Course Description

This course is required for all accounting majors. An introduction to federal tax theory and practice as applied to business entities. The emphasis is on the examination of the role of taxation in society (legal, social, economic), procedural rules and their application, and tax planning techniques.

Prerequisite(s): ACCT 202

Course Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Explain the economic, social, equity and political considerations of tax law.
- Distinguish between the statutory, administrative and judicial sources of tax law to develop solutions to tax issues and report on conclusions.
- Apply statutory tax law to the concepts of gross income, realization and economic income and when to exclude an item from income.
- Identify ordinary, necessary and reasonable requirements for business expense deductions utilizing both the cash and accrual bases of accounting while applying Internal Revenue Code disallowance provisions.
- Differentiate between realized and recognized gains and losses.
- Calculate individual exemptions, itemized deductions, and standard deductions and choose the appropriate deductions.
- Prepare an individual, corporate and partnership tax return.

Program Learning Outcomes:

ACCT 311 is a key component of the Accounting and Professional Services major curriculum. Upon completion of the course, students will demonstrate an understanding of federal income tax law in the United States by explaining sources and rationale for tax law, distinguishing between economic and tax items of gross income, identifying requirements for business deductions and differentiating between realized and recognized gains and losses.

The five examinations will test the material as indicated in the calendar. These will be online tests consisting of approximately 25 multiple choice questions. The tests are timed and are limited to 45-55 minutes. All material covered in the text is open for possible testing on the examinations. The exam due dates are listed on the calendar. No late submissions are accepted.

Tax research is a fundamental skill in understanding taxation. This course is not designed to make you an expert at tax research; however, the two research assignments should provide you with familiarity of taxation questions and sources for obtaining answers. The tax research assignments are under assignments in Black Board. The due dates are listed in the calendar.

You will complete three tax returns as part of the course: an individual (1040), a regular corporation (1120) and a partnership (1065). Accurate reporting of activities utilizing the government forms is also a fundamental skill in taxation. The cases are provided under assignments in Black Board. The due dates are listed in the calendar.

Cengage NOW assignments consist of a required study tool for each chapter worth 5 points and homework assignments for each chapter also worth 5 points. The due dates are listed under the calendar and in Cengage NOW. Click on the Cengage Tab to access obtain the access to our class.
