TONIGHT'S MATCHUP

The New Orleans Saints (10-3), who have won three of their past four games, host the Indianapolis Colts (6-7) this evening in a Monday Night Football battle that kicks off at 7:15 p.m. from the Mercedes-Superdome. After clinching the NFC South division title in Week 13 at Atlanta, New Orleans sits behind San Francisco (11-2) and tied with Green Bay (10-3) and Seattle (10-3) for the best record in the NFC going into this weekend's contests. Indianapolis is riding a three-game losing streak that includes a pair of three-point losses.

Last Sunday, New Orleans took a lead against San Francisco into the game's final possession before dropping a 48-46 heartbreaker at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome. 49ers kicker **Robbie Gould's** 30-yard field goal as time expired was the difference. The Saints jumped to a 27-14 lead midway through the second quarter as they scored touchdowns on their first four possessions, following quarterback **Drew Brees'** one-yard quarterback sneak for a score. San Francisco then produced a pair of touchdowns from running back **Rafael Mostert**, including a ten-yard run with 42 seconds left in the first half to give the 49ers a 28-27 halftime lead. In the second half, San Francisco jumped out to 42-33 and 45-40 fourth quarter leads, but Brees engineered a seven-play, 76-yard drive that ended with a 18-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver **Tre'Quan Smith** with 53 seconds left to give the Black and Gold a 46-45 edge. San Francisco then pro-

duced a seven-play, 63-yard drive that included a fourth-and-two conversion with a face mask penalty that set up the game-winning field goal. Brees accounted for all six touchdowns on the day in passing for five and rushing for one, as he completed 29-of-40 passes for 349 yards and a 138.4 passer rating. Wide receiver **Michael Thomas** caught 11 passes for 134 yards and one touchdown, as well as a 49-yard score, the team's longest play from scrimmage of the 2019 season.

The Saints and the Colts have met 12 times in the regular season with New Orleans holding a 7-5 edge. The clubs also faced off in Super Bowl XLIV, where New Orleans took a 31-17 win on February 7, 2010 at Sun Life Stadium in Miami Gardens, Fla. New Orleans is 4-1 in five Mercedes-Benz Superdome meetings with Indianapolis.

Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** is no stranger to the high stakes matchups such as tonight. In his 14th season at New Orleans' helm, Payton has led New Orleans to a 136-83 overall record (including 8-6 in the postseason), posting the NFL's fourth-most wins since his 2006 arrival. The Saints have played in three NFC title games ('06, '09 & '18) under Payton, while in 2009, he guided the franchise to its second Super Bowl victory. New Orleans has shined on Monday Night Football under Payton, posting a 14-7 record, including winning the last three matchups. Overall, the Black and Gold have a 32-15 record in prime time under his leadership

SAINTS-COLTS CONNECTIONS

New Orleans Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** served on the Indiana State coaching staff from 1990-91. Saints QB **Drew Brees** enjoyed an honor-filled career at Purdue from 1997-2000, including being a Heisman Trophy finalist in 1999 and 2000. Brees won the Maxwell Award as the nation's outstanding player in 2000 and left the Boilermakers as the Big Ten and school's all-time leader in passing yards (11,792), touchdown passes (90), total yards (12,693), completion percentage (.611), completions (1,026) and attempts (1,678...New Orleans Offensive Line Coach **Dan Roushar** served as offensive coordinator at Ball State in 1994. ...Saints Running Backs Coach **Joel Thomas** was an offensive graduate assistant at Purdue from 2000-01 and served as the Boilermakers' running backs coach from 2006-08...New Orleans linebacker **Manti Te'o** played at Notre Dame...New Orleans Defensive Tackle **Malcom Brown** and Colts quarterback **Jacoby Brissett** and defensive end **Jabaal Sheard** were teammates in New England...Saints linebacker **Craig Robertson**, Sheard and Colts quarterback **Brian Hoyer** were teammates in Cleveland...Saints wide receiver **Krishawn Hogan** prepped at Warren Central (Ind.) HS, played at Marian University and spent parts of the last two seasons with the Colts active roster and practice squad, appearing in two contests...Colts quarterback **Chad Kelly** and running back **Jordan Wilkins** played at the Mississippi together...New Orleans cornerback **Patrick Robinson** played in Indianapolis in 2016. Robinson and Colts WR **Marcus Johnson** were teammates in Philadelphia in 2017...New Orleans Offensive Assistant **D.J. Williams** and Colts wide receiver **Chad Williams**, who prepped at Madison Prep in Baton Rouge, were teammates at Grambling...Indianapolis defensive end **All-Quadin Muhammad** was a seventh round draft pick of New Orleans in 2017 and played for the Saints as a rookie...Saints tight end **Jared Cook** and Colts defensive tackle **Denico Autry** were teammates in Oakland in 2017 Saints running back **Latavius Murray** and Autry were also teammates in Oakland. Murray and Colts safety **Clayton Geathers** were teammates at Central Florida. Saints defensive coordinator **Dennis Allen** tutored Autry with the Raiders in 2014 when he was head coach...Saints defensive end **Trey Hendrickson** played with Colts defensive tackle **Trevon Coley** at Florida Atlantic together...Saints fullback **Zach Line** and Indianapolis defensive tackle **Margus Hunt** played at SMU together...New Orleans defensive back **C.J. Gardner-Johnson** and Indianapolis cornerback **Quincy Wilson** played at Florida together...Saints defensive back **Justin Hardee** and Colts kicker **Chase McLaughlin** were college teammates at Illinois...Colts running back **Joanthan Williams** played for New Orleans from 2017-18 and was tutored by Thomas at Arkansas as a collegian

