Editorial: **A renaissance in competitive angling** Women reeling in their place in history

There isn't much text written throughout history about women participating in competitive sports likely due the fact that competitive sports are generally thought to be the *a man's world* - and angling, like other sports were - and continue to be - mostly dominated by men. However, there have been a few books written to contradict this way of thinking that easily go back more than four centuries. The most famous of these books is a 15th century book entitled "Treatyse of fysshynge wyth an Angle" which is believed to be the first book ever written on angling where a woman is credited as being the author.

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Many women as far back as the Victorian era took to a rod and reel as a means of becoming closer with nature where they could exercise some level of authority and self-control without losing the respectable demeanor which women were expected to maintain. As for women taking to the open water and captaining a vessel, history records Queen Teuta of Illyria as captain of her own pirate ship in 231 BC.

So why haven't we heard more about all these prominent women who carved their own paths throughout history? My research has led me to a two-fold supposition; first, their success stories just never make it into the history books and were omitted or overshadowed by the accomplishments of the men of the era, and second - and as equally as important, women have been conditioned to be the 'good wife / good girl' and not stir the waters. Nevertheless, ease your minds ladies, this is not the case anymore. Women in competitive angling are carving out their own way in the sport right alongside of their male counter-parts whether it be solo or as co-anglers. There are several bass angling organizations dedicated to women anglers and at the top of that list is the Ladies Bass Anglers Association - and as far as making their mark, in 1991 Vojai Reed ripped open the gender barrier by competing in the B.A.S.S. Missouri Invitational and in 2009 Kim Bayne-Moore became the first woman to compete in the Bass Masters Classic.

Here in Northeast Pennsylvania there are many opportunities for women anglers whether it be fun fishing or competitive fishing and the health benefits of the sport are numerous and extremely beneficial as fishing can be an excellent cardio workout, reduce stress, aid in relaxation and can even promote clarity and focus, help with memory, and allows for the opportunity to enjoy nature and all that nature has to offer.

If you are concerned that you are not as limber and able to move around as you used to be, there are many ways to enjoy the sport while doing so within your individual limitations. As a disabled Air Force veteran, my mobility after many surgeries is limited, so we sought to find ways to successfully work around those limitations and you can to. For example, we set up tackle boxes in the back of the boat where I fish from. This allows me to enjoy a day or night out on the water without having to go back and forth to the main tackle lockers and reduces the fear of my mobility limitations dampening the fun.

There are even organizations dedicated to helping those with disabilities get out and enjoy a day of fishing and there are even local fishing clubs that will occasion-

ally host a tournament that will benefit charitable organizations such as; fishing for wishes [should you wish to take your love for the sport towards a more charitable focus]. There is also a local fishing club [the Deaf Anglers] which focuses on deaf anglers but welcomes everyone and a UK based organization called; Reels on Wheels who helps those in wheelchairs get out for a day of fishing. Focused on disabled veterans is the Reel American Heroes Foundation who has been repeatedly recognized as a Top Non-Profit Veteran's Foundation and if you want something more women focused there are organizations such as; Women

Amongst the many benefits of fishing, there's still one more added bonus, in a time where everyone is in a rush, worried about balancing home and family, stressed over finances, or just trying to balance too many things - a day out on the water can provide a much-needed mental getaway. Did you know?

- Bass lack eyelids and their iris is fixed, so bass cannot adjust the amount of light reaching the retina (the layer of photoreceptor nerve cells in the back of the eye). BUT, bright light does not hurt their eyes. The amount of light reaching the photoreceptor cells is regulated by the amount of dark pigment in the cells surrounding the photoreceptors.
- Largemouth bass prefer temperatures of 82 to 84 degrees Fahrenheit, smallmouth a couple degrees cooler. But what does prefer mean? Everything else being equal, this is the temperature they occupy if available. However, bass function quite well from 39 to 90 degrees Fahrenheit.
- Bass consume less food in cold water, but they still feed.
- It's always a good idea to try a slow retrieve, even dead-stick a lure, to entice a strike in cold water; but it's not because a bass can't catch a fastmoving bait. There isn't a reel made that can burn a lipless crankbait faster than a bass can swim, even in cold water.
- bass are also very adept at finding

- forage in dark water. The forage is probably detected by the lateral line system, which detects water movement and pressure. Although less conspicuous than the lateral line on the side of the fish, the lateral line system is especially well developed on the head of the fish. These "head canals" enable the bass to detect objects in front of the fish. Want evidence for the head canals? Look on the underside of the bass' lower jaw -- the rows of pores on each side of the jaw open into the lateral line system.
- Water temperature, not moon phase, triggers spawning. Hatchery managers who make a living spawning bass report bass spawning on all moon phases. Peak spawning occurs when water temperature is 64 to 68 degrees Fahrenheit. Keep in mind that the water temperature that sends the bass to the beds is the temperature where the pre-spawn bass hang out, not the temperature in a shallow, dark-bottom spawning pocket.
- Flow can turn on the bite in tidal waters and hydropower reservoirs with periodic current. But loads of bass are caught in lakes and ponds where they never see flowing water. Bass get active when the forage gets active.

Little lures catch big bass and big lures catch little bass. In feeding studies where bass were offered a range of forage fish sizes from small up to the maximum size they could eat, the bass always selected forage fish near the center of the size range. How big a forage fish can a bass eat? Largemouth can easily swallow a forage fish up to one-third its length. A smallmouth can slurp up a forage fish that is one-fourth of its length.

And what about those well known folktales of a town beneath the lake? Myth or Fact? It is in fact TRUE! The town of Wilsonville sits on the lake floor near the dam.


And just in case you were curious, the name Lake Wallenpaupack is a Lenni-Lenape Indian name meaning "The Stream of Swift and Slow Water."




