





Now I will make something pretty. Red and yellow and blue.



Look at this. Oh, this looks good. Mother will like it.






Now come out here. We have something to do here.




We will put this in here. This is something good.

You are a good help. Come with me. We will go to Mother.




Here we go. Up, up, up. Up to see Mother.



Get up, Mother. Get up.We have something for you.Get up and see what we have.




Oh, my. Oh, my. What is this? It is so pretty. Did you make it?

About the Author



Margaret earned a teaching degree from Wayne State University in 1948, after completing a nursing degree in 1944 at the University of Michigan. In 1993, Margaret won a prestigious award from the Woman's National Book Association for her contribution to early reading, but believed her biggest reward to be the three generations of students whom she taught to read.
