Introduction: Sometimes, "Perception is Everything!"

- What we think people "think of us" determines how we respond to them.
- How we think about <u>God</u> determines how we respond to God.

The importance of our study:

"What comes into our minds when we think about God is the most important thing about us.

The history of mankind will probably show that no people has ever risen above its religion, and man's spiritual history will positively demonstrate that no religion has ever been greater than its idea of God. Worship is pure or base as the worshiper entertains high or low thoughts of God.

For this reason the gravest question before the Church is always God Himself, and the most portentous fact about any man is not what he at a given time may say or do, but what he in his deep heart conceives God to be like. **We tend by a secret law of the soul to move toward our mental image of God.** This is true not only of the individual Christian, but of the company of Christians that composes the Church."

Defining "The Goodness of God"

• Revealed to Moses Exodus 33:19; 34:5-7

Moses' <u>Request</u> = "Show me Your glory" Exodus 33:18

"Within the cluster of God's moral perfections there is one in particular to which the term 'goodness' points – the quality which God specially singled out from the whole when proclaiming 'all his goodness' to Moses, He spoke of Himself as 'abundant in goodness and truth' (Exodus 34:6)."

"This is the quality of generosity. Generosity means a disposition to give to others in a way which has no mercenary motive and is not limited by what the recipients deserve, but consistently goes beyond it. Generosity expresses the simple wish that others should have what they need to make them happy. Generosity is, so to speak, the focal point of God's moral perfection; it is the quality which determines how all God's other excellences are to be displayed."

"The goodness of God is that which disposes Him to be kind, cordial, benevolent, and full of good will toward men. He is tenderhearted and of quick sympathy, and His unfailing attitude toward all moral beings is open, frank, and friendly. By His nature He is inclined to bestow blessedness and He takes holy pleasure in the happiness of His people."

Defining the sovereignty of God:

- Sovereign = adj. (1) above or superior to all others; chief; greatest; supreme (2) supreme in power, rank, or authority (3) of or holding the position of ruler; royal; reigning (4) independent of all others (5) excellent; outstanding n. (1) a person who possesses sovereign authority or power; specific, a monarch or ruler
- Synonymous Meaning = ruler, ultimate authority, "in control," King of kings, Lord of lords, without equal, without limitation in any way, the only <u>absolutely free</u> being in the universe.

"God's sovereignty is the attribute by which He rules His entire creation, and to be sovereign God must be all-knowing, all-powerful, and absolutely free. The reasons are these:

"Were there even one datum of knowledge, however small, unknown to God, His rule would break down at that point. To be Lord over all the creation, He must possess all knowledge. And were God lacking one infinitesimal modicum of power, that lack would end His reign and undo His kingdom; that one stray atom of power would belong to someone else and God would be a limited ruler and hence not sovereign.

Furthermore, His sovereignty requires that He be absolutely free, which means simply that He must be free to do whatever He wills to do anywhere at any time to carry out His eternal purpose in every single detail without interference. Were He less than free He must be less than sovereign."

<u>Application</u> = Absolute <u>surrender</u> of all you are and all you have!

• <u>Believe</u> all that comes into your life is either allowed or decreed by a good God who will use it for your benefit.

<u>Application</u> = Absolutely refuse to <u>worry!</u>

 <u>Behold</u> in awe the mystery and majesty of His kind, compassionate, just, and sovereign rule of all that is or will ever be.

Defining the Holiness of God:

 Root Word = to divide, to mark off, to set apart from all else; it's the opposite of <u>profane</u> – or to be common or ordinary – to be holy is to be <u>different</u>, <u>distinct</u>, or <u>unique</u> from the common or ordinary.



The Holiness of God is that which divides Him from everyone and everything else.
 It is the quality of God being different, distinct, unique – one of a kind.

Who among the gods is like you, O LORD?
Who is like you-majestic in holiness,
awesome in glory,
working wonders?

Exodus 15:11 (NIV)

• God's Holiness refers to both His <u>majesty</u> and <u>moral purity</u>. Holiness is the absolute absence of evil (1 John 1:5) and encompasses and defines all that is pure, whole, righteous, and healthy in the universe.

