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

And the difference in what these shows can and should be for all Black Americans is YOU.






THE SKWARES START IT UP MERCURY

THE WEATHER GIRLS—LAND OF THE BELIEVER—COLUMBIA—As promised in BRE's recent cover story on Full Force, the group pens and produces full-figured soul divas, The Weather Girls. The cut has an edgy, rock flavored sense of soul underscored by hard electric guitar chords. Killer drum sounds make it a dance floor winner!


PEBBLES—**MERCEDES BOY**—**MCA**—The across-the-board smash hit "Girlfriend" is just the beginning of a serious career according to singer/songwriter Pebbles. On her way to proving her commercial durability, this is another big winner from her eponymously titled debut album. Primed for instant crossover success, the cut was produced by Charlie Wilson.




VISIONS—VISIONS—POLYDOR—Cincinnati-based group Visions offers a solid mainstream R&B sound on their premier album. Breaking with hot add action on our reporters, the initial single "It's A Choice" is a smoothly self-produced song fronted by lead vocalist Tim Moore. Deftly switching to the female format, "You're Gonna Be Mine" has fellow front person Tara Davis taking the lead.

BRICK—TOO TUFF—MAGIC CITY—Brick rocked the house with its stunning remake of their disco era hit "Dazz" earlier this year. This following album shows the group in fine form with smart, dance-oriented jams like the LP's wild, up tempo title track and the cool mid-paced groover "Kum Danz." All you glass house residents beware, Brick is back with all the hits!

NORMAN CONNORS—PASSION—CAPITOL—This is the debut LP on the Capitol label from Fusion-Jazz-R&B-Pop master Norman Connors. The debut single "I Am Your Melody" features vocalist Spencer Harrison and is racing up the singles charts. Check out female vocalist Gabrielle Goodman on "You're My One And Only Love," too.









"I'm Not Just Another Cute Girl"

itmaking MCA recording artist Pebbles likes to get straight to the point: "Being a woman in this business is easier in one way because if men like you, think you're sweet, it helps. But when you like to be in control of what you're doing, as I did with my first album, you have to work to get your point across. I wanted to make sure that guys in the business didn't think of me as just another cute girl."

Oakland-born Pebbles, who still calls the city her home, says she has had a real opportunity at MCA to demonstrate the full range of her talent, not just as a recording artist. "I got to write one song and co-wrote three other tunes on the album—as well as co-producing it. Now I'm not saying it was all easy," the petite 23-year old points out, "because I had a lot of headaches in pulling everything together. In fact, I should have been called 'Ms. Tylenol' after finishing this album!"

Pebbles—she got the nickname from her godfather who likened her to the character in "The Flintstones" and it's stayed with her ever since-knew at an early age that she wanted a career in music. So she isn't entirely surprised at the shape her life is taking. "I've always been pretty determined," she admits, "and I had a real vision and concept of what I wanted to do for my first album. I didn't get into this half-way. By the time I went to MCA with the original video I'd done for the song "Mercedes Boy," I'd already created a strategy and planned out what I wanted. I didn't want to bump my way through and being an aggressive artist, I definitely had my own ideas as to what I wanted-right down to photographs, everything."

Pebbles credits "good management, a great team behind me and MCA's attitude" as the main factors which have led to her out-of-the-box success with "Girlfriend." I knew that the record had potential and naturally, I wanted the kind of response that we've gotten. I knew that if we played our cards right, we'd do well."

Pebbles credits appearances on "Soul Train" and "Video Soul" alongside response from urban contemporary radio

as having established a strong base among black music buyers. "A firm foundation made a big difference," she comments. "That, with the right timing. After I did my first video, I took it to several companies but I felt that MCA was the one—and they've been wonderful with me."

Pebbles hired the producers for the project and says that she was particularly happy with the way her session with the hot team of L.A. & Babyface (the duo from The Deele who produced "Girlfriend") as well as the work she did with Danny Sembello and Paul Jackson, Jr. "Alex Brown, who worked on 'Slip Away' and 'Two Hearts' was a real treasure too-she gave me a lot of assistance with my vocal performances—I call her 'the teacher.' Danny was great and L.A. and Babyface-well, they're like my best friends in the business and I know we're going to work together on the next album." Production chores on the album also included work by Charlie Wilson of The Gap Band and Andre Cymone, who produced "Love/ Hate," a song featured on the "Beverly Hills Cop II" soundtrack.

