Abbott,” describing the settlement of No Man’s Land (Oklahoma Territory), cowboys at the XIT Ranch in Texas, the Goodnight Pasture, and the Hi Koller Ranch. Also included is a list of ghost towns and defunct post offices from the early settlement of Beaver County, Oklahoma.

**Papers, 1924**  
**1 item**  
College dean. A manuscript (1924) of “Economics of Business Cycles,” written by Adams and published in 1925. Adams was the first dean of the University of Oklahoma College of Business.

Professor. A commonplace book (1654) by James Gough with typescript; inventories (1870–1918) of the rare book collections of Henry Stevens of Barnet, Vermont, and Joseph Quincy Adams; personal correspondence (1882–1911) of E. J. Doggett, of Bristol, England, regarding rare book collecting; and an inventory (n.d.) of rare books at the University of Oklahoma Libraries.
- Adams, Ramon Frederick (1889–1976)** **5**  
**Papers, 1942–1958**

Writer. Manuscripts of three of Adams’s books, “A Genius in Chaps,” “Cowboy Lingo,” and “Come an’ Get It,” along with his correspondence (1942–1958) with other writers, collectors of western lore, fans, and publishers. [This collection has a restriction. See [finding aid](#) for details.]

Collector. Framed allotment and homestead patents (1903–1905) for the Rabon family of the Choctaw Nation. Individuals named on the certificates include Hazel, Rufus, and Ethel M. Rabon.

Superintendent. Minutes (1921–1935); statistical reports (1934–1949); and correspondence (1931–1942) of the El Reno Sanitarium, a general proprietary hospital, the first in Oklahoma to train and graduate a class from its school for nurses.

Collector. An invoice from a St. Louis, Missouri, wholesale firm to a general store in Walters, Oklahoma, for the purchase of buggy whips and lamp burners.

Subject collection. Advertising cards (1884–1918) from businesses in Arkansas, Illinois, Indian Territory, Missouri, New York, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, and Texas.

**Advertising of the West Collection** 10  
**Printed materials, 1874–2003**

**2 feet**

Subject collection. Promotional brochures, flyers, handbills, maps, and original illustrations advertising geographic locations in the American West, as well as using the image of the West to sell other goods and services. The materials advertise tourist destinations such as rodeos, ranches, and the Grand Canyon; promotional brochures for western cities and towns such as Deming, New Mexico, and Lander, Wyoming; illustrated mining company stock certificates; and illustrations by Ken Laager for the covers of various western novels.

Hospital for women and handicapped children. Admittance records and ledgers (1917–1948) of the Albert Pike Hospital, McAlester General Hospital, and All Saints Hospital, all in McAlester, Oklahoma. Also included in the collection is a certificate of incorporation (1928) granted by the state of Oklahoma to the Albert Pike Hospital. [This collection has a restriction. Collector. Genealogical material (1950–1952) concerning the Alexander, Sellers, Chisum, and Bourland families; notes (circa 1952) on the early histories of Paris, Texas, and Bennington, Oklahoma; and printed material (1950–1951) on organized labor in Oklahoma.

**Allen, Clarence (1897–1989) 14**

**Papers, 1952–1968**

**5 items**

Cartoonist. An autographed print of a painting of Will Rogers by Clarence Allen, newspaper clippings regarding Allen, several cartoons by Allen from the *Tulsa Tribune*, and a social club event program that spoofs Oklahoma politics and politicians of 1968.

**Ledgers, 1911–1912**

Hosteler. Two registers (1911–1912) from the Hotel Dewey in Dewey, Oklahoma.

**Allen, Susie Keefer (1876–1958) 16**

Collector. An obituary (circa 1925) of Lewis Keefer; a discharge certificate (1911); pension certificates (1914–1926) for Keefer and his widow, Ann; a statement (circa 1940) by former state senator Walter Bruce Allen concerning conditions at the Granite (Oklahoma) Penitentiary; and copies of two letters (1940) from Allen concerning the death of former state senator Ralph Busey.

**Alley, Charles (1832–1910) 17**

**Diary, 1861–1865**

Soldier. A typescript of a diary (1861–1863, 1865) kept by Lt. Charles Alley, Company “C,” Fifth Iowa Cavalry, with an appendix containing the regiment’s organization and strength. [This collection has a restriction. See [finding aid](#) for details.]

University professor. A letter (1912) to Alley from Victor M. Locke, Jr., principal chief of the Choctaws, listing present and former principal chiefs of the Five Civilized Tribes, and discussing the status of the Choctaw government; a four-page manuscript (n.d.) entitled “For the First Time: The True Story of the Last Oklahoma Indian Uprising as Told by the Man Who Put It Down,” as related to Alley by Col. Roy V. Hoffman of the Oklahoma National Guard; Hoffman’s official reports (1909) concerning the Crazy Snake Rebellion, along with Governor Charles N. Haskell’s orders (1909); correspondence (1926–1942) concerning Kingfisher College; documents (n.d.) about the Dalton family; and miscellaneous research notes and professional correspondence (1920–1942) accumulated by Alley as a professor of government.