"We know nothing like the divine holiness. It stands apart, unique, unapproachable, incomprehensible and unattainable. The natural man is blind to it. He may fear God's power and admire His wisdom, but His holiness he cannot even imagine."

<u>Introduction</u>: What a <u>difference</u> it would make in life's <u>most difficult</u> times if we could believe that God is "<u>all wise</u>!"

"To believe actively that our Heavenly Father constantly spreads around us providential circumstances that work for our present good and our everlasting well-being brings to the soul a veritable benediction.

Most of us go through life praying a little, planning a little, jockeying for position, hoping but never being quite certain of anything, and always secretly afraid that we will miss the way. This is a tragic waste of truth and never gives rest to the heart.

There is a better way. It is to repudiate our own wisdom and take instead the infinite wisdom of God. Our insistence upon seeing ahead is natural enough, but it is a real hindrance to our spiritual progress.

God has charged Himself with full responsibility for our eternal happiness and stands ready to take over the management of our lives the moment we turn in faith to Him."

Defining the wisdom of God:

- <u>Definition</u> = "that attribute of God whereby He produces the <u>best possible results</u> by the best possible means" Berkhof
- <u>Definition</u> = "the quality of being wise; power of judging rightly and following the soundest course of action based on knowledge, experience, and understanding." Root words – 'to see, to know' - Websters

"Now to the King eternal, immortal, invisible, the only God, be honor and glory for ever and ever. Amen."

"Oh, the depth of the riches of the wisdom and knowledge of God! How unsearchable his judgments, and his paths beyond tracing out!"

"In the Holy Scriptures wisdom, when used of God and good men, always carries a strong moral connotation. It is conceived as being pure, loving, and good . . .

Wisdom, among other things, is **the ability to devise perfect ends and to achieve those ends by the most perfect means**. It sees the end from the beginning, so there can be no need to guess or conjecture. Wisdom sees everything in focus, each in proper relation to all, and is thus able to work toward predestined goals with flawless precision.

All God's acts are done in perfect wisdom, first for His own glory, and then for the highest good of the greatest number for the longest time. And all His acts are as pure as they are wise, and as good as they are wise and pure. Not only could His acts not be better done: a better way to do them could not be imagined."

Defining "The Justice of God"

• Revealed through Abraham

Genesis 18:25 (NIV)

"Far be it from you to do such a thing--to kill the righteous with the wicked, treating the righteous and the wicked alike. Far be it from you! Will not the Judge of all the earth do right?"

Revealed through the Psalmist

Psalm 97:2 (NIV)

"Clouds and thick darkness surround him; righteousness and justice are the foundation of his throne."

"Justice embodies the idea of moral equity, and iniquity is the exact opposite; it is *in*-equity, the absence of equality from human thoughts and acts. Judgment is the application of equity to moral situations and may be favorable or unfavorable according to whether the one under examination has been equitable or inequitable in heart and conduct."

A. W. Tozer, *Knowledge of the Holy*

"... it becomes clear that the Bible's proclamation of God's work as Judge is part of its witness to His character ... It shows us also that the heart of the justice which expresses God's nature is retribution, the rendering to men, what they have deserved; for this is the essence of the judge's task. To reward good with good, and evil with evil, is natural to God. So, when the New Testament speaks of the final judgment, it always represents it in terms of retribution. God will judge all men, it says, 'according to their works' (Matthew 16:27; Revelation 20:12f)."

Introduction: What's the source of your hope?

- Three Observations about the Human Species:
 - 1. We all depend on something or someone to "hold us up" inside.
 - 2. When that <u>something</u> or <u>someone</u> is "coming through for us" we experience a sense of peace, satisfaction, and optimism about the future.
 - 3. When that <u>something</u> or <u>someone</u> "fails to come through for us" we experience a sense of anxiety, dissatisfaction, and ultimately despair.
- Conclusion: It seems that the secret to a life of unending joy and peace is to find something or someone who will "come through for you" 100% of the time in any and every situation forever.
- The Solution: Lamentations 3:21-24



Defining "The Faithfulness of God"

