

Ryan Day is in his third full season as head coach of the Ohio State Buckeyes. He was named head coach by Ohio State Senior Vice President and Wolfe Foundation Endowed Athletics Director Gene Smith on Dec. 4, 2018.

Day has guided Ohio State to a 23-2 record in his first two-plus seasons as head coach and he is unbeaten against the Big Ten Conference with a perfect, 15-0 mark. He is the first Ohio State coach to win Big Ten championships in his first two years as coach, in 2019 and again in 2020, and he has also set the standard by leading Ohio State into the College Football Playoffs for two consecutive years.

In 2019 Day became the first Ohio State coach in 40 years to be named Big Ten Conference Coach of the Year, earning that honor by coaching, developing and leading one of the best teams in school history. His 2019 Buckeyes became the first Big Ten team ever to win three consecutive outright Big Ten titles and the team advanced to the College Football Playoffs for the third time in the six-year playoff history. Day's 13 victories in 2019 are tied for the most by a first-year FBS head coach and he is the first coach to win 13 games before the start of the bowl season. The Buckeyes were ranked among the nation's Top 5 in 14 of 16 weeks.

The 2020 pandemic-shortened season may have been an even superior coaching performance by Day, who coached and counselled and led

Ohio State, in Ryan Day's four seasons on staff, including two as head coach, has won 10 championships: four consecutive Big Ten championships; four Big Ten East Division titles; the 2018 Cotton Bowl, the 2019 Rose Bowl and the 2021 CFP semifinal at the Sugar Bowl over Clemson.

Individually, Day has coached three Heisman Trophy finalists (Dwayne Haskins, Justin Fields and Chase Young), seven first-team All-Americans (Young, Jeff Okudah, Wyatt Davis twice, J.K. Dobbins, Shaun Wade and Haskell Garrett), four consecutive Big Ten Quarterback of the Year honorees (J.T. Barrett, Haskins and Fields twice), three Chicago Tribune Silver Football award winners (Haskins, Young and Fields) and the first 2,000-yard running back in school history (Dobbins).

his team through months of separation, the anxiety of a cancelled season and then of a reduced season, and then the actual start/stop season. Ohio State was 5-0 in a scheduled eight-game regular season that had Maryland and Michigan cancel games with the Buckeyes because of the pandemic and that saw Ohio State cancel a game at Illinois because of the pandemic.

That undefeated record in the regular season earned Ohio State its fourth consecutive trip to Indianapolis and the Big Ten championship game, where the team defeated Northwestern, 22-10, to set itself up for a second consecutive invite to the College Football Playoffs, a program first.

No. 2 Clemson, the team that ended Ohio State's dream 2019 campaign, was the opponent in the Allstate Sugar Bowl semifinals and history would not be rewritten. Led by quarterback Justin Fields' 385 yards passing and six touchdowns, the Buckeyes rolled to a 49-28 victory to advance to the CFP championship game. One of the best team's in college football history, No. 1 Alabama, defeated the Buckeyes in Miami for the national championship.

Day's two Ohio State teams have been ranked among the nation's Top 5 in 25 of 29 weeks. They have been Top 10 nationally each year in total offense, rushing offense and scoring offense, and the 2019 defense was No. 1 in total defense.

Individually, Day has coached three Heisman Trophy finalists, seven first-team All-Americans, four consecutive Big Ten Quarterback of the Year honorees, three Chicago Tribune Silver Football award winners and the first 2,000-yard running back in school history.

Day is a native of Manchester, NH. He was a three-year starting quarterback at New Hampshire when Chip Kelly was offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. He was a team captain as a senior and earned his degree in business administration in 2002. He has a master's in administrative studies from Boston College (2004).

Day, and his wife, Christina, who is referred to as "Nina," have three children: Ryan Jr. or "RJ", Grace and Ourania or "Nia".

Overview: Tony Alford is in his seventh season as assistant head coach for offense and running backs coach at Ohio State University, and he is in his 24th year coaching running backs.