Oil field worker. Personal correspondence (1945–1950); war ration books, bills, and receipts (1944–1948); Catholic church programs (1951); road maps and travel guides; farmers’ handbooks (1947–1951); and telephone directories (1928–1950) from Oklahoma and Texas towns.

Professional chemistry fraternity. Records of the Alpha Chi Sigma fraternity, including reports (1921–1966), minutes (1922–1956), correspondence (1946–1969), subject files (1904–1968), membership records (1931–1968), financial records (1917–1967), newsletters entitled, “Proceedings of the Grand Chapter of Alpha Chi Sigma,” (1930–1968), “The Chrome and the Blue,” (1941–1944), and other publications of the organization, along with a scrapbook.

Professional organization for pre-medical students. Correspondence (1938) of the officers of the University of Oklahoma Kappa Chapter of Alpha Epsilon Delta; biographical data forms (1936–1946) for each member of the organization; petitions (1947–1948) from local collegiate chapters nationwide requesting admittance to the national organization; publications (1932–1951), including *The Scalpel*, published by the national organization; and brochures (1946), with form letters enclosed, explaining the Graduate Record Examination, a scholastic aptitude test for graduate students.

Women’s organization. Scrapbooks and miscellaneous papers (1960–2000) of the Altrusa Club of Norman, Oklahoma.

Soldier. An 18-page manuscript diary (1918) by PFC Orvel Alumbaugh of Battery A, 344th Field Artillery, regarding his experiences in World War I. Alumbaugh was from Whiteoak, Oklahoma. Also included are his dog tags, his belt, a manuscript pass, a group of four medals and insignia, and a printed pamphlet of Battery A Roster.

Professional organization. Minutes (1920–1990) and correspondence (1934–1998), along with other records (1923–2001) including membership lists, reports, newspaper articles, bulletins, yearbooks, histories, bylaws, and related materials from the state of Oklahoma chapter and the University of Oklahoma chapter of the American Association of University Women.
- American Firearms Manufacturers Collection** **25**  
**Printed materials, circa 1865–1936**

Subject collection. Illustrated postal envelopes (covers) and related materials advertising the goods and services of American firearms manufacturers and sellers. The companies and products represented in this collection include Winchester, Savage Arms, Remington, Hazard Powders, DuPont Powders, J. Stevens

Arms Company, U.S. Ammunition, Ithaca Gun Company, Birmingham Small Arms Company, and many others.

Subject file. Publications (1939–1975) of the Bureau of Indian Affairs and other state and federal government agencies, along with reprints of articles regarding the American Indian. Included in the collection is a report (1970) entitled “President Nixon’s Indian Legislative Program.”

Indian advocacy organization. Minutes (1958–1960) of annual conferences; correspondence (1956–1974); and newsletters and other publications (1956–2006), all concerning American Indian education, civil rights, tribal council proceedings, Indian youth programs, and child development.

Veterans organization. Awards, bulletins, and committee reports (1946–1950); correspondence (1946–1950); financial records (1946–1950); minutes of meetings (1944–1950); membership applications (1946–1949); and scrapbooks (n.d.) of the University of Oklahoma’s American Legion Thomas C. Reynolds Post 303.

**American Red Cross of Beckham County Collection** **30**

Local Red Cross chapter. Correspondence (1916–1921); minutes (1917–1921); financial records (1917–1921); and a history of the Beckham County (Oklahoma) chapter formed during World War I.

Local Red Cross chapter. A scrapbook history of the Cleveland County (Oklahoma) chapter formed during World War I.

Judge. Promotional literature and a speech (1902–1903) by Ames on Oklahoma statehood; pamphlets (1915–1918) regarding American involvement in World War I; reports (1914) of earnings and expenses of the Oklahoma City *Times* Company; and correspondence (1907–1919) regarding Oklahoma and Oklahoma City politics.

Physician. Office records (1901–1934), including ledgers, bills, patient case histories, correspondence, and insurance papers, documenting Ames’s practice of medicine in Alva, Oklahoma.

Physician. A journal (1889) titled, “The Medical News Visiting List,” with entries by Dr. W. N. Ames. The journal includes entries about patients he visited, the fees charged, and comments on patients’ diseases or the medical procedures he performed on them.

Professor. Grade books (1929–1937) from Amos’s courses in government and an unpublished manuscript (1928) by Amos entitled “The Yazoo Land Frauds.”