"The public's response to the first single has been great," Pebbles smiles. "I know that you can be the most talented person in the world but if the people don't like what you do, you can forget it." Pebbles feels that she's been fortunate in that knowing and working around some already established acts has helped her get a better perspective on what she wants to accomplish. After entering talent shows and putting together dance troupes at an early age, she shifted her focus to singing during high school.

She met musician Bill Summers in 1979 when he was recording his Walking On Sunshine album. "Bill took me under his wing and helped me learn a lot at a young age," she recalls. The talented young vocalist worked with Con Funk Shun in the early '80s, cowriting one of the group's singles, "Bodylove." Former Con Funk Shun member Michael Cooper returned the favor with "Do Me Right," one of the songs on Pebbles' debut. Pebbles says that

members of the group Sister Sledge were among her staunchest supporters—"I met them when they were recording next door to Con Funk Shun"—inviting her to sing on some of their shows. "They showed me that it was possible to survive in the music business without all the craziness—I'll always be grateful to them for what they taught me."

Now firmly embarked on her own career, Pebbles is excited about her prospects for the future. "I definitely want to get more involved in production. I worked with L.A. and Babyface by coproducing a song on The Boyz and I loved doing that. I really think I have a knack for producing, maybe even more than singing. So that's one area. Then I'd love to get into fashion—you know, do commercials, magazine layouts and so on. But I'll play that by ear-right now, I'm concentrating on making sure that my strategy is working. All I know is that when people-men and women—come up to me and tell me how much they can relate to songs on my album, I feel very gratified—it's like I'm getting back all the love I put out."

With her second single, "Mercedes Boy," already taking off at Black radio as well as becoming a hit record in Holland, Pebbles is headed for the U.K. to do promotion. Her life, she says, doesn't look quite the same way it did three months ago! "It really hasn't hit me yet just what has happened. I've been so busy and things have been so hectic that I haven't had time to stop and think about it. I do know that I haven't had much time for myself but then, I realize just how important it is to work hard right now. I definitely don't want to be seen as a one-hit wonder: I've seen so many people come and go and I don't want that, especially after everything I've put into getting to this point."

Displaying self-assurance and radiating self-confidence along with clarity that her success is derived from team effort—involving everyone from radio personnel, record company promotion staff and management to the nation's record buyers—Pebbles is clearly on the way to fulfilling her dream of a lengthy and successful career in the entertainment world.

WHATEVER HAPPENED TO...

ARLES WRIGHT & THE WATTS 103rd STREET RHYTHM BAND BV





According to Charles Wright, in 1969, "Do Your Thing" by Charles Wright and The Watts 103rd Street Rhythm Band inspired the Isley Brothers to write and record their version, "It's Your Thing." Both tunes were hits that year, with "Do Your Thing" reaching #12 on the charts and "It's Your Thing" became #1. In 1969 Charles Wright and The Watts

103rd Street Rhythm Band enjoyed the first successful Black band on Warner Bros. Records under the presidency of Joe Smith, now with Capitol Records. The group had three hits in '69: "Do Your Thing," "Till You Get Enough," "Must Be Your Thing."

In 1970 "Love Land" was a hit, but "Express Yourself" became the monster Top 10 across the country by August of 1970.

I was well into my second year as program director of WTLC in Indianapolis when "Express Yourself" was smoking.

1970 was also the year when U.S. and South Vietnamese forces crossed the Cambodian borders to get at enemy bases. Four students were killed at Kent State University in Ohio by National Guardsmen during a protest against the war. (I wonder whatever happened to the commanding officer who gave that order...) Well anyway, the same year two women generals—the first in U.S. history-were named by President Nixon. This all happened in the month of May, 1970, while "Express Yourself" was climbing the national charts to the number one spot.


