#### A WORD FROM THE PASTOR:

#### "Pretty in Pink" - Gaudete Sunday-

While some people will look at today's liturgical color and will think of John Hughes' 1986 romantic comedy, the liturgical color rose actually symbolizes joy and happiness and is usually only used twice a year, Gaudete Sunday during Advent and its counterpart Laetare Sunday during Lent..

Like Lent, Advent is a penitential season, and so the ordinary liturgical color for Advent is violet, the color of royalty, which is appropriate having just ended the liturgical year with the great feast of Christ the King. But today, on the Third Sunday of Advent, having just passed the midpoint of Advent, we celebrate *Gaudete* (Latin: "Rejoice") Sunday, and the Church lightens the mood a little as it recognizes the joyful anticipation of the season that will culminate in the birth of Christ on Christmas by changing the liturgical color to rose. Rose is a "brightening" of the ordinary violet and thus symbolizes joy. We experience that the change in color provides us with encouragement to continue our spiritual preparation - especially prayer and fasting- for Christmas. It is for this same reason that the third candle of the Advent wreath is traditionally rose-colored.

It was not until the 1960's that the bright rose and sometimes even pink colors came into use. Prior to that, the rose color used in textiles came from a plant. Rose Madder is an organic dye, made from the root of the madder plant, which was extensively used until its active ingredient, alizarin, was synthesized in the late 19th century. This was the traditional rose-colored dye used since remote antiquity in Egypt. Due to its relative weakness, the use of this pigment was limited to textiles rather than for oil paint.

The spirit of the Liturgy all through Advent is one of expectation and preparation for the feast of Christmas as well as for the second coming of Christ, and the penitential exercises suitable to that spirit are thus on Gaudete Sunday suspended for a while in order to symbolize that joy and gladness in the promised Redemption.

#### Our Lady of Guadalupe -December 12 Patroness of the Americas

The Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe in Mexico City is the most visited Catholic pilgrimage site in the world, and the world's third most-visited sacred site, just behind the Meiji Shinto Shrine and the Kasha Vishwanath Temple.

Our Lady of Guadalupe (Spanish: *Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe*) is a title of the Virgin Mary associated with a celebrated pictorial image. The official Church account of the apparition states that on the morning of December 9, 1531, a Catholic Aztec peasant named Juan Diego saw a vision of a maiden at a place called the Hill of Tepeyac, which

would later become part of Villa de Guadalupe, a suburb of Mexico City. Tepeyac had once been the site of an important temple to the Aztec mother goddess Tonantzin and later the site of a small Spanish chapel dedicated to the Blessed Virgin Mary. Speaking to him in his native Nahuatl language, the maiden identified herself as the Virgin Mary, "mother of the very true deity" and asked that a magnificent church be built at that site in her honor.

Juan Diego then sought out the archbishop of Mexico City, Friar Juan de Zumarraga, to tell him what had happened. The archbishop instructed him to return to Tepeyac Hill and ask the lady for Castilian roses, which would be a miraculous sign to prove her

identity. The first sign she gave was the healing of Juan's uncle. The Virgin then told Juan to go to the top of Tepeyac Hill, which was normally barren, especially in December, to find the roses. Juan followed her instructions, and he found the roses, which are not native to Mexico, blooming there. He carefully arranged the flowers in his tilma, or cloak, and when he opened his cloak before the archbishop on December 12, the flowers fell to the floor, and on the fabric was the image of the Virgin of Guadalupe.

Juan Diego's *tilma* has become Mexico's most popular religious and cultural symbol, and has received widespread ecclesiastical and popular support. The tilma is made from woven cactus fibers and should have a life span of no more than 60 years, but it is still very well preserved after almost 500 years.

The first printed account of the image and apparitions was published in 1648 by Rev. Miguel Sanchez, a diocesan priest of Mexico City. The next printed account was a 36-page tract in the Nahuatl language, which was published in 1649. In the earliest account, the Virgin Mary tells Juan Bernardino, the uncle of Juan Diego, that the image left on the tilma is to be known by the name "the Perfect Virgin, Holy Mary of Guadalupe."

