Responsibility, Respect, Integrity, making the Decision to be Safe, and Excellence are rewarded for their good behavior.



### W.E.B.

W.E.B. stands for "Where Everybody Belongs." It is a middle school orientation and transition program designed to help sixth graders connect with the school before sixth grade even begins. The move to middle comes with significant changes, and the W.E.B. program addresses this in multiple ways. It begins with a sixth grade orientation before the first day of school in August. Each sixth grader is assigned to an 8<sup>th</sup> grade W.E.B. Leader. This WEB Leader guides the student through orientation, and checks in with him/her regularly throughout the year during formal and informal W.E.B. and school events, acting as a friend, leader, and mentor. It has been shown that when students feel a connection to their school, they are more successful, and they are less likely to become victims of bullying.





## Personalized Learning and One-to-One Devices

## Personalized Learning

At HMS, teachers are encouraged to incorporate strategies, develop activities, and structure classrooms in such a way as to implement some of the <u>7 Principles</u> <u>of Personalized Learning</u>. We have focused specifically on three of these principles: <u>Varied Strategies</u>, <u>Mastery-Based Assessments</u>, and <u>Just-in-Time</u> <u>Direct Instruction</u>. We also put an emphasis on <u>Blended Learning</u>, which means we expect students to be using digital resources some of the time, not necessarily every day, to enhance their learning experience.

## One-to-One Devices

In order to assist in the implementation of **<u>Blended Learning</u>**, all students at HMS are assigned a personal device, the Microsoft Surface 3. In addition, students are provided a computer bag for the Surface Pro and are expected to use the bag at all times when in the hallways and moving throughout the building. Devices help students learn to communicate with others, gather information, share ideas, and create products in new ways.



...we do a lot of fun things like operating on grammarians, funerals for dead words, and referee punctuation. If you do well on a test, you get candy. You can also get a prize.










### Math Continuous Achievement Middle School/High School Flowchart





### Social Studies Course Overview:

Sixth grade is the first year of a two-year World Area Studies course. Sixth grade students study Latin America, Canada, Europe, and Australia. The goal of this twoyear course is to acquaint middle school students with the world in which they live. The geography domain includes both physical and human geography. The intent of the geography domain is for students to begin to grasp the importance geography plays in their everyday lives. The government/civics domain focuses on selected types of government found in the various areas so as to help students begin to understand the variety of governments in the world. The economics domain builds on the K-5 economics; however, the focus shifts from the United States to how other countries answer the basic questions of economics. 

## Hopewell Middle School Music Department Band, Chorus, & Orchestra



Dear Parents of Rising 6<sup>th</sup> Graders:

We are very excited to introduce to you and your student the music options available at Hopewell Middle School. We are very proud of the outstanding quality and numerous accomplishments of our music programs. Your child will have some wonderful opportunities available at HMS, one of which is to become involved with the Hopewell Music Department. More than half of all students at Hopewell Middle School participate in one of the three performing groups. There are classes in band, chorus, and orchestra available to any 6<sup>th</sup> grade student, regardless of whether or not they have played an instrument or have sung in chorus before. Students with prior playing and singing experience are encouraged to continue with their instrument/chorus in 6<sup>th</sup> grade.

It is important to understand that being in the music department is a yearlong commitment. These classes are the first of seven years' worth of performance-oriented music education offered in middle and high school. With hard work, students will continue to learn about and enjoy music for the rest of their lives. It is also worth noting that there is a financial commitment as well. Most students will be asked to supply their own instruments as well as other instrument related supplies, method books, and uniforms. More information about specific supplies and where to rent or purchase instruments will be distributed at a later date.

Below are brief descriptions of each class and the instruments that are offered. Each class is a performance-oriented course of study that utilizes the Georgia Performance Standards curriculum. All three performing groups participate in group instruction and perform several times each year. In addition, students will have opportunities for enrichment activities such as music festivals, field trips, honor clinics, Solo and Ensemble, and much more. Classes will require hard work, dedication, and a commitment to having fun!! Students will also have the opportunity to participate in musical events such as the "Rock-a-thon" fundraiser, HMS Talent Show, and the Spring Musical.