The 1K Club: Alford's running backs have been nothing short of incredibly productive, tough and reliable. He has coached a 1,000-yard runner in five of his six seasons with Ohio State: Ezekiel Elliott (2015), Mike Weber (2016) and J.K. Dobbins (2017, 2018 and 2019).

Major Awards: AlfordAlford has also coached three major award winners: Elliott won Big Ten Conference offensive player of the year and Chicago Tribune Silver Football award honors in 2015 when he barreled through an 1,821-yard season and scored 23 touchdowns; Weber was the league's freshman of the year in 2016; and Dobbins was a first-team All-American and the Earle Campbell/Tyler Rose award winner in 2019 when he made history by becoming the first Buckeye to top 2,000 yards in a season with 2,003 yards and 21 rushing touchdowns.

On Background: A 1992 graduate of Colorado State with a degree in exercise and sport science, Alford went on to play for the NFL's Denver Broncos in preseason action and the Birmingham Fire of the World League prior to entering the coaching profession. Alford and his wife, Trina, have three sons: Rylan, Kyler and Braydon.

Overview: Matt Barnes is in his third season on the Ohio State coaching staff and he is in his first season as the secondary coach. He previously had also served as the team's special team's coordinator. Barnes was hired by head coach Ryan Day in January, 2019, after spending the prior three seasons coaching at the University of Maryland. Barnes has 12 years of collegiate coaching experience.

Title Teams: Barnes has coached on three Big Ten Conference championship teams and two teams – 2019 and 2020 – that advanced to play in the College Football Playoffs. In 2019 Ohio State's defense led the nation in fewest passing yards allowed (156.0 per game) and also led the nation in pass-efficiency defense with a rating of 97.50.

On Background: Barnes is a 2008 graduate of Salisbury University on Maryland's eastern shore, where he was a team captain and helped the Sea Gulls win three ECAC bowl games and compete in the NCAA Division III tournament in 2007. A fine student, he was a candidate for the academic Draddy Award as a senior. The award is now named the William V. Campbell Trophy and is given to the outstanding student-athlete across all four divisions in college football. His degree is in business.

Family: Matt is married to Christina Holowinsky, who is from Annandale, Md. The couple has a son, Henry.

Overview: Kerry Coombs is in his seventh season overall at Ohio State and he is in his second season as the team's defensive coordinator.

NFL Experience: In two seasons with the NFL's Tennessee Titans, Coombs helped the Titans produce one of the league's top secondary units. In 2018, it ranked sixth in passing defense (216.9 yards/game), eighth in opponent passer rating (88.4) and ninth in opponent completion percentage (.632).

Welcome Back: Coombs was named Ohio State's defensive coordinator on Jan. 20, 2020, by Ohio State head coach Ryan Day. Coombs, who has spent all but two years of his life in the state of Ohio, thus returned home to Ohio and Ohio State after spending two successful seasons coaching cornerbacks for the NFL's Tennessee Titans. He had previously coached at Ohio State for six seasons, from 2012 through 2017.

Coombs' First Ohio State Tenure: Coombs' first go-around with the Buckeyes was a remarkable one, as evidenced by the five first-round NFL draft choices that he developed between 2014 and 2018: Bradley Roby (2014, Denver Broncos), Eli Apple (2016, New York Giants), Marshon Lattimore (2017, New Orleans Saints), Gareon Conley (2017, Oakland Raiders) and Denzel Ward (2018, Cleveland Browns). Every starting Ohio State cornerback in Coombs' six-year tenure reached the NFL.

Overview: Corey Dennis is in his second year as quarterbacks coach for the Ohio State Buckeyes. He was promoted by Ohio State coach Ryan Day to the position in Jan. 2020, after serving two seasons as a senior quality control coach. Dennis has been on Ohio State's staff the past six seasons, including working two seasons with Day and the quarterbacks, and the two prior seasons with wide receivers coach Brian Hartline and the Buckeyes' receivers.

High-level Quarterback Play: These past two seasons have been two of the most celebrated offensive campaigns in recent school history, with two Ohio State quarterbacks – Dwayne Haskins in 2018 and Justin Fields in 2019 – becoming Heisman Trophy finalists as well as Big Ten Quarterback and Player of the Year. The duo combined for 91 touchdown passes.

