Molly, our Miracle Mare



MOLLY, OUR SWEET GIRL

"She's too old to have any more babies--you should just kill her!" was said to Juan, the owner of the 23-year-old registered Quarter Horse mare. Juan, a racetrack groom, had bought the mare in February of 2020 from a friend in Wyoming. He knew that she had had several racing babies, one of which had set a track record in its very first race, and hoped to have a racehorse for himself.

Juan sent the old mare to Pueblo to be bred and was very disappointed when the Vet declared her not to be in foal. That was when he was advised that she was worthless and should be shot or sold for slaughter.

I received a call from Juan in late June asking if our Rescue would take the mare because he didn't want to kill her. My answer was "Yes" because we had one empty stall and pen. Somehow, I forgot to consult with my daughter, Kris Nixon. Oops. Kris is taking on more and more responsibility with the Rescue as I get older and wobbly, and I try to include her in decision making.

Juan trailered our new horse to RMHR on July 1st. As she backed down the ramp, I saw her bandaged left hind leg, and that with every step, she jerked her foot up almost to

her belly. Uh-oh. She must have stringhalt: an involuntary flexion of the hock when moving. Well, we had said we would take her in so we couldn't back out now. We decided to call her Molly and removed the leg wrap to see what we were dealing with. After seeing a smelly open wound on both the front and back side of her cannon bone, we immediately made an appointment for a Vet to see her.

After x-rays to determine how far the infection had spread and possibly impacted the bone, Mobile Veterinary Clinic vets immediately put Molly on antibiotics and started treating her wounds. Every day, a Vet would scrub the large wound in front causing it to bleed and hopefully grow in more new skin around the edges.



RMHR Sponsorship/Foster Program

After many years of discussion, RMHR has formalized a horse sponsorship program. We have three levels of sponsorship:

GOLD- pay all costs including board, feed, farrier, and all veterinary (except for major surgery exceeding \$4,000 to save a life)

SILVER - pay \$200 a month to RMHR to help

cover the costs of feed and maintenance

BRONZE - pay \$50 a month to help cover the cost of care

Our fondest hope for all our horses is that they will go with the best possible person for the longest possible time. I think we can call this a win!

Material Improvements

Over the years we have reused, cannibalized and repurposed countless items to expand our capacity; and save one more horse. We've built pens inside of existing pens, created adjuncts on pens and largely done whatever is necessary to create a viable environment for our charges. We don't always like it, in fact, many times we hate it. But saving a horse makes it all worthwhile.

We've been blessed of late with some generous

donations of materials and finally been able to use some older donations to improve our surroundings. In the past 24 months, we've been able to do repairs on six barns/loafing sheds and improve the fencing of nine corrals. We've also been able to refence our grazing corral and are working on a complete rebuild of the railing on the Claire Davis Memorial Arena. Special thanks to those who have donated and those who continue to generously provide their time and materials.

Used to lift a down (recumbent) horse to get it on its feet—e.g. out of a ditch or off a road. The LAL can be applied by one or two people in as little as five minutes to a horse with little or no sedation.



The LAL can be put on from the back negating the chance of getting kicked by flailing legs. The LAL is designed to maintain an animal on its feet for short periods.



However, the future will present enormous financial difficulties since the Lauretta Boyd Charitable Trust was designed to terminate in 2020. This means that we see increasing financial pressures ahead—but we are determined to keep on with our mission to rescue animals. We will try to apply for other grants to help us through these tough times.