A big career boost came early on via comedian Bill Cosby, who met with Charles Wright in the late '60s when Charles was a studio musician. Cosby liked what he heard and what he saw. (The entire rhythm section was left handed.) Cosby later persuaded Wright to join him on the Warner Bros. label, changed the name of the studio group to The Watts 103rd Street Rhythm Band and took the band on tour. Producer Fred Smith was also involved in making the transition.

Some 20 years later, Charles Wright invited me out to his home in beautiful Cerritos, Calif. He came into his huge living room and walked around his piano dressed in a white dinner jacketlooking happy and healthy. Charles Wright still has it all together. A great writer, arranger, performer and the originator of a group that was to become a way-station for some of L.A.'s finest.

Commenting on the music scene today, Charles Wright stated, "I admire the young Black rappers Run-D.M.C. and L.L. Cool J. They are strong young Black men and I love what they stand for." Charles himself has just created a rap song entitled, "Strawberry" and it's a gas. He also admires the accomplishments of Charles Huggins at Hush Productions in New York and "Things

Charles is from a large religious family and he's concerned about drugs in Black communities across the country. He is also wary about religion becoming part of the political world, but he's confident that it'll all work out fine.

It was the late great Jesse Belvin who discovered that Charles had considerable talent and invited him to join a group called the Shields in 1958. They had a hit called, "You Cheated." He also spent some time with another group named the Gallahads.

Many of us remember the classic, "Those Oldies But Goodies Remind Me Of You' by L'il Caesar and The Romans. Well, Charles Wright, working as an A&R man for Del-Fi Records in Hollywood, produced that hit in 1961.

Living the good life here in Southern California, Wright says, "L.A. is the best place in the country to live, but it's too laid back and everybody is a star." He likes to travel to New York and Washington, D.C. just to get in the energy flow of what's happening. He also said he would like to visit the Mississippi Delta where he was born—if the attitudes have changed.

Charles Wright moved to Los Angeles when he was 12 with his parents and 11 brothers and sisters. He graduated from Manual Arts High School and attended L.A. City College before embarking on his now historic music

As for the other members of the group, Raymond Jackson is working in film animation; Melvin Dunlap is developing computer chips; James Gadson is a studio drummer; and Bill Cannon has relocated to the Midwest, Big John Ravmond, who was one of Charles' favorite people, is now in the limo business; Yusuf Rahman produces environmental tapes; Gabriel Flemings is with the Albert Collins blues band; and Bernard Blackman was replaced by Al McKay who went on to Earth, Wind and Fire and is now a producer.

Charles Wright feels that The Watts 103rd Street Rhythm Band was the most creative band in the world. He's currently writing a book chronicling the great experience in its entirety. With that kind of history, I'm confident that Charles Wright and The Watts 103rd Street Rhythm Band sound will snap back and take their "Wrightful" place on the charts today.

Payola Probe Hits Black Radio

LOS ANGELES: In the wake of the recent indictments here of four independent record promoters, including Arizona-based William Craig, shock waves are being felt throughout the industry. Speculation is being fueled by word of continuing probes in other cities and immediate

repercussions on those named, though not indicted, in the previous disclosures by U.S. Attorney Robert Bonner.

At presstime, it was learned that Del Rice, Program Director at KPRS/Kansas City, was officially terminated from that position. Confirming Rice's departure, GM Prim Carter told BRE, "We just don't tolerate any of our air personalities working with or for record companies for pay of any kind. In fact, we have our jocks sign an affidavit up front saying that these are our rules on this issue. It puts the station in jeopardy with the FCC. For these reasons and in light of the pavola indictments, we felt we had no other choice but to terminate Del Rice."

According to Carter, Rice has been with KPRS for at least 15 years. He could not be reached for comment.

BRE has also learned that Larry Tinsley, PD of WAOK-AM/Atlanta, also cited in the probe, was placed on leave of absence from his duties—with pay-pending the outcome of the investigation.

