<b>Cock and bull story</b>	Made up story that one should not believe
<b>Cry for the moon</b>	Ask for the impossible
<b>The pros and cons</b>	The various aspects of a matter in detail
<b>Be in a tight corner</b>	In a very difficult situation
<b>Cross one's t's and dot</b>	Be precise, careful and one's i's exact
<b>At arm's length</b>	To keep at a distance

<b>Too many cooks spoil the broth</b>	Where there are more workers than necessary
<b>Crocodile tears</b>	Hypocritical Tears
<b>Cut and dried</b>	Readymade
<b>Up to date</b>	Recent
<b>Evil days</b>	A period of misfortune
<b>Halcyon Days</b>	A time when there are peace and happiness in the land
<b>To step into dead man's shoes</b>	To come into an inheritance
<b>Go to the devil</b>	Be off
<b>Devil's bones</b>	Dice
<b>Devil's Playthings</b>	Playing Cards
<b>Give a dog a bad name and hang him</b>	Once a person loses his reputation
<b>Every dog has his day</b>	Sooner or later, everyone has his share of good fortune
<b>To throw dust in one's eyes</b>	To try to deceive someone or mislead someone
<b>A white elephant</b>	A useless possession which is extremely expensive to keep
<b>To set the Thames on fire</b>	To do something sensational or remarkable
<b>A burnt child dreads the fire</b>	One who has had a previous unpleasant experience is always scared of situations where such experiences are likely to be repeated

<b>A fish out of water</b>	Anyone in an awkward
<b>Foul play</b>	Cheating
<b>To jump from a frying pan into fire</b>	To come out of one trouble and get into a worse
<b>All that glitters are not gold</b>	Things are not always as attractive as they appear
<b>To die in harness</b>	To continue at one's occupation until death
<b>Make hay while the sun shines</b>	Take advantage of all opportunities
<b>Lock, stock and barrel</b>	The whole of everything
<b>A miss is as good as a mile</b>	Comes nowhere near it. If someone narrowly misses the target it still is treated as a missed one or failure.
<b>One swallow does not make a summer</b>	It is unreliable to base one's conclusions on only a single test or incident
<b>If wishes were horses, beggars might ride</b>	If wishing could make things happen, then even the most destitute people would have everything they wanted
<b>A nine days' wonder</b>	An event which relates a sensation for a time but is soon forgotten
<b>Yellow press</b>	Newspapers which publish sensational and unscrupulous stories and exaggerate the news to attract readers.
<b>A ball park figure</b>	A general financial figure
<b>To balance the books</b>	To make certain that the amount of money spent is not more than the amount of money received.
<b>A cash cow</b>	A product or service that makes a lot of money for a company
<b>Devil's Advocate</b>	To present a counter argument
<b>Don't give up the day job</b>	You are not very good at something. You could not do it professionally.
<b>To cook the books</b>	To modify financial statements
<b>To get the sack</b>	To be dismissed from your job
<b>To be snowed under</b>	To be very busy
<b>To work your fingers to the bone / to sweat blood</b>	To work really hard
<b>Hear it on the grapevine</b>	To hear rumors
<b>In the heat of the moment</b>	Overwhelmed by what is happening in the moment
<b>Not a spark of decency</b>	No Manners
<b>Speak of the devil!</b>	This expression is used when the person you have just been talking about arrives
<b>Whole nine yards</b>	Everything. All of it
<b>Your guess is as good as mine</b>	To have no idea about anything
<b>Fishy</b>	Doubtful, Suspicious

<b>First and foremost</b>	Extreme enthusiasm
<b>Fire and fury</b>	Fearful penalties
<b>Fire and brimstone</b>	A very tasty food or meal
<b>Finding your feet/ Finger licking good</b>	To become more comfortable in whatever you are doing
<b>Fabian policy</b>	Policy of delaying decisions
<b>Excuse my French</b>	Please forgive me for cussing
<b>Everything but the kitchen sink</b>	Almost everything and anything has been included
<b>Break a leg</b>	A superstitious way to say 'Good Luck' without saying 'Good Luck'
<b>Barking up the wrong tree</b>	A mistake made in something you are trying to achieve
<b>Bated breath</b>	In anxiety, expectancy
<b>Beat a dead horse</b>	To force an issue that has already ended
<b>Between Scylla and Charybdis</b>	Choice between two unpleasant alternatives
<b>Fixed in your ways</b>	Not willing or wanting to change from your normal way of doing something
<b>A penny saved is a penny earned</b>	By not spending money, you are saving money (little by little)
<b>A picture paints a thousand words</b>	A visual presentation is far more descriptive than words
<b>A piece of cake</b>	A task that can be accomplished very easily
<b>To hold a brief for</b>	Be retained as counsel for , to argue for
<b>Shot in the arm</b>	A boost or act of encouragement
<b>To go at each other hammer and tongs</b>	To do something or perform some task with tremendous fervor, determination
<b>Step into someone's shoes</b>	Take someone's place
<b>Back to drawing board</b>	Revising something from the beginning, typically after it has failed
<b>Bring / Ring The Curtain Down</b>	To bring something to an end; to declare something to be at an end
<b>A slap on the wrist</b>	A very mild punishment
