

Placement of uploaded items

For these species: Pigeons & Game birds, Market Chicken, and Market Rabbit:

- On the Slot 1 County Use Form upload your "Producer Declaration Form". If you're not entering a Producer class, this space will be left blank.
- On the Slot 2 upload a photo
- On the Slot 3 upload a photo preferably with the animal and exhibitor

On the Slot 4 – upload your ownership papers (purchase receipt, registration papers, breeding supplement page from last year's record book, etc) If you are the Producer of the current animal, make sure that you also upload the mama of this animal.



Animal Uploads - market poultry & rabbit

If you are showing market poultry or market rabbits this year at the Garfield County Fair, you must enter all of your animal's information on 4honline.com as soon as you get your animal. This has to be done in order for you to then be able to choose that animal when you do your fair entry in June. This page will help you know what to put in each slot as you upload your information. As a county, we have decided what information needs to go in each slot. Do not follow the titles of the slots, instead follow this format so that everyone's information will be uploaded in a consistent format. That way we can run reports on certain fields and get the most accurate results. If you have trouble or questions, please contact the Extension Office for help. 970-625-3969 All uploads must be done by the possession date listed in the rulebook for your specie. All BREEDING ANIMALS for all species needed to be done by May 1st.

Late registrations must be brought to the shoot and must include the \$5.00 late fee.

Check-In: Registration and check-in begin at 8:00AM. Event begins immediately following remarks and range orientation.

Food: A food concession stand will be available, but there is NO scheduled lunch break! Competitors must plan their lunch times during their relays off.

Fees: \$5.00 for each event and \$10.00 per event for Shotgun, maximum of 5 events per participant.

Rules: The contest will follow the state 4-H shooting sports Rule Book. Contestants must possess a valid Hunter Safety Card. All participants are expected to know and obey all standard NRA range rules and commands. All equipment is subject to inspection by range officers for safety function.

Equipment & Ammunition: Each contestant must provide his or her own firearms. Bring a ground mat, eye protection, hearing protection, and knelling rolls. All contestants must provide their own ammunition (including arrows).

Scoring Protest: Tie-breakers or shoot off procedures will be asked on existing rules (i.e., NRS, ATA) Air Rifle and .22 targets will be posted after scoring 15 minutes. Scoring protests must be made during that time. When new targets are posted on the scoring board, previous targets are final.



Garfield County 4-H Council

Constitution & Bylaws

Adopted: _____

ARTICLE I: Name and Objectives

- Section 1. The name of this organization shall be the Garfield County 4-H Council.
- Section 2. This shall be a nonprofit organization exclusively for the purpose of promoting education through 4-H council work.
- Section 3. The objectives of this organization shall be to provide learning situations for the development
 - I. of leadership, responsibility and effective citizenship
 - II. to provide educational and challenging experiences that will enable young people to become knowledgeable and skilled in their selected project areas.
 - III. to provide information and training in other 4-H activities as members' interest dictate.
- Section 4. This council is organized exclusively for charitable, educational and scientific purposes, including, for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, or the corresponding section of any future federal tax code.
- Section 5. No part of the net earnings of this council shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to its member, trustees, officers, or other private person, except that this Council shall be empowered to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payment and distributions in furtherance of the purposes set forth in this constitution.
- Section 6. No substantial part of this Council's activities shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and this Council shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of or in opposition to any candidate for public office.
- Section 7. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this constitution, this Council shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, or the corresponding section of any future federal tax code, or (b) by a corporation, contributions, to which are deductible under section 170(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code, or the corresponding section of any future federal tax code.

ARTICLE II: Membership

- Section 1. Membership in this organization shall be open to all youth who have reached five years of age and have not reached their 19th birthday as of December 31 of the current 4-H year and who reside in the county regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, national origin or disability.
- Section 2. New members must be enrolled annually through 4HOnline and be approved as an active member. All members must re-enroll annually.
- Section 3. All members should be enrolled in and complete at least one project, including a project record book or appropriate paperwork.
- Section 4. Any active 4-H member, parent or leader may attend Council meetings and shall be called members.