No Stranger to Ohio State: The 2021 season will be Dennis' seventh on the Ohio State coaching staff. He previously worked as a graduate assistant coach on offense for the 2016 and 2017 seasons, working primarily with the Buckeye receivers, and as an intern in 2015. He has been a part of four consecutive Big Ten Conference championship teams at Ohio State and also victories in the 2020 Sugar Bowl, 2019 Rose Bowl, the 2018 Cotton Bowl and the 2016 Fiesta Bowl.

30Under30: In August of 2021, Dennis was named to 247Sports 30Under30 list of rising young coaches. 247Sports national football writer Chris Hummer: "Dennis has done nothing but help produce and recruit stellar quarterbacks while at Ohio State. ... In 2018, Dennis worked closely with Dwayne Haskins. The last two years, (he) tutored All-American Justin Fields. Both players were first-round NFL draft picks.

Overview: Parker Fleming is in his first season as Ohio State University's special team's coordinator. Ohio State head coach Ryan Day named Fleming, who has worked on Ohio State's staff for the past three seasons as a quality control coach with the special teams units, to the position in February of 2021.

Quotable: "Promoting from within is something I believe strongly in," Ryan Day said. "Parker Fleming is very bright. He's really sharp. And he is somebody that knows what we do very, very well. He's got the respect of our team, and we think that's a really good move there."

Buckeyes: Fleming has worked two different stints at Ohio State, beginning in 2012-13 as a graduate assistant before returning in 2018 to serve as a quality control coach for special teams. In 2018, his first season back, the Buckeyes' special teams unit ranked No. 2 in kickoff return defense, No. 6 in net punting, No. 8 in punt return defense and No. 10 in blocked kicks.

Team Success: During Fleming's time on Ohio State's coaching staff (2012-13 and 2018-present), the Buckeyes have a record of 57-5 with three Big Ten titles, five Big Ten East Division championships, a Rose Bowl victory, two College Football Playoff appearances and one CFP National Championship Game.

Overview: Brian Hartline is a rising star in the coaching profession who is in his fourth season as wide receivers coach at Ohio State and in his fifth season, overall, coaching at his alma mater.

AFCA 35 Under 35: In 2019 Hartline was honored by the American Football Coaches Association as one of its AFCA 35 Under 35 honorees, a prestigious program that identifies and develops "premier, future leaders" in the football coaching profession.

NFL Pedigree: Hartline joined the Ohio State staff in early 2017 after a terrific playing career in the NFL with the Miami Dolphins between 2009-14 and Cleveland Browns (2015). He played in 104 games with 73 starts, and had 344 career receptions for 4,766 yards and 14 touchdowns. His best seasons came in 2012 and 2013, when he combined to catch 150 passes for 2,099 yards for the Dolphins. He caught 30 or more passes in each of his seven NFL seasons.

Two All-Big Ten in 2020: In the pandemic-shortened 2020 season, receivers Chris Olave and Garrett Wilson were each named first-team all-Big Ten Conference, marking just the second time in school history two receivers earned the honor.

Notable Numbers: Led by then-co-captains and now NFL players Parris Campbell, Johnnie Dixon and Terry McLaurin, Ohio State's 2018 receiver unit caught 310 passes for 4,429 yards and 45 touchdowns ... Hill went on to break the school career mark for receptions with 201 and also finished sixth in school history with 2,332 receiving yards. ... Including Hill, eight receivers have topped 1,000 career yards under Hartline: Chris Olave (1,775), Campbell (1,768), Bin Victor (1,340), McLaurin (1,251) Dixon (1,146), Garrett Wilson (1,155) and Austin Mack (1,050).

Overview: Larry Johnson is in his eighth season as defensive line coach with the Ohio State football program. Named to his position in early January, 2014, he was elevated to associate head coach in 2019.

Noteworthy: Johnson has coached more Big Ten defensive players of the year or linemen of the year -16! – than any program has in the Big Ten over the last 24 years.