Run-D.M.C. Lawsuit Settled

In an out-of-court agreement, rap artists Run-D.M.C. and Profile Records have renegotiated their existing contractual arrangements. The group will now record a total of 10 more albums for the New York-based label. Run-D.M.C. originated a suit against the company last July alleging nonpayment of royalties and publishing income, with Profile countersuing.

Under the terms of the new deal, Profile has increased the group's royalty share by 40%, according to Russell Simmons, founder and president of Rush Artist Management, which manages the band. A new LP from the million-selling group, "Tougher Than Leather" is due in May, with a movie of the same name scheduled for summer release.

MCA's Trump Card?

Developer Donald Trump has obtained federal approval to purchase up to 24.9% of MCA, Inc., the parent company of MCA Records, after filing for FTC permission under the Hart-Scott-Rodino antitrust act. Last month, MCA said Trump already owned 375,000 MCA shares (about 0.5%) worth just under \$17 million.

BNN Debut Slated

The Black News Network is set to debut on September 1, with coverage of the 1988 presidential election from a Black perspective to inaugurate the syndicated radio service. The daily, fiveminute series called "BNN Election '88" wil air in 118 markets, representing 77% of all U.S. homes and 93% of Black households. According to Allen Theall, BNN's VP of public affairs and producer of the segments, this is the first and only coverage of a presidential election by a Black news organization.

'Soul Train' Music Awards Nominees Announced

LOS ANGELES: At a special press conference held here at Cyril's, Barry White, Vanessa Williams and members of The Whispers announced nominations for the 2nd Annual "Soul Train" Music Awards, set to air live nationally on Thursday, March 30 at 8:OOPM (PST).

Major nominees for the Awards include Michael Jackson, Earth, Wind & Fire, Angela Winbush, Levert, Prince, Stevie Wonder, Jody Watley, Janet Jackson, Aretha Franklin and Natalie Cole. LL Cool J, Whodini, Dana Dane and Kool Moe Dee are among the nominees for the two rap categories while the "Best New Artist" category features Terence Trent D'Arby, Expose, Miki Howard and Shanice Wilson. "Soul Train" creator Don Cornelius also announced that Dionne Warwick will be the host for the evening, which he termed "a significant breakthrough for women in hosting a prime time Awards show."

In addition, Cornelius noted Natalie Cole will be featured in a major opening production number focusing on her smash, "Jump Start" and her current single, "Pink Cadillac" and The Whispers will perform their

major hit, "Rock Steady". As recipients of the special Heritage Award, Gladys Knight & The Pips will be performing "Love Overboard" for the first time on national television.

Sponsored by Coca-Cola USA with travel arrangements by American Airlines, the show's executive producers are Cornelius and Emmy-Award winner Steve Bir der. Dennis Rosenblatt will direct and Cornelius and Anthony Sabatino will produce the Awards Show. "The show is necessary because it properly applauds the achievements in black music on an appropriate basis," Cornelius stated.

LOS ANGELES: Stating that the company is continuing its ongoing reconstruction, Motown Records President Skip Miller has announced that ten promotion and sales employees have been dismissed. Commenting that he considers that Motown is now "down to the best staff members in the company," Miller noted: "We're at a point

where we deal with what is necessary."

The recent appointment of industry veteran Al Bell as President of Creative Systems is seen as a major step in Motown's reorganization. When reached, Bell told BRE that his principal role is "to make whatever contribution can forward the development of the new approach of operating a record company. I'm working closely with everyone in the company as we prepare the design and structure of the company for the next 30 years," Bell added.

Motown's upcoming release schedule includes product by new artists Ada Dyer (produced by James Carmichael), female duo Magic Lady and Greg Wright, with singles coming from Right Choice and Stevic Wonder, a remix of "Get It", his duet with Michael Jackson.

BURBANK, CA: After joining the label in November, Ernie Singleton has been elevated to the post of Sr. VP/Black Music Marketing and Promotion at Warner Bros. DAT Fight Continues

WASHINGTON: In the ongoing battle surrounding the use of DAT (Digital Audio Tape) machines, its' effect on home recording and the possible loss of revenue for the recording industry, the latest development surrounds a report by The National Bureau of Standards on the special "Copycode" system developed by CBS. The report claims that the anticopying device is "inadequate" and "deficient", leading RIAA President Jay Berman to state that the Copycode "is no longer politically viable." The outcome will almost certainly be the beginning of importation of DAT equipment from Japan, although RIAA officials maintain that manufacturers who import the machines are open to legal action.

