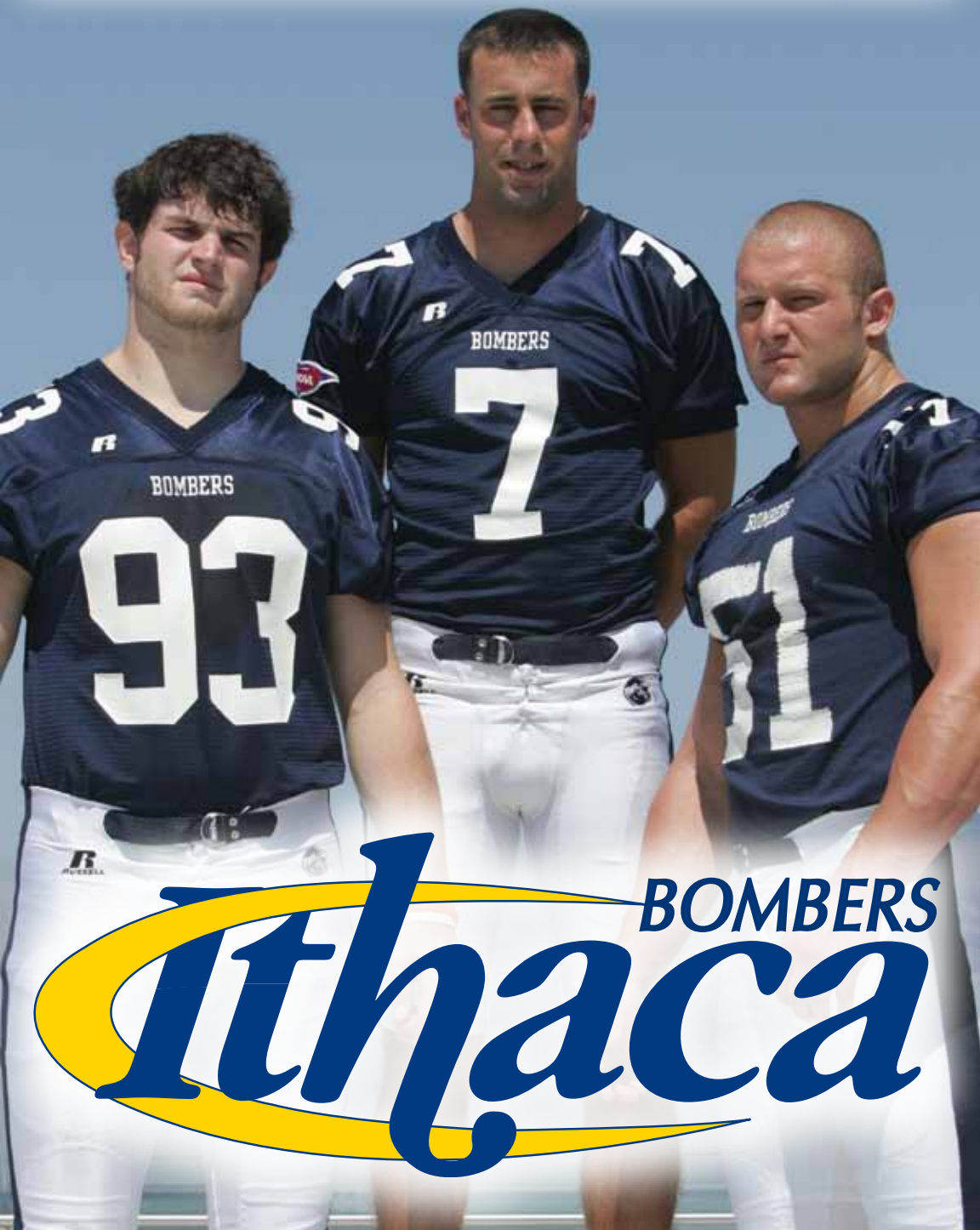

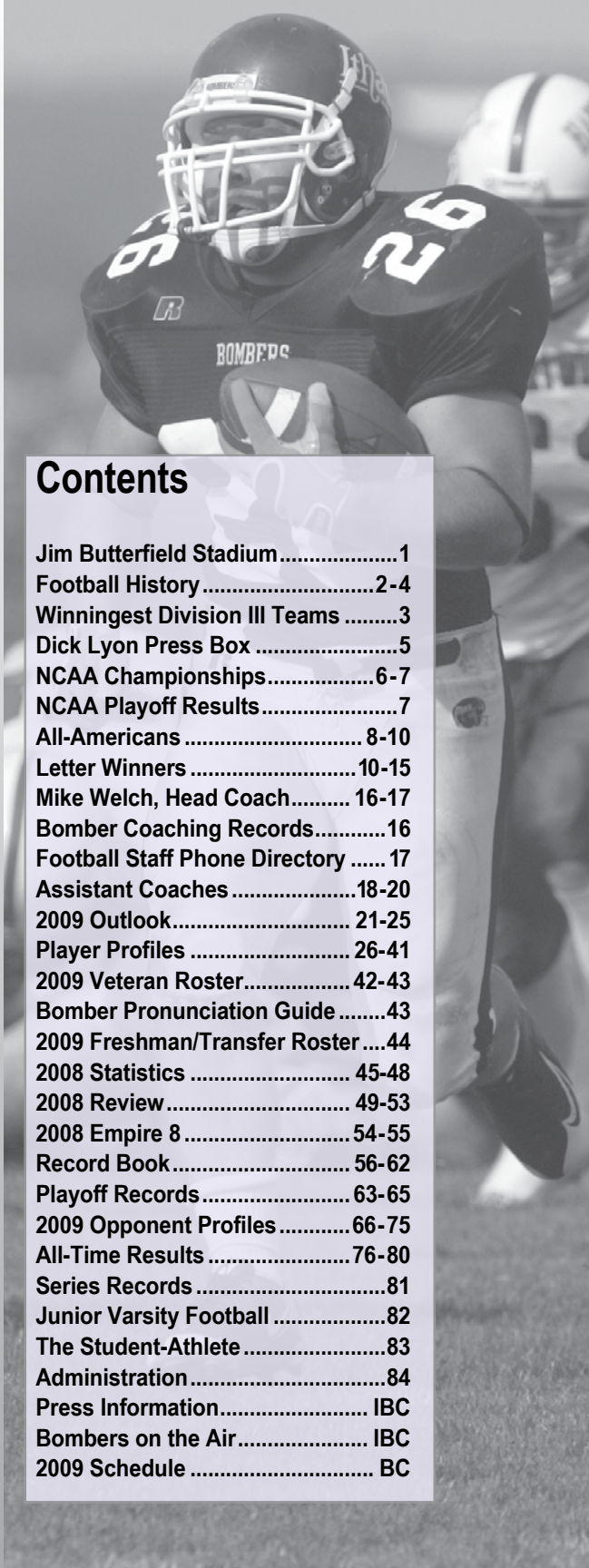

On September 19, 1992, before a crowd of 4,417 fans, which included former players and then-NCAA executive director **Dick Schultz**, South Hill Field was renamed Jim Butterfield Stadium. The move by the Ithaca College Board of Trustees placed the name most associated with the school's football program on the facility. **Butterfield** joined Grambling's **Eddie Robinson** and **Roy Kidd** of Eastern Kentucky as college football's only active coaches to have their home field named for them.

