COLLEGE NEWS FROM THE COLLEGE PRINCIPAL

This month across the College, a number of our older students had an opportunity to explore their learning pathways, and how these translate into careers.

Year 10 students from Wallsend and Waratah immersed themselves into senior learning, attending taster classes at Jesmond Senior Campus as part of our comprehensive transition program, which includes a Course Expo on 18 May.

Year 11 and 12 students attended the Newcastle & Lake Macquarie Careers Expo, with more than 80 business and university exhibitors on hand to talk with students about the vast amount of options available across the Hunter and beyond. This was followed up back at Campus by a Q&A panel of ex-students from Callaghan giving our senior students helpful advice on the HSC and career choices.



It's wonderful to experience cross-campus activities again this year, most recently with our Year 11 Sports Coaching students running a wonderful Inter-Junior College gala day for Year 7 students. We have also had a number of College sporting teams compete around the region this term, with great success and sportsmanship.

PEEK INSIDE OUR HSIE FACULTY Mr Chris Lee, Head Teacher HSIE

Why is HSIE such an important subject area?

HSIE stands for Human Society and its Environment. The name alone indicates that students will be learning about issues and topics that are relevant to themselves and the world around them. Studying HSIE subjects also makes students more informed citizens and as a result more likely to be proactive in problem solving issues they see around them.

What does a typical day look like for a HSIE teacher?

Busy! Generally, most days involve a mix of teaching across year groups (7–10) and involve teaching multiple subjects including History, Geography, and numerous elective subjects such as Law, Business and Money, Elective History or Aboriginal Studies.



What is the hardest thing about being a HSIE teacher?

The hardest thing is that there are so many amazing topics to cover and just not enough time to cover everything in the detail that we would like.

If I come into a HSIE classroom and took a photo, what would we see in the photo?

Firstly, you would see a passionate teacher who genuinely loves what they do. I don't think in over 20 years of teaching I've met a HSIE teacher who is not passionate about teaching their subject. Hopefully, you would also see this enthusiasm from the teachers translate into engaged and active student learners.

There are so many options in HSIE. What advice do you give students when choosing an elective?

The main advice I always give students is to choose subjects that you are interested in because you will always do better in those areas of interest.

I want to congratulate our students for their great collaborative skills – it required a team effort to plan and complete each activity, and the students were definitely





SUPPORT UNIT NEWS




