


Journey

TEN YEARS AFTER BEING DIAGNOSED WITH CANCER, TOMMIE DECANO IS STILL ALIVE AND KICKING AND SERVING THE LORD.



"You're going on a fast for fifteen days.

A fast? I can't say "yes" or "no" to her. If I say "yes,"
I will be miserable. But if I say "no," what's going to
happen to my health? I finally replied, "We'll have to
work it out one day at a time."

I've learned that God is so good. He gave me the strength to live. I was diagnosed with prostate cancer more than ten years ago. In 1995, I had my first surgery. Since I'd had no trouble since then, I thought that the cancer was gone, but in October 2004 I felt severe pain in my ribs. I went to many physicians--from my family doctor to another doctor, to a urologist, and finally to an oncologist who told me I was in the last stage of cancer.

Amazingly, it didn't bother me. I knew I just had to pray harder and do what the Lord wanted me to do. My phone became extremely busy because of calls coming from friends and family who wanted to see how I was doing. "How are you feeling? Are you losing weight?"

I had four chemotherapy treatments, but my prostate specific antigen level (PSA) was still going up. Then I received thirteen radiation treatments and my PSA went down a little. However, I was still in pain.

My church pastor had urged me many times to go to the HLC, and I finally went last September (2005). The words of the urologist were clearly imprinted in my memory: "Avoid fried food, dairy products and cheese." To my surprise, the staff at the HLC taught me the same thing, plus the eight laws of health: the proper use of nutrition, exercise, water, sunshine, temperance, air, rest, and trust in God.

What a wonderful journey it was to be at the HLC! The cheerfulness and positive attitude of the staff and students brought encouragement to my heart. They didn't hesitate to stop and pray with me at any time during the day. After a few days, my weight dropped from 188 pounds to 174 pounds. I got more than enough sleep, and I felt very relaxed. I still have cancer, but I don't have any pain. The doctors are very happy that I'm still alive. So am I!

I thank God for HLC and its staff. Most of the time when people find out they have cancer, depression and stress creep into their lives. That was not true for me, though. With God's help through the lifestyle center, I learned how to deal with stress. Psalm 118:8 says, "It is better to trust in the Lord than to put confidence in man." After more than ten years, here I am—alive and kicking, and serving the Lord by teaching others the principles I learned at Hartland. Praise the Lord!

I had been wanting to be baptized for a long time," said Daniel Salazar, "but I never felt like I was ready. I had too many things to make straight." While fighting depression, he prayed for help—and a peace came over him unlike anything he had ever experienced. Then his homework included a chapter in *The Desire of Ages*, which coincided with Dr. Tim's talks. "I realized Jesus wanted me to come to Him. He wanted to be my Friend. It convicted me that I needed to give my life to God as soon as possible."

Although Hartland College encourages baptism prior to enrollment, students' conversions often come later. During Dr. Tim Riesenberger's Week of Prayer, several made decisions for baptism. Dr. Tim, an emergency room physician who regards each patient as his brother or sister, focused on Christ's life as a youth, since "many of the students"

are young and in the midst of temptation," he said. "Some come from very hard family backgrounds. Christ went through the same hardships in His own home."

Jordan Henry-Fontaine, a twelveyear-old son of a volunteer, said, "I'd considered baptism twice before, but lost the conviction. Then, after hearing about God's love, along with student testimonies about what He's done in their lives, I got it back again. I figured if God could do amazing things for them, He could do the same for me."

"Every single talk was meant for me," Paige Stimpel said, "God basically rebuked me when He sent Dr. Tim. I'd been impressed to study the life of Christ, but I kept putting it off. And I'd let others discourage me about where I thought God was leading me. This week of prayer has not been like any other. The Holy Spirit worked on each part of my life by showing me His love and mercy. I know God sent Dr. Tim here for me."

Shigenori Matsueda had also been considering baptism, but when he read the baptismal vows, he realized he needed to make things right before he could be baptized. "I wasn't sure how to go about it, but Dr. Tim showed me a way to resolve my problem in order to prepare for baptism."

