# Meet the board of trustees

The University of Western States Board of Trustees consists of distinguished individuals who volunteer time and an array of expertise to the governance of the university. The board focuses on strategic planning and policy making to ensure the continued growth and success of UWS.

> Leo Romero, D.C. | Chairman Resides: Tacoma, Wash.

Elected to the board in 2005, Dr. Romero was appointed chairman of the board in August 2012. He graduated from Cleveland Chiropractic College, Los Angeles in 1992 and completed his post-graduate work in orthopedics at UWS. Dr. Romero is the owner and clinic director of four offices in Washington state.

Dr. Romero served on the Washington State Department of Health, Chiropractic Quality Assurance Commission for 12 years, first as a commissioner and later as chair and pro tempore member. He served two years as the Washington voting delegate for the FCLB Annual Congress. Dr. Romero spent three years on the advisory committee for the Chiropractic Technician Program at Highline Community College where he co-authored a manual for the development of a new college curriculum for chiropractic technicians.



He believes that his success is related to his ability to work with associates and develop them in a clinical chiropractic setting. He strives to support and develop the skill sets of chiropractic physicians by providing sustainable employment.



#### Mark Sutton, D.C. | Vice Chair Resides: Tumwater, Wash.

Dr. Sutton has served on the board since 2006 and was appointed vice chair of the board effective August 2012. Dr. Sutton graduated from Western States Chiropractic College in 1985 and completed his post-graduate work in orthopedics. He is currently the owner of a clinic in Tumwater, Wash.

Appointed by Governor Gary Locke, Dr. Sutton serves on the Washington State Department of Health, Chiropractic Quality Assurance Committee and is an examiner for the National Board of Chiropractic Examiners. He is frequently asked to aid as an expert in legal cases involving chiropractic care.

Dr. Sutton was named "Doctor of the Year" for Central Valley in 1990.

## Practicing across the world and on equines

Michael Nunnally, D.C. Class of 1980 Currently in: Sante Fe, N.M.

After beginning his undergraduate degree in fine arts, Dr. Michael Nunnally's interests in theatre, art and dance carried him to Amsterdam in 1973, where he joined a yoga ashram. At the studio, he did all of their graphic design work and picked up extra work teaching yoga, nutrition, exercise and Touch for Health. This provided his first glimpse into entering health care as a career.

His first experience with chiropractic care took place in Sweden. He had a rib out of place and within one visit, it was fixed.

Nunnally moved back to the United States to enroll at UWS, where he served as the student body vice president and worked as a teacher's assistant in anatomy classes.

During his last summer at Western States, the summer of 1980, Mt. St. Helens erupted. Nunnally knew that he wanted to live in a place with lots of culture and a deep interest in natural health, and nowhere near the predicted repeat eruption.

"The more I have available to me to help them, the better job I do. I do not know what the next patient is going to need," Nunnally said.

The most

recent specialization he has obtained is in veterinary chiropractic. One of his patients who owned an equestrian school asked if he could try to treat a horse that their vet was unable to get well. It was a success and

he chose to specialize in this as well.

Every Wednesday, he travels to barns to treat horses.

"It has been extremely successful," Nunnally said. "They're very responsive. Horses are very attuned


to their bodies. They recognize when I have found where they need help."

Dr. Nunnally has begun writing a book that will assist other doctors as they start their own practice. He and his wife look forward to living in Europe part time within a couple of years.

Upon graduation, he moved to Santa Fe, N.M. While starting up his own practice, he began teaching anatomy and physiology at the School of Natural Medicine. Over the years, he has taught at massage and naturopathic schools in the area.

Dr. Nunnally's practice quickly grew through referrals and his constant desire to increase his knowledge base. He obtained specialized degrees in homeopathy, orthopedics, addictionology and pain management.





In 2008, knowing it was

time for a career change, she began looking into massage therapy schools. She loved the clinical aspect of UWS and how it would set her apart from other massage therapists.

Since she did well in college, Pearl thought the massage therapy program would be a breeze. "I was surprised how difficult it was. It is still doable, but it really challenged me with the sciences, anatomy and kinesiology."
