

AFGHAN-IRAQI FREEDOM WAR MEMORIAL FUND

The family of Warrant Erik Kesterson, a helicopter pilot who lost his life when his aircraft crashed near Mosul, Iraq earlier this year is looking for assistance to build a memorial honoring Oregonians who have lost their lives in Iraq or Afghanistan.

They do not want to wait thirty years to see these fallen heroes remembered by their home state.

The concept is to encourage all Oregonians, from every walk of life and every group or organization to have fundraisers and then bring these funds together at the State Capitol on October 30, 2004. Skilled craftsmen and women can also donate their skills towards completion of this memorial.

We have been asked to help get this information out to the motorcycle community. But, we can do more, we can also use our regular contacts to get the word out to many other groups as well. The list is endless and all those who would like to be a part of this project need to step forward and make yourself known. The cost of the project is estimated to be under \$500,000 and any monies received that exceed the cost of construction will be put into a scholarship fund for the children of these men and women. 