- θ Band is comprised of the woodwind, brass, and percussion families of instruments. Woodwinds include the <u>flute</u>, <u>clarinet</u>, <u>saxophone</u>, <u>bassoon</u>, and <u>oboe</u>. Brass instruments include the <u>trumpet</u>, <u>trombone</u>, <u>French horn</u>, <u>baritone</u>, and <u>tuba</u>. Concert band percussion includes the <u>xylophone</u> and <u>marimba</u> which are similar to the piano, in addition to <u>snare drum</u>, <u>bass drum</u>, and <u>timpani</u> (a student who plays percussion plays all of these instruments and many more).
- θ Chorus is the performing music class that sings! The human voice is the most personal, most versatile and most available musical instrument it is always with you! Choral students learn how to sing solos, sing in harmony, and sing a capella (without instruments!), as they develop musicianship and music reading skills. Choral students perform in a variety of concerts with a wide range of musical styles including traditional choral, jazz, classical, musical theatre and pop. Through performance opportunities, students develop stage presence and confidence as they perform throughout the year. Singing skills developed in chorus provide a foundation for future success in many fields of study!
- Orchestra is comprised of the string family of instruments. These include the <u>violin</u>- the smallest and highest pitched of the string instruments, the <u>viola</u>- a mellow midrange instrument slightly larger than a violin, the <u>cello</u>- a great lower register instrument, and the <u>string bass</u> the largest and lowest of the family. Students will have an opportunity to try each string instrument before choosing their specific instrument. All string instruments come in multiple sizes for different sized players.

We are very proud of our music programs here at Hopewell Middle School! Thank you for taking the time to discuss the musical option you feel will be best for your student. In joining our music program, your child will begin a journey which will evolve into a lifetime of music appreciation and enjoyment. We look forward to having your child join our Mustang Music "Family" at HMS!!

#### HMS Band (www.hopewellbands.com)

Band students learn to play brass, woodwind, or percussion instruments while also studying basic music theory. Sixth grade band students are placed in either the woodwind or brass class. Sixth graders entering the HMS band program must start on **flute**, **clarinet**, **trumpet**, **or trombone**. Students will be allowed to try out for other instruments such as oboe, bassoon, saxophone, French horn, tuba, or percussion **at the end of the first semester**.

HMS bands annually participate in music festivals and competitions, and have won first place distinctions in Myrtle Beach, SC, at Carowinds amusement park in Charlotte, NC, and at Six Flags Over Georgia. Members of the Hopewell band program have consistently earned chairs in both District Honor Band and All-State Band. Students have also participated in the University of Georgia Middle School Band Festival, the Jacksonville State University Honor Band Clinic, and the Reinhardt University Middle School Honor Band Clinic.

Students who sign up for Band will be tested on all of the available instruments to decide which ones are most suitable for them (preferences will be taken into consideration!). More information regarding instrument selection will be sent home at a later date.

#### HMS Chorus (www.hmschorus.wordpress.com)


In the HMS Chorus, students improve natural talent by learning vocal skills and techniques in daily rehearsal. Students learn to sight-read music as part of a comprehensive musicianship program along with performance concerts in the fall, winter and spring and additional performance opportunities throughout the year. The HMS Chorus also performs for many community events such as the annual Tree-Lighting and The Milton Round-up. Each grade level has two chorus classes, mixed chorus and girls chorus, and often performs across grade levels as well as combines with all classes in performances. There are over 200 singers currently participating in the HMS Chorus with an average of approximately 35-40 singers per class.

The HMS Chorus has consistently received Superior ratings for performance and sight-reading at our annual District Large Group Performance Evaluation as well as a first place ranking in Music in the Parks Festival at Six Flags over Georgia. The HMS Chorus has also received invitations to perform at Walt Disney World in Orlando, Florida as part of the Disney Performing Arts Program in addition to performances at local events. HMS Chorus students have regularly been selected as members of the Georgia Music Educators District Honor Chorus, Georgia All State Chorus, Spivey Hall Honor Choir Workshop, 6<sup>th</sup> Grade Statewide Honor Chorus, American Choral Directors Association (ACDA) Southern Division Honor Chorus as well as the ACDA National Honor Chorus.

#### HMS Orchestra (www.hopewellorchestra.weebly.com)

The HMS Orchestra has over 200 members comprised of students on violin, viola, cello, and bass. The 6<sup>th</sup> grade orchestra focuses on developing basic technique (bowing and left hand), note reading skills, music theory, and musicianship; in addition to building a strong sense of responsibility, teamwork, and commitment. Sixth grade orchestra students participate in three concerts, with additional performance opportunities throughout the school year.