- **Definition** = "Steadfast in affection or allegiance (loyal), firm in adherence to promises or in observance of duty (conscientious), given with strong assurance (binding), true to the facts, to a standard (constant)." Websters
- **Synonyms** Dependable, trustworthy, loyal, staunch, resolute, constant, reliable, true to one's word, keeps one's promises, true to and consistent to one's character, someone "who comes through for you."
- Why Is God Able to Be Faithful 100% of the Time?
 - 1. He is <u>all-knowing</u> He is never caught off guard. Romans 11:33-36
 - 2. He is <u>all-powerful</u> He never encounters anything or anyone who can thwart His plans or purposes.
 - 3. He is holy He is pure, honest, full of integrity, unable to lie, and therefore, is always consistent with His character and His Word. Isaiah 6:1-6
 - He is <u>eternal</u> He is not affected by space or time; He knows the end from the beginning. Psalm 90:2
 - 5. He is <u>omnipresent</u> Nothing can happen outside the sphere of His influence.

 Psalm 139:7-11
 - 6. He is <u>immutable</u> He never changes; is never different then He is now, He is never in a bad mood, and never has a bad day. Malachi 3:6, Hebrews 13:8

"All of God's acts are consistent with all of His attributes. No attribute contradicts any other, but all harmonize and blend into each other in the infinite abyss of the Godhead. . . God, being who He is, cannot cease to be what He is, and He is at once faithful and immutable, so all His words and acts must be and must remain faithful."

Introduction - Three facts about love

- Fact #1: It's a Universal Need = We are all looking for love!
- Fact #2: There's a <u>Universal Solution</u> = God loves all people everywhere and longs to meet the deepest needs of their heart for love!
- **Fact #3**: There's a <u>Tragic Disconnection</u> = Nevertheless, most people remain starved for love for three primary reasons:
 - 1. They don't know God loves them.
 - 2. They know of God's love, but have not received it.
 - 3. They have received God's love, but don't know how to experience it in daily life.

"Over the years, I have come to realize that the greatest trap in our life is not success, popularity, or power, but self-rejection. Success, popularity, and power can indeed present a great temptation, but their seductive quality often comes from the way they are part of the much larger temptation to self-rejection. Defining "The Love of God"

- Definition God's love is His holy disposition toward all that He has created that compels Him to express unconditional affection and selective correction to provide the highest and best quality of existence both now and forever for the objects of His love.
- Characteristics of God's agape love include:

• It is a giving love John 3:16

• It is a <u>sacrificial</u> love John 3:16

• It is an unconditional love John 3:16

• It is a <u>boundless</u> love Ephesians 3:14-21

 God's love is expressed primarily through His goodness, mercy, longsuffering, and grace.

Ryrie's Basic Theology, pg. 44

- God's love for you means . . .
 - 1. His thoughts, intentions, desires, and plans for you are always for your good and never for your harm.
 - 2. He is kind, open, approachable, frank, and eager to be your friend.
 - 3. He emotionally identifies with your pain, joy, hopes, and dreams and has chosen to allow your happiness to affect His own.
 - 4. He takes pleasure in you just for who you are totally apart from your performance and/or accomplishments.
 - 5. He is actively and creatively orchestrating people, circumstances, and events to express His affection and selective correction to provide for your highest good.



God reveals His love to us through . . .

Creation - He made you for Himself. Genesis 1:26-27, Colossians 1:16

Providence - He shows His kindness to all. Matthew 5:44-45, Acts 17:24-27

<u>Incarnation</u> - He is proactively <u>pursuing</u> you. Luke 19:10, John 4:23-24

Discipline - He chastises us to protect us from self-destructive behavior.

Hebrews 12:6

Holy Spirit - He supernaturally pours His love into our hearts by the Holy Spirit.

Romans 5:5

Son - Jesus revealed the nature of God's love for us.

- Jesus' **life** modeled compassion, grace, and truth
- John 1:14

Jesus' **teaching** explained God's love

- Luke 15
- Jesus' death demonstrated the extent of God's love
 1 John 3:16, Romans 5:8

3. We must bestow it by faith through our wills.