The image had originally featured a crown on the Virgin's head, but this disappeared in 1888, no doubt inspired by a desire to 'modernize' the image and reinforce its similarity to the nineteenth-century images of the Immaculate Conception.

According to the Sanchez account, the iconography of the Virgin is fully Catholic. He described her as the Woman of the Apocalypse from Revelation 12:1, the woman "clothed with the sun, and the moon under her feet, and upon her head a crown of twelve stars." She is described as a representation of the Immaculate Conception.

According to the second account, the image also had layers of meaning for the indigenous people of Mexico, which contributed to her popularity. Her blue-green mantle was the color reserved for the divine couple Ometecuhtli and Omecihuati, and her black belt is interpreted as a sign of pregnancy; and the cross-shaped image, symbolizing the cosmos and called *nahui-ollin*, is inscribed beneath the image's sash. She was called "mother of maguey, the source of the sacred beverage pulque. Pulque was also known as "the milk of the Virgin." The rays of light surrounding her are seen to also represent maquey spines.

Prior to the apparition, very few native peoples had converted to the faith in Mexico, but after the apparition hundreds of thousands of indigenous peoples converted to the Catholic faith, and today both their Catholic faith and their devotion to Our Blessed Mother remains strong.

In 1754, Pope Benedict XIV, in a papal bull, solemnly declared her to be the Patroness of New Spain (Spanish Central and North America), and Pope Pius XII in 1945 expanded that title to Patroness of the Americas.

#### **Second Collection Today for Religious Retirement**

The annual **Retirement Fund for Religious** collections will be held this weekend, **December 12-13**. Now in its 28th year, the appeal is coordinated by the National Religious Retirement Office (NRRO) and offers support for senior Catholic sisters, brothers and religious order priests whose communities lack sufficient retirement funding. Some 33,000 women and men religious past age 70 benefit from this collection.

The 2014 appeal raised \$28.3 million and the NRRO distributed more than \$25 million in financial support to 395 religious communities. Throughout the year, additional funding is allocated for communities with the greatest needs and for retirement planning and educational resources. Ninety-three cents of every dollar directly aids elderly religious, the remainder is used for administration and promotion of the appeal. Since the fund was launched in 1988, Catholics have donated \$755 million to assist religious communities in caring for their elder members. Many of the Sparkill Dominican sisters who taught for so many years here at St. Helena are now living in senior care facilities.

While the response to the collection is unprecedented, so is the need. The total cost of care for senior women and men religious has exceeded \$1 billion for each of the last six years. At the same time, the number of religious needing care is on the rise. In 2014, 66 percent of the religious communities providing data to the NRRO had a median age of 70 or older. Accompanying the higher median age is a decrease in the number of religious able to serve in compensated ministry, which further reduces the income available for eldercare.

Hundreds of religious communities also lack sufficient retirement savings, due in part to historically low compensation. "Most senior religious worked for years for small stipends and did not receive retirement benefits," said Sister Janice, director of NRRO. Religious communities are financially autonomous and thus responsible for the support and care of all members. Annual distributions from the Retirement Fund for Religious provide

supplemental assistance to help meet such day-to-day needs as prescription medications and nursing care.

In addition to providing financial assistance, the NRRO offers education and resources that help religious communities stretch retirement dollars and plan for future needs. Please be generous in this weekend's second collection.

Holy water, as our catechisms taught us, is "water blessed by the priest with solemn prayer, to beg God's blessing on those who use it and to seek God's protection from the powers of darkness."Most importantly, it is also reminds us of our Christian baptism. Sacramentals are instituted for the sanctification of certain ministries of the Church, certain states of life, a great variety of circumstances in Christian life, and the use of many things helpful to man. They always include a prayer, often accompanied by a specific sign, such as the laying on of hands, the sign of the cross, or the sprinkling of holy water (which recalls Baptism). The use of holy water in Catholic Churches goes back possibly to Apostolic times. There is a tradition that St. Matthew recommended it in order thereby to attract converts from Judaism by using a rite with which they were familiar in their former faith. Its use is mentioned in a letter written in 117 and ascribed to Pope Alexander I, and we also find a detailed account of its use in the "Pontifical of Serapion," which was written in the fourth century, and the formula of blessing mentioned therein has considerable resemblance to the one we currently use.