Motown Specials To Air Again

Two historic Motown TV specials are scheduled for primetime viewing within the next nine months, resulting from a deal concluded recently between distributors King World and Access Syndication. The muchacclaimed "Motown 25: Yesterday, Today, Forever" (which features Michael Jackson's dynamic "Billie Jean" performance), hosted by Richard Pryor, is set for June while "Motown Returns To The Apollo" (with performances by Jackson, Smokey Robinson and Diana Ross) will air in the late fall.

FCC Approves 50K Increase For WDCU

The Federal Communications Commission has approved WDCU-FM radio's application to increase its power from 6,800 to 50,000 watts

According to WDCU GM Edith Smith, "Other than the obvious result of being able to reach a considerably larger amount of listeners, the increase in power will significantly increase the value of the station. Additionally, as a noncommercial station that will be relying more and more on public support in the coming months, we see the increase as an avenue to more fund drive dollars."

WCDU-FM, which is licensed to the Board of Trustees of the University of the District of Columbia, currently reaches nearly 100,000 listeners, but the power increase will double that amount. Smith also said that the station will soon conduct a Capital Campaign drive to raise the \$113,000 needed to purchase a new transmitter and antenna.

NEW YORK: Well, the 30th Annual Grammy Awards Show arrived in New York on March 2 and of course, I was right there. The Grammys saluted recordings released between October 1, 1987 and September 30, 1987 in 73 categories. Winners were elected by ballots cast by members of the National Academy of Recording Arts & Sciences in seven chapters around the nation. NARAS' 6,000 members include recording artists, songwriters, musicians, producers and technicians.

The most disappointing element of the entire Grammy hoopla was the fact that Michael Jackson struck out in the Album of the Year, Best Pop Male Vocal, Best Male R&B Performance and Producer of the Year categories. Now, real-ly, he should have won something! This loss probably is an indication of industry backlash to his Thriller winning eight Grammies in 1983 and the "Michaelbashing" resulting from reports of his bizarre and sometimes outlandish behavior. His Bad album debuted late last year but still managed to gross as the biggest selling record of 1987. It was ironic that Humberto Gatica and Bruce Swedien won a Best Engineered Recording Grammy for the album. Nevertheless, Mr. Jackson's invigorating song and dance routines of "The Way you Make Me Feel" and "Man In The Mirror" have to be lauded as the "Performance of the Year." "BAD" Engineering Wins Grammy

I would like to congratulate **Bruce Swedien** and **Humberto Gatica** on their Grammy for engineering (non-classical) on Michael Jackson's *Bad* album. Quincy Jones sure knows how to pick engineers. A few years ago a major audio engineering magazine stated that the *Thriller* album—also engineered by Swedien—was the best-engineered album in recording history! I could not agree more. Being an amateur speaker designer, I use both LP's to test my designs. Thanks Bruce, and keep up the fine work.

Product Preview

Orban, manufacturer of the now famous 8100 A-1 Optimod-FM, announced a new piece of gear called the **222A Stereo Spatial Enhancer** Quoting Orban's news release:

"The unit is primarily designed for use in AM and FM stereo broadcasting to add dimension and depth to a station's stereo image. The 222A can also be used successfully in the final processing of stereo CD and Cassette masters."

The 222A is placed in the program line prior to the audio processing. I'm sure the San Francisco-based Orban Company will be glad to send you more information about this unit.

Another product that really isn't new but I find interesting is the **3302 Stereo Signal Manager** manufactured by **SCIP Electronic Systems** of Pacific Palisades, CA. This device is basically a phase corrector.

Have you ever had listeners call and say that they can't hear the vocals on a certain song? After questioning the caller you will find that they are listening on a mono receiver.

