"The Past is a Present" Series: Senior Profile

Howard M. Frisch

In a different approach to the typical Series interview session, I wanted to see how quickly Howard could think on his feet, so I asked him up front to tell me, "Off the top of your head, Howard, what are the three things you are proudest of in your life?" Without skipping a beat, he responds, "Marrying my junior high school sweetheart – we met at a dance in Lynn, MA (Howard notes he was Chair of the dance), I was 15 and Janice (from Revere, MA) was 14. I knew at first sight I was going to marry her. We were married 44 wonderful years; second, my accounting practice, Horvitz & Frisch, P.C., a firm that stands for integrity and honesty; and third, my volunteering efforts where I really feel I have made a difference, particularly my 30 years dedicated to the Friends of the Gloucester Council on Aging."


The response is quintessential Howard Frisch: fully prepared, succinct and to the point, with a tinge of self-deprecating humor. While Howard has never actually lived in Gloucester, he is a veritable icon in the Gloucester business community, having dedicated 40+ years of his life to presiding over an extensive number of prestigious local boards and community activities. His exemplary commitment to Gloucester is distinguished by his unwavering professionalism and impeccable character.

Howard first came to Gloucester in 1980 when he bought a 50% interest in the local CPA practice of Joel Horvitz. Horvitz, originally from Fall River, MA, came to Gloucester in 1972. "We were great partners together," reminisces Howard. "We formed our partnership on a handshake. I'm a success today because of Joel Horvitz. I was a good accountant, but he taught me how to be a good public accountant. He was a wonderful mentor to me, repeatedly saying, 'This community puts bread on our table. So, we must give back to the community.'" Horvitz's dedication to the Gloucester business community included serving on the Addison Gilbert Hospital Board of Directors as Treasurer and its Board of Trustees for 25 years, and serving as President of both the Gloucester Chamber of Commerce

and the Rotary Club of Gloucester, receiving the Paul Harris Fellow award, the highest honor bestowed on any Rotarian. Howard fully bought out Horvitz's interest in Horvitz & Frisch, P.C. in 1993. They remained very close friends in his retirement. Horvitz passed away in August 2006 after a five-year battle with cancer.

Howard learned the importance of volunteering from the example set by his mother, Mary (Butter) Frisch. "My mother was the consummate volunteer...

...in Lynn. She was Vice President of every Jewish organization in the city. From the time I was a little boy, she would take me to her events where I would help with counting the tickets, putting down placemats, etc. For me, volunteering was just a natural thing to do. The Frisch Family just volunteered." His mother, who was born and raised in Revere, MA, was also Howard's first brush with accounting, as she was a bookkeeper at a local market. "The second income from her bookkeeping really put me through college."

Howard's paternal grandfather, Max Frisch, emigrated with his brother from Kiev (then part of Russia) in the 1890s. They settled in Lynn, MA. (During the 30 years between 1885 and 1915, Lynn's immigrant population increased from 9,800 to 29,500, representing nearly one-third of the city's total population. Russian and Polish Jews were the largest single group, numbering more than 6,000). According to Howard, his grandfather Max started out working in a shoe factory in Lynn, "like everyone else." (At the beginning of the 20th century, Lynn, nicknamed the "Shoe City of America," was the world leader in the production of shoes, with 234 factories producing more than a million pairs of shoes each day). According to Howard's father, Max then switched over to the more lucrative construction business, collecting rent from over 400 families in tenement buildings he had constructed before the depression struck. Howard distinctly remembers his grandfather's advice to him in his thick ethnic accent, "Harvard, land is power." ("He never called me Howard, it was always Harvard"). Having lost most of his savings in the depression, Max reinvented himself by going back to the shoe business and starting Manchester Waste Company which bought scrap leather from the Lynn shoe manufacturers, re-sorted the leather and then profitably sold it back to the shoe companies for custom-made heels.

Howard's father, Sidney Frisch, worked at Metropolitan Life Insurance Company in Lynn, along with his brother Frank, for 35 years. He insured mostly immigrants – Italians, Irish, Jews and Polish - who lived in the "brickyards" of Lynn. When he was 9 or 10 years old, Howard would go on the routes with his dad while he sold his 25-cent and dollar whole life policies, cash only, to employees in the "brickyards." "My father knew everyone. He would spend most of his day sitting with families and listening to their stories." In an uncanny foreshadowing of his career, Howard would count the quarters and dollars from the sales that day and give an accounting to his dad, who would then bring the cash to the agency the next morning.

Howard went off to college at UMass Amherst where he initially started out as an engineering major. "I found out I hated engineering, so in October of my sophomore year I made the difficult switch in mid-year to an accounting major in the business school." Howard recalls the head of the department, Prof. John Anderson, saying something which has stuck with him the rest of his life, "You want to find a profession you love. You want to wake up 30 years from now and look back and say, 'I had a great time. I love what I do.' So, if you don't like accounting, find something else." Howard smiles, "And guess what, I have always loved accounting and I love what I do for a living."