Recognized as one of the top natural-grass facilities in Division III football, Butterfield Stadium has seating capacity for approximately 5,000 spectators, although crowds of more than 10,000 fans have attended games there—including a facility-record 12,620 for the 2001 Cortland game.

The original stadium was completed in the summer of 1958. On September 27, 1958, Ithaca hosted East Stroudsburg in the first regular-season game on South Hill Field. Trailing 6-0 at halftime, Ithaca rallied behind an **Al Cain** five-yard touchdown run and a scoring pass from **Bob Ryan** to future Ithaca College Athletic Hall of Fame member **Dick Carmean**. The Bombers' 14-6 win snapped a streak of eight consecutive losses to the Warriors.

Ithaca has posted undefeated home records 15 times since 1958. Since the NCAA adopted a three-division format in 1973, Ithaca has lost just 30 games at home, with 11 of those coming at the hands of Division II opponents. Ithaca is 13-6 in NCAA playoff games at the facility and 2-1 in ECAC postseason competition.

The Bombers have won over 80 percent of their Butterfield Stadium/South Hill Field games. In 1998 the Bombers celebrated their 200th game at South Hill Field/Butterfield Stadium by beating St. Lawrence, 60-0. During coach **Jim Butterfield's** 27-season career, the team's home record was 117-25-1, a winning percentage of .822.

A 17-16 victory over Lycoming in the 2008 season-opener was the 200th Ithaca win at the stadium.

A number of improvements have been made since the facility was first used in 1958, including the latest renovation—a new scoreboard and message board installed in 2004. The press box, which was constructed in 1960, was renovated in 1985 and again in 1998. The track, resurfaced most recently in 1997, has played host to championships in the Independent College Athletic Conference, the Empire Athletic Association, the New York State Women's Collegiate Athletic Association and the Eastern College Athletic Conference.

One of the school's most successful athletic programs, the Ithaca football team also ranks among the top programs in the nation. The many highlights of Bomber football include:

- Three NCAA Division III football championships, a total surpassed only by Augustana and Mount Union.
- Seven appearances in the Division III national championship game, the Amos Alonzo Stagg Bowl.
- Totals of 41 playoff games and 27 wins (both among the Division III leaders).
- The fourth-best winning percentage in Division III (.660).
- Eight Lambert/Meadowlands Cups, presented to the top small-college program in the East each season; and nine Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) team of the year trophies.
- ECAC championships in 1984, 1996, 1998 and 2004.

Four years ago the Bombers recorded the program's 400th victory.

Ithaca's Division III teams have been guided by coach **Jim Butterfield**, a 1997 inductee into the College Football Hall of Fame, and current coach **Mike Welch**, a player and assistant coach under Butterfield.

Following **Butterfield's** retirement in 1993, **Welch** was named Ithaca's ninth head football coach. His first team finished the regular season with six consecutive wins to earn the program's 12th NCAA playoff berth. The Bombers posted playoff wins over Buffalo State (in overtime) and Plymouth State and nearly reached the Stagg Bowl, losing, 23-19, in the semifinals to Washing-

ton & Jefferson. Ithaca slipped to 5-4 in 1995 but was back in the postseason hunt again in 1996. The Bombers capped a 7-3 season with the ECAC Northeast championship, thanks to a 27-21 win at Worcester State. In 1997, a seven-game winning streak put Ithaca in the playoff race, but back-to-back losses by a total of eight points in the season's last two games knocked the Bombers out of postseason contention. The 1998 team won eight of 10 regular-season games, then routed Hartwick, 40-6, in the ECAC North championship. A year later Ithaca made its 17th postseason appearance, reaching the ECAC Northwest championship. In 2001 the Bombers made a run in the NCAA tournament for the second time under **Welch**. After a 9-1 regular season, the 2001 team traveled to Montclair State and Rensselaer to post two playoff wins. The Bombers then fell to Rowan to end the successful season. The 2003 season saw road wins over Brockport and Montclair State in the NCAA playoffs before a snowy loss at Rensselaer in the national quarterfinals. The 2005 team reached

the NCAA playoffs for the 15th time and the 2007 and 2008 teams reached the NCAA postseason as well.

When **Butterfield** arrived at Ithaca in 1967 for his first collegiate head coaching post, Ithaca's schedule included top teams like Lehigh, West Chester, and C.W. Post. His first seven seasons produced a 29-29 record, before the program took off in the 1974 season.

Ithaca won 10 straight games that season, scoring over 25 points in all but one of those games. An NCAA playoff win over Slippery Rock put Ithaca into its first Amos Alonzo Stagg Bowl, where the team lost to Central (Iowa), 10-8. Ithaca won the Division III team offense title that year, averaging 487.9 yards per game, a total topped by only four teams since. The Bombers were back in the national championship game a year later, posting 10 straight wins (five by shutout). In one of those shutouts, a 61-0 win over Springfield, Ithaca's defense set Division III records for fewest total yards allowed (minus 50) and fewest rushing yards allowed (minus 94). In the playoffs, the Bombers topped Fort Valley and Widener before



losing to Wittenberg, 28-0. All-Americans **Jerry Boyes**, a quarterback, and running back **Dave Remick** were mainstays on those first two Stagg Bowl teams.

Wittenberg again eliminated the Bombers from the postseason in 1978, a season that saw Ithaca lead Division III in rushing offense (averaging 320.1 yards per game). A year later the Bombers upset the three top seeds on the way to the school's first national championship in any sport. Linebacker **John Laper**, the school's career leader in tackles, and running back **Bob Ferrigno**, who tops the program in postseason rushing yards, were two of the top players on that team. The Bombers were back in the Stagg Bowl in 1980 and 1985, and reached the semifinals in 1986.

The 1988 season brought another national championship. The Bombers were 9-1 in the regular season, posted an overtime win over defending champion Wagner in a first-round playoff game, avenged their regular-season loss to Cortland in the second round and defeated Ferrum in the semifinals to earn a sixth Stagg Bowl visit. Ithaca's 39-24 win over Central gave the program its second national championship. The Bombers set four playoff records: most points (159), first downs (91), net yards rushing (1,377) and total offense (1,719 yards).

Two freshmen who played in the 1988 championship game—quarterback **Todd Wilkowski** and kicker **Matt Sullivan**—were back in the Stagg Bowl again in 1991. **Wilkowski** set a number of school passing records as a senior. After a week-four loss to Springfield put postseason hopes in jeopardy, **Wilkowski** (who was inducted into Ithaca's Athletic Hall of Fame in 2002) engineered two scoring drives in the final minutes the following week against American International en route to a 23-20 win. Ithaca won its remaining four regular-season games and then beat Glassboro State, Union and Susquehanna in the play-

offs to set up the Stagg Bowl return.