Mark Gulyaev had been baptized, but knew he wasn't converted. "I had been praying the night before about baptism, and the next day Dr. Tim made an appeal. I believe God spoke to me through him."

Dr. Tim stayed an extra week to follow up with decisions for baptism, re-baptism, and rededication. God moved very definitely during this week of prayer. Hartland College needed a revival. The harvest is ready.

HMR: What is EGN?

Richard: EGN stands for the Everlasting Gospel Network. It uses streaming video technology to broadcast the good news of the Gospel over the internet. Our website is: www.egntv.com.

HMR: Why use the internet?

Kevin: We see EGN as a means of reaching people worldwide through technology that is more accessible and more cost-effective than television or satellite broadcast. With the internet we have the ability to reach anybody that has access to the internet anywhere in the world at any time. Also, the number of viewers doesn't increase our costs, so we can focus on the production of programs that are going to meet people's needs.

HMR: What will we see on EGN?

Chris: All of the videos we have produced over the years are being converted into digital masters so that they will be available to EGN viewers. Some will be included in the scheduled programming. Others will be viewable on demand in our online library. All will be available for pur

chase as a download, DVD, CD, oraudio tape. We are also considering offering a subscription service for our regular items such as convocations or morning chapel services. Our goal is to have the entire library completed by March of 2007. That's about a thousand hours of footage.

HMR: How about new programs?

Richard: We will continue to produce and improve the production of convocations and camp meetings. Beyond that, we have started recording our morning chapel service. Many former students have told me that morning chapel is what they miss most about leaving Hartland. Now everyone will be able to worship with us morning by morning. All these programs are already in progress; we just have to record them. We believe that God wants us to take the next big step of creating new programs recorded in a studio setting. We plan to begin with a makeshift studio until God provides the funds to build a dedicated studio. Our goal is to start recording our first program of this type by the end of March.







HMR: How will students be involved with EGN?

Viviana: Students in the Christian Media Management major will gain practical experience by helping to produce programs for EGN. They will gain needed skills to manage a videostreaming network, such as audio production, videography, video editing, directing of live and taped programs, multiple camera shooting, lighting, and program coordination. January marked the opening of the new media lab where students are using state-of-the-art computers.

HMR: What is the potential of EGN?

Richard: We believe God is opening a door of opportunity for us that has the potential to reach vast numbers of people, including places where it is impossible for a missionary to evangelize. It is estimated that half the world's population will have internet access in the next ten years. To bring EGN to its full potential will require great effort and resources, but God has already shown Himself faithful in this regard. My prayer is that we will have the faith, courage, as well as new staff, to move quickly to maximize this opportunity

helping them to make the right choices. I want them to be ready when Jesus comes."





I can't wait to be a part of camp again this year, because I want to help others know God as I have learned to know Him.





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
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
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PRISON MIRACLES

THE THREE ANGELS' CHORALE TOUCHES THE HEARTS OF YOUNG INMATES

The highlight of the Chorales' December California trip came when three juvenile prisons opened for a concert on the life of Christ. The warden's words at one prison aroused concern: "These guys may look like your brothers or best friends, but they're dangerous criminals convicted of murder, rape—everything in the book. Each of you will wear a personal alarm because when we get hundreds of them in one room, we never know what might happen. If they get restless, watch for a signal to leave."

At the first prison, the dedicated chaplains made their position clear: "If you're here to promote yourselves or entertain us, please go home. We're here to reach these young people for Jesus. This might be their only chance. We know they need Jesus, and you need to give them Jesus tonight. And we know God must have sent you because we were told only yesterday that you were coming, and it usually takes a month to clear a musical group."

"The choir believed God allowed us to go there," said Sung Hoon, one of the choir members, "because somebody there was searching for God and was going to be changed. We prayed that God would touch whoever that might be."



