HAMILTON SOUTHEASTERN HIGH SCHOOL: PATHWAYS PERIOD FOR GRADES 11 AND 12

Pathways Period is a multipurpose class period aligned to state graduation requirements (known as Graduation Pathways). Pathways Period activities and their alignment to required Graduation Pathways components are outlined below and described in more detail in this document.

Organization

Pathways Period is scheduled for all students during Period 5, each Royal Day. Each student will be assigned to a Pathways Period homeroom (or default teacher) based on grade level. This is the classroom to which the student will report when they are seeking independent study time and/or have no other activities scheduled.

We will be using an online flexible scheduling tool called <u>Enriching Students</u> to manage activities and attendance. Through this software, teachers will be able to invite students to their classroom, and students will be able to self-select activities/locations, as well.

Juniors and Seniors in good standing will have the option to have release time during Pathways Period on any Blue Day when there is not an attendance requirement (described below). Students will be required to have documentation before

Targeted Instruction

One of the primary purposes of Pathways Period is for students to receive targeted instruction and intervention. Targeted instruction is the intentional effort by teachers and staff to support students in achieving academic expectations and meeting state standards. This time is a supplement to classroom instruction, specifically designed to serve students who need additional instruction or enhancement to the

curriculum. As teachers monitor students' learning, they will identify areas of need for individual students and then assign students to one-on-one or small group skill-based help sessions aligned with those needs. Additionally, students may also recognize their own areas of need and self-select help sessions through the Enriching Students app (and communication with their teacher).

Academic Enrichment

Pathways Period will also present an opportunity for teachers and students to pursue curriculum and learning experiences beyond what is available in the regular classroom. Teachers will be able to host one-day or series of seminars/workshops on specific topics or skills. Enrichment could include a greater depth of study of content in existing curriculum, exploration of content beyond existing curriculum (ex. optional AP subject matter), and facilitation of student-suggested sessions. The Enriching Students software will allow students to sign up for sessions based on their interests.

Employability Skills Instruction

It is the mission of Hamilton Southeastern High School to equip students with skills needed for life after high school, and Senate Enrolled Act 297 requires that schools include employability skills standards in instruction. These standards were established by the Indiana Department of Education, in conjunction with the Department of Workforce Development, and approved by the State Board of Education. To achieve our mission of preparing students for college and careers and to fulfil the expectations of SEA 297, students will receive Employability Skills Instruction during select Pathways Period in several lessons over the course of the school year, each year they are in high school, so that by the end of their high school career, all skills will have been covered. Curriculum for these lessons was developed based on the Employability Skills Standards linked above and will be delivered by certified staff. Lessons will last about thirty minutes, after which students will be able to use the remainder of their Pathways Period for other activities. Employability Skills Curriculum is outlined below.