In the national championship game, **Wilkowski** passed for 262 yards and two touchdown passes and **Jeff Wittman** rushed for three touchdowns as Ithaca defeated Dayton, 34-20. Ithaca's 94 first downs and 1,867 yards in total offense were NCAA playoff records.

Ithaca made its 11th appearance in the NCAA postseason in 1992, but had its three-year streak broken in **Butterfield's** last year.

**Butterfield** was named Kodak Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association in 1988 and 1991, and earned District I honors from the same organization seven times: in 1974, from 1978-80, and again from 1984-86.

Following Ithaca's national championship seasons in 1979, 1988 and 1991, **Butterfield** was presented the Stan Lomax-Irving T. Marsh Award as Eastern coach of the year by the New York Football Writers Association. The 1988 season also brought him Division III coach of the year recognition from Chevrolet.

National recognition came to his players as well, with 85 of his Bombers winning 149 all-American spots.

Already a member of the Ithaca College Athletic Hall of Fame, **Butterfield** added to his long list of accomplishments in 1997 when he became the first member of the Bomber football program to earn induction into the College Football Hall of Fame.

Ithaca's football program began

in 1930, under coach **Leonard Schreck**. At that time, Ithaca played a five-game schedule that included freshman teams from St. Lawrence and Colgate, and varsity teams from Mansfield, Hartwick and Cortland.

Coach **Bucky Freeman** took over in 1931 and led the Bombers to their first winning season, a 3-2 mark. His 13-year tenure featured nine winning seasons. **Freeman** coached back **Ken Patrick**, who still ranks among the program's rushing leaders with 1,500 yards.

Football was discontinued from 1943-45. Between 1946 and 1957, **Pete Hatch**, **Joseph Hamilton** and **Art Orloske** served as Ithaca's head coaches.

The hiring of **Dick Lyon** in 1958 produced a resurgence in the program. On the heels of a 2-5 season, **Lyon's** first team posted a 6-1 record in 1958. That team, captained by lineman **John Fasolino**, a member of the Ithaca Athletic Hall of Fame, held the opposition to eight points or fewer in six of

seven games.

In 1959 an incentive was added to the already competitive Ithaca-Cortland rivalry. Team captains **Dick Carmean** from Ithaca and **Tom Decker** of Cortland joined to donate a traveling trophy, named the Cortaca Jug, to be presented to the winning team each year. Today the matchup is one of the most prominent in Division III. The last eight Cortaca Jug games held in Ithaca have attracted crowds of 9,500 or more.

Ithaca posted three straight 6-2 records from 1962-64. Among the standouts of the period were 1962 all-American running back **Bill O'Dell** and **Sam Curko**, a guard, linebacker and kicker who earned all-America honors in 1963. In 1965 the Bombers finished 8-0 for the program's first undefeated season. Quarterback **James Harris** passed for 1,269 yards and nine touchdowns that year.

**Lyon's** teams posted a winning record every season. In 1967 he joined the football staff at Army, opening the door for the arrival of **Butterfield**.

**A**t a special ceremony held in 1998, the press box at Butterfield Stadium was renamed the Dick Lyon Press Box in honor of the former Bomber coach. The ceremony, which was part of Ithaca's Homecoming Weekend festivities, also coincided with the 40th anniversary of the first football game played at the facility (formerly known as South Hill Field).

A group of coach Lyon's former players spearheaded a fund-raising drive that enabled the school to make improvements to the press box, which includes private coaching booths for both teams and broadcast facilities for up to four radio stations and ICTV.

Lyon's first year as head coach at Ithaca in 1958



also featured the team's move to South Hill Field. One of his team's early conditioning drills was to walk the length of the field picking up rocks on the new playing surface. Now known as Butterfield Stadium, the facility (including the Dick Lyon Press Box) is one of Division III's finest.

**PHENIX CITY, Ala.**—Quarterback **Doug Bencsko** passed for one touchdown and ran for another, and the Bomber defense limited top-ranked Wittenberg to just 10 points to secure Ithaca's first national championship.

The win marked the fourth time in five tries that the Bombers had beaten an undefeated opponent.

The two teams scored on consecutive possessions in the first half. After recovering an Ithaca fumble in the first quarter, Wittenberg drove 51 yards on 11 plays to score the first points. The Bombers tied the game on their next possession, a 15-play, 76-yard drive capped by **Bencsko's** 11-yard touchdown pass to split end **Jim Meyer**. The Tigers moved ahead again on a field goal with five seconds remaining in the first half.

Another long drive, this one covering 58 yards in 11 plays, led to **Bencsko's** one-yard touchdown dive. The score, with 1:33 left in the third quarter, turned out to be the last of the game.

All four Tiger fumbles occurred in Ithaca territory, and two were recovered by the Bombers inside the 15-yard line. Linebacker **Harry Moss** and nose guard **Don Phillips** each had 12 total tackles for Ithaca, and defensive back **Tony Smith** added 10. All-American linebacker **John Laper** and defensive tackle **Jimmy Hoffman** had nine tackles apiece.

**PHENIX CITY, Ala.**—Stagg Bowl most valuable player **Paul Parker** rushed for 208 yards and three touchdowns, leading Ithaca to a 39-24 win over Central.

Central came into the game yielding an average of fewer than 100 rushing yards per game, but Ithaca rushed for 408 on the afternoon. The passing attack was effective as well, as quarterbacks **Todd Wilkowski** and **Tom Pasquale** combined to complete 11 of 15 passes for 116 yards. The team completion mark of .733 established an Ithaca playoff record.

Touchdown runs of 23 and 26 yards by **Parker**, a five-yard scoring run by **Wilkowski**, and **Matt Sullivan's** 42-yard field goal helped Ithaca build a 25-8 advantage. The Dutchmen closed the gap to 10 points on a third-quarter touchdown, but on the following kickoff **Mike Scott** scored on an 84-yard return. **Parker's** third touchdown put the game out of reach in the fourth.

Cornerback **Tom Knapp** tied a Stagg Bowl and school playoff record with three interceptions, and linebacker **Matt Herbst** led the team in tackles with 11.

**BRADENTON, Fla.**—Ithaca captured its third national championship with a 34-20 win over Dayton in the Amos Alonzo Stagg Bowl at Hawkins Stadium.

Junior fullback **Jeff Wittman** scored three touchdowns and finished with 159 yards rushing on a school playoff-record 30 carries. **Wittman's** touchdown runs covered one, three and six yards.

The defense was equally impressive. In the second half, Ithaca did not allow a first down and yielded only 13 yards to the Dayton offense. Junior linebacker **Billie Mays Jr.** had 10 tackles and senior strong safety **Joe Palladino** picked off two passes and made nine tackles.

Ithaca College's ninth head football coach, Welch has continued the success of one of Division III's winningest programs. His teams have been consistent playoff contenders, and he owns a record of 121-43 (.738) as Bomber coach. He achieved another milestone in 2006 when he was elected to the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Board of Trustees, where he is one of just two Division III coaches.