The choir members prayed constantly for the Holy Spirit's presence, for safety, and especially for the inmates. The prisoners may not have known their deep need of Jesus, but the songs and the short sermons revealed His love for them. Seth Lucas' piano solos were especially well received by the young men, many of whom lack positive adult male role models. By God's grace, almost 200 young men in each prison listened carefully to everything said, sung or played, and responded enthusiastically!

Afterward, male choir members mingled with the inmates. One young man said he'd found the Lord just the week before, and praised God for the encouragement He sent through the choir. "That one person made it all worthwhile!" said Daniel, another choir member.

Another inmate said, "You guys have no idea what you have done for us tonight. If my friends were listening like I was, then they would realize it was the Holy Spirit working in this place." He must have been one of the prisoners God had in mind when He cleared the way for the prison visit.

After one concert a chaplain reminded the choir, "The effect on the young men was not your doing. It was God's Spirit working through you." Strangely, these concerts happened because of a very disappointing cancellation. "God knew who really needed to hear us. We just needed to trust Him," said Seth Lucas, assistant chorale director. "In the end, we were just as blessed as the prisoners." (1)



The destruction of the ancient city of Pompeii has tremendous lessons. Built near the southern foot of Mt. Vesuvious and the Bay of Naples, Pompeii was surrounded by fertile farmlands. It had fresh water from the river Sarnus, trees and other resources from the mountain, abundant fishing in the bay, and a harbor for commercial industries and trade. Pompeii had become wealthy by exploiting its natural resources.

The city had smooth, stone-paved streets; an amphitheater for gladiatorial sports; theaters for entertainment; shops; gardens; and vineyards. There were fountains, aqueducts, public baths, and pools. Temples to pagan gods were numerous. Some homes covered an entire city block and were richly decorated with frescos, statuary, fountains, pools, and large colonnades. The city was surrounded by massive walls.

Pompeii was known for its promiscuous lifestyle revolving around its brothels, nightlife, and entertainment. Immorality was glorified, and homosexuality was rife. Pompeii drew tourists from all over the world, much like New Orleans, Las Vegas, and other cities given over to extreme pleasure. Someone once wrote an inscription on a wall in the city, "Sodom and Gomorrah."

Warning signs were everywhere that August. Streams and wells suddenly dried up, but the farmers thought it was just the summer heat. Strangely, many dogs, cats, and other beasts began leaving the city. The Bay of Naples began to boil in places from hot lava. As enormous underground pressures were building a few miles away, earth tremors became frequent and intense. Still, the

people remained unconcerned.

Ironically, on the festival day honoring Vulcan, the god of fire, the mountain exploded, sending fire and ash twelve miles into the air. A blanket of superheated ash covered the city in minutes. People panicked. Some locked themselves in their homes and waited. By midnight roofs began to collapse under the weight of accumulated ash.

Others fled this way and that. The choking, sulfurous ash suffocated many trying to escape. Their bodies lay where they had fallen in the streets. Soon hot lava avalanches engulfed the city, burying it under eighteen feet of pumice. The final positions of the dying residents were preserved for centuries by the volcano's mineral debris.

We also live in luxury and convenience. We surround ourselves with physical comforts and pleasures. We revel in non-stop entertainment which glorifies the lifestyle ancient Pompeii possessed. Even many Christians have become "lovers of pleasure more than lovers of God." 2 Timothy 3:4. Yet Jesus said, "Then shall be great tribulation, such as was not since the beginning of the world to this time..." Matthew 24:21.

Are the natural disasters such as the tsunami, the New Orleans flood, and recent earthquakes a warning to us? Why are many Seventh-day Adventists so unconcerned about the signs of the times? Will we be engulfed by an overwhelming surprise like the people of Pompeii? Let us take heed and turn from our wanton extravagance, our passion for fashion, and our addiction to sports and entertainment. "For the Son of man cometh at an hour when ye think not." Luke 12:40. [1]

What Will It

CHRISTIANS IN MANY COUNTRIES RISK EVERYTHING FOR THE GOSPEL. WHAT WILL IT TAKE FOR US?

