candidates were Paul McKinley and Beverly Reid.

GSU's forum is being re-broadcast over the university's GSU's cable access channel, The Educator. GSU's broadcast area extends from Chicago to Kankakee on Comcast channel 16. It can also be found at WideOpenWest (WOW!) cable on channel 24 in South Holland, Oak Forest, and Calumet City. The forum will be repeated on The Educator through February 26 at 7 p.m. on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Sundays, and at 8 p.m. on Tuesdays, Fridays, and Sundays.

The Second District primary election takes place February 26, with the special election for the seat to follow on April 9.

In presenting the forum, GSU partnered with League of Women Voters chapters in Homewood-Flossmoor, Dolton-Harvey-Riverdale, and the Park Forest area, and Mikva Challenge, a nonpartisan 501(c)3 organization that prioritizes the development of civic leadership in underserved Chicago high school youth. A number of students from Mikva Challenge attended the forum.

Nomination Deadline Nears for Honorary Doctoral Candidates

Nominations for candidates for an Honorary Doctoral Degree at Governors State University are to be submitted by Thursday, February 14.

Provost Terry Allison, chairperson of the GSU Honorary Degree Committee, invited members of the university community to submit nominations for inclusion on the roster of honorary doctoral degree candidate.

To nominate a candidate, forward a name with an accompanying recommendation statement and justification for the nomination to <u>Dr. Allison</u> or <u>Myisha</u> <u>Meeks</u>. A brief biographical statement should be included.

"We ask that you consider how the individual you nominate either has reflected the mission and values of GSU in his or her work, or how their connection to GSU might further the mission and values of the university," Dr. Allison said.

Complying with State's ANCRA Law

Gail M. Bradshaw, Associate Vice President of Human Resources and Diversity, has directed that all employees, including all full and part-time, extra-help, temporary, graduate assistants and student workers, receive notification about the new Illinois Abused and Neglected Child Reporting Act (ANCRA). To verify notification has been made, employees will receive an e-mail from HR shortly, containing information and instructions about this law, with a link to the DCFS <u>Acknowledgement Form</u>, which each employee must complete, print off, sign, and date.

Please keep a copy for your records, and send the original DCFS form to the GSU Human Resources Department by March 1. You can drop it in the night mailbox next to the HR Department entry door, or place it in the university mail addressed to the HR Department, or place it in the U.S. Mail addressed to: Governors State University, Attn: Human Resources Department, 1 University Parkway, University Park, IL 60484.