#### **BUEN DIA, HERMANOS:**

Unos griegos se acercaron a Felipe y le dijeron: "Queremos ver a Jesús" (*Jn* 12, 21). Eran prosélitos; es decir, extranjeros convertidos al judaísmo. Habían subido a Jerusalén para el culto. Pero oyeron hablar de Jesús y su expectativa cambió. También hoy, hombres y mujeres de todas partes miran a la Iglesia y le piden, con justa razón: "Queremos ver a Jesús". Porque la misión de la Iglesia es hacer visible a Cristo en el mundo mediante la oración, el testimonio de vida y el apostolado.

El Espíritu Santo ha querido darnos un Papa muy sensible a esta misión. Con su exhortación "Evangelii Gaudium", Francisco nos introdujo en el dinamismo de una Iglesia "en salida" hacia el hombre y sus periferias existenciales. Ahora convoca un Año Santo –a partir del próximo 8 de diciembre–, un Jubileo Extraordinario bajo el signo de la misericordia. En la mente del Papa, la Iglesia "en salida" ha de tener "amplias entradas". Para ello, invita a cada cristiano a no mirar sólo la "superficie" de los demás, como hizo Simón, el fariseo, cuando juzgó a la mujer que se acercó a Jesús (cf. Lc 7, 36-50); en ese nivel es muy fácil equivocarse. La misericordia mira más adentro y solidariza el corazón con las verdaderas miserias de cada persona.

"He pensado mucho –dijo el Papa el 13 de marzo– cómo la Iglesia puede hacer más evidente su misión de ser testigo de la misericordia... He decidido convocar un Jubileo Extraordinario que tenga en el centro la misericordia de Dios. Será un Año Santo de la misericordia".

#### Año de la Misericordía:

Todas las miserias humanas puedan acercarse a la Iglesia. Ahora bien, las miserias se diversifican tanto como las necesidades del hombre. La Iglesia no pretende remediarlas todas, pero sí ofrecer su mejor esfuerzo. Ella busca aliviar la miseria corporal dando alimento, techo y vestido; la miseria afectiva dando cercanía, calidez y bondad; la miseria humana e intelectual educando y promoviendo la justicia; la miseria psicológica dando atención y acompañamiento; y, sobre todo, la miseria moral y espiritual enseñando la fe y administrando los sacramentos, que son su mayor tesoro. La Iglesia es experta en misericordia, porque es experta en humanidad. Su único fin es "continuar, bajo la guía del Espíritu, la obra misma de Cristo, quien vino al mundo para dar testimonio de la verdad, para salvar y no para juzgar, para servir y no para ser servido" (Concilio Vaticano II, Gaudium et spes, 3).

El Año de la Misericordia comprometerá a todos en la Iglesia. A los obispos y sacerdotes como ministros de la misericordia, a las personas consagradas como encarnación de la misericordia para cada ser humano, y a los fieles laicos como promotores de la misericordia en el ámbito de las realidades temporales.

Las "obras de misericordia", corporales y espirituales, son una síntesis concreta y práctica al alcance de todos. Entre ellas cabe destacar el perdón de las ofensas como gesto propio de un año jubilar. Porque los jubileos nacieron, en la historia del pueblo de Israel, como "años de gracia". En ellos se condonaban las deudas y se devolvía la igualdad a todos.

Ahora bien, la misericordia tiene un precio. "Si el grano de trigo no muere, queda solo; pero si muere, da mucho fruto", explicó Jesús a Felipe. Para que germine la misericordia en nuestra vida, algo debe morir en nosotros: quizá una pereza, un apego, una visión superficial, un afán de mera justicia, un rencor, una desconfianza. Sin embargo, este morir es pasajero. Cuando somos misericordiosos reencontramos nuestra propia esencia, que lleva en sí la impronta de Dios; jy vivimos de nuevo! Porque nunca se parece tanto el hombre a Dios como cuando es misericordioso.