Then four Indonesian teenage girls were attacked last October near their homes in Poso, Central Sulawesi, three of them were beheaded. They had been on their way to school when six men wielding machetes and dressed in ninja-style tunics stormed out of the bush and assaulted them. The girls' heads were dropped off at a police station and a Pentecostal church.

Violence against Christians is increasing in Indonesia. According to *Voice of the Martyrs* (November 2005), in Central Sulawesi in 2001 and 2002 alone, 1,500 Christians were killed. In the neighboring islands of Maluku, 9,000 people have died since 1999 when fighting broke out. A peace accord in 2002 quelled the violence dramatically, but "mysterious assailants"

began attacking Christians. These terrorists effectively continue fighting Christians, who make up about half of the people living in that area.

What is happening in Indonesia is not uncommon, especially in strongly Muslim countries. The effect is that Christians in these countries are strongly committed. They risk everything. They have to be that way. After all, their lives are at stake just for being believers in Christ. This state of affairs exists despite the Koran's mentioning "Christ" four times more than "Mohammed" --- despite the Koran's recommending the reading of the Bible.

Of course, not all Muslims behead Christians. The fact remains that it takes something special to be a Christian in a country that persecutes, rapes,



murders, and otherwise oppresses Christians. In other cases, official regulations of varying severity limit Christian activities in many places. Even when a nation has a freedom of religion "policy," repressive laws against Christian activity can open the door for radicals to take matters into their own hands without fear of government prosecution.

Bravery, courage, faith, and stamina are all developed by those engaged in God's work in places of persecution. It's dangerous. This world is becoming less tolerant of the truth, not more tolerant, in spite of much talk of tolerance. This was predicted by Jesus Himself and by many prophets. Yet most of us are unready for the hard realities of oppression and persecution. We

are nearing a time of persecution for those who believe the truth in the western world, too. It may seem impossible for similar persecutions to develop in the U.S.A. or other western nations, but just when we think there is peace and safety, sudden destruction comes.

What sacrifices are you willing to make for the truth? What will it take for you to be ready to leave all and follow Jesus down that painful path of suffering for Christ's sake? What will it take for our families, our schools, our churches to be purified and ready for the coming crisis? My friends, we must pray that the Holy Spirit will take over our lives, that we will live by every word that proceeds out of the mouth of God, and then do what we must do to receive that promised Spirit, by God's grace. That's what it will take. ①

After five years as dean of the college at Weimar Institute in California (1978-1983), I was called by the Lord to be the foundational president of Hartland Institute. I quickly discovered that self-supporting ministries need friends whom the Holy Spirit would convict to financially help them. Since then, God has blessed us with men and women who have so generously and sacrificially helped sustain and advance the ministry of Hartland. This could never have happened without the blessing of the Lord and faithful gifts from our friends. In turn, we have done everything we can to feed God's people with truth and to share the gospel worldwide.

From the original two divisions, He has added not only Hartland Publications, one of the premier self-supporting, truth-presenting publishing houses in the world, but also a rapidly developing media center which is now expanding into video streaming on the web. Such streaming has the potential to reach hundreds of millions of people.

In addition, the Last Generation magazine targets the secular mind and has led many to Christ and to the Seventh-day Adventist faith. We organize and host convocations, an annual camp meeting, summer youth camps, and various

training seminars which provide opportunities for supporters and students to get involved. In 1984 Hartland rejuvenated the summer youth colporteur



program which has trained workers for God who are now on various continents.

We seek to encourage and support those who have their own ministries. We have had students from forty-nine different countries and have ministered in well over 100 countries. This fall, we accepted our one-thousandth student to Hartland College. What a mighty force our alumni are in finishing the gospel commission!

From such small beginnings, God has blessed us through your support, and we are grateful for it. Our vision was relatively small when we began. But God, as He has tested the loyalty of Hartland to His precious end-time message, has inspired us to continue to expand and develop.