Taking over for Jim Butterfield, one of college football's most successful coaches, Welch was college football's most successful rookie coach in 1994. He led the Bombers to a 10-3 record and the NCAA Division III semifinals that year.

He posted more victories (10) than any other first-year NCAA coach. For his efforts, Welch was named Division III coach of the year by *College Sports* magazine and Eastern Division III coach of the year (Stan Lomax-Irving Marsh Award) by the Football Writers of New York.

The 1996 season saw a return to postseason play for Ithaca. The Bombers started the season with five straight wins and at one point earned the top spot in the NCAA Division III East Region rankings. Ithaca won the ECAC Northeast championship by downing previously unbeaten Worcester State, 27-21. The 1998 and 1999 teams also made ECAC playoff appearances. In 2001 the Bombers

reached the NCAA quarterfinals, posting road wins at Montclair State and Rensselaer. The 2003 Bombers reached the national quarterfinals after recording NCAA playoff wins at Brockport and Montclair State. In 2004 Ithaca routed Massachusetts-Dartmouth in an ECAC postseason game and a year later the Bombers won their fourth straight Empire 8 title and reached the NCAA playoffs for the 15th time. In the past two years Bombers have made consecutive trips to the NCAA tournament (for the first time since 1992).

A high school standout at Dansville, Welch was coached there by Ithaca Athletic Hall of Fame member Tom Vogt '64 and earned all-county honors as a junior halfback and a senior linebacker. Dansville was 16-0 during Welch's sophomore and junior seasons.

At Ithaca he earned two letters playing for Butterfield. A running back, he missed most of his sophomore season with an ankle injury. Welch was named the Bombers' most-improved back as a junior after gaining 467 yards on 117 carries. The starter at fullback and a captain as a senior, Welch was again slowed by an injury but still gained 257 yards on 61 attempts. Welch also spent four years with the lacrosse program, including two with the varsity.

From 1973-76 Welch worked as an assistant football coach at Rush-Henrietta High School in Rochester. He earned his master's degree from Al-

bany in 1977. Welch was also a member of the Great Dane coaching staff, serving as offensive back coach and later defensive line coach on Bob Ford's staff. Albany reached the NCAA semifinals in 1977.

In 1980 Welch began a four-year tenure as offensive coordinator at Washington (Mo.) University. He came back to his alma mater in 1984 as linebacker coach.

The Bomber football program has posted a 209-60 (.777) record with Welch on its coaching staff. In addition to winning national championships in 1988 and 1991, the Bombers have made 10 other NCAA

playoff appearances (1985, 1986, 1990, 1992, 1994, 2001, 2003, 2005, 2007 and 2008). Ithaca was an ECAC playoff participant in 1984, 1987, 1996, 1998, 1999 and 2004.

Welch is married to the former Susan Price, a 1973 Ithaca College graduate. They have two children; Jessica, a 2003 Ithaca graduate, was an all-American lacrosse player, and Jeff, a 2005 graduate who was an all-conference football and lacrosse player and captained both sports.

The chair of Ithaca's School of Health Sciences and Human Performance curriculum committee, Hummel also serves as secretary and treasurer of the New York state Athletic Trainers' Association.

## TODD LAZENBY

Todd Lazenby joined the Ithaca athletic training staff in 2006 after 10 years with the NFL's San Francisco 49ers, including three as head athletic trainer. Lazenby and the rest of the 49er staff were named the NFL's Athletic Training Staff of the Year in 2001.

He holds bachelor's and master's degrees from Ohio State University. Lazenby's other sport responsibilities at Ithaca include baseball, junior varsity men's basketball and men's and women's swimming and diving.



The Bombers extended their streak to 38 straight winning seasons in 2008 and made the program's fifth trip to the NCAA playoffs in eight years (and 18th overall). Ithaca brings back 41 letter-winners, including 12 starters.

**2008 REVIEW:** Ithaca's 9-2 record marked the 20th time in the past 35 years that the Bombers have won at least eight games. Four Bombers – the program's highest total in 17 seasons – earned all-America honors with cornerback **Jason Chier** and linebacker **Matt Scalice** named to D3football.com's first team and left guard **Chris Gray** and tight end **Brian Weverbergh** picking up third-team recognition. **Weverbergh** was also selected to the Associated Press and AFCA all-America teams. All four were first-team all-region picks, with defensive tackle **Joe Goetz** and running back **Thomas Bergerstock** named second and third-team all-region, respectively. **Bergerstock**, **Chier**, **Goetz**, **Gray**, **Scalice** and **Weverbergh** were each named to the all-Empire 8 first team (**Chier** was a first-team Empire 8 all-star as both a cornerback and as a kick returner), where they were joined by offensive tackles **Sean Mirkov** and **Jake Queener**. Quarterback **Dan Juvan**, defensive end **Adam Drescher** and right guard **Eric Russo** were second-team picks with strong safety **David Ahonen**, wide receiver **Kyle Crandall**, kicker **Andrew Rogowski** and linebacker **John Scanlon** received honorable mention. Coach **Mike Welch** was named Empire 8 Coach of the Year and AFCA District I Coach of the Year.

**KEY LOSSES:** The Bombers lost 24 letter-winners, including 10 starters. **Crandall**, **Scanlon** and **Weverbergh** were four-year letter-winners. **Chier**,



**Jason Chier** earned all-America honors as both a cornerback and kick returner.

**Juvan**, **Gray** and **Mirkov** were three-year starters with **Russo** and free safety **Matt Samela** starting as juniors and seniors; defensive lineman **John Cirba**, wide receiver **Zach Connett**, cornerback **Chris Grady** and center **Ben Garvey** stepped into starting roles last fall. The class of 2009, which also included safety **Alex Darcey**, defensive end **Doug Fraser**, running back **Justin Kulp**, linebacker **Craig Liebler**, offensive tackle **Chris Mott**, wide receiver **Matt Quinn**, tight end **Pete Sachs** and offensive guard **Mike Tannenbaum**, was Ithaca's 34th in a row to make a postseason appearance.

**THE DEFENSE:** Ithaca brings back 22 letter-winners from a unit that posted the Empire 8's second-best scoring defense and rush defense. Eight starters return, along with five other players who have seen starting duty.

**DEFENSIVE LINE:** Ithaca returns all four starters and the list is headed by seniors **Adam Drescher**, a team captain, and preseason all-American **Joe Goetz**. Both have seen starting duty since their freshman seasons.

A second-team Empire all-star, **Drescher** has compiled 100 tackles (including 26 for loss) while making 23 starts over the past three seasons. Also lining up at one end spot will be seniors **Scott Auchenbach** and **Brad Payne** and junior **Sean Gil**. **Auchenbach** missed most of last year with an injury; he recorded four tackles (two for loss) in his two appearances. A former tight end, **Payne** lettered in his first season on the defensive side after picking up a pair of tackles in eight games. **Gil** is in his second year with the varsity.