If an out-of-phase stereo signal is combined to mono, you will lose the mid- and high-frequencies of your signal. This is called phase cancellation. A defective cart, or cart machine, or an improper patch can cause this problem. Have it re-dubbed on another cart, and let the engineer know just in case it's a machine problem. The thing I like about this unit is the built in LED X-Y display eliminating the use of an oscilloscope for diagnosing such problems. Having such device in the production studio could nip many problems at the bud.

Phase Tech Tricks

There are several devices to correct phase that can be placed in the program line. I am personally a little leery of these. The best remedy for this problem is to make sure the signal going in is in phase. A defective cart can cause phase problems. Talk to your engineer about setting up a checking procedure to assure that even brand new carts do not have phase problems.

Here's a trick for dubbing mono oldies using the stereo phase principles. If you dub a scratched mono record using a stereo cartridge, you can eliminate the "pops" by connecting the left and right channels together. The pops and clicks hit the left and right channels of the stereo cartridge out of phase, then the program material is in phase. By connecting the two channels together the pops are literally shorted out, and the program material is untouched. Give it a try—you'll be pleasantly surprised.



BLACK PIONEERS IN RADIO AND RECORDS

In the conclusion of this three-part series, the legendary Sid McCoy continues his reflections on the radio scene in Chicago some three decades ago—a golden era where he, "Daddy-O" Daylie, Norm Spaulding and others brought the Black jazz legacy to the airwaves in sharp contrast to its limited exposure today.

To many of his Chicago area listeners, McCoy was the bedroom-voiced deejay equivalent of crooner Billy Eckstine. He admits that many were the calls he'd get from men irate because their ladies had unfavorably compared their voices—hence, their sex appeal—to the suave disc jockey's. "Hell, man," would be McCoy's inevitable, good natured comeback, "you know you got more action during my show than any other time of the week."

One of McCoy's trademarks was his ability to make each member of the listening audience feel he or she was being spoken to individually. "Hey, hey, old bean, and you, too, baby," he would croon in a mellow tone, and, for each listener, the salutation seemed privately-extended. McCoy credits the style to Dave Garroway, another pioneering Chicago electronic host. "All the other air people seemed to 'announce' their lines," reflects McCoy. "Garroway talked to you, alone."

Holmes "Daddy-O" Daylie was a McCoy contemporary and friend. Daylie came into the business under the umbrella of Sam Evans, Benson's biggest rival in the late '40's. Daylie intro-ed the Swing and BeBop platters he played with a brand of glib, rhyming chatter unique for the time. "Here's a word from Bird I know you haven't heard—it's so good it's absurd," Daylie would say as he put on a new Charlie Parker record. And he maintained that hip stream of corresponding sounds at the end of his lines, non-stop. Today's rappers, whether they know it or not, owe their shirts to Daddy-O.

Another Benson protege was Oscar Brown, Jr. The legendary entertainer's first on-air gig was a show called "The Negro Newsfront." The broadcast, often controversial since it brought radio audiences their first taste of news from a Black perspective, also increased Benson's ratings.

Brown's show happened to be sponsored by his father, a well-to-do realestate broker and trade school owner. That being the case, the sharp-tongued talent never worried about offending the corporate side of the business with his criticisms. But one show, in particular, did create inordinate static. During that program, Brown verbally assaulted the mighty DuPont Corporation for polluting the environment, in general, and not hiring Blacks, in particular.

The firm, in turn, put pressure on the station to get rid of the outspoken young commentator, and so management did.

As soon as the listeners heard about Brown's ouster, however, the uproar was such that the station's bosses had to reinstate him immediately. And, ever since, Brown—who would go on to much bigger things in the entertainment world—has kept the edge on his tongue for those he perceives as having wronged humanity, in general, and Black people, in particular.

For all of his differences with Benson, McCoy remembers "The Old Swingmaster" as the consummate professional. "He was the teacher of us all," McCoy says, as he remembers other past-masters of the on-air game who came up under Benson. "There was Norm Spaulding, an immaculate voice, and Lucky Cordell and Richard Stamms and...so many more."

