Hap Palmer's Most Requested Songs from A to Z

The songs in this book are designed for preschool, primary, and early elementary grade learners. They were selected based primarily on requests from teachers and parents. We also considered rankings on iTunes, view counts from our YouTube channel, streaming statistics from music services such as Spotify and sales on the Songs for Teaching website. In addition, the collection also includes favorites from family and friends, and some of my personal choices. If your favorite is not here, see below for a special offer.

Each song is arranged in lead sheet format. This is a form of musical notation that specifies the essential elements of a song: the melody, lyrics, and harmony. The melody is written in music notation, the lyric is written as text below the staff, and the harmony is specified with chord symbols above the staff.

You don't need to play an instrument to enjoy this book. You can sing without accompaniment, or sing along with the recordings. Also, each song is followed by a section with suggested activities – valuable for encouraging active participation.

Among the list of songs, you may recognize titles of some familiar favorites such as "*Itsy Bitsy Spider*" and "*Hickory, Dickory, Dock*". These songs combine the traditional melody and words with additional original music and verses to extend both vocabulary and movement possibilities.

There are several songs where we include both the original and an updated or revised version. For example, the song "Colors" is followed by the revised version "Colors In Motion" that adds more colors and extends the response time. "What Are You Wearing?" is followed by an updated version that names additional articles of clothing more currently worn by children.

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Helpful Hints

Often, songs incorporate instrumental interludes for children to respond actively. These instrumental sections are suggestions. Feel free to create your own melodies or to play chords with rhythms that express the appropriate feeling or energy. You can also add beats or measures when children need more time to complete actions.



You can simplify chords for easier playing. For example D9 can become D7 and D suspended 4th can be played as D. Most songs are shown in the key of the recorded version, but transposing the key of a song is another way to simplify chords. For example a song in E can be played down a step in D or up a half step in the key of F.



When songs have a swing or dotted eighth feel, it is noted in the the style or description phrase at the beginning of the music with words like "shuffle" or "swing". It might say something like Medium-Tempo Shuffle, Fast Rock Shuffle, or Up-Tempo Swing.



Occasionally the music may not exactly match the original recording. As time passes we sometimes find better ways to say things or make changes to improve melody and chord progressions.

Songbook Organization

The songs in this book appear in alphabetical order. You can view the song order in the table of contents at the beginning of the book. In alphabetizing the songs we go by the APA style manual and disregard the first words a, and the. For example, the song *The Elephant* will be alphabetized under the letter E. At the end of the book songs are listed by category such as Holidays, Math, Phonics, and Rhythms.

Activity:

Place the numerals 3, 6, 9 and 4, 8, 12 on the board in triangles. Point to each number as it is named in the song.

Variation:

Make three number cards. One card says 3, one says 6, and one says 9. On the reverse side of the cards write 4, 8, and 12. Place the number cards 3, 6, and 9 out on the floor in a triangle. Start at the number 3 and run to each card as it is named in the song. When you hear "Go the other way," start at the number 6 and move in the opposite direction to each number card. Halfway through the song, flip the number cards over to 4, 8, and 12 and repeat the activity with the 4, 8, 12 fact family.

Follow Up:

Sing this song using other combinations such as the 3, 5, 8 family.