At UMass Amherst, he joined Alpha Epsilon Pi fraternity (he was Treasurer of the house), and was active in other campus organizations as Treasurer of the Military Ball, Winter Carnival, March of Dimes and the Student Union. In his senior year, he was honored to be one of 10 men elected to Adelphia (scholars & leaders on campus; 10 women scholars/leaders were elected to Mortarboard).

Howard tells a wonderful story from his freshman year: "I walked into the offices of the student newspaper, *Massachusetts Collegian,* and said I wanted to work at the newspaper. They asked me, "Can you write?" "No." "Can you edit?" "No" "Can you take a picture?" "Ya, I guess so." So, I became the "Third Assistant Photographer" for the newspaper. In January of the following winter semester, the renowned poet, Robert Frost, was scheduled to speak at the school in a much-anticipated event. The day before the event, the Second Assistant Photographer broke his leg and the First Assistant Photographer flunked out. I was informed I would be taking pictures of Robert Frost. In preparation, I went to the photography department and got a special Leica camera. I entered the library as Robert Frost was speaking, walked down the middle aisle right.... (Howard's profile cont. (Howard's profile cont. from Page 3)up front and was so enamored of him that I tripped over a cord and fell flat on my face, smashing the expensive camera into pieces. Mr. Frost looked over at me sprawled face-down on the floor and dryly said, 'Young man, that's not the best angle to be taking my photograph from.' Completely embarrassed, I got up off the floor, gathered the scattered pieces of the camera and went back upstairs to get another camera. When I came back to the event with the new camera, the damn shutter button wouldn't work. I never got a single photograph of Robert Frost for the newspaper!" The next day, the newspaper editor suggested, "Maybe you should do something else. How about selling ads?" Which Howard did, and apparently was very good at it, becoming Advertising Manager and then Business Manager of the newspaper for two years.

After graduating from UMass Amherst with a BBA in Accounting, Howard married his junior high school sweetheart, Janice Fox. They settled in Swampscott, MA where they raised their two children, Robyn and Scott. His daughter, Robyn Ruggiero, is a homemaker living in Sarasota, Florida with her husband, Steve, and their two children, Lindsay and Brandon. His son, Scott Frisch, also a CPA, is COO & CFO of AARP (American Association of Retired Persons) in Washington, DC, with a national membership of over 38 million. Scott and his wife, Christine, are raising their two daughters, Julia (in her 4th year at UVA undergrad) and Olivia (a senior at Newburyport High School) in Newburyport, MA.

After college, Howard worked for 9 months at KPMG before joining the Army where he was stationed at Ft. Bragg, NC. He made 1st Lieutenant in 24 months and Captain a year later, receiving the Army Commendation Medal for running the tax program at Ft. Bragg. While he stayed in the reserves, his unit was never called up for service in Vietnam, and he was honorably discharged as Captain, Ordnance Corp. He says he matured immensely in the Army, adding, "The four most important things in preparing me for the business world I learned in the Army: attention to detail, looking out for other people, getting things done and leadership."

Subsequent to the Army, Howard went back to KPMG in Boston and passed the CPA exam. After various controller jobs for mutual fund companies in Boston (Putnam, John P. Chase), and Bliss Marine in Woburn, Howard decided he wanted to work for himself and return to public accounting. He made the call to Joel Horvitz in 1980 to initiate their partnership and the creation of Horvitz & Frisch, P.C. Today, almost 40 years later, Howard continues to have overall responsibility for the management of the practice.

When you walk into the offices of Horvitz & Frisch, P.C, (located on the second floor of 128 Main Street in Gloucester), the first thing you notice is the overwhelming presence of antique clocks. Everywhere. There are elegant mantel piece clocks, stately wall clocks, precise miniature clocks, and very old clocks dating back to the 1800s – his oldest piece he dates to 1798. 95% of his clocks are made by U.S. craftsmen, primarily from New England, dating between 1830 to 1899. One of the first timepieces in his collection is a simple kitchen clock from the 1880s made by Ingraham Clock Co. of Connecticut whose glass front has elegantly etched, "Time Is Money." When I ask Howard how his passion for clocks began, he says "Frank Molinsky." The original owner of Para Research, Molinsky began company operations at the Whistlestop Mall in Rockport. Howard was designing accounting software packages for them, and "for those two years I would sit in their conference room looking at an enormous 36" in diameter tower clock dial." Howard bought the dial and brought it home (weighing 80 pounds) to his wife Janice who immediately made him put it in the garage. The real addiction started happening at garage sales. Howard would buy a clock, bring it home and take it apart. Then buy another, and take it apart, etc. After buying his first 25 or so clocks, he was waiting in the dentist's office of Dr. Russ Sanfield in Rockport and noticed some beautiful Chelsea clocks on the office shelf. He let Dr. Sanfield know of his interest in clocks, and "The next thing I knew I was his guest at a meeting of the NAWCC (National Association of Watch and Clock Collectors), Chapter #87 Greater New England, and I never looked back. That was 35 years ago, in 1985." Howard is a member of that Chapter #87, and Chapter #7 of Greater Massachusetts. Currently, he has 1,100+ clocks at the Horvitz & Frisch offices, and another 300 clocks in his home basement. He says he never buys a clock without deeply researching the manufacturer, where it was made and when it was made. (Howard's profile cont. Page 5)