Nearly every one of them went on to greater glory because of the start Benson offered. McCoy, himself, eventually became the host of a singularly popular jazz show, "The Real McCoy," which aired five hours a night, five days

a week on radio station WCFL-AM. That show not only branded McCoy's easy style on listeners in about a dozen midwest states, it was also the launching pad for a generation of jazz fans, both Black and white, within earshot of the 50,000-watt station.

In 1967, McCoy left Chicago for Los Angeles, getting involved in television acting and directing. Daddy-O Daylie is in semi-retirement and Al Benson is deceased.

The legacy of Black radio's on-air personalities is deep and wide. It is through them that Black people have not only come to know the music and its makers much better, Black people have probably gotten to know themselves better, as well.

Nineteen-year-old Brooklyn native and Tabu recording artist Kid Flash stopped by BRE's offices to talk to Rap editor Duff Marlowe. Flash's single "Hot Like Fire" is burning up airwaves coast-to-coast and a video to the song has been released. The Kid's debut album is called He's In Effect.

BRE: What inspired you to start rapping? **KID FLASH:** Well, in New York it's like everybody's rapping anyway in school. But you know I was rapping with another group called Mantronix, and then after rapping background for them, I was rapping with Whiz Kid and just doing house parties and parks and going up to the Roxy and the Funhouse and messin' around with all the groups that were just coming out like Whodini and the Fatboys.

BRE: How long have you been living in California?

KF: I've been here almost two years now. **BRE:** A lot of people now claim that rappers should have a solid background in the "old school" rap style. Do you think that's important?

KF: Not really, 'cause nowadays if you've got strong connections and you've got juice and you come in correct on your record then you're just as strong as anybody else. It's all politics, and you're gonna get over if you've got people behind you that are pushing you and

that believe in you. It's gonna work just like one hand washing the other, you do what you got to do and they do what they got to do. A lot of old school rappers' now are not even around. So if you've got to come from the old school, then where are they to show you how to do it?

BRE: Why do you think that rap is so overwhelmingly popular among today's kids?

KF: Kids can't really get with R&B all the time because their minds are young and they're moving so fast and new rap records are coming out all the time...So they want to listen to what's hip, you know what I'm sayin'? They want to kick it with some Kool Moe Dee, some Kid Flash, some L.L....I don't think they're really into that R&B. Especially in New York, that's all you hear on the street is rap. You wouldn't hear no Luther or Patti LaBelle with someone who's 13 or 14. All you want to hear is some beats and somebody rapping. It doesn't even have to be a name brand. Some kids make their own cassettes. I'm from Brooklyn and I know 'cause all over the streets in Brooklyn is rap, hip-hop...In the clubs on Friday and Saturday nights, at the World, the Latin Quarter, it's hiphop. You don't hear any normal R&B or disco records.

BRE: Do you think Rap is underrepres-

ented on Black radio stations?

KF: One thing I can say that somebody brought to my attention the other day is that L.A. is the only city that has a Rap *station*. KDAY is a hit breaker Rap station. It's a Rap radio station. New York doesn't have a Rap radio station. WRKS is not a Rap station. They only have Rap shows.

BRE: Rap seems to have an ever broadening appeal. Do you feel that your music is going out specifically to a Black audience or that Rap is strictly a Black phenomenon?

KF: No, it's definitely not. We just Continued on page 26

finished the "Hot Like Fire" video and we had white and Black kids down there. They broadcast it on the radio and the crowd was a mixture of everything. It wasn't just a Black thing. Everybody came down and it worked out well. On my album, a lot of my stuff is not directed to just one audience. Like I've got something called "Protection" about teenagers getting pregnant. Black and white kids can get pregnant, so that goes for both of them. Another one is about apartheid. That's a rap about South Africa and apartheid, so you know that goes both ways too. Everybody is going to take everything in a different way, I know that, but it's a record for both crowds, and both crowds are with it, you know what I'm sayin'?

BRE: Rap's subject matter is often criticized...

