Shopping for Clothing in a NEW England Town 1750 - 1900

Plan a visit now! The Museum's newest exhibition, Fresh Goods: Shopping for Clothing in a New England Town, 1750-1900, whose title was drawn from an 1818 ad for the Concord dry goods shop of Josiah Davis, is on view until July 8. A runway-ready selection of historic clothing from the Museum's rarely-exhibited collection is displayed together with accessories — shoes, hats, purses, and fans. The dry goods shops of Concord center, where fabrics for many of the outfits were purchased, are also explored through a variety of objects imported from across the globe. Material culture historians Jane and Richard Nylander served as Consulting Curators, while Astrida Schaeffer of SchaefferArts created and dressed the forms. Fresh Goods is part of the MassFashion

JOHN M. FERRELL IS NEW INTERIM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

On March 1, 2018, John M. Ferrell started as Interim Executive Director of the Concord Museum. This comes after the successful seven-year tenure of Executive Director Margaret R. (Peggy) Burke, who retired on February 28, 2018.

John joined the Museum's Board of Governors in 2010 and became Vice President in 2011. He has served as a member and chair of the Development Committee, member of the Nominating Committee, and is the current chair of the Building Committee. John will oversee the Museum's operations and the building of the new Education Center.

Prior to the Concord Museum, John was President and CEO of the YMCA of Greater Boston, a position he held for seventeen years.

Ralph Earle, Vice President of the Board of Governors and Chair of the Search Committee is working with the New York firm Phillips Oppenheim in the search for a new Executive Director.

EDUCATION & PROGRAMS: SPRINGING FORWARD

The great work continues in the Concord Museum education department, where we are currently balancing our schedule of spring programs for schools, families, and adults with our planning for the imminent opening of the new Education Center. In addition to our very busy calendar of events (see pages 4-5), including our annual Patriots' Day celebrations and an extensive array of programming related to *Fresh Goods*, we are also working with the New England Museum Association to offer a workshop on April 9 entitled "Caring For and Utilizing Textile Collections." The daylong workshop will bring staff from other museums in New England to the Museum to explore the *Fresh Goods* exhibition and develop real-world strategies for caring for and utilizing textiles in their collections.



Meanwhile, our school programs are currently in the midst of the busiest part of the season, with students from all over the region visiting the Museum every day from now until the end of the school year. We recently completed the first year of our highly successful outreach program on 19th century African American daily life in Concord, where we visited all of the 2nd grade classrooms in the Concord Public Schools — a continuation of our longstanding partnership with the district. This summer, we will be partnering with the Museum Institute for Teaching Science, Mass Audubon's Drumlin Farm Wildlife Sanctuary, and the Walden Woods Project, to conduct a summer institute entitled "Landscapes for Learning: A Natural Confluence of Science, Literacy, Mathematics and Place-based Pedagogy," where we will host teachers in grades 3-8 for a week of sessions designed to encourage inquiry-based learning that connects students in meaningful ways to their local environment.