Three veterans return at the other end spot. Junior **Matt Dibble** took over as the starter in midseason and wound up second on the team in tackles for loss (12) and sacks (five). Sophomore **Chris Collier** also returns. One of eight Ithaca freshmen to letter in 2008, he made nine tackles while playing in all but two games.

**Goetz**, an all-region and all-conference pick last fall, has picked up a third of his career tackles behind the line of scrimmage (33 of 99) and has made 10 sacks. Classmate **Kyle Scharles**, another three-year letter winner, has started 13 games over the past two

seasons while making 32 tackles. Junior **Andrew Haim**, who played in eight games last year – starting once – has lettered in both his Bomber seasons.

**LINEBACKERS:** Six letter-winners are back this season, with four Bombers who combined to start 22 games last fall returning.

**Matt Scalice** enters his final season as one of Division III's top defensive players. D3football.com's East Region Defensive Player of the Year in 2008, he's averaged 7.6 tackles per game in his career; maintaining that pace would put him second on the program's all-time list at the end of the regular season. **Scalice's** return (he was granted a fifth year of eligibility after missing playing just three games as a freshman) marks the first time the Bombers have brought back a first-team all-American since **Jeff Wittman** in 1992.

Junior **Pat Scott** and sophomore **Ryan Clarke** also return at middle linebacker. **Scott** made nine tackles (three for loss) as **Scalice's** back-up last year. **Clarke** started times games at outside linebacker and finished with 36 tackles despite missing three games. Senior **Eric Berger**, who rejoins the program, and sophomore **Tyler Murray** (a junior varsity player in 2008), are also in the mix.

Junior **Morgan Abdelnour** is the most experienced candidate at one outside spot. A starter in the season's final three games, he finished with 43 tackles (including four for loss). Sophomore **Eric Toporoff** lettered as Ithaca's punter last fall but is expected to see significant playing time at linebacker. Sophomore **Jusan Hamilton** (a member of Ithaca's track & field team last year) joined the program last



spring.

At the third linebacker spot, sophomore **Joe Gilfedder** and senior **Tyler Baker** are the leading candidates. **Gilfedder** lettered as a freshman after playing in six games. **Baker**, a part-time starter in 2007 and 2008, has made 65 career tackles, including 26 last year. Sophomores **Jordan McElroy** is up from the junior varsity team.

**SECONDARY:** A pair of starters and two other defensive backs with starting experience are on the Bomber roster. Junior strong safety **David Ahonen** earned all-conference honors last year and his 57 tackles and eight pass break-ups are the most by a returning defensive back. **Ahonen** has made 68 career tackles and picked off three passes last year. Senior **Bobby DeForrest** and junior **Kevin Accetta** both return to the varsity this season. Sophomore **Kevin Cline** is up from the junior varsity team.

At free safety, senior **Chad Herring** made six stops last year while earning his second letter. Junior **Tyler Rauber** is back for a second varsity season.

Sophomore **Spencer White** heads the list of returning cornerbacks. A starter in the final seven games, he made 45 tackles and broke up five passes. Junior **Tom Eschen**, a 2008 letter winner, will push for playing time as well. Juniors **Aaron Castonguay** and newcomer **Brendan Kurtz** are also available.

The other cornerback spot features returning letter-winners **Mike Conti** and **Andy Lonsky**. **Conti** played in all but one game as a Bomber freshman. **Lonsky**, a transfer from Shippensburg, made 11 tackles and scored on an interception return in his first Ithaca season.

**THE OFFENSE:** Four starters and four other players who've seen starting duty are among the 16

letter-winners who return from an offense that ranked 20th nationally by averaging 36.36 points per game last fall. The Bombers' average of 421.7 yards per game marked the fourth time in the five years they've put up over 400 yards of total offense per game.

**RUNNING BACKS:** The Bombers averaged 194.1 yards per game on the ground last year (the program's third-highest mark in 17 years) and bring back five running backs, including record-breaking **Thomas Bergerstock**.

**Bergerstock** scored a Bomber-record 20 touchdowns as a junior and his 1,240 yards were just 67 short of another school single-season mark. A third-team all-region and first-team all-conference pick, he posted a pair of five-TD performances.

Junior **Dan Ruggiero** ran for 425 yards and five touchdowns in the season's final three games after an injury sidelined **Bergerstock** (he finished with 659 yards and seven scores on the season). His 192-yard, four-TD performance in the win at Alfred that clinched the league title earned him Empire 8 Offensive Player of the Week honors and two weeks later his 33 carries against Curry set a Bomber playoff record.

Junior **Luke Herrington**, a transfer from St. John Fisher who gained 123 yards in four games with the Cardinals last fall, and sophomore **Adam Lajara**, who's up from the junior varsity team, are also candidates.

Three letter-winning fullbacks return to the Bomber rushing attack, including senior **Danny Witbeck**. A three-year letter-winner, **Witbeck** has been a key blocker in Ithaca's offense. Junior **Lance Baumgartner** has lettered in both his seasons as a Bomber and made his first career start in the win at Alfred. Senior

**Joe Nicoletti**, who'd lettered as a reserve linebacker in 2007, picked up his second letter last year after moving to fullback.

Sophomore **Eric Cerio**, a junior varsity player last fall, and sophomore **Aaron Sader-Rubinstein**, a transfer from Iona, are also in Ithaca's backfield.

**QUARTERBACK:** Pressed into first-string duty for the final 10 quarters of the season, **Brian Grastorf** threw for 537 yards and six scores to lead the Bombers past undefeated Cortland and into the NCAA playoffs. Now a senior captain, **Grastorf** has compiled 955 yards and nine TD's in his career while accumulating a quarterback rating of 143.0.

Junior **Rob Zappia**, a baseball teammate of **Grastorf's** as well, was Ithaca's third quarterback the past two years. Sophomore **Mike Matthews**, who red-shirted at Division I-AA Delaware, will also push for playing time.

**RECEIVERS:** Ithaca brings back five letter-winners, including a pair of players with starting experience. Junior **Thomas Vossler** was Ithaca's leading wide receiver in his first varsity season, catching 41 passes and averaging 13.0 yards per reception. Senior **Shane O'Malley**, who's played in 16 games over the past two seasons, made his first career start in the NCAA playoff game against Curry. Junior **Dan Ruffrage**, who played in just three games last year because of an injury, is another top candidate for a starting spot.

Senior **Chad LaChance**, juniors **Sean Heenehan** and **Chris McConnell** ( a converted cornerback) and sophomore **Alex Hendrickson** all return to the varsity roster. Sophomores **Eric Breton**, **Tom Coady** and **Matt Hannon** are all up from last year's junior varsity team.

Three returning letter-winners return at tight end. Senior **Sean Puckhaber** and junior **Dan Higgins** both saw regular duty as back-ups last year (**Higgins**

caught four passes). Junior **Matt Crandall** moves to tight end from running back; he contributed 76 rushing yards and a pair of touchdowns last season.

Juniors **Charlie Calovich**, a former fullback, and **Jack Scott** will also push for playing time, along with sophomore **Alex Price**.