Best in the Business: Johnson has coached nine first-round NFL Draft picks, including the Bosa brothers (Joey in 2016; Nick in 2019) and Chase Young (2020). He had five of his players move on to the NFL in one season, after the 2017 campaign, including draft picks Tyquan Lewis, Sam Hubbard and Jalyn Holmes. In addition, four of his players, including Sam Hubbard, have been named first-team Academic All-American.

A Heisman Trophy Finalist: In 2019, Johnson coached and developed Chase Young into a Heisman Trophy finalist – just the ninth defensive player ever named a finalist – and to unanimous first-team All-America status while being named a finalist for five other major national awards.

14 All-Americans: Eight Ohio State defensive linemen have earned first-team All-America honors under Johnson, including DT Haskell Garrett in 2020. The list includes: Chase Young (2019), Dre'mont Jones (2018), Nick Bosa (2017), Joey Bosa (2014 and 2015), Adolphus Washington (2015) and Michael Bennett (2014). Johnson has coached a total of 14 first-team All-Americans at Ohio State and Penn State.

Noteworthy: Studrawa is a Buckeye. He was born in Fostoria, attended St. Wendelin High School and played collegiately at Bowling Green. He has coached collegiately for 20 years throughout the state of Ohio: at Cincinnati, at Wilmington College, a year at Ohio State under John Cooper (1997) and six years at Bowling Green, including under Urban Meyer in 2001-02, prior to his current position.

Best in the Business: Studrawa has developed two major national award winners – Rimington Trophy winners Pat Elflein and Billy Price – and five first-team All-Americans at Ohio State: Elflein, Price, Michael Jordan and Wyatt Davis in 2019 and again in 2020.

Notable Numbers: In his first four seasons coaching at Ohio State, the Buckeyes ranked sixth nationally among Power 5 teams in rushing yards per game (231.4 yards per) and the program extended to eight its consecutive seasons with a 1,000-yard rusher after J.K. Dobbins rushed for an all-time school record 2,003 yards in 2019. Only three Power 5 teams scored more rushing touchdowns than Ohio State's 129 between 2016-19.

Overview: Columbus, Ohio native Al Washington is in his third season as coach of the Ohio State linebackers. He joined the coaching Jan. 8, 2019 and is in his 14th year coaching on the collegiate level. .

Columbus is Home: Washington grew up in and around Ohio Stadium and attended Bishop Watterson High School, graduating in 2002. His father, Al Washington Sr., played linebacker for the Buckeyes from 1977 through 1980 and currently ranks eighth in career tackles with 345.

A Successful First Season: In 2019, Washington developed four linebackers into all-conference performers with Malik Harrison a first-team honoree and Tuf Borland, Baron Browning and Pete Werner all earning honorable mention honors.

In the NFL: All four of Washington's senior linebackers on the 2020 Ohio State team were in NFL training camps in August 2021: Borland (Minnesota), Browning (Denver), Justin Hilliard (San Francisco) and Werner (New Orleans).

Overview: Kevin Wilson is in his fifth season as the Buckeyes' offensive coordinator and tight ends coach. Wilson has directed some of the most prolific offenses in the nation over his 38-year coaching career.

Noteworthy: Wilson has coached two of the four teams in FBS history that produced a 3,500-yard passer, two 1,000-yard rushers and a 1,000-yard receiver in the same year. His 2015 Indiana and 2008 Oklahoma offenses achieved the feat. The others are USC in 2005 and Southern Mississippi in 2015. (Ohio State was just 46 rushing yards by Mike Weber 2018 from being the fifth team to accomplish the feat.)

Best in the Business: Wilson, a winner of the Frank Broyles Award in 2008 as the nation's top assistant coach and twice a finalist, coached potent and productive Indiana offenses that led the Big Ten Conference in passing three times – 2012, 2013 and 2015 – and finished second in 2016.

Notable Numbers: Ohio State has featured one of the top offenses nationally with Wilson on staff. Ohio State's offense has finished Nos. 7, 2, 4 and 7 nationally in total offense, and Nos. 6, 8, 3 and 11 in scoring offense in 2017, 2018, 2019 and 2020, respectively.