LAST MEETING

Saints 27, Indianapolis Colts 21; October 25, 2015 @ Lucas Oil Stadium – RB Mark Ingram powered the New Orleans rushing attack, carrying 14 times for 143 yards (10.2 avg.) with one touchdown to stake the Saints to a 27-21 victory for their second straight win to improve to 3-4. The defense and special teams did the rest, allowing only 75 rushing yards and a 23% third down conversion rate, while forcing three turnovers that would lead to 14 points.

Ingram led a rushing attack that accounted for a season-high 183 yards and three touchdowns, including two by Khiry Robinson. QB Drew Brees completed 28-of-44 passes for 255 yards with one touchdown throw. While WR Marques Colston had only one reception, his 20-yard pickup with 1:58 remaining was possibly the most important catch of the game, as it allowed Brees to kneel three times in a victory formation and clinched the team's first road win of the season.

The Saints defense harassed Colts QB Andrew Luck all afternoon, frustrating the former first overall pick in the 2012 NFL Draft to complete only 52.3% of his passes while rookie LB Stephone Anthony and CB Kyle Wilson recorded interceptions. DE Cameron Jordan sacked Luck twice, giving him five takedowns in the last two games. RB Frank Gore was held in check with only 43 yards rushing.

Special teams also played an important role in several facets. Late in the first quarter on a fourth-and-nine situation, QB/holder Luke McCown completed a 25-yard pass to TE Benjamin Watson on a fake field goal attempt. Early in the second quarter, LB David Hawthorne stripped the ball from Colts WR Griff Whalen on a kickoff return and it was recovered by Wilson. In the fourth quarter, RB/RS Marcus Murphy recovered an onside kick attempt.

- Jordan finished with three tackles (two solo), two sacks and added three passes defensed.
- WR Brandin Cooks tied for the team lead in receiving with six grabs for a team-best 81 yards, including a reception for a 47-yard gain when the Saints were backed at their three-yard line in a third-and-eight situation
- An inspired effort against the run surrendered only 75 yards rushing, including only 43 to Gore. This was the lowest opponent rushing yardage total since Week 7 of 2014 (59 at Detroit, Oct. 19). LB Dannell Ellerbe and S Kenny Vaccaro tied for the team lead with seven tackles apiece, with Vaccaro adding a sack.
- The victory gave New Orleans a 7-5 record against the Colts in the regular season, as well as their Super Bowl XLIV win over Indianapolis. The Saints have not lost a contest in Indianapolis since the franchise relocated from Baltimore