ARTICLE III: Officers and Elections

- Section 1. The Council officers shall consist of the following: President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Reporter, Historian, one boy and one girl Senator and their respective alternates as membership allows, and up to four (4) adult advisors consisting of at least one female and one male advisor, as membership allows. The President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer shall be referred to the Executive Council.
- Section 2. Officers shall be elected annually. Officers shall take office at the council meeting directly following the Fair and shall be publicly installed at the Annual Achievement program or any other appropriately appointed time.
- Section 3. If any officer cannot fulfill their term, the Executive Council will appoint a replacement. This replacement would be voted in at the first Council meeting following the appointment.
- Section 4. Members ages 14 or older can apply for the offices of President, Vice President, Senators and Alternate Senators. Members ages 11 years and older may apply for Secretary and Treasurer. Members ages 9 and older may apply for Historian and Reporter.
- Section 5. Officers cannot miss more than four (4) meetings in any one year and may not be absent for more than two meetings in a row. In a situation where this happens, the position will be terminated unless extenuating circumstances occur. Notification 48 hours before the meeting must be give of any absence. The Executive Council plus an advisor and/or the 4-H agent(s) will determine if it is a reasonable excuse.
- Section 6. Applicants will be required to fill out an application that will be turned into the Extension Office in April. The applications will then be summarized and published in the following newsletter. Elections will be held at a following month's Council meeting. Nominating committee will be appointed in April in order to secure consent of nominees and publish in newsletter.
- Section 7. "In the case of Officer elections, all 4-H members attending the election month will be eligible to vote by paper ballot."

- Section 8. Current officers of the Council are responsible for encouraging and recruiting new officer nominations.
- Section 9. Member officers shall serve a term of one year and shall remain in office until the successors are installed at the election meeting, except Senators who have a two year commitment, serving as an alternate the first year and Senator the second year.
- Section 10. No officer shall be eligible for the same office for more than two consecutive terms.

ARTICLE IV: Duties of Officers

- Section 1. Duties of the president shall be
 - a) to preside at all meetings of the Council, enforce the bylaws and exercise supervision over the affairs of the Council,
 - b) to prepare the agenda in conjunction with the advisors and/or Extension Agent
 - c) to assist Leader(s)/Extension Agent with planning and attend council retreat
 - d) to assist Leader(s)/Extension Agent with planning and implementing Mini Trip
 - e) to attend 70% of all Council activities
 - f) to attend LDC, State Conference, District Retreat and any district meetings that are held
 - g) to appoint standing and special committees
 - h) to serve as an ex-officio member of each committee, except the nominating committee, and
 - i) turn in a completed President Record Book.
- Section 2. Duties of the vice-president shall be
 - a) to assist the president,
 - b) to perform the duties of the president in the absence of that officer,
 - c) to serve as a member of all committees, (i.e. Events, Fundraising, Meeting and Service)
 - d) to serve as chairman of the program committee
 - e) to help plan all Council educational programs one year in advance, and
 - f) turn in a completed Vice President Record Book.
- Section 3. Duties of the secretary shall be
 - (a) to keep a full and correct record of all proceedings of the Council,
 - (b) to file a copy of the official minutes in the Extension Office
 - (c) to have charge of Council correspondence, and
 - (d) to keep the roll and read the minutes at each meeting
 - (e) All records of the Secretary shall be transferred at the time of the new officer installation, and
 - (f) turn in a completed Secretary Record Book.
- Section 4. Duties of the treasurer shall be
 - (a) to help prepare a budget for approval by the Council.
 - (b) to review receipts of all money received and paid based on the adopted budget of the Council.

- (c) to help keep an accurate record of the receipts and expenditures of all funds.
- (d) to present a financial statement when requested to do so.
- (e) to serve as chairman of the finance committee and assist with the fundraising committee.
- (f) to make an audited report of expenditures and receipts of the Council at the end of term.
- (g) If the secretary is absent, the treasurer shall prepare the minutes and complete attendance, and
- (h) turn in a completed Treasurer Record Book.
- Section 5. Duties of the reporter shall be
 - (a) to report activities of the Council to local news media, and
 - (b) to report activities to the County Extension Agent and in the County 4-H newsletter, and
 - (c) turn in a completed Reporter Record Book.
- Section 6. Duties of the historian shall be
 - (a) to maintain all events in a scrapbook
 - (b) to present the scrapbook at the end of their term, and
 - (c) turn in a completed Historian Record Book.
- Section 7. Duties of the Senators shall be
 - (a) to attend LDC, State Conference, District Retreat and any district meetings that are held
 - (b) to be the voting delegates representing the county on the district and/or state level 4-H meetings.
 - (c) If the Senator does not attend the above listed meetings, he/she will lose their spot unless extenuating circumstances occur.
 - (d) May be a voting member at district conference calls
- Section 8. Duties of the alternate Senators shall be
 - (a) to attend LDC, State Conference and District Retreat
 - (b) to fill in for an absent Senator.