He has a library of approximately 100 clock reference manuals. Buying most of his clocks from clock conventions, EBAY or garage sales, he says the price of clocks is declining because younger people are not interested in antiques. But with declining prices, "I've been able to buy clocks I've wanted all of my life!" He just returned from a national convention in Springfield, MA this past June where he was able to purchase an Ansonia Chrystal Palace clock, called a "Four Poster," circa 1875. He says with a big smile, "It was the last clock I needed in a series. Very rare. I've been looking for it for the last 30 years, and I got a great deal from someone who didn't know what an historic piece he had." He says he likes the challenge of restoring clocks, and genuinely experiences joy when he finishes restoring a clock, although he no longer has the time to repair the clock movements and just concentrates on exterior restoration. "Clocks have taught me great patience and organization. You know, clocks are a lot like people. They just need a little polish to get going."

A passionate advocate for seniors, Howard has served as a Director and Treasurer of the Friends of the Gloucester Council on Aging for 30 years and its President for the last 19 years. When I point out 30 years is an amazing commitment of time, Howard responds, "I'm proudest of the little things we have been able to accomplish behind the scenes to make things better for the Seniors. Whether it's remodeling the Bingo Board, or ordering a new ping pong table, or restoring the Senior Center bathrooms - we're a small group, but we get a lot done." "The Seniors are so appreciative. People don't realize, when you give your time, you get twice as much in return." Over the last 25 years, the Friends have been the recipient of \$37,000 donated from the proceeds generated by the annual Gloucester Rotary Club Pancake Breakfast.

An iconic local activity associated with Howard Frisch, the annual Gloucester Rotary Club Pancake Breakfast fundraiser is celebrated outdoors every August at Stage Fort Park during the Waterfront Festival. Approximately 800 people are served early-morning blueberry pancakes in a happy occasion to socialize with family and friends. For 25 years, Howard served as the Co-Chairperson of the Pancake Breakfast fundraiser, along with Charlie Foster and retired police chief, Jim Marr. He says, "the three of us worked as a beautiful team and had a lot of fun," with members donning yellow aprons engraved with "Precision Pancake Team." All proceeds from the breakfast are distributed equally to three local non-profits: Friends of the Gloucester Council on Aging, North Shore Health Project and the Teen Leaders at the YMCA. He estimates the Rotary's Pancake Breakfast has raised over \$130,000 for charity over the last 25 years. A member of the Rotary Club of Gloucester since 1989, Howard is a two-time recipient of its prestigious Paul Harris Award.

In addition to being past President of the Cape Ann Chamber of Commerce (1985), he was its Treasurer (13 years), and a Member of the Finance Committee (24 years). When he first came to Gloucester, Howard originated the concept of a seminar entitled, "Activating Your Entrepreneurial Spirit," contacting seven business people to speak at an 8-hour seminar on a Saturday sponsored by the Chamber. The first seminar was held in January 1990, and this annual seminar ran for the next 20 years with over 750 people attending. Howard served as Chairman of the Chamber's Seminar Committee and presided over 180 additional seminars during the 20-year period.

Howard has been Treasurer of the First R Foundation (their motto: "If you can read, you can do anything") for the past 10 years and is noticeably moved by the organization's hands-on mission: The group invites local community leaders to visit Kindergarten and First Grade classes in Gloucester once a month to read aloud to the students from a brand-new hard cover book. The guest readers leave the book in the classroom as a gift to the children, with the hope that by the end of the year, with at-home help from their parents, the children will be able to read the books themselves.

For 30 years, Howard was Treasurer of the Cape Ann Investment Club and for 9 years, Trustee of the Sawyer Free Library, also functioning as Chairman of the Investment Committee and Assistant Treasurer; he was a Director of the Schooner *Adventure* for 3 years; and past Treasurer of the Gloucester Stage Company.

His awards are too numerous to mention, but the most noteworthy include: selected as Small Business Advocate in the State of Massachusetts by the Small Business Administration (1998); selected as Small Business Person of the Year in Gloucester (2005); received the Rose Mary Kerry Award for Community Service in Gloucester (1997); and received Seacoast Nursing Home's Service to Seniors Award (2018).

In July 2007, his wife and junior high school sweetheart, Janice, was diagnosed with a rare form of lymphoma, stage 4. She died during the first round of chemotherapy in August 2007.

Howard now has a special companion in his life, Melinda Russo, with whom he attended grade school in Lynn. They share a home in Swampscott which has plenty of basement storage space for Howard's 300 clocks. Howard says he and Melinda "make a good team."

At the end of Howard's senior year at UMass Amherst, the head of the Accounting Department, Prof. John Anderson, appropriately distributed to all accounting majors copies of a poem by Robert Frost entitled, "The Hardship of Accounting." Howard recited it to me flawlessly:
