That the audience already knows the wrenching eventual outcome only heightens the emotional tension as the voices of Butterfly and Pinkerton soar together to blissful heights of young love. Small wonder that *Madame Butterfly's* place is secure in the world's top ten most-performed operas!

For the role of Madame Butterfly, Artistic Director Thomas Bankston has cast a newcomer to Dayton Opera in soprano Yunah Lee. Yunah Lee, however, is certainly not a newcomer to Madame Butterfly. This appearance will mark Lee's 31st performance as Puccini's heroine Cio-Cio-San, having performed the lead role with opera companies across the globe. Lee has been described as "...a revelation... Interview with Tom Bankston

SINGING WITH THE STARS

Ever wonder how the gifted and talented singers for Dayton Opera's Artists-in-Residence (AIR) and Dayton Opera productions find their way to Dayton?

Recently I sat down with Tom Bankston, artistic director for Dayton Opera at the Dayton Performing Arts Alliance and asked him to tell our readers how he goes about selecting singers.

As Tom explained, there is a difference in the method he uses for Artists-In-Residence, newly graduated from college/conservatories, and professional singers who are already out there advancing their careers and who have agents. With AIR Tom offers a one year residency starting at the beginning of a calendar year. This means he starts recruiting in early spring of the year before. Dayton Opera posts online through contacts with regional conservatories and the Opera America network throughout the United States. The application requires a head shot and resume.

Bankston reviews hundreds of applications.

What is the Artistic Director looking for?

young artists who have finished

training at a college or conservatory;

- experience in singing various roles at their schools;
- participation in other apprentice programs outside their schools;
- names of professionals with whom they've worked and who Tom might know so he can check their credentials."

In late spring, after getting prospective applications whittled to a manageable number, Tom schedules a long day of auditions in early summer, both in Dayton and in New York City. This can be expensive for the young artist who has to bear the travel costs. However, Dayton Opera provides the venue and the accompanist.

So what are the singers looking for?

- performance opportunities;
- being on the main stage in full opera productions;
- rubbing shoulders with seasoned singers;
- singing for conductors and with a live orchestra;
- working with stage directors.

The AIR program also has an educational component in which the singers go to schools in the Dayton community to present specific age-appropriate programs written by the Education Staff at DPAA. This adds to their experience.

Tom told me that two of his AIR singers for next year are actually coming to Dayton early so they can be in the *Madame Butterfly* production in November. This is a bonus for them.

How are Main Stage Production Singers Chosen?

Main Stage auditions for Dayton Opera productions begin up to two years in advance. Currently Bankston is lining up the 2016-2017 season.

Most of these singers are represented by management company agents although a few are independent. Again, there is a process whereby Tom sends the agents information on selected future performances and main roles for which he wants to audition. The agents suggest singers. Tom culls the applications. Agents also suggest singers who

may not be available for the season but might be considered for future productions. Some singers don't have to audition, especially those who have performed in Dayton before.

Auditions are scheduled for three days in New York City in early December. In this instance, the singers must provide their own accompanists. Tom told me he records all auditions so he can go back and listen to confirm his choices. He says people ask, "Isn't it a blur after several hours? Doesn't it run together?" But, he counters that good auditions "stand out and your ears pick up immediately."

After the auditions are concluded, Tom compiles first, second, and third preference lists. From there it's a matter of negotiating with agents on contracts.

In answer to my question about the attractiveness of Dayton to these singers, Tom states that Dayton has a respectable reputation and singers get a good experience. That word travels. It is especially significant that Dayton Opera has a longstanding track record without lapses in season performances.

Tom told me that the home hospitality and transportation offered through the Opera Guild are greatly appreciated by the singers.