**Papers, 1980–2003**  
**8 feet**  
Professor. Correspondence (1980–2003) of University of Oklahoma history professor Gary Anderson, and his research notes for his books *Kinsmen of Another Kind: Dakota-White Relations in the Upper Mississippi River Valley* (1984, a finalist for the Pulitzer Prize) and *The Indian Southwest, 1580-1830: Ethnogenesis and Reinvention* (1999). The collection also includes court records and research by Anderson for two trials in which he served as an expert witness: *Keweenaw Bay Indian Community v. Michigan* and *Quapaw Tribe v. Blue Tee Corporation*.

Physician. Lecture notes (1893) taken by Anderson while a medical student.

Collector. A reprint of the *Ulster County Gazette* (January 4, 1800) of Kingston, New York.
- Andrews, Leila Edna (1876–1954)** **40**  
**Papers, 1894–1954**  
**.10 feet**



Physician. Certificates from Northwestern University (1894, 1899) and the American Medical Association (1907); an application for membership in the D.A.R. (1903); and newspaper clippings regarding Dr. Leila Edna Andrews, who was the first woman elected to the American College of Physicians.

**Andrus, Selden Eugene (1858–1941) 41**

Businessman. Business and personal correspondence (1886–1908); fraternal organization correspondence (1902–1908); and legal documents (1901–1908) relating to Andrus's mining and petroleum interests in Oklahoma and his memberships in fraternal organizations.

**Angell, Warren M. (1907–2006) 42**

**Printed materials, n.d.**

**1 item**

Professor. One copy of the *Choir Clinic Manual* written by Dr. Angell, who was appointed dean of the College of Fine Arts at Oklahoma Baptist University in 1936. This book is one of a series of books in the church music curriculum developed by the Department of Church Music of the Baptist Sunday School Board. It is a teaching manual in a loose-leaf binder, presenting a credit course for vocalists. It also contains seating arrangements for choruses and broadcasting plans.

**Anthony, Travis Dan (1914–1993) 43**

Teacher. Correspondence (1926, 1974–1989); newspaper articles (1982–1989); manuscripts (n.d.); and publications (1935–1987) either by or about Travis D. Anthony, and relating to Anthony's family, his life in rural Oklahoma, and his student experiences at the University of Oklahoma in the 1930s.

American Indian chief. A typescript of an article from *Sturm's Oklahoma Magazine* (1906) regarding the life of Apushmataha.

City clerk. A list of mayors of Claremore, Oklahoma, from 1900 to 1949, including the index numbers to city record books where their records can be found.

Service organization. Meeting minutes, accounts ledger, officer and membership lists, financial reports, and correspondence (1927–1930) of the Atoka, Oklahoma, Lions Club.

**71.33 feet**  
Lawyer. Case and client files (1920–1943) from Austin’s law firm in Altus, Oklahoma, in which Robert B. Harbison and David Ross Rutherford were associate members. [This collection has a restriction. See [finding aid](#) for details.]

Historian. Reprints (1952–1953) from the *Indiana Magazine of History*, and a paper read at a historical society convention, all written by Ayer, concerning the medical career of Joseph Rodes Buchanan.

Typescripts and notes (1926–1957) regarding Baptist missionaries to the Indians; a history (1960) of schools in Kiowa County, Oklahoma; publications (1953–1957) of the Bureau of Indian Affairs concerning American Indians and Indian education; a booklet (n.d.) on Sequoyah and the Cherokee syllabary; notes and correspondence (1926) concerning Joseph Samuel Murrow and Bacone College; a leaflet (1958) describing El Meta Bond College; and correspondence (1960) concerning Oklahoma post offices.

**Bambas, Frieda Derdeyn (1905–2005), and** **65**  
**Rudolph C. Bambas (1915–1996)**

**Papers, 1922–2003**

**3 feet**

Professors. Correspondence (1942–1995) of French professor Frieda Derdeyn Bambas and English professor Rudolph C. Bambas primarily regarding their lives during World War II, including Rudolph's military training at Fort Bragg, North Carolina, and Fort Sill, Oklahoma, and his wartime service in India; and Frieda's early career as a French teacher at Oklahoma College for Women and Ward Belmont College in Tennessee. The collection also includes Frieda's scrapbooks (1922–1923) and diaries (1934–1952), as well as a manuscript, poetry, and dissertations written by the couple, who later held teaching positions at the University of Oklahoma and the University of Central Oklahoma.

**Bandy, (Mrs.) David H.** **66**

Collector. Artifacts collected by relatives of Okmulgee, Oklahoma, resident Mrs. David H. Bandy, during their travels and military service. Items include an opium box and a small clock obtained from Tien-Tsin, China, during the Boxer rebellion, which were given to Mrs. Bandy's brother, Harry M. Lunsett, during his service in the U.S. Army during the Spanish-American War; and Canadian and Mexican coins collected by her husband, David H. Bandy.
