opening for a biology teacher at High Tech High. He recognized that his expertise in biology and research would be extremely usefully at a prestigious STEM high school like High Tech. "It is the perfect job," Mr. Queenan stated when asked about his new position. However, he acknowledged that there have been some challenges in adjusting to the new environment because of the coronavirus pandemic: "Two of the greatest problems are student engagement and making sure that student needs are met. It is important to give the students the same level of education through virtual labs and simulations. Furthermore, there is less time to talk to a student about an issue." In addition, he explained that he needed to prepare a new biology curriculum that would be suitable for a virtual setting.

Despite the pandemic-related challenges, Mr. Queenan affirmed that he is enjoying working with High Tech students. "They are very dedicated," he observed. When Mr. Queenan is not teaching, he tries to make time for his running hobby, and he loves to spend time with his wife and five-year-old twin boys.

EazyML Hackathon organized by HTHS Students a Roaring Success

EazyHacks Hackathon, hosted by Easy ML, took place Nov. 13-15. Participants had 40 hours to create an application from scratch, incorporating the use of machine learning by utilizing the platform or API provided by EazyML. Participants worked on a variety topics, including analyzing factors to help manage California wildfires, creating a bot that analyzes tweets about movies to create searchable categories, and tracking glaciers to help inform knowledge about the impact of climate change.

The first place project was the Glacier Time-Machine. This group chose to raise awareness about our rapidly changing environment due to global warming. They used EazyML to predict the sizes and locations of glaciers in the future. Second place went to California Wildfire Intensity Explanation. This group figured out the model that would most accurately predict the intensity of California wildfires in different areas. Earning third place was FireSense, which also focused on California wildfires, but with a different approach. This group took a proactive stance towards immediate detection through the use of images.

There are still many applications of EazyML's machine learning platform that have not yet been realized. If you would like to make predictions with large and complex data, EazyML can help. On Wednesday, October 28th, HTHS hosted its seventh annual Snacks With Scientists event - a joint effort between the National Honor Society and the STEMinists Club. This yearly event provides an opportunity for middle school girls in Monmouth County to learn about STEM careers by connecting them with women working in those fields. Students had the chance to hear from exciting speakers, such as Tiffany Zhao, an HTHS alumna who works as a data scientist for Instagram. Other fields represented in this year's event included neuroscience, chemical engineering, electrical engineering, and computer science.

However, the event looked a little different in 2020 than it has in the past: it was held online using Google Meet instead of in person at High Tech. Students were split into groups to hear from a series of speakers through the use of virtual breakout rooms. To keep with the spirit of Snacks With Scientists, "We encouraged [the girls] to have their own snacks at home," said Eileen Liang, '21, Co-President of the STEMinists Club.