THE COACHES

Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** has posted a 136-83 overall record (.621), including an 8-6 postseason mark after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival in 2006. Payton holds both the club's top victory total and winning percentage. Payton is tied for 26th all-time in NFL record books in victories with Hank Stram, ranked fifth among active head coaches. He continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured head coach within the division, but also among the most accomplished within the NFL. Only the Patriots' Bill Belichick (2000) has been with the his team longer than Payton's 14 seasons in New Orleans. Payton is also one of just seven active NFL head coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory. The others are Belichick, the Seahawks' Pete Carroll, the Raiders' Jon Gruden (Tampa Bay in 2002), the Ravens' John Harbaugh, the Eagles' Doug Pederson and the Steelers' Mike Tomlin. The 2018 Saints edition posted a 13-3 regular season record, secured the NFC's number one seed for the postseason and advanced to the NFC Championship for the third time. A franchise-record five players were selected to the AP All-Pro team and a club-best eight members of the team were named to the Pro Bowl. New Orleans' ten-game winning streak was the second-longest in club history and the longest run of consecutive victories in the NFL in 2018. The streak only sits behind in club record books, New Orleans' 13-0 start under Payton in 2009, the season when they captured Super Bowl XLIV. New Orleans ranked third in the NFL in points per game, eighth in total offense and sixth in rushing offense. A stingy run defense ranked second in both opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. The 2019 campaign has started with a 10-2 record for the Black and Gold, capturing their third consecutive NFC South title. Payton earned a bachelor's degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, at the time the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in September of 2000 and had his jersey retired in a ceremony in September of 2010. He received an honorary doctorate from his alma mater in 2013. Payton was born December 29, 1963 in San Mateo, California, and was raised in Naperville, Illinois, Payton has a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor.

Frank Reich was named head coach of the Colts on Feb. 11, 2018. He has 27 years of NFL experience as a player (1985-1998) and coach (2006-). In his first season as head coach, Reich led the Colts to a 10-6 regular season record, including one postseason win and an appearance in the AFC Divisional Round. He became just the third head coach in team history to win a playoff game in his first season at the helm. After starting the season with

a 1-5 record, Indianapolis won nine of their final 10 regular season games to clinch the team's first postseason berth since 2014. The Colts became the third team in NFL history to start a season 1-5 and make it to the playoffs, and just the second to win a playoff game. Reich previously served as offensive coordinator for the Philadelphia Eagles (2016-17) and was instrumental in the team's Super Bowl LII championship. He also coached for the Chargers (2013-15), Cardinals (2012) and Colts (2006-2011). Reich enjoyed a 14-year playing career with the Bills, Panthers, Jets and Lions after being selected by the Bills in the third round (57th overall) of the 1985 NFL Draft. Including post-season play, he played in 129 career games (22 starts) and passed for 6,858 yards and 47 touchdowns. Reich is most notably known for engineering the greatest comeback in NFL history in the 1992 Wild Card Round playoff game against the Houston Oilers. Making his first post-season start in place of injured Jim Kelly, Reich led the Bills to a 41-38 overtime victory despite being down by 32 points early in the third quarter.

Background: Was quarterback at Maryland (1981-84), where he backed up Boomer Esiason before becoming a starter his senior year. That season, Reich rallied the Terrapins from a 31-0 deficit to defeat the Miami Hurricanes, 42-40. At the time, Maryland's victory over Miami marked the greatest comeback win in college football history and is now only second to Michigan State's 2006 35-point comeback over Northwestern.

SERIES HISTORY

The Saints lead the all-time series with the Indianapolis Colts, 7-5 in the regular season, while also picking up the 31-17 victory in Super Bowl XLIV. The two clubs first played in New Orleans' inaugural season in 1967, when the Colts were still based in Baltimore. The last ten contests have taken place since the Colts relocated to Indianapolis in 1984. Of the 11 regular contests between the two clubs, five have been decided by six points or less, with New Orleans winning four including escaping Lucas Oil Field Stadium with a 27-21 win on October 25, 2015. The Saints' longest winning streak in the series was a five-game stretch from 1986-2001. Including the Super Bowl XLIV victory, the Saints have won the last three contests, the last being the 2015 win, where New Orleans outrushed Indianapolis 183-75 and forced three turnovers that led to 14 points.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR

- If the Saints defeat the Colts tonight they would improve their 2019 mark to 11-3, giving them a season of at least 11 wins for the tenth time, the seventh time since **Sean Payton** became head coach in 2006. It would also be the second time in franchise history the club has had three consecutive 11-win seasons, joining 2009-11 period.
- A Saints win would improve New Orleans' all-time regular record against the Colts in the regular season to 8-5 and improve their home record to 5-2.
- Payton has a 2-1 regular season record against the Colts. With a win today, he would have a 3-1 record against them. He has a 1-0 home mark against Indianapolis, looking to improve to 2-0.
- With 136 career wins (regular season and postseason), Payton is tied with former Saints and Chiefs Head Coach **Hank Stram** for 26th all-time in NFL record books. With a win, he would move into sole possession of 26th.
- Facing Colts Head Coach **Frank Reich** for the first time as a head coach, a win, would make him the 64th coach Payton has a victory against and the 47th coach he has a winning mark against.
- A win tonight would even New Orleans' record on Monday Night Football up at 22-22 and improve their overall prime time record to 50-44.
- New Orleans has not given up 100 rushing yards to an individual player in 39 regular season and postseason contests, looking to extend the streak to 40.
- A Saints win would give New Orleans their 203rd home game victory in the regular season in franchise history, including home games played at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome, Tulane Stadium, San Antonio's Alamodome and London's Wembley Stadium. It would also improve the franchise's record in home contests, both regular season and postseason to 210-209-1.
- A New Orleans win would give the Saints a 6-2 regular season home record in 2019, giving them at least six home victories in three consecutive seasons for the first time in franchise history.
- The Saints currently have a streak of 285 regular season games without having been shut out, dating back to a 26-20 win at Tampa Bay on September 6, 2002, the longest running streak in the NFL and fourth overall, a streak that they will look to extend to 285 games tonight.
- QB **Drew Brees** will play in his 273rd career NFL game tonight, moving into a tie with K **Norm Johnson** for 23rd place on the NFL's all-time games played list.
- Brees currently has 537 touchdown passes, Patriots QB Tom Brady 536 and Peyton Manning the NFL's all-time leader at 539. Dependent on Brady's result against Cincinnati on Sunday, Brees currently needs two touchdown passes to tie Manning for the NFL record and three to surpass him. Also with three touchdown passes on Monday night, Brees would reach the mark for the 16th season. Both Brady (19 in 2019) and Manning have 16 seasons with 20 touchdown passes.
- LB **Demario Davis** has a team-best 95 tackles in 2019. With five more stops, he will have 100 for the third consecutive season, sixth overall in his eight-year NFL career.
- DE **Cameron Jordan** has 13.5 sacks in 2019, tied with LB **Charlie Clemons** (2001) and Jackson for the fifth-highest total in franchise history. With his next sack, he will take sole possession of fifth and become only the fourth Saint to have 14 sacks in a season, joining DT **La'Roi Glover** (17-2001), LB **Pat Swilling** (17-1991 and 16.5-1989) and DL **Wayne Martin** (15.5-1992). With his 142nd career appearance on Monday night, he would move into a tie with C **Joel Hilgenberg** for 18th on the club's all-time list. Combined with eight postseason appearances, it would be Jordan's 150th career appearance
- RB **Alvin Kamara** has 612 rushing yards and 462 receiving yards in 2019. With 38 receiving yards tonight, he would become the third player with at least 500 receiving yards and 500 rushing yards in each of his first three seasons, joining Abner Haynes (1960-62) and Herschel Walker (1986-88).
- Kamara needs needs three yards receiving to become the fourth NFL running back to have 2,000 yards rushing and 2,000 receiving in their first three seasons, joining Christian McCaffrey, Roger Craig and Herschel Walker.
- P **Thomas Morstead** will play in his 172nd career game, moving past Martin into sole possession of eighth place on the club's all-time games played list.
- WR **Michael Thomas** has an NFL-best 121 receptions. With five grabs, he will surpass his 2018 career-high and franchise-record and also what is the NFL's fifth-highest total. With nine grabs, he would surpass Antonio Brown's total of 129 in 2014 for the league's fourth-highest total.
- Thomas is tied for the league record with seven games of at least ten receptions in a season with Andre Johnson (2008) and Wes Welker (2009). With ten grabs tonight, he would become the only player with eight 10-reception games in a season.
- S **Marcus Williams** has a team-leading four interceptions this season as well as in his rookie season. With one pick today, he would set a new career-high.