This is Tom's 20th year as Artistic Director for Dayton Opera. I asked him to comment on how the search and selection process has changed and what he has learned over that time period:

- The process hasn't changed that much despite the technology.
- Trust your instincts; his have borne out positively.
- Make sure to hear the singer in per son - there's more than voice - you get a sense of the individual person and other qualities of the artist.
 "This is a very important part of the package."
- Dayton audiences like having singers who are visually credible to the roles they play.

Tom spent ten days in Santa Fe this

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President's Message, continued from p. 3 past summer. He and his wife Frances attended every opera presented. One of the apprentice singers was a former Opera Guild vocal competition winner. He says that in the future he wants to continue to visit Santa Fe and Lyric Opera of Chicago to see the talent offered through their apprentice programs. He concludes with saying, "the level of artistry [at these venues] is a great thing to hear. I'd like to bring them to Dayton for leading roles."

The Magic Flute and as Jade Boucher in
Dead Man Walking, in which she gave a
gripping performance as the mother of
one of the convicted criminal's victims.

Baritone Corey Crider also returns to Dayton Opera in this production to play the role of Sharpless, the American Consul in Japan who is sent to break the news to Butterfly that Pinkerton will return to Nagasaki, but not for the reason of which Butterfly has dreamed. Crider appeared with Dayton Opera last in the role of Morales in the 2005 production of *Carmen*, and has recently appeared in leading roles with Opera Roanoke, Arizona Opera, Sarasota Opera, Madison Opera and Lyric Opera of Kansas City.

Returning to Dayton Opera for his fifth performance, bass Adam Fry will perform the role of The Bonze, having appeared with Dayton Opera once before in a *Madame Butterfly* production in 2006, as well as appearances with Dayton Opera in Macbeth in 2008, in Turandot in 2008, and most recently in Tosca in 2013. Rounding out the cast are three vocalists who will be making their Dayton Opera debuts: tenor Robert Norman as Goro, baritone Andrew Pardini in the dual roles of Imperial Commissioner and Prince Yamadori, and soprano Kasia Borowiec as Kate Pinkerton. Pardini and Borowiec are both members of Dayton Opera's upcoming 2015-2016 Artists-in-Residence Program.

Puccini's gorgeous score will be provided by the impeccable Dayton Philharmonic Orchestra under the direction of Conductor Robert Tweten, hailing originally from Victoria, British Columbia, Canada, and making his Dayton Opera debut with this performance. Tweten has masterfully conducted *Madame Butterfly* with both Edmonton Opera and Utah Opera, both in 2014. He has been described as leading with "verve and precision," as well as having "flawless" pacing and "musicality and near-symbiotic accord with singers, which always impresses."

Albert Sherman returns to Dayton Opera to stage-direct Puccini's masterpiece, bringing this beautiful story to life on the Mead Theatre Stage. Sherman's directing expertise was enjoyed in five past Dayton Opera productions, *The Elixir of Love* in 1998, *Cosí Fan Tutte* in 1999, *Cinderella* in 2006, *The Merry Widow* in 2009, and most recently in *Romeo and Juliet* in 2012.

The ever-remarkable Dayton Opera Chorus, under the skillful direction and leadership of Chorus Master Jeffrey Powell, will be part of the production. Artistic Director Tom Bankston reminds us that the opera will be sung in Italian with English surtitles made possible by the Opera Guild of Dayton.

Want to learn even more about the beauty of *Madame Butterfly*? Come one hour prior to both performances to hear pre-performance talks presented by UD music professor Dr. Sam Dorf. Delicious "Opera bites" are also available in the Wintergarden before the performance and at the first intermission.