**OFFENSIVE LINE:** Ithaca featured one of Division III's top offensive lines last fall; five letter winners, including a pair of Bombers with starting experience, are back this year.

Heading the list is 6-8 right tackle **Jake Queener**. The former starter at Division I-AA Maine started every game and earned first-team all-Empire 8 recognition in his first season in a Bomber uniform. Junior **Vinnie Diana**, a returning varsity player, is another candidate.

The most experienced contender for the other tackle spot is junior **Leland King**. A letter-winner in 2008, **King** also lined up as a blocking tight end. Sophomores **Mike Glickman** and **Bob Levenfeld** are also pushing for playing time.

At guard, the Bombers bring back **Kevin Heinzelman**, who was granted a fifth year of eligibility after missing the 2006 season. He made a pair of starts at right guard last season. Sophomores **Sal Arena** and **Greg Peck**, junior varsity players as freshmen, are also available.

Junior **Rich Mallon** has the most playing experience of the candidates at left guard. Other choices include junior **Jason Zweig**, who's being moved from defensive end, and junior **Brian Murray**, a former starter at Division I-AA Pace.

Senior centers **Mike Boch** and **Mark Rodovick**, who both lettered as reserve linemen in 2008, are the top candidates for the last starting spot.

**SPECIAL TEAMS:** Once again last season, Ithaca fielded one of the nation's best special teams units. The Bombers ranked ninth in the nation in punt

returns and blocked a school-record 10 kicks while increasing their total to 11 return touchdowns since 2003.

The list of returning special teams contributors includes three Bombers who lettered as freshmen. **Andrew Rogowski** scored 65 points – the most ever by a Bomber freshman – while converting 83.3 percent of his field goal attempts and received honorable mention to the Empire 8 all-star team. **Toporoff** took over as Ithaca’s punter and put 14 of his 41 kicks inside the 20-yard line. **Brendan Harper**, Ithaca’s kickoff specialist, also returns.

**Clarke** and **White** are the top returning tacklers from Ithaca’s kick coverage units, collecting 12 and 11, respectively. **Pat Scott** and **Eschen** both made six special teams tackles. **Abdelnour**, **Crandall**, **Gilfedder** and **Lonsky** made five apiece.

**Ahonen** had two of Ithaca’s 10 blocked kicks last year. **Drescher** (who has six blocked kicks in his career) and **Goetz** had one apiece.

**Higgins** has handled Ithaca’s long-snapping on punts and placements for the past two years. **Gras-torf** is the team’s most experienced holder.

**THE SCHEDULE:** The Bombers open their season Sept. 5 at St. Lawrence (one of three new additions to the Bomber schedule); Ithaca continues its season-opening road stretch at Union before opening the home season with a Sept. 19 game against Widener at Butterfield Stadium. The Saints are back on the Ithaca schedule for the first time since 2003 (the two teams had met for 30 straight years). The Bombers have won 20 straight against St. Lawrence,

marking their longest winning streak against any opponent. Ithaca’s games against Union and Widener will be the program’s first regular-season game against either opponent, but both have been Bomber victims in the NCAA playoffs (Ithaca beat Union in 1985, 1986 and on the way to the 1991 national title; the Bombers beat Widener in 1975 to reach the Stagg Bowl). Empire 8 play kicks off Sept. 26 for the Bombers when they travel to Utica. Ithaca has won five of the league’s seven championships, posting a 33-6 conference record since football became an Empire 8 sport in 2002. The next three weeks feature three Homecoming games; Ithaca celebrates its own Homecoming against St. John Fisher Oct. 10 between visits to Utica and Frostburg State for those schools’ Homecoming games. Ithaca has treated its Homecoming fans to a win 25 times in the past 27 years and the Bombers have won eight straight road games as a Homecoming opponent. Following a week off Ithaca travels to Springfield for its final regular-season road trip, then returns home for the season’s final two games. The Bombers host Alfred Nov. 7 to close out their Empire 8 schedule then take on visiting Cortland in the 51st Cortaca Jug game. The game, which annually draws more than 10,000 fans to Ithaca’s Butterfield Stadium (capacity 5,000), is one of Division III’s signature rivalries. The Bombers hold series lead against all 10 of their 2009 opponents. Three made postseason appearances last fall with Cortland playing in the NCAA playoffs and Alfred and St. John Fisher picked for ECAC games.

## ANDY LONSKY CB, Jr., 5-9, 195; Milford, Pa.

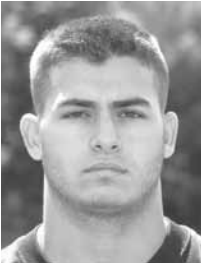

ITHACA, N.Y. —The #18 Bombers rallied to beat the visiting Lycoming Warriors 17-16, opening the season with a win for the 28th time in 32 years. Senior cornerback **Jason Chier** intercepted two passes and blocked an extra point. The win was Ithaca's 200th in Butterfield Stadium/South Hill Field.

The Bombers used a touchdown and extra point with 4:14 left to seal the win. Senior running back **Justin Kulp** capped a 10-play, 72-yard drive with a seven-yard touchdown and freshman **Andrew Rogowski** followed with the game-winning extra point.

The Warriors' final drive ended when **Chier** made a diving interception inside the Bomber 30 with 11 seconds remaining. He was named Empire 8 Defensive Player of the Week for his efforts and also earned a spot on D3football.com's Team of the Week.

Ithaca held a 10-3 lead before the Warriors scored touchdowns on consecutive fourth-quarter possessions. Following their go-ahead touchdown, **Chier** blocked the extra-point attempt.

The Bombers took leads of 3-0 – on a 29-yard field goal by sophomore **Dillon Dwyer** – and 10-3. Their first touchdown was a one-yard run by sophomore **Matt Crandall**. **Crandall's** first career touchdown came two plays after the Warriors were called for roughing the kicker on a successful 25-yard field goal attempt by **Dwyer**. **Dwyer** was injured on the play, leading to **Rogowski** taking over on extra point attempts.

Junior cornerback **Chris Grady**, one of seven Bombers making their first career start, recorded a personal-best 12 tackles. Junior strong safety **Roniel Bencosme** added a career-high seven. Junior defensive tackle **Joe Goetz** recorded a pair of sacks among his six tackles.

Sophomore running back **Thomas Bergerstock**, one of five first-time offensive starters, rushed for a team-best 78 yards. Sophomore wide receiver **Thomas Vossler**, another first-time starter, caught four passes for a team-leading 63 yards. Senior quarterback **Dan Juvan** completed 11 of 24 passes for 142 yards.

On Ithaca's next possession, sophomore wide receiver Dan Ruffrage caught a 19-yard touchdown pass – the first of his career – from senior quarterback Dan Juvan.

Juvan completed 18 of 32 passes for 291 yards and three touchdowns. Weverbergh gained 123 yards on his nine catches and sophomore wideout Thomas Vossler caught three passes for a career-best 77 yards.