The HMS Orchestras participate annually in the Music in the Parks and Trills and Thrills Festivals at Six Flags over Georgia and Dollywood in Pigeon Forge, Tn. The orchestras have won first place and Best Overall Orchestra distinctions at both festivals. Hopewell Orchestras have also received invitations to perform at the Georgia Music Educators Association In-Service Conference in Savannah, the Governor's Mansion Holiday Open House, and the Disney Performing Arts Program at Walt Disney World in Orlando, FL. The HMS Orchestras have consistently received Superior ratings for performance and sight-reading at the GMEA District Five Large Group Performance Evaluation. HMS Orchestra students have regularly been selected as members of the GMEA All-State Orchestra, Fulton County Youth Orchestras, GMEA District Five Middle School Honor Orchestra, and GMEA Solo and Ensemble.



## Physical Education

Physical Education focuses mainly on physical fitness activities that help promote the overall well-being of students. Students learn about ways to maintain a healthy lifestyle and the importance of being active in and out of school. Students participate in the "mile run" and "circuit" once a week. They also participate in various activities that focus on health-related fitness components. The "Fitnessgram" is required by the state, and students are tested twice during a nine-week period. This test evaluates their cardiovascular endurance, muscular endurance, flexibility, and body composition.

## Visual Art

Visual Art students participate in a variety of 2D and 3D assignments as they learn about the elements and principles of design. Emphasis is placed on materials and techniques, developing craftsmanship, and drawing from observation.

## Health

Health is a course where students learn to take positive action regarding their own well-being. Students learn that good health habits can improve the way they look, prevent illness, and increase success in school. A healthier lifestyle also provides students with increased interaction among peers. The overall goal is to teach students about a better quality of life, which provides physical, emotional and mental wellness.

### Library & Research Skills

This is a Connections class designed to guide students through the research process in order to answer critical thinking questions in a thorough and coherent manner.

## Business and Computer Science

In Business and Computer Science, students explore touch-typing, expanding their knowledge at each grade level. Students move from keyboarding to Microsoft Office activities, with more involvement in each area of Office per grade level. Students also learn about marketable skills for today's job market. In compliance with Georgia Literacy Standards, students are involved in reading, writing, and hands-on activities dealing with varying technology issues.

## Debate

Students in Debate Class gain a command of the fundamental processes of argumentation and debate. They demonstrate familiarity with various materials and methods of research. They improve their ability to think clearly, critically, creatively, and analytically while demonstrating effective oral communication skills. Students design and present impromptu, extemporaneous and prepared arguments.

## STEM

This course is structured to prepare students as responsible citizens for success in the real world by providing challenging, student- centered, inquiry-based experiences for students. Students will be able to problem solve, think creatively, collaborate with others to come up with solutions, and effectively communicate with one another.


## Drama

Drama 1 is a standards-based, nine-week course which introduces all areas of the theater to the student using the Theater Arts Standards. Students learn about artistic perception, vocabulary of the theater, creative expression, and acting with continued emphasis on voice, movement, character and improvisation. They learn about aesthetic valuing, including reviewing movies and live theatrical productions. They also learn about careers in theater and film.

## Broadcast Journalism

Broadcasting Journalism is a hands-on class in film production, film directing, film editing, Final Cut Pro editing, shooting video for TV, video production and TV news production. Students will produce videos with their peers that they will share with the class and with the school community.

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#### IMMUNIZATION RULES FOR 6TH GRADE STUDENTS

♦ ALL CHILDREN ENTERING 6<sup>TH</sup> GRADE (ON OR AFTER July 1, 2007) ARE REQUIRED TO MEET THE FOLLOWING NEW REQUIREMENTS:

- 1) Have two (2) doses of Measles vaccine, two (2) doses of Mumps vaccine, and one (1) dose of Rubella vaccine or laboratory proof of immunity against Measles, Mumps or Rubella.
- 2) Have two (2) doses of Varicella (chicken pox) vaccine or documentation of disease or laboratory proof of immunity. At the time your child entered school only one (1) dose of this vaccine was required.
- 3) Contact your health care provider to receive any needed vaccinations and to obtain the Georgia Certificate of Immunization (Form 3231).
