



#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

"Where were you on September 11th?"
This simple question has become one of the single most important statements of our generation, and one whose effects haven't been equally felt since the attack on Pearl Harbor 70 years ago.



As engineers, we pride ourselves in our ability to learn from failures and to use the wisdom that can be gained

from them to better ensure the safety, health, and welfare of the public. Shortly following the disaster, the National Institute for Standards and Technology (NIST) was appointed to begin a three year study into the structural failure of the buildings that collapsed that morning in order to ensure that engineers would be able to learn from this failure. Among other things, NIST attempted to answer some of the questions that had started surfacing such as: What factors contributed to the collapse of each building? Were there flaws in the fireproofing or the structural system of each building? Can anything be done to building designs of the future to prevent such a catastrophic failure




from happening again? In commemoration of the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the September 11<sup>th</sup> attacks, ASCE Richmond is proud to host Dr. Therese McAllister PE, Co-Project Leader for NIST's investigation into the collapse of the World Trade Center buildings 1, 2, and 7 at a special branch meeting later this month.

While the events of 9/11 were tragic, the results from NIST's investigation will ideally enable engineers to learn from this once-in-a-lifetime event so that we can continue to improve the safety of buildings and structures in the future. We are so honored to host Dr. McAllister at this event, and we look forward to seeing you on September 20<sup>th</sup> on this very special occasion.

# The Collapse of the WTC Buildings: Why and How They Failed

#### Therese McAllister, PhD PE

Research Structural Engineer for NIST and Co-Project leader for the Structural Failure Analysis of the WTC

The collapse of New York City's World Trade Center structures following the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001 was the worst building disaster in recorded history. In response to the WTC tragedy, the National Institute of Standards and Technology conducted a building and fire safety investigation to study the factors contributing to the probable cause (or causes) of post-impact collapse of the WTC Towers (WTC 1 and 2) and WTC 7.

Highlights of the investigation into the probable cause of collapse for the WTC Towers will be presented, followed by a brief summary of the WTC 7 collapse sequence and recommendations for future practice, codes, and standards.

#### GOVERNOR McDonnell Signs Environmental Stewardship Legislation

Legislation signed includes measures to regulate the use of certain fertilizers, allow agricultural land to be deemed in full compliance with its total maximum daily load allocation (TMDL) upon implementation and maintenance of a resource management plan, and authorize the Secretary of Natural Resources to study the expansion of the Chesapeake Bay Watershed Nutrient Credit Exchange Program.

Speaking about the legislation, Governor McDonnell remarked, "Agriculture is the largest industry in Virginia, generating an annual economic impact of \$55 billion and providing more than 357,000 jobs across the Commonwealth. It is essential that we continue to implement environmentally sound measures that ensure this industry will grow and thrive, while simultaneously working towards enhancing water quality in the Chesapeake Bay and Virginia's other watersheds. The eight pieces of legislation signed today are a positive step in that direction."

#### Legislation Signed August 11, 2011

SB1055 (Stuart)/HB1831 (E.Scott) - Fertilizer; regulation of application and labeling.

- Prohibits the sale, distribution and use of lawn maintenance fertilizer
  containing phosphorus beginning December 31, 2013. Additionally, this
  legislation requires golf courses to implement nutrient management
  plans by 2017 and also requires the Virginia Department of Agriculture
  and Consumer Services to establish reporting requirements for
  contractor-applicators and licensees who apply lawn fertilizer to more
  than 100 acres of nonagricultural lands annually.
- Prohibits the sale of deicing agents containing urea, nitrogen or phosphorous intended for application on paved surfaces.

HB1830 (E. Scott) - Resource management plans; effect of implementation, exclusions.

 Allows farmers who develop and maintain agriculture resource management plans to be deemed as being in full compliance with any load allocation contained in a TMDL and any state water quality requirements for nutrient and sediment.

SB990 (Stuart)/ HB2057 (Poindexter) - Virginia Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (VDACS); regulation of fertilizer, penalties.

 Revises the laws governing the manufacture and application of fertilizer to, among other things: (i) incorporate by reference the guidelines adopted by the Association of American Plant Food Control Officials, (ii) adopt precautionary labeling guidelines to prevent fertilizer runoff into

waterways, (, (iii) require distributors of commercial fertilizer to submit an annual statistical report to the VDACS Commissioner regarding the amounts and localities of distributed product, (iv) authorize the VDACS Board to impose civil penalties for the violation of a written stop sale, and (v) allow the imposition of late fees for failing to obtain or renew a registration, license, or permit..

### SJ334 (Whipple) - Chesapeake Bay Watershed Nutrient Credit Exchange Program; Secretary of Natural Resources to study.

 Requests that the Secretary of Natural Resources study the expansion of the Chesapeake Bay Watershed Nutrient Credit Exchange Program, ensuring that the stakeholder committee has representatives from local government, state government, environmental organizations, nutrient source sectors identified in the Bay TMDL, and private sector interests experienced in nutrient credits and trading.

### SB1441 (Obenshain)/ HB2486 (J. Cox) - Impaired waters; requires plan developed and implemented to restore waters be controlling.

 Requires that the plan developed and implemented to restore impaired waters be controlling unless it is amended or withdrawn by the State Water Control Board.