KF: You can take a rap and make it into a story about a subject, or you can brag. Anybody can brag. You can say anything about yourself, but when you take a positive subject and turn it into a song, then you're doin' something. 'Cause that takes a little bit more thinking, a little more than just talking about yourself. I take a human, positive approach. There's some bragging in there too; that's there 'cause that's hip-hop and I can't change that. I'm gonna stay on track, but I'm taking it one more step to a positive effect.

BRE: Who do you like in the current Rap arena?

KF: I'm with some Run-D.M.C. I was always with Run and them 'cause they had that family effect. You know Run, Darryl and Joe, it was like "you can't stop us," and that's what they did...you couldn't stop them. So now they're on top. I like L.L., I like a lot of stuff that's produced well like Run-D.M.C., the Fatboys, Whodini, They don't just make those local records that stay right in New York or L.A. and nowhere in between, they go everywhere, and I'm not going to follow in their footsteps—if anything they're gonna follow in mine in the long run. And with the tightness that I've got we're gonna be up there with them or we're gonna be over them.

Crossing musical genres from traditional to big band to R&B and fusion, the talent line-up for the 10th Anniversary Playboy Jazz Festival will once again bring top performers to the Hollywood Bowl on June 18 and 19—including many legendary artists who have headlined previous festivals.

According to producer George Wein, the following is a brief listing of the artists set for the two-day jazz extravaganza. The order of appearance for the Saturday and Sunday performances will be announced at a later date.

Mort Sahl takes over the Master of Ceremonies slot occupied in recent years by jazz buff extraordinaire Bill Cosby. The satirist reprises his historic role as the host of the first Playboy Jazz Festival held in Chicago in 1959.

SATURDAY, JUNE 18

Carmen McRae, a singer's singer and supreme interpreter, displays the style that has made her one of the most critically acclaimed jazz artists in the business.

Saxman **Kenny G.,** whose first appearance on the Playboy lineup in 1986 brought the crowd to its feet, returns for an unprecedented third straight year.

Bass virtuoso **Ray Brown** began his career more than four decades ago and returns to the lineup from his 1979 appearance.

Others on 'the Saturday lineup include Grammy-winning guitarist Larry Carlton, King Sunny Ade and his 19-piece African Beats "juju" band, the Michael Brecker Band led by the "quintessential session saxophonist," and blues-rock

A headliner at the '59 Festival, the legendary **Dizzy Gillespie** and his All-Star Band return this year under the direction of Jon Faddis to share the joyous jazz of the man with the upturned horn and a host of brilliant sidemen.

"The Genius"—Ray Charles—debuted with Playboy at the Bowl in 1984 and performs in his inimitable style with the Raelettes and the Ray Charles Band.

Bobby McFerrin, whose voice-as-instrument brand of jazz earned him a 1987 Grammy for his work on the film, "Round Midnight," adds another dimension to the '88 lineup.

Trumpeter Freddie Hubbard adds a Latin flavor to his redhot hornsmanship at this year's Festival appearing with flutemaster Dave Valentin, percussionist Airto Moreira and vocalist Flora Purim in their version of "Latin Jazz '88."

Innovative pianist/composer Ahmad Jamal reprises his standout performance in his native Chicago at the '59 Festival at the Bowl this year.

Rounding out the all-star Sunday Playboy Jazz Festival lineup are fusion specialists **Spyro Gyra**, whose 1985 performance excited the audience and critics alike; internationally hailed blues vocalist/pianist **Jeannie Chatham**, making her first Festival appearance; and **The Timeless All-Stars**, a sixmember ensemble featuring jazz stalwarts **Bobby Hutcherson**, **Cedar Walton**, **Billy Higgins**, **Harold Land** and **Buster Williams**.

The New York-based singer/songwriter is currently enjoying major success in Europe with her latest release...Hotter than hot Morris Day has a cameo role in the Richard Pryor film, "Moving," his first on-screen appearance since his scene-stealing comedic antics in Prince's "Purple Rain"...Blues great Memphis Slim (real name Peter Chatman) recently passed away in Paris at age 72. Slim was known for his bass-heavy playing style and as composer of a number of blues standards, including B.B.
