#### Dear Friends in Christ,

I have been hearing collective sighs of disbelief that it And that is what the kin-dom of God is like – sharing is already (almost) summer. We are also collectively our faith with one another in small and unexpected ways resuming many summer activities with the hope of as we live together as the body of Christ. putting the pandemic truly behind us. This is good and right, and yet there have been many lessons learned in the last 15 months, as well as simply a new appreciation for what it means to be in community and spend time with one another.

I would love to hear what new perspectives you have gained as you move forward into this summer of 2021. Or perhaps you are still exhausted from either literal Covid symptoms lingering, or from the accumulated stress of the last several months. I hear both the joy and lament, and join you in taking both to God this summer and beyond.

This summer we resume using the RCL (Revised Common Lectionary) for our Sunday Worship scripture readings. This means we resume reading an Old Testament, Psalm, New Testament reading, and a Gospel reading for a typical Sunday. I look forward to returning to both hearing the Psalms read responsively and having longer Gospel readings again. I have included the RCL scripture readings for each Sunday this summer for your reference and study.

I'm also excited to introduce you all to the Manna and Mercy book and Bible Study Curriculum this June along with an invitation for families and leaders at each church to work with one another and with Pastor to dive into scripture and study the entire arc of the story of God and God's people as we receive it in the Bible. The introduction classes (June 9th and 16th) will explore how the author presents the stories, and even how he landed on the title of the book. We'll also look at some of your favorite Bible passages. Be prepared to share!

Jesus' parables invite us to imagine life together in new ways while teaching us and calling us to enter into God's imagination. With the parable of the mustard seed we are invited to see the small seeds of faith and life in faith, when tended to grow to create shelter for future generations. This image is striking me in particular as churches continue to discern their purpose in God's mission in this time and place.

There is always an invitation to Holy Dreaming and intentional planning for vitality in our congregations, and yet we are called to remember the importance of tending our faith in our daily lives. As your pastor I hope to talk to you this summer about how your church community can help you as you live your faith in your daily life. The shelter of God's tree of life is for us on each and every day, and not simply for Sunday worship. What Biblical images help sustain you and your faith? Seriously, give me a call, send a text or email or let me know when you see me - what image of the kingdom of God captures your imagination?

As you plant your seeds of faith, may the blessing of God, who provides for us, feeds us, and journeys with

John Hoppe (Salem) took care of paying an outstanding bill from Weiland Accounting.

New Business: Harvest Ministry's joint worship service will be held at Little Sioux Park on Sunday, July 25, 2021, at 9:30 AM . The shelter house will be rented for \$175.00. Rods and Rides out of Sioux Center will again attend, and we will ask them to sing several songs as well. Janet will check with Salem to see if they would bring homemade ice cream for a Brunch after the service. We will also be celebrating Pastor Tami's 50<sup>th</sup> birthday. Pastor Tami explained the current confirmation program . "Chosen Together" is a Cross + Generations confirmation program centering on life-giving relationships between generations. We also again discussed ideas to increase attendance: Continuing the Lift program at Salem, and using Sunday School donations to purchase chicks, goats, or other livestock for third world countries.

Pastor's Report: Pastor would like to start community coffees again and will let us know when the first is scheduled. She also will be starting a "Discipleship Life Group on June 21. More information to follow. With some COVID restrictions being lifted, Pastor is beginning visits again. She shared that she has continuing education on May 17-21. These classes are online, so she will still be able to participate in River Valley Baccalaureate on the 19<sup>th</sup>. The next meeting of Harvest Ministry will be June 3, 2021 at 6:30 at Salem.

#### Pastor's Report, March/April 2021

- Harvest Ministry: St. John and Salem Congregations (submitted May 16, 2021)

#### **Current Joys & Challenges**

I am joyful to have finished the Confirmation year strong with students generally being able to attend class in person. I am also joyful and thankful that we are moving to the other side of this pandemic and the end is in sight. I give thanks for faithful dedicated council members, mutual ministry team members, and other congregational leaders that have led both congregations through this pandemic while always striving to "love our neighbors" in all things. I recognize that the accommodations we needed to make to work to keep one another safe as a part of loving our neighbors were not always easy or comfortable, and at times were confusing. I invite you to join me in giving thanks for God's ongoing work as the Holy Spirit continues to show up in the midst of change to bring healing and new life!

I also am thankful and joyful that my carpal tunnel surgery, in spite of a few healing bumps along the way has proved successful and slowly full use of my right hand is returning. Thank you all for your prayers and support during this time.

Challenges include the transition back to worshipping, visiting home-bound and other in need members, and resuming group activities in a post-pandemic time. We will continue to stream our worship services so that they are available any time you are unable to join us in person in the sanctuary, and that leaves us with some challenges of how to do both well. Being online and in-person for worship (and other events) is often called being a "hybrid church." To do both well (and there are reasons to do so as the pandemic led more people to hear the gospel proclaimed than ever before due to the aid of technology), we will need to continue to invest in both technology and to train multiple lay people in how to use that technology.

Challenges also include navigating tension and anxiety over church conflict at St. John, including tension over my pastoral leadership and the leadership as set forth in the ELCA. I will continue to work with the St. John and Harvest Ministry councils as well as with Mutual Ministry in order to examine all possibilities for continued ministry. There was a St. John congregational meeting April 25<sup>th</sup> and future meetings will be set by the St. John council. I invite you to keep these challenges in your prayers as with humans many things are not possible, but with God all things are possible.

