The schedule consists of eight periods. Each period is 45 minutes long with a 10-minute break in between except for courses with multiple periods. See Schedule inside this packet.

Please have cell phones turned off and blue tooth put away for all sessions except for Lunch Break as a courtesy. A Scout is Courteous.

There will be a 40-minute lunch break. **We will offer a \$7 lunch for those who pre-order it.** This is optional as you may pack your own lunch or make other arrangements. A Subway Boxed Lunch consists of a sandwich, a cookie, a bag of chips and either a soda or water. There is a **\$2 early bird discount if pre-registered and paid for by Monday February 25th.**

- **Training Session Registration:** Please pre-register by completing the online registration form on the Iroquois Trail Council website www.itcbsa.org. Easy, simple and quick to use, it is designed to take you approximately 5 minutes to complete. You will pick your courses from a drop-down menu for each period. You can even make your lunch selection on the same form. However, both course registration and lunch selection must be done at the same time prior to your submission. Upon submission, you will receive date/time stamped confirmation to your email account.
- **Payment:** Please send payment separately to the Batavia Scout Shop using the form at the end of this information packet. Participants may pay by check or via credit/debit card with a required signature. The enclosed payment form, last page of the packet, may be mailed or faxed in (do not mail cash) to the council office.

Note to Units: If a Unit plans to pay for their Scouters' registrations/lunches, all payment forms must be accompanied together along with a unit check. Deadline dates still apply.

As always, the event is free for AoL Parents who are non-registered with Boy Scouts of America. We encourage them to take all courses in the AoL to Troop Parent track. A day of learning goes a long way! We highly advise all Pack units to let their parents know about this amazing opportunity.

Child care **will not** be available. All registered leaders and youth are asked to please wear their full Boy Scout uniform (neckerchief is optional). Casual dress is appropriate for AoL Parents.

Changes for 2019 University of Scouting:

Train the Trainer – now 1 ½ periods

Retention – now focuses more on Cub Scout level

Marketing Your Scout Program changed to Amazing, Astonishing, Awesome!!!

Please note the color keys for certain Youth level in the schedule. This is for the Youth to know which courses are applicable for them to take.

First Aid / CPR:

Course requires a \$5 fee in addition to the Registration fee. The fee is a pass through to Emergency Care Safety Institute (ECSI). This covers the cost of certification card and is valid for 2 years from the date of training.

Refresher course for Adult Leaders of all levels. Leaders must have taken it previously from any certifying agency. Meets a pre-requisite requirement for the Wilderness First Aid course.

Venture youth are now allowed to take this. The caveat is they must be at least 15 years old. This offers the opportunity for youth prepared to go on to a more advanced course, Wilderness First Aid. Highly recommended for units that are engaged in outdoor adventure activities.

102	Cub Scout Tiger / Wolf / Bear Den Leader Specific	Required training for all Den Leaders. Learn all the new updates to give your Scouts a fantastic program.
103	Cub Scout Webelos Den Leader Specific	Required training for Webelos Leaders to give their Webelos a Quality program. Keep abreast of all the new updates. Key time to help Webelos to prepare their transition to Troop program.

111	Spring Recruitment	More Cubs equals More FUN! Recruitment is a vital lifeline of every Cub Scout Pack. This course is designed to give you tools on how to effectively plan, prepare and recruit new scouts.
112	Putting OUTing in Scouting	What is Scouting without outdoor experiences?! The outdoors opens unimaginable opportunities for Cub Scouts. Get them to catch the outdoor bug at an early age. When they get to the Troop level, they will want more!

418	Youth Protection Training (YPT)	Required BSA training for ALL volunteers! Can take YPT in lieu of online training. Take advantage of asking questions and any interactive discussions that will likely take place. This is a 1 1/2 hour course. Please plan to stay till 5pm.
419	Merit Badge Counseling	Always have a desire to be a Counselor based on your expertise or profession? Get trained to learn what it takes to be one. Later part of course will you have fill out paperwork and standard adult application. Do bring your BSA ID and copy of your latest YPT.
420	Sexual Harassment	We will discuss how to prevent and handle claims of sexual harassment within your unit. As the Family Scouting movement grows this will be good training to mitigate risk and ensure high-character behavior within your organization.
421	Team Building Games	Learn to have fun and teach at the same time! Learn games that will help bring your leaders together as a team. Adults and Youth are encouraged to take this fun packed and educational course.