Bergerstock's touchdowns included a 75-yard burst on Ithaca's final drive, a 24-yard score, a nine-yard run that opened the scoring and a pair of one-yard rushes. He was named Empire 8 and ECAC Upstate NY Offensive Player of the Week and earned a spot on D3football.com's Team of the Week.

The two teams combined for 1,067 yards of total offense and the 111 combined points were the most in any Ithaca game.

Senior tight end Brian Weverbergh and senior wide receiver Kyle Crandall both caught two touchdown passes and both went over 100 receiving yards. Freshman kicker Andrew Rogowski set Ithaca single-game records with nine extra points and 10 extra-point attempts.

Senior linebacker John Scanlon led Ithaca with nine tackles. Senior cornerback Jason Chier and junior cornerback Chris Grady both made eight and sophomore linebacker Morgan Abdelnour had a career-best eight.

Senior free safety Matt Samela intercepted a pass on Hartwick's first play of the game and returned it 30 yards for a touchdown. Crandall caught five passes for 76 yards. Sophomore wide-out Thomas Vossler caught four and led Ithaca with a career-best 84 yards. Junior fullback Dan Witbeck caught three passes for a career-high 50 yards. Freshman kicker Andrew Rogowski made all six of his extra-point attempts.

The Bombers held Utica to 39 yards of total offense and three first downs in the first half and game totals of 52 passing yards (in 19 attempts), 130 rushing yards in 40 attempts and three of 14 success on third and fourth downs. Grastorf came in with 5:30 left in the half and led five scoring drives in his first six possessions, helping Ithaca score 30 points – erasing a 21-13 Alfred lead – before Ithaca stopped Alfred twice on fourth down in the final 2:09.

Sophomore strong safety David Ahonen broke up a fourth-down pass with 2:09 left to thwart one drive. On the Saxons' final possession, they drove to the Ithaca one, but threw three incomplete passes – one was broken up by senior cornerback Jason Chier in the end zone.

The Bombers took the lead for good on the final play of the first half. Freshman Andrew Rogowski kicked a career-long 26-yard field goal after sophomore defensive end Matt Dibble set up the score by intercepting a screen pass and running it back 43 yards to the Alfred 11.

Grastorf completed nine of 16 passes for 161 yards against the nation's sixth-ranked pass defense and threw a 76-yard touchdown pass to senior wideout Kyle Crandall, who led Ithaca with 115 yards on three catches.

Ithaca's offensive line turned in its strongest performance of the year by posting its fourth sack-free performance in the last five games.

Chier made a career-best 10 tackles, blocked a field goal and recovered a fumbled Alfred kickoff. Junior defensive tackle Joe Goetz also blocked a Saxon field goal try. Senior linebacker Matt Scalice led the Bombers with 15 tackles. Senior linebacker John Scanlon added nine tackles, with two for loss. Freshman cornerback Spencer White matched a career high with eight tackles. Sophomore linebacker Morgan Abdelnour made his first start and had a career-best seven tackles.

Ahonen made six tackles – with a career-high three for loss – and forced a fumble that junior defensive end Adam Drescher recovered. Junior strong safety Roniel Bencosme made two tackles for loss, both on pass plays.

Cortland, N.Y. — The #17 Bombers beat previously unbeaten Cortland 35-13 in front of 10,300 fans at the 50th annual Cortaca Jug game; in conjunction with the game, the Red Dragons had honored their 1988 team which had been the program's only team to post an undefeated regular season (the Bombers beat Cortland in the NCAA East Region final on their way to the national championship).

Junior quarterback Brian Grastorf threw for three touchdowns and rushed for two more in his first career start and senior cornerback Jason Chier tied a school record with three interceptions.

Grastorf, the first Bomber quarterback to make his first career start in the Cortaca Jug game, completed 19-of-28 passes for 273 yards and three touchdowns and rushed for two one-yard scores; all four figures were career bests. Senior Kyle Crandall caught four catches for a game-high 114 yards and two scores and junior Dan Ruggiero came off the bench to rush for 96 yards – the highest total surrendered all year by the Red Dragons – and catch a touchdown pass.

Chier finished with seven tackles and two pass breakups along with his three interceptions. Two of his pickoffs came in the end zone and the other was at his own two; one of his pass break-ups came in the end zone as well.

Sophomore strong safety David Ahonen made nine tackles intercepted a pass in the end zone on Cortland's final play from scrimmage. Sophomore linebacker Morgan Abdelnour added a career-high nine tackles. Senior linebacker Matt Scalice added eight tackles and raised his career total to 261, good for 11th on the program's all-time list.

Crandall caught a 14-yard pass from Grastorf with 9:44 left in the first quarter to give Ithaca a 7-0 lead. Crandall turned a short crossing pass from Grastorf into an 80-yard touchdown with 1:26 left in the half and a 32-yard screen pass to Ruggiero for a touchdown created a 21-13 Bomber lead.

Grastorf capped the scoring with a pair of on-year touchdown runs – the first two of his career – in the fourth quarter. The second was set up when sophomore defensive end Matt Dibble forced a fumble on a sack that senior defensive tackle John Cirba recovered.

ITHACA, N.Y.— The seventh-seeded Curry Colonels scored the game-winning touchdown with 32 seconds left in a 26-21 win over the second-seeded Bombers in the NCAA playoffs.

The Bombers took over on their own 39 with 30 seconds left. Following a 20-yard pass from junior quarterback Brian Grastorf to senior wide receiver Kyle Crandall on Ithaca's first play and a pass interference penalty on Curry that moved the ball to the Colonel 25, the Bombers threw three incomplete passes to end the game.

Ithaca had taken its final lead late in the third quarter on a touchdown set up by a blocked punt. Senior Matt Samela blocked a Curry punt that senior teammate Craig Liebler recovered on the Colonel 14. Two plays later Crandall caught a 10-yard touchdown pass from Grastorf.

A pair of Ithaca touchdowns put the Bombers up 14-6 after the Colonels had scored on their first dive of the game. Grastorf threw a 13-yard touchdown pass to senior tight end Brian Weverbergh midway through the first quarter and the first of three extra points by freshman Andrew Rogowski gave the Bombers their first lead.

Late in the second quarter senior linebacker Matt Scalice recovered a fumble on a Colonel punt return on the Curry 18-yard line. Five plays later, sophomore Dan Ruggiero scored on a five-yard run.

Ruggiero gained a game-high 138 rushing yards on a Bomber playoff-record 33 carries. Crandall was Ithaca's leading receiver with three catches for 52 yards; his career average of 21.5 yards per reception is second all-time at Ithaca.

Weverbergh caught three passes and broke his own year-old school record for tight ends, finishing with 50 catches.

Senior linebacker John Scanlon led Ithaca's defense with 10 tackles. Sophomore strong safety David Ahonen made nine tackles (including six solo stops), blocked the extra point attempt after the Colonels' second touchdown and broke up the conversion pass following their third attempt.

Senior cornerback Jason Chier intercepted his school-record tying eighth pass of the year, blocked an extra point, tackled Curry's holder on an aborted field goal attempt and blocked a Colonel field goal attempt on the final play of the first half.