#### **Looking Forward**

Summer plans include resuming "coffee with pastor" times in both Correctionville and Kingsley, starting discipleship small groups, and beginning a long-term Bible study that will begin with studying Genesis when we first meet and slowly move forward throughout the Bible from there. Watch for dates to be announced soon.

The plans mentioned above is part of a shift in focus toward community building as the body of Christ. I'm shifting some of my time that was spent in worship planning to plan and participate in additional small group activities, both formal and informal. If you have ideas for additional activities or would like to invite me to an activity in your community, please do so. I look forward to hearing from many of you as we work together to proclaim the Gospel and BE good news to each other and those around us.

#### Worship

Both congregations celebrated joyfully with Easter Services on April 4<sup>th</sup> that proclaimed Christ Crucified and risen – Alleluia!!! Throughout Holy Week and Easter our Confirmation Students assisted with worship, and our special services brought meaning to all attending either in person or through our live-stream / recording options.

Throughout the Easter season we continued using the Narrative Lectionary as our Preaching scripture texts while returning to ELW setting 10 for our liturgy. On Holy Trinity Sunday (May 30, 2021) we return to using the Revised Common Lectionary for our scripture readings; however at times we may only read two or three of the assigned readings for the day rather than all of them in order to focus on specific themes. We will continue using ELW setting 10 for our liturgy for the time after Pentecost (this lasts until Advent). At this time, our Worship Committee is selecting all of the hymns; please pass along any hymn requests to them (at St. John, Marcia Schemmel and Elaine Droegmiller; at Salem, Nancy Clausen and Karen Lund).

May is filled with many special worship services with recognizing high school graduates at both churches, Confirmation Sunday at St. John, and our Pentecost Sunday service on May 23<sup>rd</sup>.

#### Confirmation

On May 9, 2021 seven students were confirmed at St. John: Xavian Deeds, Aubree Galvin, Braxton Galvin, Tate Heilman, Julius (Cory) Jepsen, Kayden Volkert, and Keegan Volkert. We look forward to our new students starting classes next fall! Additionally, the Salem students ended the year with selecting a Bible story and relating it to their faith as they prepare to confirm their faith in the fall on Reformation Sunday.

#### General Parish Ed (Sunday School / Wednesday Night Program at Salem)

St. John currently (May) has a First Communion class with five students and their families participating. I will offer First Communion classes at both churches during August prior to Confirmation Classes resuming after Labor Day.

Both congregations are joyfully anticipating and preparing for VBS this year as Ingham-Okoboji Bible Camp counselors will lead VBS at St. John July 5<sup>th</sup> thru the 8<sup>th</sup>, and at Salem July 12<sup>th</sup> thru the 15<sup>th</sup>. I am also hoping to have other fellowship and learning times for families this summer, and anticipate both Joyful Noise at St. John and LIFT at Salem to resume after Labor Day this fall.




## HARVEST MINISTRY NEWS

#### **First Communion Instruction**

Pastor has First Communion instruction scheduled at each church in August. All are welcome to attend these classes, however, registering ahead of time with Pastor is required so that we have enough books for everyone. Kids attending must bring along at least one parent or other mentor.

Classes using the *A Place for You (interactive edition): My Holy Communion Book* consist of two in person classes (ideally) spaced two weeks apart, and lasting from 60 to 90 minutes depending on the size of the class. I assign one homework assignment between the two classes.



All families with children 1<sup>st</sup> Grade or older will receive an invitation to attend these classes with their children, even if their child is already communing or if you plan to have your child wait to begin communing until they are older.

The tentative class schedule at this time is as follows:

St. John Classes → Sunday August 15<sup>th</sup> and August 29<sup>th</sup> at 6 pm Salem Classes → Wednesday August 4<sup>th</sup> and August 18<sup>th</sup> at 6 pm

In most circumstances these Communion classes are required prior to beginning Confirmation classes.



#### **Finding Paradise**

Perseverance is a familiar quality for Mon, who after spending decades living as a refugee from an early age was recently able to place roots in Iowa and succeed in building a life for his family.

After living in a Nepali refugee camp for almost 24 years, Mon's family was able to resettle in the U.S. When they arrived in Iowa, they moved directly into a tiny apartment. But the single room was not sufficient for their family – especially once their youngest daughter was born. They stayed in the apartment for four years, but Mon was determined to create a better home for his family. Mon secured housing for his family through the Habitat for Humanity program, and through LSI Refugee and Immigrant Services, he was able to get on track and save and earn money towards his goal of homeownership. With guidance from staff in LSI's Match and Save financial program, he was able to open a savings account and develop a monthly savings plan.

Mon and his family moved into their new home last year, and he said LSI and Habitat for Humanity were critical steps in helping him learn about U.S. finances and savings – lessons that will pay off during his journey as a homeowner.

"I felt very sad when I left my country," Mon says. "I felt as if I lost my paradise. But when I got the key and when I entered my house, I felt that I regained my lost paradise. So that was the happiest moment in my life and right now, I, my family, and kids are super happy to live in this new house."




