With EVERYONE'S help some repairs were made, axle bolts were replaced (someone had spares), brake lines crimped, tire remounted and we're on our way. While this work was going on someone pulled out an umbrella and a tarp to provide shade. Talk about being resourceful. This group was unbelievable.

We decided that our fun meters were full, so we cut the remaining run short and used the easy way back out to highway 95. Since there were two vehicles disabled, but only one trailer available at the Scenic Turnout, two trips back to town were required.

Everyone made it back home okay. This group leaves no one. It ended up being a little hotter than expected with all the extra activities. I figured the run would be over about 1:30. I got home about 4:30.

I enjoyed doing the run and hope everyone else did. Thanks to Ed Heil for being my tail gunner and everyone else for pitching in when needed.

#### PROPOSED BY-LAW CHANGES

# Members: The following items are for your information. These will be voted on at the November meeting when discussion on them will be done.

#### • Article III - #9

**Presently:** Members shall immediately notify the <u>Secretary</u> upon change of a home address, mailing address, telephone number, <u>CB handle or vehicle</u>.

Change: Secretary to Membership Chairperson and CB handle or vehicle to e-mail address.

#### • Honorary Members - #12

**Presently:** The interest of a member in the Club is not transferrable upon his/her death or when he/she ceases to be a member, by resignation or otherwise, in accordance with the Constitution. Any member may resign from membership upon notice in writing to the <u>Secretary</u>. No dues shall be refunded upon a resignation.

Change: Secretary to Membership Chairperson

#### • Supportive Members

Add #14 - If a member elects not to renew their Club membership, but would like to get the newsletter "Trail Talk", they may do so by paying an annual fee of \$15.00. They will not have any privileges or voting rights.

#### • Article VII - Duties and Powers of Officers - #3

**Presently:** The Secretary shall keep and preserve all records and minutes of the regular membership meetings and Board meetings, <u>shall assume the responsibility of ledger roll call and determine the number of voting members present so it may be known if a quorum is in attendance, shall keep a file system of membership.</u>

Move underlined items to SOP under Membership Committee duties.

#### • Article XIII - #5 Events - C

**Presently:** All members are responsible for themselves. It is up to each member to decide if a trip is too difficult for that member's personal experience. Only the driver knows his/her limits; it will be their responsibility to go or not go on a run. The trail boss has the authority to prohibit any member or guest from joining a run if, in his/her opinion, the Club member has insufficient experience or the member's vehicle does not meet the minimum standards required for the level of difficulty established by Paragraph 5.E.

**Delete:** Paragraph 5.E Add: the SOP Trail Rating System

#### • Article XV - Amendments

**Presently:** These BY-LAWS may be amended by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote at a regular membership meeting, a quorum being present and voting. Any amendment to the BY-LAWS must be presented to the membership <u>at</u> the regular meeting preceding that in which the vote is taken.




Crazy Eights




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


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### - HAVASU 4 WHEELERS TRAIL RATINGS -

- Mandatory Vehicle Equipment - All vehicles on H4W runs must be 4-wheel drive & equipped with a CB radio, fire extinguisher, first aid kit, tow straps, and front and rear tow hooks or safe hitching point ..... all in working order.

RATING	G DESCRIPTION					
1	EASIEST: Passable by stock vehicles. Gentle fairly wide grades.					
2	EASY: Use of 2 wheel and some 4-wheel drive. Trail may have some rocks, loose road surface, and ruts but a reasonable line for driving.					
3	EASIEST MODERATE: 4-wheel drive with aggressive tire treads. Expect a rough road with rocks and sand that requires lower tire pressure. Substantial sections of single lane.					
3¼	M <u>ODERATE</u> : Same as above with some use of high and low range gearing. These trails have a rough, rutted surface, rocks and deep sand. Sections may be steep enough to cause traction problems, narrow shelf roads with steep drop-offs and tight clearance between rocks.					
31⁄2	H <u>ARDER MODERATE</u> : 33" tires with aggressive tire tread, one locked differential, high and low range gearing. For experienced drivers Potentially dangerous, large rocks, ruts, steep slopes, loose surface and narrow clearances that need to be negotiated.					
3¾	HARDEST MODERATE: Same as above with both differentials locked, Some strapping/winching. Skilled, experienced drivers only. Very challenging sections, extremely steep grades, loose surfaces, large rocks, deep ruts and tight clearances.					
4	<u>DIFFICULT</u> : Same as above with belly up, 4:1 transfer case or equivalent, skid plates, beefed up axles and suspension system. Probable strapping/winching. Vehicle width and wheelbase should be considered. Highly skilled experienced drivers only. Possible body damage.					
5	HARD: All of the above. Probable body damage.