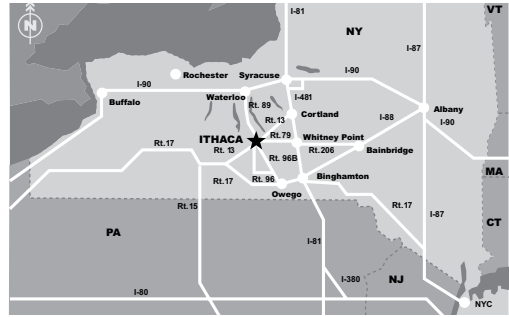
## FACILITIES

Ithaca has more than 80 modern buildings, including science facilities with state-of-the-art laboratories, music center with concert and recital halls, health sciences center, and observatory plus 53 residence halls offering a variety of living accommodations. The library contains more than 400,000 materials in various formats as well as thousands of digital volumes and databases. Athletic facilities include a 2,600-seat gymnasium and a 5,000-seat football stadium. The fitness center houses two smaller gyms as well as aerobics and exercise rooms with cardio machines, stair-stoppers and treadmills.

## ADMISSION AND FINANCIAL AID

Undergraduate admission to Ithaca College is based on high school record, personal recommendations, SAT or ACT scores, and, for some programs, auditions or portfolios. Candidates should submit an application by November 1 for early admission and by February 1 for regular admission. Ithaca accepts the Common Application exclusively. More than 85 percent of incoming students receive some form of financial assistance, totaling over \$145 million in scholarships, grants, jobs, loans, and private aid. ## INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS

Ithaca teams have won three national championships in football and wrestling, two each in baseball, women's crew and women's soccer and one each in field hockey, gymnastics and softball. Bomber teams have also produced individual national champions in gymnastics, men's and women's swimming and diving, wrestling and track and field. Ithaca is sponsoring 26 varsity sports during the 2009-10 school year—14 for women and 12 for men.

During the 2007-08 academic year, Bomber teams were a combined 260-129-1, (.668), and 14 were represented in the NCAA playoffs. Ithaca won 11 Empire 8 championships and finished 14th in the Division III NACDA Directors' Cup standings. A total of 18 Ithaca student-athletes earned all-American recognition or academic all-American recognition.

## NCAA PHILOSOPHY STATEMENT

Colleges and universities in Division III place highest priority on the overall quality of the educational experience. In so doing, they seek to strengthen the integration of objectives and programs in athletics with academic and developmental objectives and to ensure the integration of athletes with other students.

## ATHLETIC TRAINING

Injury prevention and care of Ithaca's student-athletes are overseen by a staff of six full-time athletic trainers, plus a graduate assistant and over 65 undergraduate students in the athletic training major. Several fully equipped facilities are devoted to athletic training.



### THOMAS R. ROCHON President

Thomas R. Rochon became the eighth president of Ithaca College on July 1, 2008. He holds a doctorate and a bachelor's degree in political science from the University of Michigan, where he graduated with high distinction.

Prior to his selection as the president of Ithaca College, Rochon served as executive vice president of the University of St. Thomas, a master's comprehensive university in Minnesota, where he oversaw the university's eight schools and colleges and, with the chief administrative officer, shared responsibility for the \$150 million university budget. He worked to develop the academic vision of each unit and to set strategic directions; reorganized academic programs to create the School of Engineering; and helped launch a capital campaign centered on endowment support of students and faculty. An engaged civic leader, Rochon championed a university effort to strengthen community service and partnership activities in St. Paul, leading to Carnegie Foundation classification for community engagement. Along with his administrative responsibilities, he was a tenured professor in St. Thomas's political science department.

Rochon has an extensive history of accomplishments as an educator and academic administrator. Before his position at St. Thomas, as executive director of the Graduate Record Examinations program at the Educational Testing Service (ETS), Rochon was responsible for determining program policy under the oversight of the board and the ETS vice president for graduate and professional education. He guided the addition of analytical writing to the test, the first use of an essay in the GRE program; he also developed and implemented a program to empower universities to create their own test prep courses for graduate programs. He has held positions in the top leadership at prominent universities: dean of the School of Politics and Economics at Claremont Graduate University and assistant master of Dean Mathey College at Princeton University. He also held the post of assistant professor in the politics department at Princeton University for eight years.

Rochon came to Ithaca College with a distinguished record of scholarly research. His work focuses on contemporary European politics and social movements in Europe and the United States. He is the recipient of numerous grants and awards, including the Distinguished Scholarship Award of the Collective Behavior and Social Movements section of the American Sociological Association, and the Susan

Louise Dyer Peace Fellowship at the Hoover Institution on War, Revolution, and Peace at Stanford University. Rochon was also a Fulbright lecturer at Kobe University in Japan. His 1998 book, *Culture Moves: Ideas, Activism, and Changing Values*, received a Distinguished Scholarship Prize from the American Sociological Association and was named by Choice an outstanding academic book of 1998. He has given periodic lectures and seminars on Dutch politics for embassy personnel of the U.S. Department of State and has served on numerous advisory boards.

Since childhood Rochon has been an avid baseball card collector. He developed an interest in older cards, including those dating from the 1880s, and is an active user of the eBay online auction site.

Rochon is married to wife, Amber, who until recently worked in a shelter that provided accommodation to teenage girls; she is looking forward to continuing her work in the Ithaca community. The Rochons welcomed a son, William (Liam) in May 2009.

### KEN KUTLER Director of Intercollegiate Athletics

Ken Kutler is in his seventh year as Ithaca's director of intercollegiate athletics and recreational sports.

Kutler came to Ithaca after serving as director of athletics at two other Division III institutions: Frostburg State University (1978 to 1986) and Hartwick College (1986 to 2003). At Hartwick, he oversaw a 24-sport intercollegiate athletic program (including two sports that competed at the Division I level).

He is a past president of the Empire 8 athletic conference. Kutler spent 10 years as women's soccer coach at Hartwick (1986 to 1993 and again in 2001 and 2002) and guided the Hawks to five appearances in the NCAA championship tournament.

He is a 1964 graduate of East Stroudsburg University, where he was an all-region soccer player. Kutler holds a master's degree in education from Temple University and a doctorate in education from West Virginia.

### ON RADIO

All Ithaca football games can be heard live on award-winning WICB, 91.7 FM. The broadcast features senior Andrew Champagne and junior Josh Getzoff. The pregame show starts 30 minutes before kickoff. All six home games will also be broadcast by VIC (106.5 FM). WICB also carries *Sportstalk*, a 60-minute program that airs Sundays at 6 p.m. Included in the call-in format of the show are game highlights, interviews and comprehensive coverage of Ithaca's athletic program.

### ON TELEVISION

All four Bomber home games will be televised by ICTV on Time Warner Cable's channel 16. Bombers Football is cablecast live and re-shown on a tape-delayed basis at 7 p.m. the day of the game. It is produced by Colin D'Aeth.