Myrna Cunningham





"Tosca touched my soul!" This is how Opera Guild member Myrna Cunningham describes how she came to love opera. Myrna came to the art form later in life through her husband Dick Cunningham. She says her favorite movie is "Pretty Woman" and talks about the scene where Richard Gere takes Iulia Roberts to see her first opera. He tells her people either hate opera or "it touches your soul." Cunningham says she saw several operas, with no particular effect and then she saw *Tosca* and "it touched my soul." Of course, as opera lovers know, Puccini is a master of the heart grab and the soul touch! In any event, after seeing Tosca, Myrna was hooked and has been a mainstay of the Dayton Opera and the Opera Guild ever since - generously

Myrna was born in Akron, moved to Dayton when she was seven years old and was raised in Mad River Township. She graduated from Wilbur Wright High School. After graduation she got a job working as a long distance operator with the telephone company. Wright Patterson AFB was within her territory and she describes the job as very interesting, linking calls and conference calls from around the country and the world. She considered a career with the telephone company, but had a chance to attend college, an opportunity a colleague advised her to take. Good advice as it turns out! Myrna attended Ohio University and

then the University of Dayton, where she graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in medical technology. While in college she joined the Phi Mu sorority and is still very active in this organization. She is a past president of the Board of the Dayton Alumnae Panhellenic Council. She describes the training received from this organization as very helpful: upon joining the Board, a member starts at the least responsible level and then moves up a level in responsibility each year until becoming President. Myrna married and lived with her family several places in the United States before moving back to Dayton in 1971. At that time she took a job with Kettering Hospital working in the blood bank. She retired from this position in 2006.

Myrna met her second husband, Dick Cunningham (another familiar face to the Opera Guild) at a singles event in 1992. At the time, Dick was a civilian employee with the Air Force at Wright Patterson AFB. Originally a physics major from Illinois, he came to WPAFB to fulfill his ROTC assignment and stayed for 46 years! The couple have been married for 20 years. Dick had season tickets to both the Dayton Philharmonic and the Victoria Theater and Myrna began attending events at these venues with him. When he retired, he suggested, "Why don't we try opera?"

The couple joined the Opera Guild and attended operas at Memorial Hall in Dayton. She credits the Guild's educational program "Ear for Opera" with developing and maintaining her interest in the art form. She really enjoyed the presentations on the actual mechanics of staging an opera: how the singers are selected, the budget proposed, the importance of make-up and costumes, the significance of the stage manager and the difficult job of the conductor. One of her most memorable sessions was on opera directors and how they differ in their interpretations of each piece. Luke Dennis was one of her favorite presenters. It was at an "Ear for Opera" that they

learned of the Sorg Opera Company in Middletown and began attending operas there. Myrna describes these productions as sort of a "one-man show" where the artistic director was also the conductor and the music director. It was at Sorg that she saw first saw her first and transformative *Tosca*. As an aside, these operas were held in the Sorg Opera House, a Middletown building fallen into disrepair, subsequently remodeled and rumored to be haunted by the ghost of its founder, Paul Sorg. Myrna says she never saw any ghosts when she was there!

In addition to *Tosca* another of her opera favorites is *Turandot* with its beautiful and haunting aria "nessun dorma." Myrna was enthralled by Dayton Opera's 2006 production of *Madame Butterfly*, and its riveting finale of Cio-Cio-San's suicide, back-dropped by a huge Japanese flag running with blood. Like the rest of us, she eagerly awaits Dayton Opera's new production of this opera, coming in November.

Since joining the Opera Guild, Myrna has done everything from soup to nuts, as the saying goes. Her first volunteer activity was for a Holiday Tables event done at the Wright Brothers' home, Hawthorn Hill in Oakwood. Since then, she has worked on the BRAVO! Committee, the Membership Luncheon Committee, served on the Marketing Committee, made cookies for the cast of the Dayton Opera, helped with the telephone tree and the student dress rehearsals. She has been a board member of the Guild for many years. She and Dick are loyal supporters of the Dayton Opera and the Opera Guild. Not only do they contribute financially to the arts, but the couple has attended every Opera Ball, the 50th Anniversary Gala, the Doctor and the Diva function at Books & Co. and many other events. Myrna would

Myrna has embraced opera and brought to the our organization her love for the art form as well as her energy, enthusiasm, dedication and capacity for hard work.