Section 9. If any officer fails to present a draft record book to the advisors or does not fulfill all of their above Officer requirements by the July meeting, they will not be able to assume their newly elected office and their office will be up for nominations.

ARTICLE V: Leaders and Duties

- Section 1. Adult leaders of the Council shall be
 - (a) Up to four (4) adult advisors shall be elected by the members and shall be at least one man and one woman, as membership allows.
 - (b) at least one screened, approved, enrolled Council/organizational leader and as many other approved leaders as are needed to carry out specific responsibilities, and

- (c) approved by the county Extension agent.
- (d) Shall be elected annually
- Section 2. Duties of the Council leader shall be
 - (a) to be responsible for the overall year's program of the Council,
 - (b) to work with other adult leaders and the Council's youth executive committee to see that the Council's program and activities are well-planned and executed.
 - (c) to work closely with county Extension agents to provide positive youth development educational programs, and
 - (d) to prepare an annual charter application and all required chartering documents to submit annually to the county Extension office.

ARTICLE VI: Committees and Duties

- Section 1. The Executive Council shall be the Executive Committee. It shall have the power to act for the Council on matters requiring immediate attention. It shall have the power to appoint standing committees. A quorum of the Executive Committee shall be two advisors and three officers.
- Section 2. Standing committees may be appointed by the executive committee, and/or the Council leader at the beginning of the Council year.
- Section 3. Standing committees and duties may include
 - (a) Finance shall have the responsibility of presenting a proposed budget to the Council and arranging for an audit of the books when necessary. The committee shall also review the financial status of the Council and make recommendations for fund-raising projects.
 - (b) Membership shall encourage every eligible boy or girl in the community to become a 4-H member. The committee shall also be responsible for welcoming visitors and prospective members.
 - (c) Activities shall be responsible for all of the activities that Council will be planning and executing throughout the year.
 - (d) Community service/Shamrock Shindig shall be responsible for planning community service activities to involve all members of the Council. Those activities should help members develop personally as well as benefitting the community and county.
 - (e) Achievement Night shall be responsible for the planning and executing of the annual Achievement Night where members, leaders, and clubs receive their awards.
 - (f) Trip/Conference Shall be responsible for the appropriation of funds and scholarship funds for trips.
- Section 4. Other committees may be named as the need arises.

- Section 1. Meetings shall be held during the months of January through November and at any other designated time that is deemed necessary by the Council Officers and/or Extension office. The meeting place shall be determined by the Council officers.
- Section 2. Meetings will be held on the 3rd Tuesday of the month, unless a change of day is approved by the members.
- Section 3. Special meetings may be called by the president, Council Advisors and/or Extension Agents.
- Section 4. The privilege of voting at Council meetings shall be limited to 2 votes per club, except for the election of Officers.
- Section 5. Six (6) voting members at any one meeting shall constitute a quorum for the meeting.

ARTICLE VIII: Order of Business

- Section 1 Robert's Rules of Order, Revised shall be the accepted authority in all matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure that are not specifically covered in the Council's bylaws.
- Section 2. The order of business for regular meetings is:
 - 1. Call to Order
 - 2. Pledges
 - 3. Roll Call
 - 4. Reception of new members and recognition of guests
 - 5. Minutes of last meeting
 - 6. Reports
 - 7. Unfinished business
 - 8. New business
 - 9. Leader's report
 - 10. Announcements
 - 11. Educational program
 - 12. Refreshments
 - 13. Adjournment
 - 14. Recreation

This order of business may be altered for the convenience of a speaker giving the program.

ARTICLE IX: Fiscal Accountability

The 4-H Council/group shall submit a financial report and all required chartering documents to the county Extension office each year. The Council fiscal year shall be July 1-June 30.

ARTICLE X: Council Dissolution

Upon dissolution, this Council's assets including money and equipment, shall become the property of the County 4-H program for care and disposition; the Council/group authorizes Colorado State University Extension and the county Extension agent full rights to access bank records, bank funds, and all other banking authority. This also applies to all inventory and assets acquired by and or owned by this organization. Any such asset not so disposed of shall be disposed of by a Court of Competent Jurisdiction

of the country in which the principal office of the Council is then located, exclusively for such purposes or to such organization or organizations, as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated exclusively for such purposes.

The last official duty of the Council's leader shall be to affect the transfer of Council property and to turn over Council records to the county Extension agent.

ARTICLE XI: Amendments

Section 1. These bylaws may be amended at any regular meeting of the council by a two-thirds vote of the members present, provided that the proposed amendments have been presented to the council in writing and filed with the secretary at the previous meeting of the council. Amendments must not conflict with the basic 4-H philosophy.
